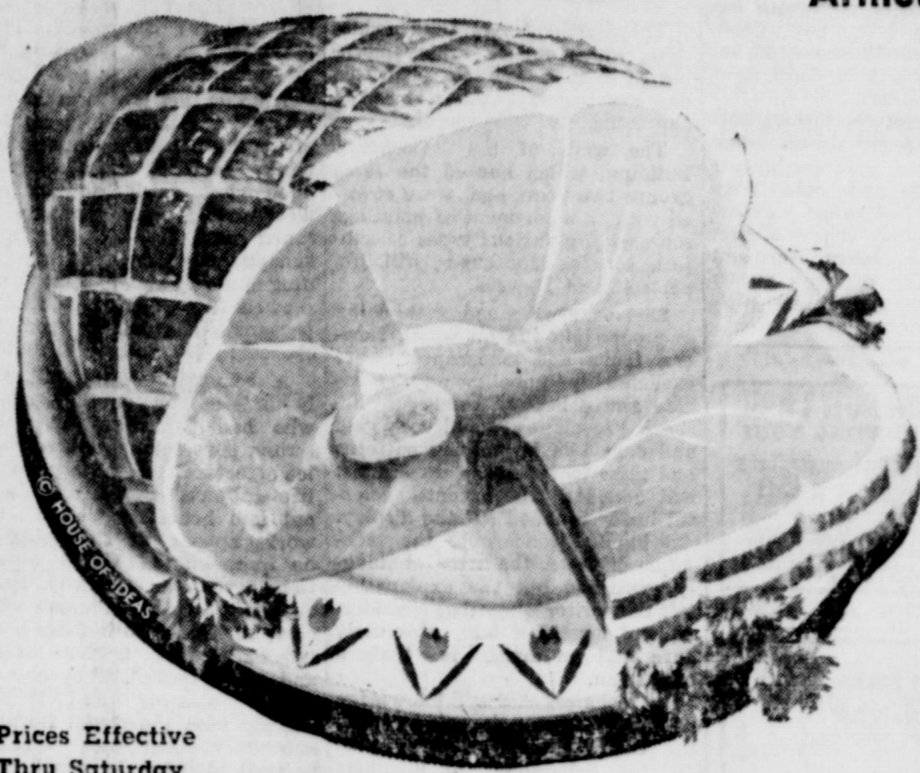
This year's turkey crop is estimated at 82.3 million birds, a new record. Heavy-breed birds are especially abundant. Many of these come from Texas' \$15 million turkey industry. New-crop cranberries also are from a record-large harvest.

Both beef and pork are on the November list to provide meat variety for hearty meals. Total meat production has been running considerably higher than a year ago.

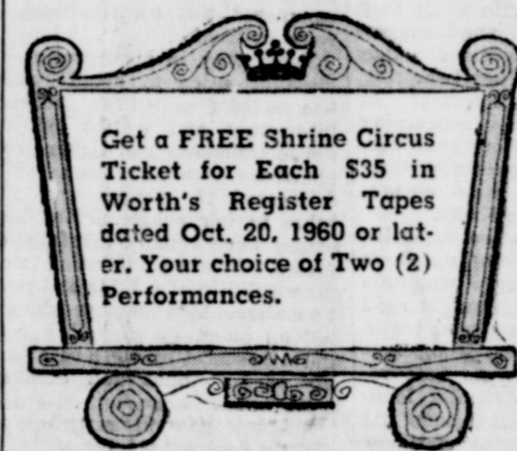

### Art Show Draws Big Crowd Here

The Eastland Art Club exhibition, which opened Friday morning at 9 a.m. and closed Saturday evening at 7 p.m., attracted approximately 700 visitors.

The walls of the Cornelius Building, which housed the same groups two years ago, were covered with an assortment of paintings representing various types of subjects such as landscapes, still life, portrait and flowers.

Shelves were lined with china and porcelain tile on which flowers, fruits and landscapes were executed in unbelievably intricate and delicately beautiful designs. Procelain covered with gold and etched in the same artist had added a transcendently colorful luster rounded out the display. An inquiry concerning the technique of these, the artist obligingly explained but the explanation left this writer somewhat bewildered and mystified but absolutely sure that an artist is truly a craftsman.

The technical skill and knowledge of the craftsman is evidenced in the entire group's working procedures. Selections of mediums and the studied choice of frames which held the paintings, careful attention to texture and color of frames is important and the shape and width is taken into consideration, also. Some antique frames had been restored to a semblance of their former beauty to once more grace a scope of color.

On overhearing one artist tells another, "That frame ruins your landscape," this writer listened to the critic's explanation and wholeheartedly agreed, as did the artist under criticism.

The high quality of a group's work can perhaps be explained in part by the manner in which they welcome criticism and suggestion. The encouragement they give one another is heartwarming, so too is their willingness to answer all questions concerning their art. Many visitors were curious all questions concerning their art. Many visitors were curious as to how, where and why.

Versatility and close attention to detail marks one member's landscapes. Craggy mountain heights, sharp rocks, straight rigid trees and cold water contrast with softly, rustling leaves, deep, peaceful pools holding warm soft reflections. Sharp detail in a landscape showing a picturesque old building in the north part of Eastland was interesting. It's wire fences, posts, grass, mesquite trees and other objects typified this artist's ability to depict de-

tail and the composition of the painting was an interesting study in contrasts.

Another artist's similar contrasts were handled in an interesting but different manner. Beautifully bold red roses softly subdued irises, daisies and fruit contrasted with sharp strongly detailed rocks, deep shadowy valleys, sunsplashed hills, trees and running water. This same artist showed two unusual paintings of peasant girls pausing from their chores to drink from a fountain.

A beautiful, demure white lily offered by another member who had paintings in which strong pure color produced realistic effects in a variety of still life subjects. Beautifully clear-cut and honest in design these works appear, at first glance to be quite simple. Closer observation reveals a carefully studied simplicity which renders them complex. These works have a special charm which is both exciting and oddly restful. They are altogether pleasing and contrast sharply with the pastel florals of another member who exhibited portrait sketches in pencil, charcoal and pastel as well as other oils and pastels.

A water color and two equally lovely reproductions of florals in oil were proof of one artist's ability. Lovely iris stills and an interesting painting on wood were another member's contribution. One artist showed a delicately wrought still life in fruit. Arranged by her in a crystal bowl contrasted in pale true beauty with a wonderfully true application of dark colors in an oil painting of glorioxias in a clay pot. A magnolia in oil and a serenely beautiful Colorado landscape completed this contributions. All were originals.

Originality in arrangement and close attention to detail makes one artist's still lifes especially interesting and worthy of high praise. Shadows and lights complemented glowing colors which delineated the shapes and gave value to her subjects. Her landscapes were equally carefully executed. Another interesting work was a still life of a Bible and roses. It was shown by a member who also had an oil study of yellow roses and a graceful exotic bird also in oils of soft hues and excellent brush work.

A single rose in a white vase was the point of interest in an original by one member whose work is noted for the consistency of its high quality. Moonlight on a Dutch Mill, a copy of a loved masterpiece, would probably bring astonished praise from the painter of the original because of the glowing color among the clouds that seem to move in the sky.

Other works including landscapes and a small aqua rose still life reveal this artist's mastery of the selection and application of color.

The artists of china tile mentioned earlier also show a mastery of the brush in oils on canvas, flowers and fruits in exquisite color and detail by both were equaled in delicacy by one in birds and nursery rhyme characters. Oil landscapes vied with the perfection of a common moon flower so exquisite in color and regal in form as to be unbelievable beautiful.

The other has roses in oils that are matched in color and its application in her landscapes. The beautiful handling of color and understanding of form has resulted in this artist's oil portrait of her daughter-in-law. Amateurs, the members of the Eastland Art Club, tell us there are other artists in the area whose work is outstandingly good. We would like to view a display of their work. It is a pleasant experience to see the efforts of this Club to capture beauty and to preserve it to share with others. We look forward to their next exhibition.

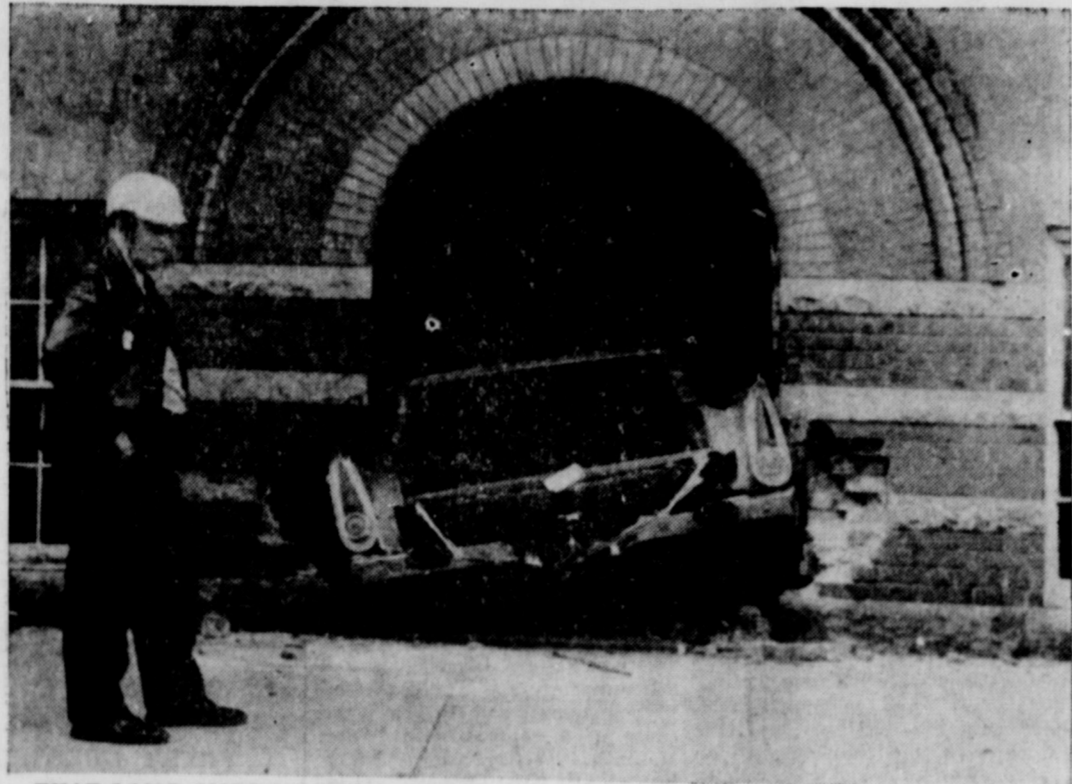

### Good Watershed Management Is Important To All!

The increasing use of soil and water conservation measures for watershed protection has caused many people to ask, "Just what is a watershed?" Jack Barton, extension soil and water conservation specialist, explains that a watershed is the land area which water drains to a given point. Small streams have watersheds of only a few acres. This small stream and others like it run into a larger stream. These small streams and the land they drain make up the watershed of the larger streams. Watersheds of medium-sized streams make up the watershed of rivers. Even the smallest watershed are important, because their management, or mismanagement, affects everything living within the watershed area. Watershed management determines whether water is to be a friend or an enemy, Barton explains. If water runs off the land too fast, it cuts gullies and carries off valuable topsoil. This soil, along with other debris carried by the stream, can clog streams and lakes in the watershed below. Such sediment may greatly increase the cost of filtering water for home use and it can also interfere with hydroelectric plants. If too much water runs away too rapidly, it causes a flood that damages farms, ranches, crops, homes and utilities, Barton continues. Also, sediment recreation, because clogged streams have very few fish in them. On the other hand, water can be slowed down and used to advantage when needed soil and water conservation practices are observed over all the watershed Terraces, stripcropping, more grass and legumes in crop rotations and improved pastures are practices that make more water soak into the soil for use of crops and pastures. Also, water that is properly managed doesn't carry sediments to clog streams and other water supplies. Barton says that more information on soil and water conservation and flood prevention can be obtained from local soil conservation district offices or from local county agents or the Soil Conservation Service.

money. "After a small loan is refinanced the second or third time, the loan shark has fully recovered his investment and is able to charge the borrower for use of money never actually received," he says. "Naturally, the loan sharks do everything within their power to encourage the borrower to continue to refinance. Then, all too often, the borrower suddenly awakens to find himself trapped in a perpetual debt that is impossible to repay."  
 "Unless and until we have adequate laws to govern lenders, the State is practically powerless to effectively stop loan sharks. The first step to get such laws is for the voters to approve Amendment No. 4. If the Amendment is not approved, Texas will likely continue to be a loan shark haven for years to come," he concluded.

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**Indonesian Gives Impressions of American Life**

AS I SEE AMERICA

It's good to be in America, a country which is esteemed highly throughout the world. Ten months have elapsed since my arrival in this land of opportunity. I must say I have enjoyed every bit of my time I spent in this small but lovely community. And I owe this all to Rev. Lively Brown of The First Methodist Church in Ranger, who through the grace of God, has, somehow, picked me out of thin air and given me this chance to pursue an education.

At first American food to me was very unsteady. Before I came here, I had lived on rice, chili-pepper, vegetables, and meat. We cook these things differently in Indonesia, as you will see. We don't use any milk or butter on the rice. The rice is cooked well done, and it must be dry. Our vegetables are cooked, whether they be lettuce, greens, cabbage or carrots. Some of our best foods are chop suey, la choy and curry. The last is hot. To Americans it seems as if too much chili-pepper has been applied to this curry. It has, but it is this chili-pepper that makes the food taste good. Our ketchup is what you call her soy saure, and your ketchup is what we call tomato juice.

This sudden change of good and ration made life rather difficult for me. As time went on, however, I began to put away my native food and to eat American food. And yet even until today, I have a dislike for some things, such as the sack lunches that the school cafeteria offers Saturday and Sunday evenings.

Being in a small community, I get to know most of the people. They are very friendly and understanding. The people here treat me so nice that I feel completely at home. And it is because of them that I don't feel homesick as often as I ought to.

School life itself is wonderful. Teachers help me in my lessons, and the boys and girls help me to live like an American. They treat me as if I were one of them. It's really fun to be in this country.

**Fire Losses Show Increase On Farm and Ranches**

Farm fire losses in the United States increased an alarming 37 per cent during the past 10 years. More than a third of the total gain occurred in 1959 alone.

These tragic figures were underscored by W. M. Irwin of Stephenville, general manager of the Stephenville Production Credit Association, as he urged full cooperation and participation by farmers, ranchers and dairymen during National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 9-16.

"These mounting fire losses present an increasing problem to our agricultural economy," Irwin said. He pointed out that the estimated fire loss on American farms and ranches in 1959 was \$174 million, \$18 million more than the preceding year.

The Stephenville PCA is one of 36 associations, owned and operated by their borrower-stockholders, which provide short and intermediate-term agricultural credit to all 254 Texas counties.

Increasing fire losses can have a direct effect on the successful and profitable operation of a farm or ranch, he pointed out, and urged an all out effort to eliminate fire hazards and to provide effective fire detection and fire fighting equipment.

Losses to barns and their contents constituted 42.5 per cent of the entire 1959 farm fire loss. Dwellings and their contents were next with 35.5 per cent followed by livestock, other outbuildings and contents and farm machinery.

Listed as most frequent causes of fires in farm homes in 1959 were defective heating equipment, faulty chimneys and flues, defective and overloaded wiring systems and matches and smoking.

"A progressive start toward a year-around fire prevention program on our farms and ranches is a cleanup campaign to eliminate as many fire hazards as possible during Fire Prevention Week," Irwin said.

The Stephenville Production Credit Association has its central office in Stephenville. Field offices are located in Eastland, Comanche, Cleburne, Fort Worth and Decatur. The association serves an area composed of Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Somervell, Parker, Johnson, Tarrant and Decatur.

R. Cal McCurdy of Decatur is president of the association's board of directors and James W. Crouch of Burleson is vice president. Other directors are Tom Mazurek of Comanche, T. M. Win-

ters of Evant and C. M. McCain of Eastland. Irwin is manager and secretary-treasurer.



**WORKING WITH WOOD**

Some species of wood are naturally resistant to fungus attack and withstand decay for many years. However, it is only the hardwood of these species which is durable. The sapwood of all native trees decays readily. The durability of hardwood from certain trees is the result of toxic materials in the heartwood which make the wood undesirable to fungi. Also, since heartwood is drier than sapwood and the heartwood pores are filled with various deposits, the moisture and air con-

ditions required for fungus growth are less favorable. Fortunately, sapwood is easy to treat with wood preservatives since the cells are relatively open and free of deposits. Such treatment can make sapwood more durable than the naturally durable heartwood. The expense of preservative treatment should really be considered since properly treated give effective service longer than untreated wood. To protect their investment, builders should use preservative treatment of all wood used in or near the ground where conditions favor decay and fungus growth.

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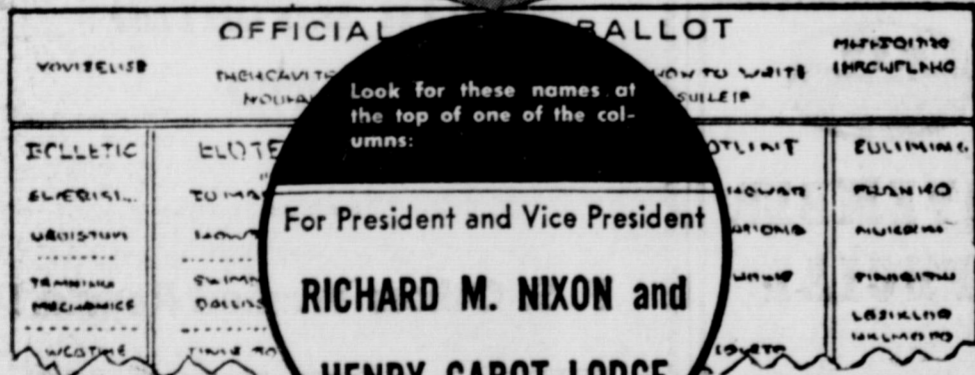
