USO Has Big Peace Time Job to Handle

One of the participating agencies of the Eastland United Fund Drive is the U. S. O.

The purpose of the USO is to serve more than 2,500,000 men and women in the armed forces and their dependents. It is a voluntary, civilian federation of six national agencies and is responsible to the President of the United States and the Secretary of Defense.

President Eisenhower is national honorary chairman of USO.

Member agencies are Young Men's Christian Associations, National Catholic Community Service, National Jewish Welfare Board, Young Women's Christian Association, the Salvation Army and Stationary Travelers Aid Association.

Requests for USO services are received from the Department of Defense and from civilian communities faced with a heavy military impact. The USO itself also may initiate plans for additional facilities. Since USO funds are derived from voluntary contributions, these requests are studied met on a strictly priority basis.

USO is NOT a part of the Federal government structure. USO receives its support through United Funds, Community Chest and other voluntary community campaigns, including independent USO campaigns in New York City and Chicago.

Established on February 4, 1941, USO now has 267 local units of service in this country, and overseas. In addition, special programs for military and naval maneuver areas are planned and carried out as needed. Through its entertainment division, USO provides units of both professional and approved volunteer entertainers for turning overseas military commands throughout the year.

Twenty-two of the USO clubs and lounges are outside the continental USA—Anchorage, (two clubs), Fairbanks, Kodiak, the Canal Zone (three clubs), Nice, Cannes, Paris, Casablanca, Athens, Salonika, Rhodes, Istanbul, Naples, Rome, Seoul, Guam, Manila, Tokyo and Honolulu.

The USO program is designed to meet the specific human needs of members of the Armed Forces in off-duty hours, and wherever they may be serving those needs remains basically the same—friendship, entertainment, recreation, acceptance by the community, help with personal problems, and contact with the centers of their religious faiths.

During a recent 12 month period, visits to USO clubs and activities totaled 42,389,907.

In the same 12-month period, an average of nearly 50,000 civilian volunteers per month devoted a total of nearly five million hours of service to USO programs.

Home hospitality, a plan introduced by USO to encourage civilian families to invite military personnel into their homes for dinner and an evening of home entertainment, was provided 99,027 times.

On nearly 7,000,000 occasions, armed forces personnel and their dependents sought and found a variety of information at USO centers.

More than half a million pieces of religious literature were distributed; housing placements were made for military families 266,409 times; counseling and guidance serves were used 98,061 times; USO show troupes gave 1,375 performances before GI audiences overseas; USO snack bars and canteens served more than 14 million.

Safeway Halts Save-A-Tape Plan In Local Store

Clarence Jenkins, manager of the Eastland Safeway store, revealed this week that Safeway's Save-A-Tape plan will be discontinued in favor of a new program.

The plan was introduced in this area about a year ago. As of tonight (Saturday), Safeway will no longer issue green register tapes for premiums.

"You will have a full four weeks beyond this time, until Aug. 18, in which to redeem the tapes you now hold for premiums," Jenkins explained.

He said the new program would be introduced in the immediate future.

Turkey Growers To Hold Meeting Thursday Night

Members of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association will hold their first meeting since the election of new officers Thursday night in the courthouse at Eastland.

A spokesman said Hardy Tidwell, who recently returned from a trip to Washington where he spoke to Sec. of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, would speak at the meeting. Tidwell will discuss the possibility of the government buying surplus turkeys this year.

The meeting will begin at 8 p. m. and all members have been urged to attend.

Plans for the annual Fall barbecue will be made, and problems facing turkey growers will be discussed. Ed Ivy is new president of the organization.

Dudley B. Houle Gets MS Surgery Degree Thursday

Dudley Benningfield Houle of Eastland was one of three University of Minnesota students to receive master of science in surgery degrees Thursday night.

Houle, who earned his B. A. degree in 1949 from Texas Christian University and his M. D. degree in 1953 from Tufts College, majored in surgery and minored in physiology.

His thesis was "The Effect of Respiratory and Methabolic Acidosis on the Pressor Effects of Epinephrine, Norepinephrine and Metaraminol."

University of Minnesota July graduate heard an address by the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president of the College of St. Thomas and St. Thomas Military Academy, St. Paul.

Father Shannon, who taught religion and history at St. Thomas before being named president in August 1956, was selected St. Paul's Outstanding Young Man of 1956 by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

A native of South St. Paul, he is a graduate of St. Thomas, the University of Minnesota and Yale University.

University President J. L. Morrill conferred degrees upon approximately 400 Summer Session graduates, and he presented certificates of completion to members of the University Army, Navy and Air Force ROTC.

Following the ceremony, President and Mrs. Morrill were hosts to the graduates and their relatives and friends at a reception on the Coffman Memorial Union terrace.

Kincaid Feed Soon to Have Feedmobile

Don and Aubrey Kincaid and Robert Ables are returning this week from Lancaster, Pa. where they attended a factory training school on the operation of their new mobile feed processing plant.

Their new Feedmobile will soon be placed into operation by Kincaid Feed & Turkey Hatchery.

The three men flew to Duffin Manufacturing Company in Lancaster this past week-end for three days of intensive instructions in bringing a complete feed processing service to local farmers and feeders.

Their new mobile mill will now enable them to take the feed plant to the farm instead of asking farmers to bring their grains to the mill.

Don says that Kincaid Feed and Turkey Hatchery expects to provide better and faster service to farmers and to extend the range of their operations.

"With our new Feedmobile," he said, "we can now drive right up to the farmers bin-door, grind anything he grows for feed, mix the ground material with high-protein commercial concentrates and other additives, and blend in warm liquid molasses. There's a pneumatic unloader on the Feedmobile's mixer-blender which quickly pipes the finished formula feed to wherever the farmer wants it."

The new service, according to Aubrey, will greatly reduce the amount of labor and time normally needed to get feed prepared. It will also enable farmers, he said, to maintain an uninterrupted supply of fresh, productive rations since the mobile mill will serve farms on a regular route schedule—even during planting, haying, or harvest time.

Pipkin Reveals Meeting of WTCC Board in Abilene

Grady Pipkin, District No. 5 vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, announced today that board members living in this area, will meet in Abilene on Friday, July 25, at 1:30 p. m., in the WTCC headquarters office.

He said the meeting was one of a series of district meetings being held for WTCC directors in which the program of work for the coming year will be outlined for board approval.

Plans call for WTCC president, R. E. Godfrey of Fort Worth, and the regional chambers executive vice president, Fred H. Husbands of Abilene, to present the tentative program of work for the directors' suggestions, additions and approval, he stated.

The work program, which was developed in recent sub-committee meetings, includes the West Texas Chambers' activities in the fields of agriculture and livestock, public information, industrial development, state affairs, water resources, national affairs, community services and member relations.

In addition to planning next year's work, Pipkin said the board would be given a brief review of last year's activities. He stated that particular emphasis has been placed, in recent months, on national affairs, including taxation and legislation.

The counties to be represented in the district meeting for this area include Callahan, Eastland, Fisher, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, and Taylor.

No Boat Sirens At Lake Leon

In a monthly meeting of the Eastland County Water Supply District Board earlier this week, the use of sirens on private boats at Lake Leon was unauthorized.

The board voted to allow no sirens of any type on boats at the lake, except for the water patrolman's boat. A siren on the boat of Eb Richardson, patrolman, will signal any danger or approaching trouble.

Eastland Keeps Sharp Eye On Middle East

Eastland, like the rest of the world, has kept a close eye on happenings in the Middle East in the last few days.

The threat of war has caused some concern here, especially among parents and wives of servicemen.

President Eisenhower's action in ordering the Marines into Lebanon has met mainly with backing here. There has been some belief, however, that the action came too hastily.

A number of Eastland men are members of the National Guard, Marine Reserve and Army reserve units.

"Secondly, assuming that the FBI would consent to such investigation (which they would not without direct orders of the Department of Justice, Washington, D. C.), it would take them more than a week to make such investigation, and by that time the forthcoming election would be over.

"Thirdly, and again, if they were to make such investigation (which they won't), they would not release their findings for public consumption so that my opponent might use them also as a political football to try to influence voters."

"There are State agencies (as well as Federal Agencies) whose primary functions are to investigate alleged irregularities within State and Federal agencies. In the State of Texas, for example, we have, among others, the following State investigative agencies: State Police (Texas Rangers) and Highway Patrol, Motor Vehicle Bureau, Adjutant General's Office, Bureau of Vital Statistics, Board of Supervisors of Elections, Department of Correction, Board of Medical Examiners, Department of Education, Industrial Accident Board, and the Public Welfare Agency, that makes investigations in the malfunctions within the State Public Welfare Agency. The Federal Government's Surplus Food Program is also administered under a Division of the U. S. Government that makes its own investigations, when necessary. This Agency is not the FBI.

"For my opponent's information, I herewith list the various departments of the Federal Government and their related investigative agencies: U. S. Armed Services (Intelligence Divisions, Unit Provost Marshals, Military Police, Criminal Investigation Divisions, Unit Personnel Divisions, Demobilized Records Branch); Treasury Department, (Division of Investigations, U. S. Customs, U. S. Coast Guard, Secret Service, Intelligence Unit, Internal Revenue Depart-

Candidates For County Judge Swap Verbal Slaps

Politics entered the final week here, today, with the Democratic primary election coming up Saturday, and the heated county judge's election has claimed the local spotlight.

Two strong candidates, Judge John Hart and former Judge Clyde Garrett, have been busy all week exchanging shots in the county judge's race, after the campaign was broken wide open by Garrett's charges Monday before the County Commissioners Court that Hart was making a "political football" out of the Surplus Food Program.

Latest development in the affair is Hart's press release stating he planned to ask the FBI to investigate the charge that the surplus food program is being used to further his campaign for re-election.

Garrett immediately replied, in a statement released to county and regional newspapers, that "... such an investigation on the part of the FBI is wholly outside their jurisdiction."

Judge Hart told a reporter representing the Eastland Telegram and The Ranger Times that he hadn't called in the FBI as late as Friday, but that he was taking steps to do so.

Hart pointed out that the surplus food program, although administered locally by the County Commissioners Court, is handled in Austin by a State agency, which answers to the Federal Government.

A check shows that Eastland County pays all employees who handle the program on a local level, and also pays the cost of transporting the surplus food to Eastland for distribution. The only other cost is for rent of the lower floor of the Masonic Building. At the present time, some 1800 Eastland County citizens are receiving surplus food.

Here is Garrett's prepared statement:

"If my opponent were aware of the functions and duties of the various State and Governmental agencies, he would know that such an investigation on the part of the FBI is wholly outside their jurisdiction. The FBI would not concern itself with such. The FBI, under the Delineation Agreement of the U. S. Government concerns itself with the investigation and prosecution of the following acts: 'Treason, Sabotage, Subversion, Infiltration of Foreign Nationals in the U. S. Government and its various departments, and Kidnapping (where there is evidence of interstate transportation of the victim, and where more than 24 hours has elapsed since the alleged crime), and other such related acts of violence against the Federal Government."

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ment, Bureau of Narcotics, Alcohol Tax Unit); Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI); Identification Division, Single Fingerprint File, International Exchange File, Technical Laboratory, Law Enforcement Bulletin Division, National Police Academy.

"And here are a few more, Office of Naval Intelligence, Office of Special Investigation, U. S. Civil Service Commission, Post Office Department, U. S. Maritime Service, Federal Communications Commission, Department of State, Census Bureau and the U. S. Marshall's Office.

"If any department of the Federal Government would even consider to associate itself with such a purported investigation, it might possibly be investigators of the U. S. Marshall's Office for the Northern District of Texas, certainly not the FBI."

Garrett further stated that he doubted very seriously if the Federal Government would permit any of its investigative agencies to be used as a "political football" in a purported claim to clear any administrator's skirts so that the results of such investigation for political purposes, in an effort to gain votes.

As a matter of fact, it should not be necessary for Mr. Hart to ask the FBI to make an investigation as to whether employees of the Surplus Food Program have been harassing and intimidating our old people by telling them that the program may be discontinued (Continued on Page Two)

Dave Pickrell Farms 200 Acres As Hobby

A 200-acre farm for registered hereford cattle and bulls, owned by David D. Pickrell, was last Tuesday's Mystery Farm appearing in this paper.

Pickrell has owned the farm four years, purchasing it from the J. H. Clemmer estate. Prior to that time, it was owned by O. S. Savage.

It is located two miles south of Ranger near Peterson's Nursery. People often notice the white fence, while passing by.

Pickrell is superintendent of Ranger's Division of Premier Oil Co. He is a past president of Ranger's Rotary Club, a bucker of Little League and Teen-Age League baseball (serving as president of the latter), and an active civic leader. He has lived in Ranger for 18 years.

About 30 cattle graze on the pasture of native grass. At present, Pickrell also has five registered hereford bulls. One of the bulls took first place in the PHA show in Eastland this year. It was shown by Pickrell's son, Dave II.

Farming as a hobby, a total of 3,300 bushels of oats were grown on 75 acres of land this year. Pickrell also grows oats and maize, making hay from the oats.

Some wheat is also grown. Most of the grain is used as weed for the cattle.

STATE NEWS

We have this week sent accounts to most of our subscribers, and feel assured that could they witness the immense sensation, caused by a \$2.50 piece right about this office, they would open the hearts and purses and wipe out our scores. Some of you have been reading the paper all last year without paying for it, and now we appeal to you to pay us for the old subscription and for the coming one in ADVANCE.

Money can be sent by mail at one risk. To our agents who have made collections for us, we say, don't delay remitting until some acquaintance visit Austin, but send through the Post Office at any time.

The Fourth being Sabbath, the morning of the 5th was ushered in by the firing of one gun for each of our thirty-three sovereign states which adorn the glorious galaxy. The booming sound was echoed back from an hundred hills and re-echoed through the whole ex-

tent of the country. At an early hour of our streets were thronged with hundreds of our citizens mostly wearing happy faces. At half past eleven the thundering cannon told us that the Quitman Rifles were marching to the Capitol in their blue and white uniforms and appropriate small caps under the command of their gallant Captain, Washington Hill.

We have elsewhere spoken of the prospects of this road, and now before our readers the following condensation by the editor of the Galveston News. Our citizens must feel an interest in the completion of this road to Brenham, since it is impossible that the terminus can remain in the very center of the richest country in the world. The ode of building by the people themselves must heartily commend itself to every man.

"The company expects to complete the road from Hempstead to the River within sixty days from the present time — it being an air line from Hempstead to the river, and grading very light. It is thought \$1000 per mile will complete the road but ready for the cross-ties, on this portion of the road. Thirty dollars per month for first class hands are allowed, payable in the stock of the company, which it is supposed can be made the best paying stock in the state."

The first crop of figs ripened in our garden about two weeks ago; and last Tuesday the 22nd, inst., we had fine, large, ripe Early Pork peaches, Texan Advocate.

Texas Tourists Spend \$531 Million In 1957

AUSTIN — Vacation motor travel is big business in Texas, with nearly ten and a half million tourists spending \$531 million as they piled up four billion miles of driving during 1957.

These figures were mentioned today by J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, as he warned Texans of the many traffic accidents that occur during summer's peak vacation months.

"Every year, more and more persons take to the open road during the summer months," Musick said. "And each year, more and more of them manage to get themselves injured or killed in traffic accidents while on vacation."

He attributed such accidents to many causes, but listed the principal ones as being:

(1) Excessive speed. Because many vacationers try to cover too much territory in too short a time, speed is an important factor. More than fifty percent of the drivers in rural fatal traffic accidents are traveling at excessive speeds at the time of the accident.

(2) Alcohol. People on vacation are likely to be in a holiday mood and frequently their pursuit of a good time includes drinking. Drinking and driving is a combination which is entirely out of its involvement in more than a third of all rural fatal traffic accidents.

(3) Laws. Failure to observe traffic signs and laws exacts a high annual toll. About one-fifth of the cars smashed up in rural fatal accidents are found to have disregarded warning or stop signs.

(4) Fatigue. Driving while fatigued is a foolish practice indulged in by vacationers who won't take time out to get sufficient rest. On a national basis, about one out of thirteen drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are found to be in a physical condition that could be a contributing factor in the accident. In about two-thirds of such cases the drivers are fatigued or asleep. "Don't turn your vacation dream into a nightmare," Musick said. "Use a few common sense safety rules and courtesy. Be especially conscious of your driving speed—slow down and live!"

Milk Program Bill Signed

COLLEGE STATION — President Eisenhower has signed into law a bill providing for continued operation of the Special Milk Program, which makes more milk available to children. The program will be available to the more than 5,000 summer camps, day camps, recreation centers and other child-care institutions, and schools which plan to participate in it this summer. It will serve three-quarters of a million children. This includes the schools which hold regular summer sessions as well as schools which operate during the summer to make up for time lost during the harvest season.

Enactment of the bill, which extends the program for three years, also makes it possible for school administrators to make orderly plans for continued participation when schools generally reopen this fall. Last school year, more than 75,000 schools and institutions took part in the Special Milk Program, serving nearly two billion half-pints of milk to children. This was in addition to milk served under the National School Lunch Program.

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce	1/4 teaspoon Tabasco

Combine all ingredients in saucepan. Bring to a boil; boil 1 minute. Use to brush chicken during broiling or grilling.
YIELD: 1 1/2 cups or enough for 2 broilers.

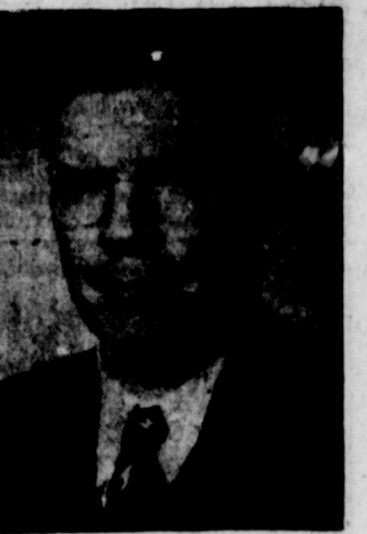

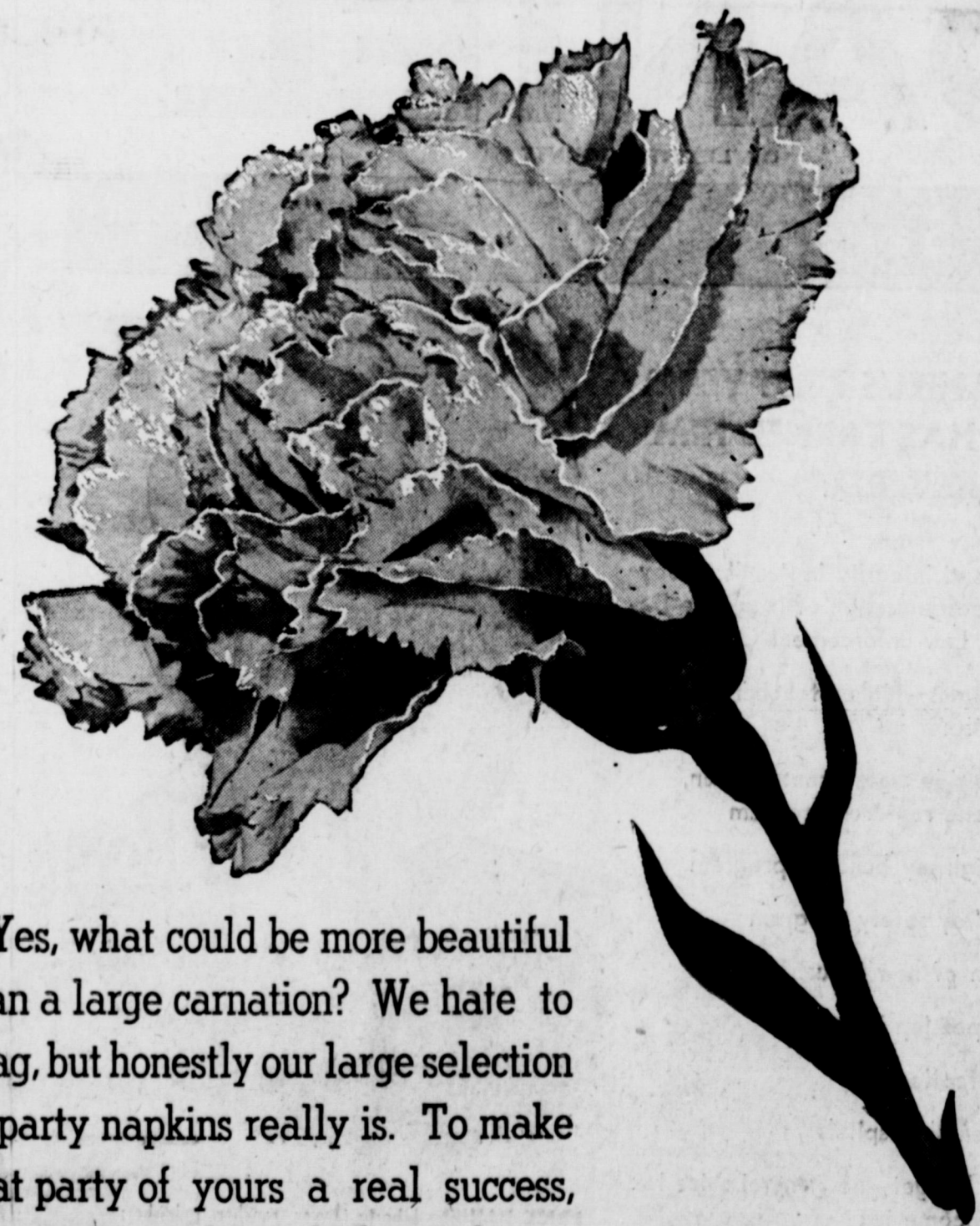
