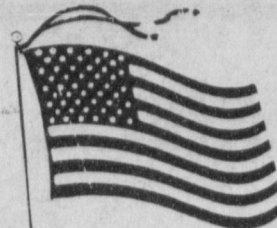

## Local ASCS Office Releases Latest Sign-Up Dates

The following dates were released Wednesday by Danny Noble, County Executive Director, Bailey County ASCS office.

**1990-1991 DISASTER PROGRAM**  
Signup for the 1990-1991 disaster program ended on March 13, 1992. Producers who filed by the deadline and did not have all the required information on file at that time, have until March 27, 1992, to furnish the remainder of the necessary paper work in order to approve the disaster application.

**1992 FARM PROGRAM SIGNUP**  
Signup began February 10, 1992, and will continue through April 17, 1992. Producers wishing to participate **MUST** sign up their intentions during this time frame. Signup is by appointments. Please call 806-272-4538 as soon as possible (talk to Laverne).

**1991 CORN AND GRAIN SORGHUM DEFICIENCY**  
The 1991 final deficiency rate has been announced for corn and grain sorghum. The payments will be based on 41 cents for corn and 37 cents for grain sorghum. The 0/92 guarantee will be the estimated rates, 58 cents for corn and 56 cents for grain sorghum. We hope to have all payments made by April 1, 1992.

**IAM REALLOCATION**  
In 1992, you may once again reallocate your farm IAM (Irrigated Acreage Maximum). For 1992, crop IAM's may exceed the crop acreage bases, but may not exceed the highest planted and considered planted credit in the base period. Farm IAM's may be reallocated but it is not mandatory. Any reallocation of IAM's is permanent for 1992 and must be completed by April 17, 1992.

**FINAL PLANTING DATES**  
The final planting dates for crops grown in Bailey County are: wheat, barley, oats-Nov. 15; corn-May 15; cotton-May 31; and grain sorghum-June 30. These dates are for crop insurance purpose.

primarily, but in the case of prevented planting, the dates are recognized as the final date for planting the crop. Should you be prevented from planting any of the crops listed above, beyond your control, you have 15 days following the final planting date to file a prevented planting claim on an ASCS-574. Claims filed after 15 days will be considered late filed.

### STEWARDSHIP INCENTIVE PROGRAM-SIP

SIP is a new cost-sharing program administered by USDA's Forest Service and State Foresters to encourage private landowners to actively manage their forestland and natural resources. The ASCS role is to provide administrative assistance to the Forest Service and State Foresters. ASCS will not approve or disapprove any application. Eligible producers are landowners (owning at least 10 acres) and the cost-share level is 50 percent of the total cost. This program offers landowners in this area the opportunity to apply for farmstead and feedlot windbreaks, field windbreaks, living snowfences, and wildlife habitat enhancement. Interested landowners should contact this office and the area forester, Bob Fewin, 806-746-5801, Lubbock, Texas.

**PRICE SUPPORT**  
The final date for obtaining price support loans on 1991 crops are as follows: Wheat, barley, oats and rye-March 31, 1992; corn, grain sorghum, cotton; soybeans and minor oil seed crops-June 1, 1992.

**INTEREST RATE**  
The loan interest rate for March is 4.250 percent.

**RECONSTITUTIONS**  
We need to know of any change that would cause a farm or farms to be combined or divided for the 1992 program year.

M.C. Darrell Turner will give awards Saturday at 5 p.m. He will be assisted by the queen.

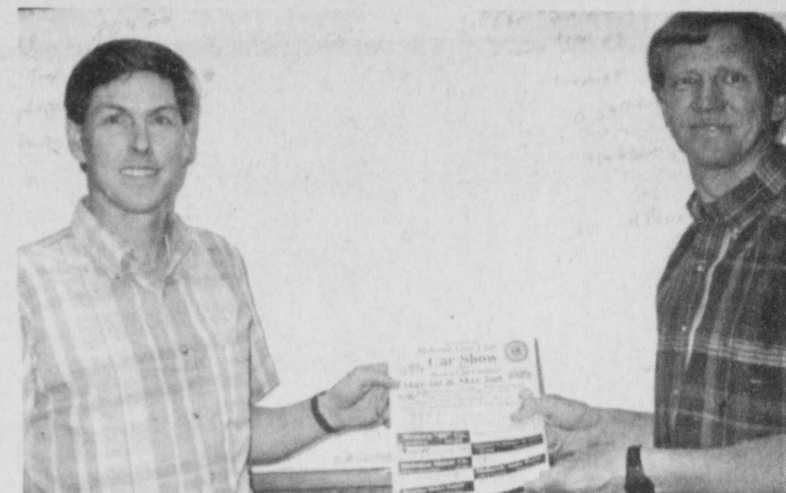

## Creative Living

Information on myths about red meat and disposable diapers will be the featured topics on "Creative Living" on Tuesday, March 24 at 12 noon and Saturday, March 28 at 2 p.m. (All times are Mountain.) "Creative Living" airs on public broadcasting station, KENW-TV, from Eastern New Mexico University.

Joy Best, Extension Home Economist with the Roosevelt County Extension Service, will talk about the role of beef in the diet. Red meat is an excellent source of protein, vitamins and minerals. She will also dispel twelve common myths regarding red meat. Ms. Best lives in Portales, N.M.

Dr. Bill Sammons, pediatrician, author, and spokesperson for the Diapers Manufacturers' Group, will discuss a new study regarding disposable diapers and present recycling options that are more in tune with Americans' concern for the environment. The Franklin Study reports that disposable diapers use significantly less energy and water resources than cloth alternatives. The research study also concludes that disposable diapers produce considerably less air and water pollution than cloth diapers.

Sammons is from Charlotte, VT. On Tuesday, March 24 at 9:30 p.m. and on Thursday, March 26 at 12 noon "Creative Living" will present information on making hair bows and preparing a party cheese board.

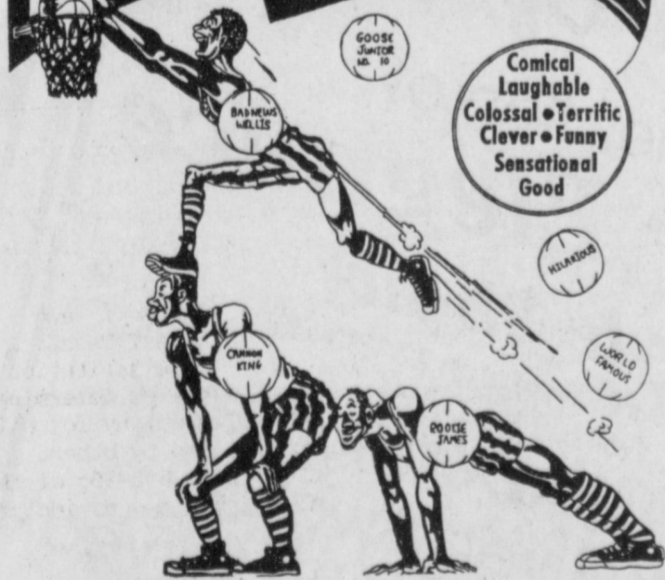

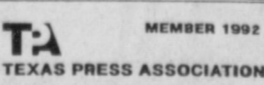

**BEEF KABOBS AU POIVRE**  
1 pound well-trimmed boneless beef top sirloin steak, cut 1 inch thick  
1 tablespoon each olive oil, coarse grain mustard, and red wine vinegar  
1 clove garlic, minced  
1/2 teaspoon sugar  
1 teaspoon cracked black pepper  
1/2 cup dry red wine

Cut beef top sirloin steak into 1-inch cubes. Combine wine, oil, mustard, vinegar, garlic and sugar. Place beef cubes in plastic bag; add marinade, turning to coat. Close bag securely and marinate 30 minutes. Pour off marinade. Sprinkle pepper over steak cubes, pressing gently into surface of meat. Thread an equal number of steak cubes onto each of four 9-inch skewers. Place kabobs on rack in broiler pan so surface of meat is 3 to 4 inches from the heat. Broil 10 to 13 minutes to doneness desired (rare or medium), turning occasionally. 4 servings.

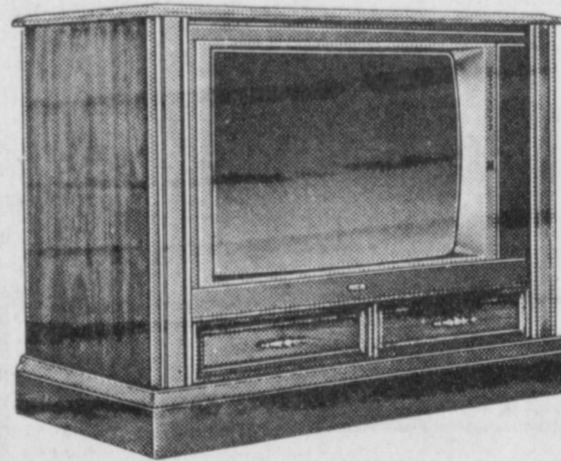

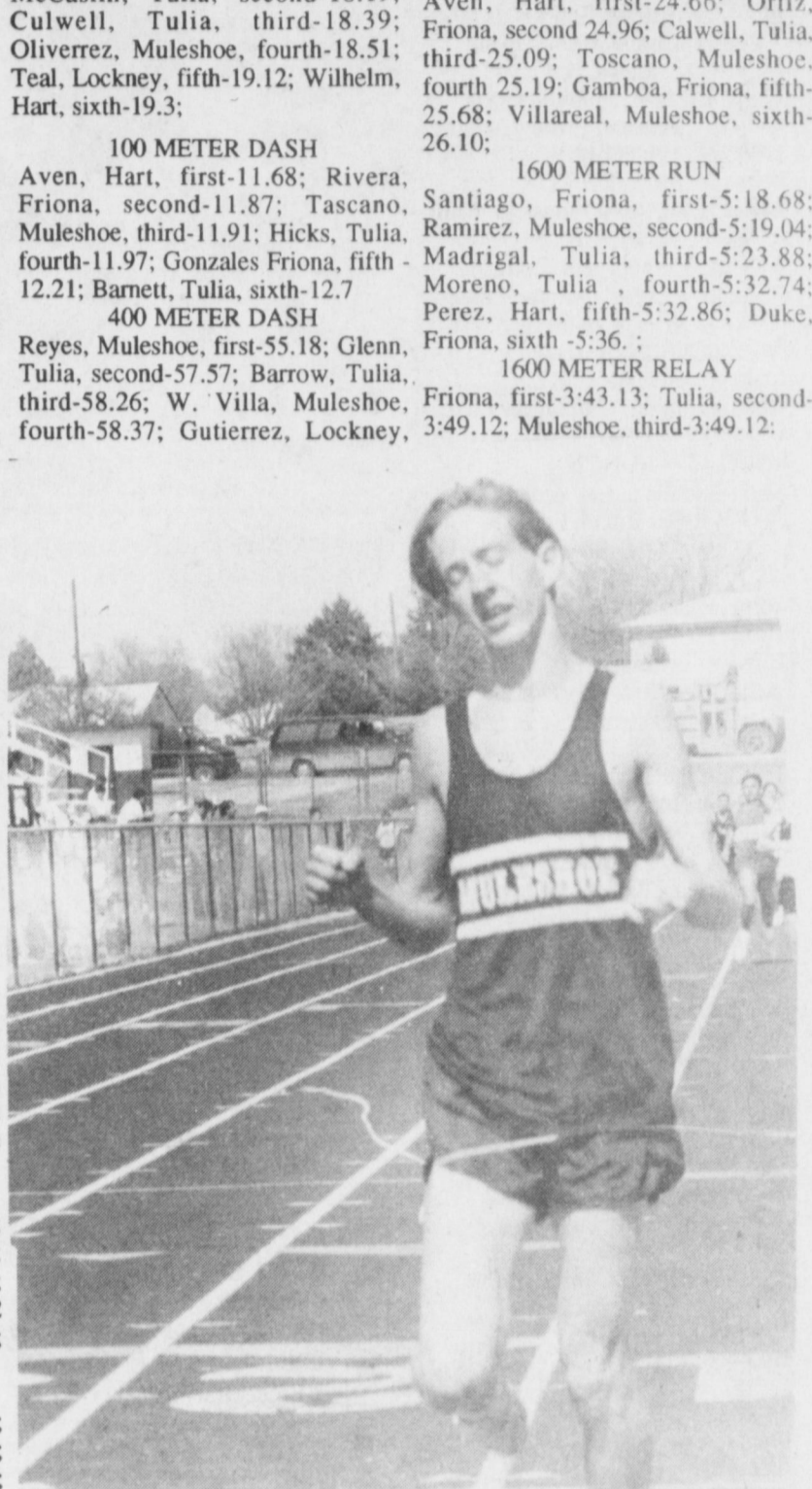



## Report From Larry Combest

U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) made the following statement during House debate in support of incentives for economic growth and against increased taxes:

"Mr. Chairman, let's cut right to the chase. There are two distinct differences and two distinct economic plans. We want to cut taxes and we want to restore growth incentives and they want to raise taxes and reduce those incentives. It is the same old philosophical difference. My taxing friends have the same 'won't-work' solutions that they always have. They tell us that prosperity and economic growth is just one more tax increase away. They continue to say that the 'trickle-down theory' is not working. Well, I don't know where they have been for the last six years, but the Tax Bill took away any chance for 'trickle.' It took away all the incentives to save and all the incentives to invest. What is not working today is THEIR program.

We said it then and we have said it every tax increase since: The result of this is going to be fewer jobs and a stagnant economy. Well, our predictions have come true.

Now we want to restore those incentives, and they want more taxes. The philosophical differences are clear. We believe that business creates job opportunities and

economic growth. They believe that more taxes and government programs will solve the economic downturn.

People are upset, and they want action. But I have yet to hear my first constituent say that they want more taxes and more government.

The difference is very clear: it is black and white. Or, as the case will be for families and small businesses: it is black and red."

## Senator Phil Gramm Reports

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has vowed to bring the president's anti-crime bill to a vote in the Senate "every week until it passes."

"Our bleeding nation demands action," Gramm said.

Gramm along with Sens. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., and Bob Dole, R-Kansas, have re-introduced the legislation, which contains a death penalty for drug murders and mandatory sentences for a range of drug-related crimes.

"If there was one outrage in the United States Congress that stands head and shoulders above any last year, it was that the Congress did not adopt a strong anti-crime bill," Gramm said.

The senator said that by spurring a weekly debate and vote on the legislation, "the public will become aware that there are some people who are concerned about crime and violence and that something is going to happen."

Gramm said he would oppose legislation to expand criminals' rights. "Until those of us who are not victims of crime become as outraged as those who are victims, things are not going to change," he said.

"We are not going to let this issue simply sit there any longer," said Gramm. "We want something done about it."

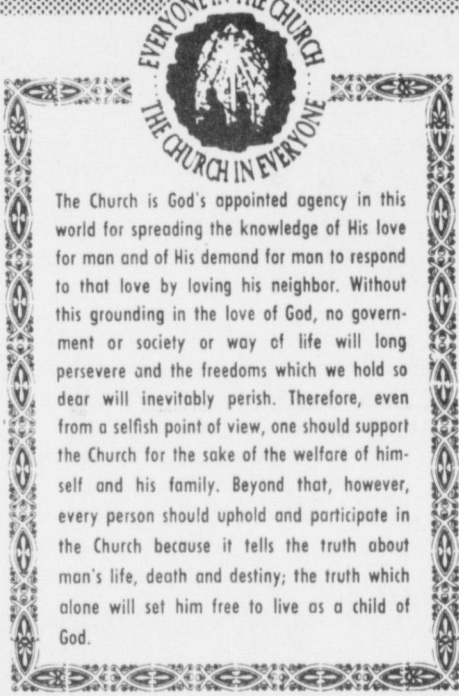


IN MOTHER'S FOOTSTEPS

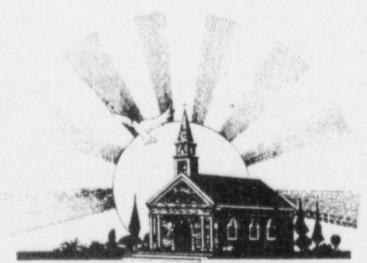

3 eggs, separated	1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup margarine	3/4 cup milk
1 1/2 cups sugar	1 jar (18 oz.) red raspberry preserves
2 teaspoons almond extract	3 cups heavy cream
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour	1 cup sliced almonds, toasted
2 teaspoons baking powder	

Place egg whites in medium bowl. Whip on Speed 5 for 2 minutes until stiff, but not dry. Set aside.  
 Place margarine, sugar, and almond extract in a large bowl and cream on Speed 3 for 1 minute. Add egg yolks, one at a time, and beat on Speed 3 for 15 seconds after each addition. Stop and scrape bowl.  
 In a separate bowl, combine flour, baking powder, and salt. Add to margarine mixture alternately with milk on Speed 1. Stop and scrape bowl. Mix on Speed 3 for 3 minutes. Hand fold egg whites into mixture.  
 Pour batter into two greased and floured 9-inch cake pans. Bake at 325° F for 35 to 40 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes, then remove and cool completely on wire racks.  
 Place heavy cream in large bowl and whip on Speed 5 until stiff peaks form.  
 To assemble: With a long serrated knife, cut each cake horizontally in half. Place first layer on serving plate. Spread with 1/2 cup preserves and 3/4 cup whipped cream; repeat with second and third layers. Finally, top with remaining layer and 1/2 cup preserves only. With half of remaining whipped cream, frost side of torte. Evenly coat sides with almonds. Place remaining whipped cream in pastry bag fitted with 1/2-inch star tip. Decoratively pipe around top edge of torte. Garnish with fresh raspberries and mint leaves. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Yield: One 9-inch torte.

## U.S. Dominance In Aircraft Business Threatened

The changing nature of competition in the European and Japanese aerospace industries threatens to erode U.S. dominance in the large commercial aircraft business by the 21st Century, according to a study completed by a Texas Christian University research team.

The impact of a faltering aerospace business could ripple through the U.S. economy creating unfavorable effects on U.S. employment, aerospace research and development, availability of technology and export trade, the study noted.

Cooperative ventures among competing firms and government sponsorship of the aerospace industry in Europe and Japan are displacing marketplace competition engaged in by U.S. firms. The study also said European and Japanese organizations may enter other industries using the same competitive model.

Top-level Japanese aerospace industry executives and government officials privately predict the demise of the U.S. aircraft company McDonnell Douglas, the research team reported. The loss of the United States' second-largest aircraft company could make way for Japan to become the number three competitor in the large commercial aircraft sector behind first-place Boeing and second-place Airbus Industrie of Europe.

Scheduled to be published in the winter edition of the Columbia Journal of World Business, the

study examined the competitive organizations of the large commercial aircraft industry. "Global Competition in the Commercial Aircraft Industry: Positioning for Advantage by the Triad Nations" was conducted by Research Associate Paul Lauritano, Dr. David Cravens, professor of marketing, and Dr. H. Kirk Downey, dean of TCU's M.J. Neeley School of Business and professor of management.

Lauritano, a fall 1991 Master of Business Administration graduate from the Neeley School, served at the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo under one assignment during his years as a foreign service officer for the U.S. Department of State. Working closely with several Japanese government agencies, including the Science and Technology Agency and the Space Development Agency, Lauritano analyzed the country's aerospace industry and made policy recommendations to Washington.

Cravens noted that aerospace is one of the last industries in which the United States holds a competitive edge in the world market. That advantage is being eroded by Airbus Industrie's heavily subsidized operations and now increasingly by Japanese efforts to build their position, he said.

"The pivotal issue is how should the United States compete against major consortia supported by government like Airbus and the collaborative strategy between government and industry developing in Japan," Craven said.

While not urging a move to a government-organized aerospace industry, the study recommended that the U. S. government provide more flexibility in certain industries to allow American firms a greater competitive advantage with the consortia that have been established in Europe and Japan.

The recommendations included that American corporations may need to form strategic alliances to deal with the formidable technical and financial resources required in an industry such as aerospace. The study called for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to focus less on space and more on aerospace projects and urged the commerce and defense departments to work more closely to move military technology into the commercial sector. The study also suggested that the U.S. Export-Import Bank could change regulations to lower financing obstacles in foreign sales which would ease competitive pressures.

## Disappointing

One forgives presidential candidates for catering to the selfish interests of voting blocs from time to time.

On constitutional issues, however, candidates should resist compromising principle. Unfortunately, Governor Bill Clinton felt he had to bow to political expediency in the national capital recently, as have other Democratic candidates.

Clinton announced he too supported statehood for the District! That would mean two more Democrats in the U.S. Senate. Washington being overwhelmingly black, thus automatically Democratic in elections, these two seats would be lifetime Democratic seats.

The fundamental consideration, however, is that the national capital belongs to all the states--not to present-day residents. Washington was never intended to be a state; full voting rights can be afforded residents without making the national capital a state.

As the seat of government, the District has almost none of the resources, industry, and characteristics of a state. The federal payroll is the city's biggest industry. Crime is rampant and drug use and murder the most shocking in the country.

Statehood would mean more bureaucracy, more taxes, more corruption and a bigger federal bailout because--the nation's taxpayers would be told--the national capital must be preserved, and financed.

One had hoped for more from Clinton.
