## Removal Of Overpass Not Expected To Begin Before July 1

Contracts for highway construction in the Brownwood district have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer E.M. Pritchard, and

will be in Eastland, McCulloch Coleman and Brown Counties. Bontke Brothers Construction Company of Abilene was awarded a contract for removing railroad overpass and constructing grading, structures, asphalt stabilized

base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 2 miles of US Highway 80 in Eastland County. Low bid was \$108,305.75.

The project extends from Avenue D to Avenue B in Cisco. R.P. Haun Jr. of Eastland is

the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 90 working days. Department officials in Eastland said the projects were not expected to begin before July 1.

Abilene Paving Company, Inc. of Abilene was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 1 mile of spur 490 in Eastland County. Low bid was \$235,355.20.

The project will extend from Interstate 20 northward to US 80, 3.5 miles west of Eastland. R.P. Haun will be in charge of this project also which will take an estimated 150 working days.

Pioneer Construction Company, Inc. of Abilene was awarded a contract for grading, structures, hot mix concrete pavement and one course surface treatment on 2.6 miles of TOPICS streets in Brownwood. Low bid was \$213,477.53.

George Amthor, Inc. of Center was awarded a contract for flexible base and two course surface treatment on shoulder on 17.8 miles of State Highway 71 in McCulloch County. Low bid was \$182,041.25.

Ferrier Brothers Bridge Company of Seymour was awarded a contract for widening bridges and approaches on 1.4 miles of US Highway 283 in Coleman County. Low bid was \$446,546.39.

Teams headed by Geep Mitcham and Butch Edison posted seven-under 61s to tie for fourth place. The Mitcham team won the honor in a pitching contest to break the tie.

Other teams were captained by Bennie Nichols, Jerry Doyle, Randy Rexroat, Phillip Smith and Carrel Smith. Some 50 golfers took part in the tournament.

According to reports, there will be a scramble tournament at Lone Cedar Country Club next Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

A Golf Scramble will be held Saturday, June 9, at Lone Cedar Country Club. Everyone is welcome.

The Eastland County Racing Pigeon Club closed out its old bird racing season by participating in the Texas Center 500, June 2, originating in Brownsville, Texas. Texas Center is comprised of Clubs in Texas, Oklahoma and parts of Louisiana.

State Wide results of this race will be announced at a later date. The results for the Eastland Club were as follows:

1st place- Charles Bode of Breckenridge, whose bird flew at the fantastic rate of 1805 yards per minute.

2nd place- Mike Collins- 1662 yards per min.

3rd place- Curtis Yount- 1632 yards per min.

4th place- Floyd Frady- 1584 yards per min.

5th place- Ed Sargent- 1395 yards per min.

Flying conditions were exceptionally good which probably contributed to the fact that each Club member's entry returned at these unusual average rates of speed.

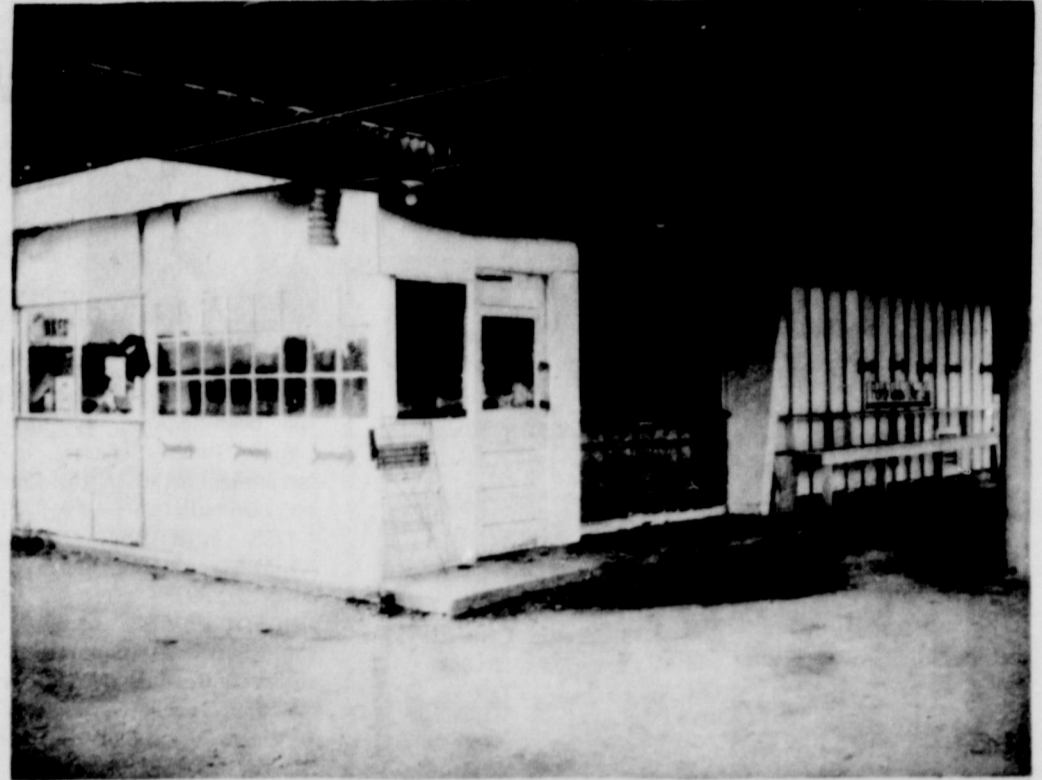

## Rodeos To Continue Each Friday Night In Rising Star

The opening of the 21st season of summer rodeos went off well Saturday, despite the threat of rain during Saturday night's opening performance. One hundred and forty-two horses were in the grand entry.

The parade through the business district of Rising Star initiated the day's events. Several area riding clubs participated in the march, along with a "flock" of kids on bicycles and various other entries. Selected as winners in the parade were Brown County Sheriff's Posse, first; May Riding Club, second; and Cisco Riding Club, third.

Following are the results of the first rodeo performance of the year:

Barrels under twelve years old- Sherry Koenig of Cross Plains first, with 20.7 seconds; Tommy Kitchens of Rising Star, second with a time of 21.5 seconds. In competition in the barrels twelve years and over, Penny Berry of Cisco was first place winner, timing 19.9 seconds. Susann Harbin of Eastland was second with 20.1 seconds. In professional barrel racing, Caludie Swannof Gail won first with 19.0 seconds. In while Debra Miller of Abilene came in second with a time of 19.4 seconds. There were no riders in steer competition.

In bronc riding, Bobby Nixon of Eastland was first, and

Booger Red Nixon of Eastland was second. Joe Chick of Dublin was first in calf roping with a time of 11.5 seconds.

Wayne Gibbs of Bangs was second, clocking 12.7 seconds, clocking 12.7 seconds. Randy Ogden of Gail was third with 12.7 seconds, and Jack Cannon of Abilene was fourth, with a time of 13.6 seconds.

The bull riding and jackpot roping events were rained out. Bull riders will ride the stock this week that was drawn for at last Saturday's performance.

C.W. Richter, president of the Rising Star Roping Club, thanks all who have helped to get the show going and tomake it a success thus far this year. The club appreciates all the riding clubs and riders who participated, and a special thanks to Mr. Dick Vestal of Baird who announced at the rodeo and to Bob Shuts for announcing the parade and providing the platform for the judges. Mr. Richter also expresses appreciation to the parade judges, Mrs. Bobbie Sansom, Mrs. Pauline Winfrey, and Doyle Herring, and the local Citizens' Band Radio Club for their help in the parade.

Please keep in mind that from here on, rodeo performances will be held on Friday nights at 8:00 p.m. instead of Saturday. The opening show was set on

Saturday due to convenience of area riding clubs.

## County In Top 10

### In Turkey Raising

Eastland County is in the top 10 counties in turkey production in Texas during 1972, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reports.

Production in Eastland County during 1972 totaled 409,000 birds.

Texas total production last year was 7,851,000. This makes Texas number six in the nation in total turkey production. Minnesota, California, North Carolina, Missouri, and Arkansas are the top five turkey producing states.

"Eastland County producers and those throughout the state are moving into a new era in turkey production. They are producing some of the top quality birds in the nation, and are making plans to move ahead in turkey production," White said.

AN INTERESTING LEGISLATIVE PROPOSAL has been offered by three United States Senators, all considered to be on the Conservative side.

THE PURPOSE IS TO EXPAND THE CAPITAL OWNERSHIP IN THE UNITED STATES economy, beginning with employees of corporations which account for over 80 percent of the goods and services produced in the private sector.

IN INTRODUCING THE BILL, THE AUTHORS SAY THERE IS VITAL NEED FOR revitalizing the Free Enterprise System. They point out these statistics: There are more people drawing money from the Government for not working today than during the Depression; that absenteeism in many of the large companies costs more than \$50 million annually; that workers have been known to often sabotage assembly lines on which they work; and that too many workers have no pride in the product they are turning out.

THEY ALSO SAY THAT THE COUNTRY IS BEING TOLD THAT THE ALIENATION of youth and the general frustration of many Americans today are the workings of the Capitalist or Free Enterprise System. They point out that in the past the solution to most every problem is to create more bureaucracy to provide more Government control, to dilute the Capitalist System.

THE PROPOSED BILL WOULD ALLOW THE EXPANSION AND DEVELOPMENT of corporate financing called "Employees Stock Ownership Plan," which incidentally, is already in practice by some corporations.

IT IS POINTED OUT THAT IN MOST CASES A CORPORATION WILL BORROW MONEY to buy new productive machinery. When the loan is paid off it means usually that the book value of the outstanding stock has increased. This indirectly benefits old stockholders or the established capitalist but does not in itself add any new stockholders. Lower and middle class Americans simply do not have the excess income to make large investments in stock.

UNDER THIS BILL, THE AUTHORS CONTEND, CORPORATIONS WOULD HAVE NEW incentives to obtain their new financing through employees trust. In other words, employees would be given first chance at helping finance the business in which they are employed. They would contribute to a trust fund and the trust fund would purchase new stock issues which would give the employee an interest in the business. The bill provides further that after a loan by the corporation or business is paid to the trust fund of the employees and no new stock is issued, a committee representing the employees and employer could then invest trust funds in other businesses.

THE IDEA IS TO GIVE OPPORTUNITY FOR EMPLOYERS TO GET into the action which presumably would motivate them to work harder and insist on their fellow workers performing efficiently because they are working in their own self-interest.

THE CONCERN ABOUT THE PROBLEMS OF WORKER ALIENATION, WHICH EVIDENTLY IS COMMON IN OUR SOCIETY TODAY, TURNS PRIMARILY ON THE FACT THAT MOST WORK IN AMERICA DOES NOT MAKE A MAN RICH. To be a person of means is to own income-producing capital. A person's income from merely high wages or a high salary, dissipated by the high cost of living and high taxes, will stop when he ceases to perform productive toil.

IT WILL BE INTERESTING TO SEE IF THIS TYPE OF LEGISLATION will catch on. It has an appeal in that it would, if successful, spread the base of capitalism, motivate productivity, increase income and purchasing power, provide attractive retirement income, and reduce unemployment.

IT REMAINS TO BE SEEN WHETHER SUCH AN IDEA MIGHT BE ACCEPTED BY THE big labor unions because they could contend that it would weaken the loyalty of the union member to his organization, since he would be part owner in the business.

NOTHING IS GOING TO HAPPEN SOON ON THIS LEGISLATION BUT IT WILL BE interesting to watch. To have support sufficient for enactment, it would have to catch on across the country and that will take time.

Events for the other divisions will be halter, showmanship, western pleasure reining poles, barrels, goat tying, and cow milking.

An electric timer will be used for the speed events.

Trophies will be awarded to first place winners with ribbons through sixth place.

Buckles will be presented to the high point junior and senior contestants and a trophy to the high point pee-wee.

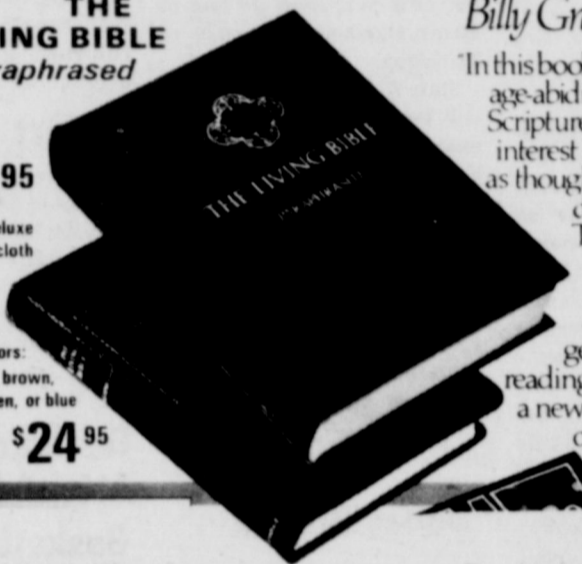

# Accent on Health

The buzzing of bees is just as much a part of the active summer scene as picnicking, swimming, hiking, golfing and gardening. But this pleasant sound is also a warning of the possibility of painful bee stings. Venom from honeybees, bumblebees, wasps, yellow jackets and hornets is - drop for drop - just as potent for certain susceptible persons as deadly rattlesnake venom.

Some health authorities believe that stings by these insects kill more people in the United States than the feared rattler. One prominent specialist suggests that some of the sudden deaths attributed to heart failure, or heart prostration, are in reality due to insect stings to susceptible individuals.

Many of the bee stings could be avoided with proper precautions. But most people do not seem able to cope with bees and other stinging insects. There are 822,000 nonfatal poisonings a year in the nation which result in one or more days of restricted activity or require medical attention, according to estimates of the National Center for Health Statistics.

Approximately one-half of the total are the result of a very common occurrence - bee stings - which happen to be classified as poisonous.

Bees and other stinging insects usually do not attack humans. But they are attracted by vigorous activity, such as a group of playful children at the beach. So, if a bee approaches, don't aggravate it into action by trying to swat him; keep calm and walk away slowly. Perfumes, suntan lotion, hair spray and other cosmetics, bright colors and flower prints attract them. Use an insect repellent to temporarily keep stinging insects at a distance.

Persons who disturb nests of stinging insects by accident, or on purpose, may have to run for it. If the man-of-the-house decides to paint his home, spruce up his garden, or trim hedges and shrubs, he should look for hidden nests.

The unwary painter, especially if he is on a ladder, may be badly stung by angry wasps or bees. If there are nests, dislodge them with a long pole, making sure your fast escape is possible. Insecticide will kill the insects in the nests you knock down.

And the thoughtful parent won't let children go barefoot until he examines the yard for

possible - below-the-ground nests of yellow jackets. If nests are found, pour kerosene into the hole in the early evening, when the insects have all returned.

If someone gets stung by a honeybee, use a needle, fingernail or knife blade to scrape the stinger out as soon as possible. Avoid pulling it out with your finger; this squeezes more venom into the body. Honeybees can sting only once. Bumblebees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets can sting repeatedly.

Ordinarily, the only effects of a sting are temporary inflammation, pain and itching. Ice packs or a cold cloth will ease the pain. Cold cream, baking soda or a compress moistened with ammonia spirits, will relieve the itching.

Persons who suffer multiple stings or who are allergic to insect stings may develop serious reactions. They require medical attention at once.

Some persons become sensitive to insect stings if they have been stung one or more times in the past. Such persons should see a physician about desensitization.

Treatment should begin in the fall or winter for protection the following spring or summer. Physicians can also prescribe an emergency kit for the sensitive person to carry in case of an immediate, generalized reaction to an insect sting.

Deaths from insect stings are uncommon; the rate is less than one death per one million population per year.

Even so, bees, wasps, hornets and other members of the Hymenoptera group of insects caused 229 deaths in the United States over a period of ten years.

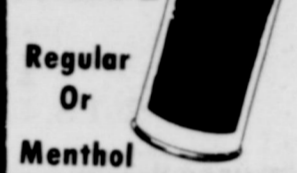

## Ministers Speak

### THE LUKEWARM CHRISTIAN

In Revelation 3:14-22 the letter to the church at Laodicea begins by describing the risen Christ by two great titles: the "FAITHFUL AND TRUE WITNESS" AND THE "beginning of the creation of God". In verse 15 and 16 the

Bible goes on to say that, because Laodicea is neither cold nor hot but lukewarm, it will absolutely and totally rejected; and this is said with such crude violence that the intensity of the feeling behind it cannot be mistaken. The word for hot in the Greek means more than hot; it means at boiling point. Here is the great

fact that there can be no real religion without enthusiasm. Laodicea was a great commercial and trading center; it was a very prosperous city. It is very likely that the people of Laodicea drew the line when religion began interfering with their business. A decent respectability was all right and even much to be desired, but a religion which was like a fire in a man's bones and which pervaded every part and corner of his life was a different thing altogether. There is such a thing as a common sense religion. The Ten Commandments are doubtless very proper; but when it comes to

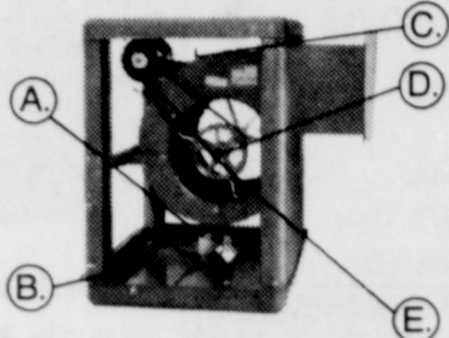
and enthusiasm which demands that we should love our enemies, and give our goods to the poor, and pray for the people who insult us that is a very different matter. Laodicea is condemned because she preferred a respectable morality to a passionate religion. The Greek word for lukewarm means tepid. In the district around Laodicea there were hot mineral springs. A medicinal spring can have a most nauseating taste. It may well be that the picture is taken from these mineral springs and that the risen Christ is saying: "Sometimes when a man goes

to drink of the medicinal springs, the tepid and the ill-tasting water makes him want to vomit; that is the way in which I feel about a church that is neither hot nor cold." The plain fact is that in Christianity there is no room for neutrality. The person who has not declared for Christ has declared against Christ. The very expression a lukewarm Christian is a contradiction in itself, for a lukewarm Christian has no claim to be called a Christian at all.

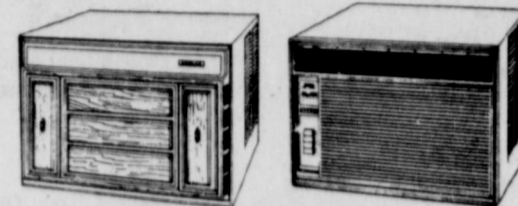

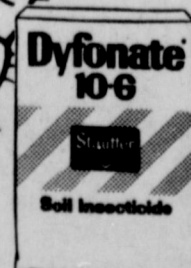
