School Week Has Started

Eastland will join schools throughout the state this week in observance of Texas Public Schools Week.

Local citizens have been urged to visit schools here during the special week set aside. Schools Week has been celebrated in Eastland since 1951.

Public Schools Week has become an outstanding annual event here, having been observed for six years with ever-increasing interest and participation of school patrons and parents.

Gov. Price Daniel has proclaimed the week as officially set aside as Public School Week.

March 4-9 has also been set aside as Teacher-Appreciation Week by proclamation of Governor Price Daniel for the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The complete text of the official designation follows:

"Three great institutions of American life—the church, the home, and the public school—exert powerful influences upon our youth in preparing them for useful citizenship.

"The public school teachers of Texas have great responsibility that cannot be valued merely by statistics or by dollars and cents. In doing their job well, our teachers must work long hours, keep constantly abreast of new developments, and continue their own studies in their chosen fields.

"Many problems face our teachers, not the least of which is the present shortage of teaching personnel which has placed an added burden upon those in the profession. All citizens should do their part in helping the public school teachers fulfill their responsibilities, which grow so much greater with every passing year.

The first session will be the House of Delegates meeting Friday night in the Main Auditorium. At this meeting, area officers for 1957-1958 will be elected.

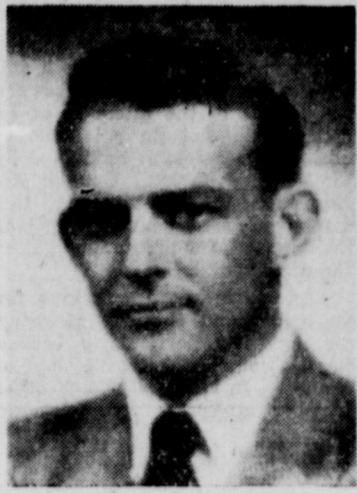

Two Personnel Changes Made By Texas Electric

Texas Electric Service Company has announced changes in personnel affecting two of its Eastland area supervisors.

J. C. Kuykendall, superintendent of the Leon Power Plant since January of 1955, will move to the Company's Morgan Creek generating station near Colorado City. L. C. Kinard, assistant superintendent of the Leon Plant, will succeed Kuykendall as superintendent.

Kuykendall moved to Eastland from Wichita Falls in September of 1951 as assistant superintendent, and was made superintendent in January, 1951. He is a graduate of Southern Methodist University and a registered mechanical engineer. He is a director of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Rotary Club of Eastland and of the First Methodist Church. Upon moving to Colorado City he will assume supervisory responsibilities with TESCO's Morgan Creek Plant, one of the largest and most modern generating stations in the Company's system.

Kinard came to Eastland in January of 1955 from the Company's Permian Basin Plant near Monahans. He is a mechanical engineer, having graduated from Texas A&M and has been with Texas Electric Service Company since August, 1949. He has been active in the Lions Club of Eastland, and is one of those responsible for the organization of the Little League movement in the City. He has also been active in Boy Scout affairs in the Eastland area.

Kinard will succeed Kuykendall as superintendent of the Leon Plant effective March 13, Frank Sayre, district manager, revealed.

Three File For City Posts Near Deadline

Seaberry, Germany, Perkins Announce

Three of Eastland's leading young business and professional men filed their names as candidates in the Eastland city election late Thursday afternoon.

Announcing their candidacy for the three vacancies on the city commission were Virgil Seaberry, Jr., attorney; Bob Perkins, owner of Perkins Implement Co.; and Jack Germany, Cornelius Theatrical Printing Co. associate.

The three were the only candidates to announce for the offices as late as noon Saturday, the last day for filing. Mayor George L. Davenport and Commissioners T. L. Fagg and Norris Wilson announced earlier Thursday that they would not seek re-election.

Marine Reserve Recruits Must Get Training

Captain Wayne A. Hudson, executive officer, 87th Special Infantry Company and Captain R. P. Haun, platoon leader, Third Platoon, 87th Special Infantry Company, U. S. Marine Reserve said Saturday that after next month the only recruits that will be taken into the organized Marine Corps Reserve will be six-month trainees.

The "open" enlistment becomes a thing of the past for men without prior military service with a new Marine Corps order now in the process of being distributed to all reserve echelons, he explained. The move to limit enlistments of men without prior military service strictly to the six-month training program has been ordered by the Department of Defense. The Defense Dept. is seeking to build the reserve forces "solely with trained reserve reservists in the organized units." Ultimately the Secretary of Defense decides that organized units be made up only of prior active-service personnel and men who have had the equivalent of four months or more of active duty.

Six-month training has frequently been cited by Brigadier General Thomas G. Ennis, director of Marine Corps Reserve, as the way to attain stability in drill pay units. Currently the Marine Corps has exceeded its 1957 quota to date for enlistments in this category. General Ennis has stated that the program is in an extremely healthy state.

Curtailed of "open" enlistments, those to which there is no active duty requirements, means that the quota for six-month trainees will probably be raised.

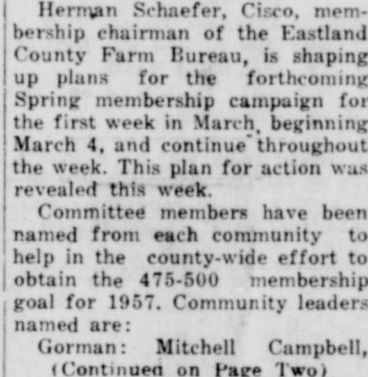

Eastland Bids Jim Farewell

This past week was a big one in the life of Jim George. Jim, after 38 "good years" in Eastland, boarded a train here Thursday afternoon. His destination: Greece, his homeland.

It wasn't a lonely exit, though. At the station friends of Jim's waited with him for more than an hour waiting for the train, which was late. And the day before George was treated to a farewell party by Victor Cornelius at the White Elephant cafe. Cornelius served coffee and French pastry to almost 200 of Jim's friends. Large printed signs, "Bon Voyage Jim! If You Don't Like Those Greeks Hurry On Back," were featured everywhere in the cafe.

It was a fitting farewell for Eastland to pay to Jim. For more than 30 years he ran a cafe here, and has probably served more meals than any other individual here. He was speechless as his friends sang "For Jim's a Jolly Good Fellow."

Jim returns to his homeland after 50 years in the United States. Two years ago he sold the Manhattan Cafe and has been in retirement since that time. "I have been thinking for sometime that I would visit my homeland," he explained, "and have at last decided to do so."

The 74 year old native of Greece plans to make his home in Arta, the town where he was born. Arta is located 135 miles northwest of Athens.

Jim has been a citizen of the United States since 1926. He was presented with his citizenship pap-

ers in ceremonies in the courthouse in Eastland that year. Two years later he purchased one of the first Cadillac automobiles ever brought to Eastland.

"It took me 4000 chili sales to pay for that car," George recalled recently. Jim's passport to Greece is good for two years. He said he didn't plan to stay there six months if he doesn't like it. He was 23 years old the last time he saw his native land.

A niece and two nephews will be waiting in Greece to see their uncle. The niece's name is Sperdola and the nephews are Kerkos and George. Jim said that was all the family he knew of that is still in Greece.

While in Eastland Jim was a credit to the First Baptist Church, which he was a member of. Anyone who was here during the depression will tell you that no one ever left his place of business hungry that he knew about. He fed hundreds who couldn't pay and even paid for hotel rooms for many of them.

Before he left, George said, "I am humble grateful to those I feel closest to in going out of their way to make things easier for me. Without that confidence and help of friends and associates, indeed the going would have been very difficult."

Eastland hopes George finds happiness in Greece. But if he doesn't this city waits with open arms for the return of the Chili King.

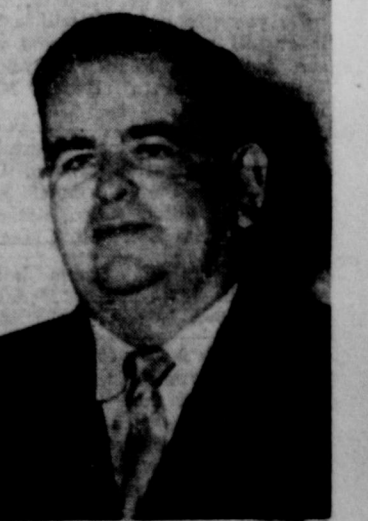

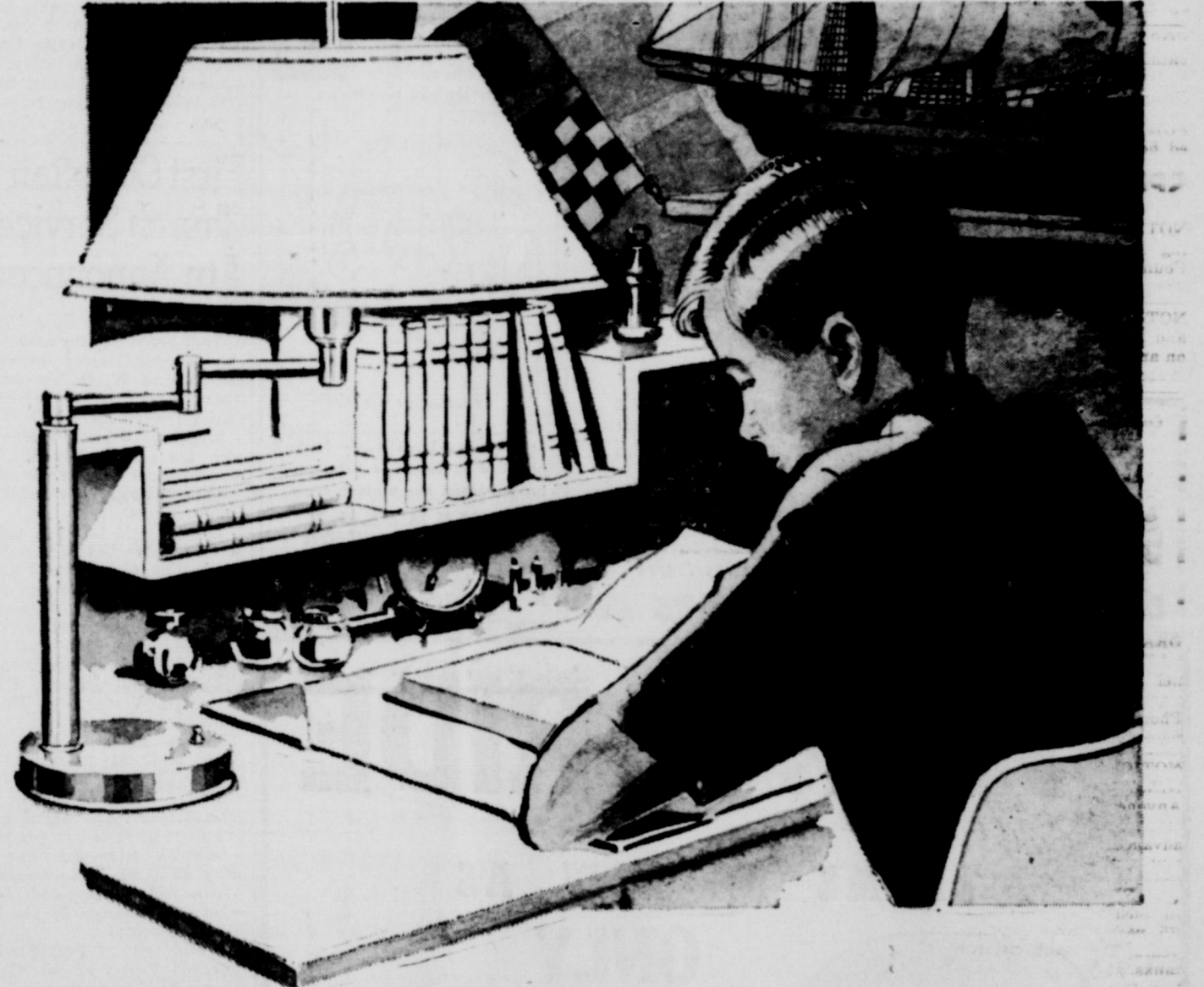
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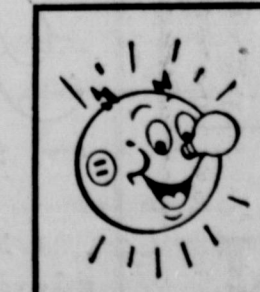
