Hospital Wing Decision Is Left Up to Directors

Stockholders of the Eastland Memorial Hospital voted Tuesday night at their annual meeting to let the Board of Directors decide if a new wing should be added to the hospital.

Directors had asked stockholders to make the decision, but on a motion by Jack Frost, seconded by Clifford Wilson, it was voted to leave the final decision to the directors. Frost said he felt directors were in a better position to decide the issue, since they had all of the facts.

President Bill Hoffmann said a meeting of the directors will be held "sometime next week" to decide the matter. Hoffmann strongly recommended that a new wing be added. He said Eastland doctors are asking for the new wing right now and declared, "From all indications everyone is of the definite opinion that we should have a new wing."

Hoffmann was one of the directors named to serve another term. Billy Frost was also elected and Herbert Weaver is the new member of the Board. He succeeds Tom Wilson. Holdover members of the Board are Parks Poe, Buda Butler, Ewing Baker Jr., Bob

Perkins, R. M. Sneed and Curtis Feen.

Hoffmann opened the meeting by saying there had been some "misunderstanding in the paper." He said the meeting was called to decide, if a new wing was to be built and not to consider if the present hospital should be re-equipped. He maintained that the present hospital equipment is "in good shape."

He called on Maxine Meisenheimer, new hospital administrator and asked her what would be more beneficial to the people of Eastland, a new wing or some equipment named by the administrator (kitchen equipment, portable lift, improved signal system and improved wiring.)

"I feel that if we had the wing our income would increase and we could buy the equipment we need," he was told.

Hoffmann told stockholders that plans for the new wing have been drawn up and cost estimates made.

Plans call for constructing the wing northeast of the present hospital, connecting with the present kitchen and room 12. Added would be an administrator's office, nurses' lounge, therapy room, eight two-bed patient rooms and two private rooms.

Hoffmann said he felt the hospital had enough money, counting the Ford Foundation gift, to build the wing, and he said he believed it would get equipped if built.

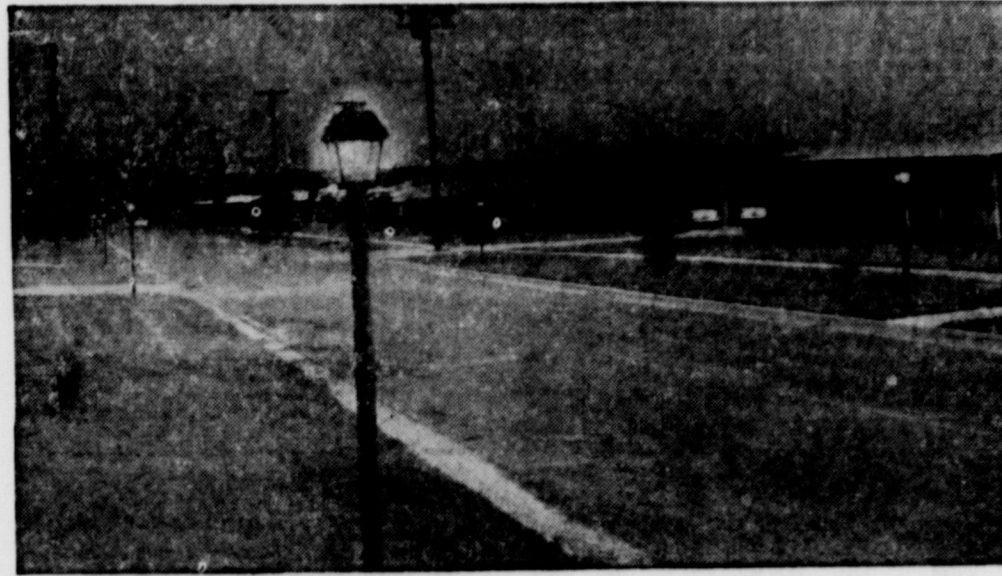

TALES OF LOST TREASURES IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY

In the early 1800's Juan Manuel, ruthless Mexican bandit and merciless gunman, robbed, burned, and murdered his way across

Central Texas wantonly. With his band of cohorts he wrought havoc everywhere he went. To the pioneers moving westward he was feared as much, if not more perhaps than the dreaded Comanche Indians themselves.
Manuel was born in what is now El Macho, state of Coahuila, Mexico in 1793. By the time he was nineteen he had formed his own band of thieves and in two years time had reached the height of his insatiable deeds.
Everywhere in what was later to become the Republic of Texas Manuel and his men killed ferret or drive them forever out of Mexico. After what amounted to several skirmishes the latter was eventually realized. The "rurales" drove the bandits into what is present-day Stephens County, where Manuel finally eluded his pursuers and hid out with his remaining in the broken country along the breaks of the Clear Fork.
Records show, that besides himself, Manuel's remaining troop totaled the disheartening sum of only two. They had successfully escaped with what amounted to a fortune within itself although it was only a paltry sum of the original spoils that they had had to leave behind in Mexico.
Proving the old aphorism that there is no honor among thieves, Manuel's greed and avarice soon got the better of him and he shot his two remaining men in cold blood, grabbed the gold and started for Iowa Territory. He hadn't gotten over two or three miles until Comanches spotted him. Frantically, Manuel took cover and quickly buried the gold. He then prepared himself for the fight that inevitably was soon to come. In a matter of minutes, the hostiles attacked with all their fury. They fought Manuel the rest of that day and when night came it afforded him the necessary cover to escape into the thickets. Several months later he appeared in Iowa Territory ragged and beaten. After a few days Juan Manuel died from over-exposure in the wilderness, with his gold where he had left it.
Obviously, posed as Apache warriors, they robbed wagon trains, stages and pack trains loaded with silver. Sometimes they were Comancheros and then again border bandits of the vilest sort. Oft times they made their headquarters in the Ladrone Mountains near the Rio Bravo where they plied

STOCK MARKET REPORTS

Cattle and calves were generally steady to strong at Fort Worth as stocker buyers were numerous and aggressive and shippers and independent packers also set a fast pace. There was some ineffective lower bids offered on the early rounds but these bidders were quick to surrender or go empty-handed.
Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$25 to \$27 and medium and lower grades scaled from \$18 to \$24. Fat cows drew \$19 to \$21.50 and canners and cutters sold for \$13 to \$19. Bulls brought \$18 to \$22.50.
Good to choice slaughter calves ranged from \$24.50 to \$27.50 and common and medium steer calves cashed at \$27 to \$33 and light weight stocker yearlings scaled from \$31 downward. Feeder steers sold from \$22 to \$26, a load of strictly good feeders weighing 803 pounds from Les Ringo of Gordon at the \$26 top. Heifer calves sold mostly from \$29 downward, a few lightweights above that range.

The delayed action break in swine prices which featured the close of livestock trade at northern centers last week struck at Fort Worth Monday. After considerable delay in getting trading started, during which it was well past mid-morning before any movement toward the scales started, salesmen were forced to yield.
At the close, butcher hogs and packing hogs were 50 cents to mostly \$1 per hundred lower. Shippers took about a deck of choice hogs at \$21 and the other choice hogs sold at \$20.75. Medium cart trains transporting rich bullion via the old Chihuahua Trail. Top prices were paid for No. 1 pelt lambs. Cull to medium lambs sold from \$14 to \$19. Stocker and feeder lambs sold mostly from \$19 to \$21, a few higher. Slaughter ewes sold from \$7 to \$8. Aged slaughter bucks sold for \$6 to \$6.50. Goats ranged from \$6 on hard canners, up to \$8 for fat wethers.
