Mrs. B. A. Tunnell Dies Sunday; Services Held

Mrs. Buford A. Tunnell, 55, a Ranger resident for 31 years, died at 10:45 a. m. Sunday at Ranger.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Monday at the First Methodist Church with Rev. Lively Brown, pastor, and Rev. Olin Tunnell, pastor of the Southwood Methodist Church of Dallas, officiating.

Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery with Killingsworth Funeral Home in charge.

Born Venita A. Daniels July 12, 1903 at Cisco, she married Buford A. Tunnell there May 17, 1923. Her husband is Texas & Pacific Railway agent in Ranger.

The couple lived in Abilene from 1942 until 1945, when he was T & P agent in Abilene.

Mrs. Tunnell was first vice president of the Child Welfare Club, president of the 1920 Club, past president of the W.S.C.S. of the First Methodist Church, of which she was a member, and a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Survivors include her husband; one daughter, Mrs. David L. Adams of Abilene; one brother, I. V. Daniels of Abilene; three sisters, Mrs. James M. Shelton of Abilene and Mrs. Cate Crawford and Mrs. Mabel Keefer, both of Cisco; and three granddaughters.

Pallbearers were S. M. McAnelly, J. E. Matthews, R. V. Galoway, James Ratliff, W. F. Creager, Frank Pearsall, J. A. Bates, David D. Pickrell, George Williams and V. V. Cooper Jr., all of Ranger.

Four are Fined For Hunting By Artificial Light

Four out-of-town persons were fined in Justice of the Peace Court No. 2 Saturday for hunting with an artificial light in deer country.

Charles Bobo, justice of the peace, said that the hunters were apprehended Saturday morning about 1:30 and Saturday night about 11. He fined two of the persons, Saturday night, \$67.50 each—including costs. The other two hunters were fined \$117.50, including costs, Saturday morning.

M. S. Dry, State Game Warden, made the arrests. He found one group on a public road near the Tudor Community, and the other two on Highway 80 east of Ranger.

Deer season officially started Sunday morning, although it is not known if the hunters were after deer. It is a violation of law, however, to hunt with artificial light in deer country.

Second County Rat and Mice Campaign Underway

The second rat and mice control campaign for the year got underway this week when the Eastland County Farm Bureau set up several bait stations over the county for the convenience of their members as well as for the general public according to John Love, Cheaney, president of the sponsoring organization.

Fumarin treated bait will be used in this campaign, same as for the first campaign waged last August he said. The need for killing the rodents now is perhaps as great if not greater than it was in August according to Love. As winter approaches rats and mice will begin migrating from the woods and fields into houses, barns, cribs, grainaries and other places in even greater numbers looking for food and shelter.

The fumarin treated bait can be obtained at a reasonable cost at not only Loves Place in the Cheaney Community but also at the J. D. Caldwell farm near Garman; A. Z. Mycirkes Locker Plant in Cisco; Arther Wrights farm in the Long Branch Community;

Herman Schaefers place in the Nimrod Community and at Perkins Implement Store in Eastland. Other bait stations may be set up later if necessary.

Fumarin is quite similar to Warfarin it was explained. The widespread use of an anti-coagulant bait has proven to be relatively safe for use on farms and ranches and in the vicinity of children, pets, poultry and livestock. Repeated ingestions of the material over several days is necessary to cause the thinning down of the blood so that internal or external bleeding starts. Once this

She was born March 12, 1895 in Graham and lived in Olney most of her life.

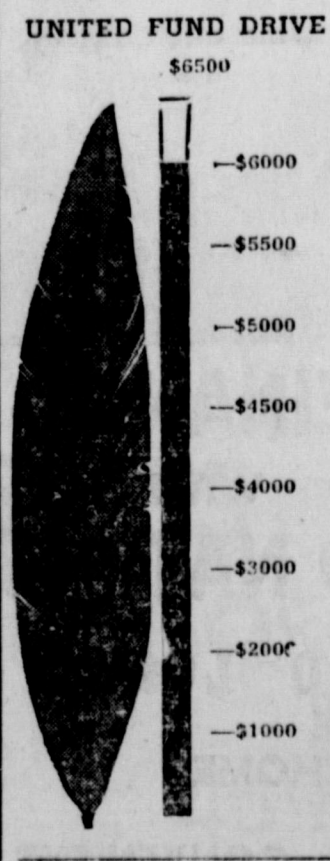

Pecan Growers Asked To Enter Pecan Show

Pecan growers in Eastland and adjoining counties are being invited to enter exhibits at the Sixth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show, to be held in Ranger on Dec. 12-13.

Wilson Guest, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, is issuing a special invitation for growers to enter pecans in the show. The two-day affair will be held in the Joseph building on Main Street.

Six more entries in the Pecan Show have been received at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce office. Four entries were received from Joe Lawrence of Olden, two different native varieties, one Burkett and one Stuart variety. W. W. Paschall of Ranger submitted Stuart and Success entries.

County Agent J. M. Cooper is sending out letters this week to all the towns and communities in the county notifying them of places where pecans can be picked up for entry in the show.

Two candidates in the Eastland County Pecan Queen contest have been announced. They are Zelma Hendricks of Route 1, Eastland, representing Pumpkin Center, and Carolyn Cawley, of Carbon, representing Okra.

A quart of pecans will constitute an entry. People who live in towns are invited to have entries in the show, as well as those in the country.

"We are planning to make this the biggest and best pecan show ever held in the county," T. C. Wylie, chairman of the agriculture committee, said in commenting on plans for the show that has attracted attention throughout West Central Texas.

Growers are limited to one entry of each of the improved varieties of nuts. For example they may have one entry of Burkets.

Lake Leon Docks Are Hard Hit by Tornado

A tornado early Monday morning skipped over Lake Leon, ripping off the roof of one boat dock and overturning another. About

7:25 a. m. Monday the twister had reached the southwest section of Strawn where it did considerable heavy damage.

Last report indicated that the tornado had struck about two and one-half miles east of Strawn damaging cars and trucks near the H. C. Vandaveer & Son Aggregate Co.

The roof of a boat dock, belonging to E. N. Varner, who lives near the lake, was ripped off by the tornado winds Monday morning. About the same time the twister up-turned the Joe Jackson dock and left the all-steel structure upside down and partly in the water.

Varner reported that he felt the boat dock lift up about six or eight feet when the tornado struck and carried away the roof. High winds preceded the tornado's path and continued over the area for most of the day.

Preceding a cold front, high winds and "freak" weather conditions were reported over most of the state Monday, some doing considerable damage.

Have was wrought by the high winds in straw, but no injuries were reported.

The roof and neon sign at Andy's, belonging to Andrew Marine of Strawn, was damaged in the wind. A metal roof with a pipe frame was carried across Highway 146, from the the Pruitt Recreation Club, about 200 yards, scattering debris in the area.

Roofing of the Housley Garage was stripped off and left behind by the tornadic winds.

The twister was sighted by several residents of Strawn who reported that it as in a cloud-like shape that created a suction capable of blasting out windows.

Left in the path of the tornado were broken TV and radio antennas, shattered tree limbs and branches, broken poles and electric lines.

About six or seven homes were reported damaged by the storm. One of the heaviest hit was the Bob Shubert residence. Winds separated the back two rooms about five inches from the rest of the house, according to reports. The roof and windows were also damaged.

The whirling wind blew off several garage doors, blew away a Lone Star meter house, blew off the roof of a storage room, and broke several poles near a transformer station.

Part of the roof of the C. C. Cole house was severely damaged, along with several others in the vicinity.

High winds in Ranger blew over the weather box at West Texas Gulf pump station. No severe damage in the area was reported, however.

The high winds followed 20 of an inch of rain which fell on the area Sunday and 13 Saturday. Friday's rain, measuring .75, brought the three-day total up to 1.08 inches.

All 7-A A players, except those playing for Cisco, turned in their uniforms Saturday and from here on out it will be basketball for them.

Cisco, on the other hand, will get a late start at the roundball sport. The Lobos, undefeated in 10 straight games, will play Gran-

bury Saturday at 7:30 p. m. in Brownwood for bi-district honors. In final round action last week, Cisco slaughtered Coleman, 44-12; Langer shipped by Eastland, 21-14; and Ballinger downed Winters, 32-14.

Animal Disease Meet Important, Love Announces

"An important area-wide meeting to discuss ways of controlling costly animal diseases will be held Nov. 20 at the Texas Hotel in Fort Worth," according to John Love, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

The county farm leader urged all livestock and poultry producers to attend the one-day session, which starts at 9:30 a. m. The meeting is one of six being held in Texas under sponsorship of the Texas Animal Health Council. Purpose of the meeting is to bring the facts of the serious animal disease problem to all producers in the state.

Dr. L. R. Noyes of Fort Worth, executive director of the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, will explain the animal disease situation in Texas and Dr. John L. Wilbur Jr. of Fort Worth, veterinarian in charge of Texas Animal Health division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will discuss what is being done by state and federal governments to control diseases in livestock and poultry. Other speakers include C. G. Scruggs of Dallas, associate editor of "Progressive Farmer" and secretary of the Council; Harold Nelson, president of the Texas Milk Producers Federation and chairman of the Council; and C. H. DeVaney, vice president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Local leaders planning to attend the session are Dr. Dick Hedges of Ranger, chairman of the local animal Health Committee, and John Love.

Busiest Peanut Week In 8 Years Reported

Last week was one of the biggest weeks from the standpoint of peanut receipts in Eastland County since 1950, according to reports.

The heaviest movement of peanuts in the county since that time was reported. About half of the Ranger area peanut crop has been received, according to T. C. Wylie, vice-president and general manager of the Ranger Peanut Co., Inc. Wylie said that peanuts filled up one warehouse, with a capacity of about 800 tons, last week, and part of another warehouse, with a capacity of about 1,000 tons.

Recent rains have slowed down the peanut movement, but no crop damages have been reported. If the weather stays dry, the movement should continue to be heavy this week.

Monday, Nov. 10, was a busy day in Rising Star when over 200 tons of peanuts poured through the grading station. Later receipts showed improvement in grade.

Total receipts through Tuesday were over 600 tons with the bulk of the crop still to come in at Rising Star. Harvest reports indicated that over 2,500 tons were expected from area yields.

An average production of 20 to 25 bushels per acre is prevailing throughout the county, with some farms yielding about 60 bushels.

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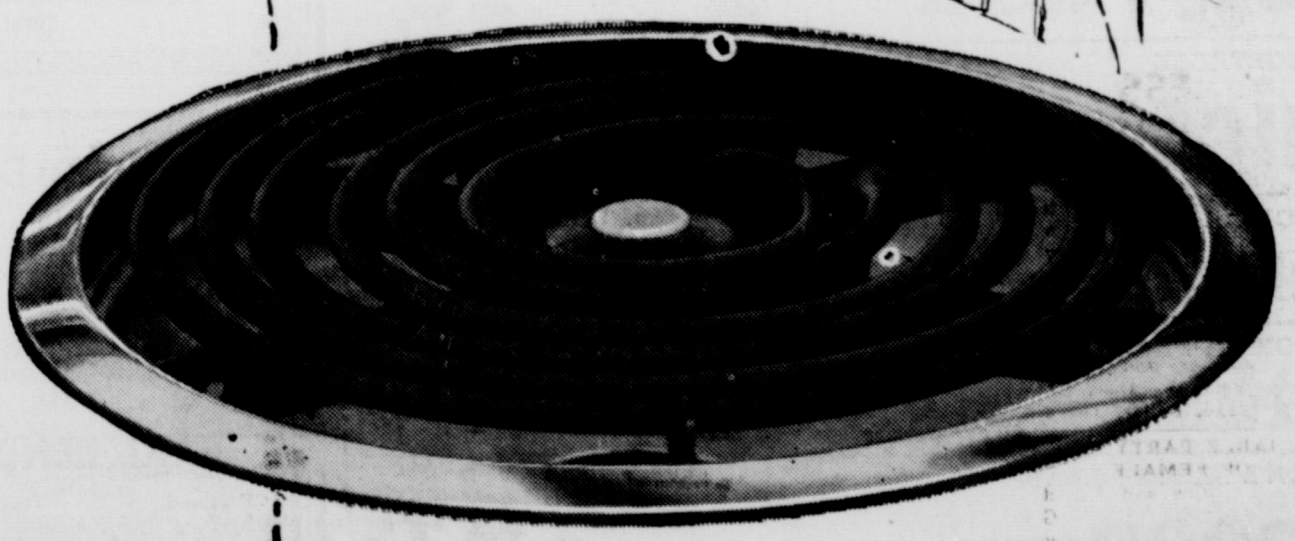
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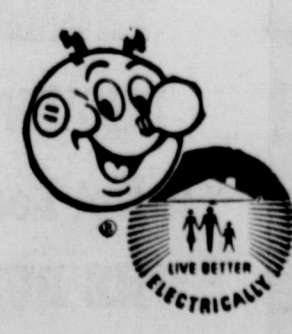
