Cote d'Ivoire, Saudi Arabia Farmers Benefit

Muleshoe Rotarians and Rotary Anns made trips to Cote d'Ivoire in West Africa and to Saudi Arabia Tuesday at noon. They accomplished this through a slide presentation, with narration by Duke and Mary Woods of Quitaque, who have been with the VOCA program since 1988.

They have made trips to both West Africa and to Saudi Arabia

as part of a group that teaches the residents of those, and other developing countries, the way to improve their farming techniques and how to use and care for modern farming equipment.

According to the Woods, some 35,000 people die each day from a lack of food and medical facilities.

An average monthly income for these people is around \$50 per month.

Woods explained that VOCA works at a people-to-people level, teaching people how to take care of themselves.

They learn how to grow healthy crops, how to use and maintain farm equipment and how to harvest their produce and store it properly.

Incomes in countries aided by VOCA have risen from around \$250 to \$1000, said the Woods.

The people learn how to grow new crops, and many locations have started food processing businesses.

Wood said their governments purchased tractors and planters. His job was to teach the people how to drive tractors and how to take care of them.

He said corn harvesting was still done by hand, and in Africa, the people lose a lot of crops because there is so much rain.

He told about how the planters were used, and the land was only 'roughly' cleared out and prepared for planting.

The speakers said they worked with 44 villages in Cote d'Ivoire, and a lot of the hectares had just been "broken out" for farming in 1989 when they were there. "We had a lot of trouble working the land," commented Wood.

Corn is grown from mid-May to September, and the drier, but not dry, season is February in Africa, he added.

The Woods said they had checked into the Peace Corps, but decided on VOCA because the VOCA commitments are generally from six weeks to three months.

"The women in Cote d'Ivoire are beautiful," said the Woods. "They do not need aerobics to keep in shape. They get up at 6 a.m., and get their large pans for the top of their heads, and may walk 12 miles per day gathering food and wood for their family. They have very

Pouring into the gym were other SCAC members, basketball players and supporters waving U. S. flags.

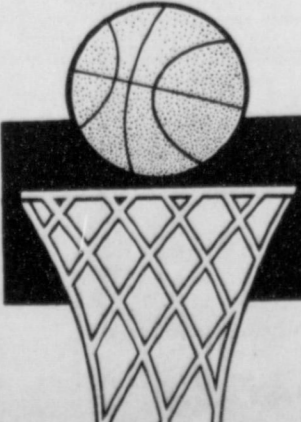
As the American flags waved proudly, the recording God Bless the USA sung by Lee Greenwood, was played.

Willson Annual Lecture Series

Slated Feb. 12

The 43rd Annual Willson Lecture Series, featuring noted psychologist and author Dr. Robert E. Hemfelt, will be presented Tuesday, Feb. 12 on the West Texas State University campus.

Hemfelt, a licensed staff psychologist with the Mirnirth-Meier Clinic in Richardson, specializes in the treatment of codependency addictions and adult-children abuse issues. He has co-authored five best selling books--Love is a Choice: Recovery from Codependent Relationships; Love Hunger: Recovery from Food Addictions; Kids Who Carry Our Pain: Breaking the Cycle of Codependency for the Next Generation; No Language But a Cry: Recovery for Adult Children of Alcoholism and Other Abuses; and We Are Driven: The Compulsive Behavior America Applauds.

Hemfelt will present four lectures on the WTSU campus beginning at 11 a.m. in Room 101 of the Classroom Center with "Love is a Choice," a discussion of the 10 stage recovery process for those whose happiness depends on people, behavior and things. At 12:20 p.m. in the Commons Area of the Jack B. Kelley Student Center, he will present "Love Hunger," a discussion of food addictions.

Hemfelt will take a brief respite to autograph copies of his books at 2 p.m. in the WTSU Bookstore prior to a 5:45 p.m. dinner presentation titled "How to Help People." The presentation, scheduled in the Mary Moody Northern Hall Atrium, will focus on the counseling process used to help people deal with problems.

The final lecture, "We Are Driven," will be presented at 7:30 p.m. in Northern Recital Hall. Hemfelt will discuss the recovery process for those who feel their lives are out of control or find themselves driven by work, school or other situations and circumstances.

All lectures are free and open to the public. Dinner will be served at the 5:45 p.m. program at cost of \$8 per person.

The Willson Lecture Series is sponsored by West Texas State University and made possible by gifts from Mrs. J.M. Willson and the late J.M. Willson of Floydada. The series is presented annually by lecturers selected on the basis of ethical ideals, human experience and scholarship.

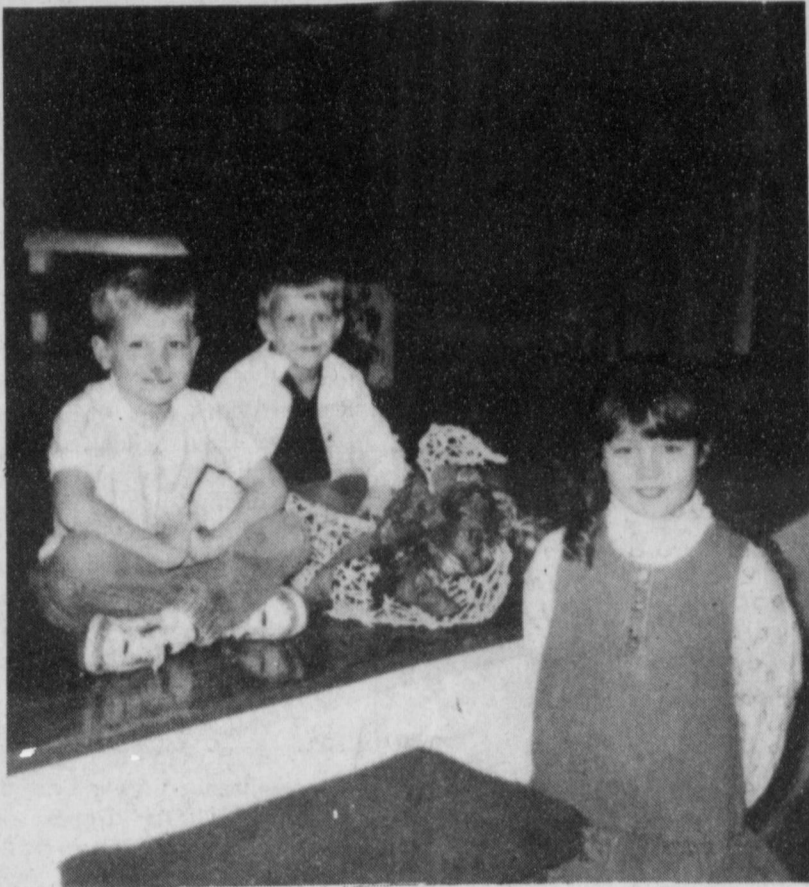

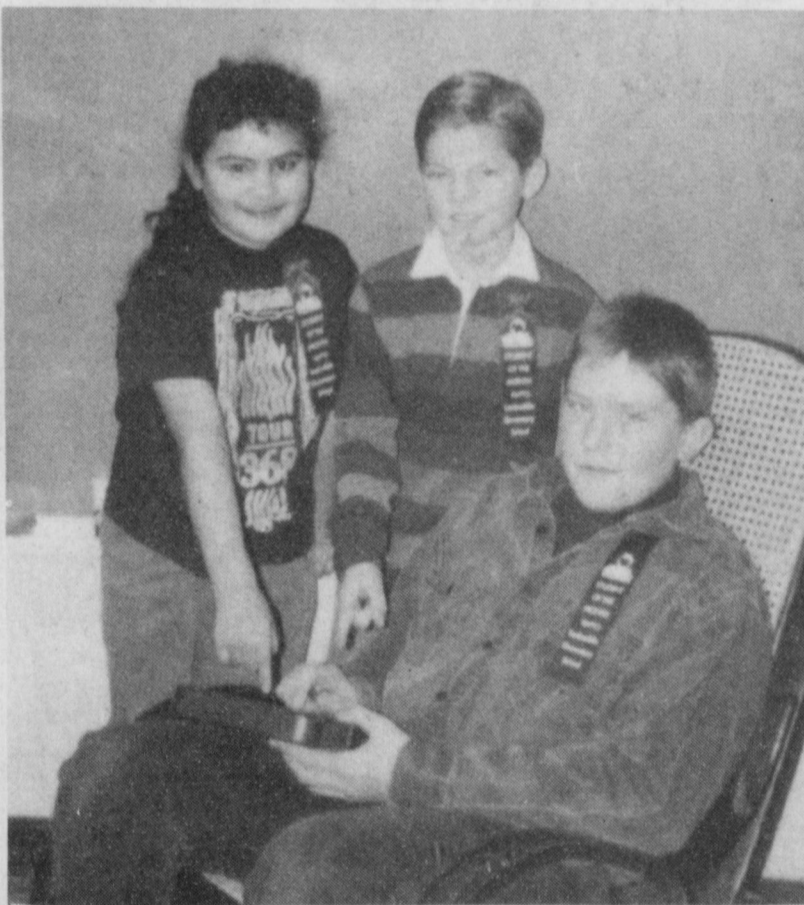
Heart Association

VEGETABLE QUICHE

- 1 pie crust, unbaked
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 medium size tomatoes, thinly sliced
- 1 tablespoon packed bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon basil
- 3/4 cup milk
- 3 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 10 oz. boxes chopped spinach cooked and drained
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 1/2 cups shredded cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped roasted peanuts
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon celery salt
- 1 tablespoon Parmesan

cheese

Press excess water out of spinach. Sauté green onion and garlic in butter until golden brown. Add spinach, cook over medium heat stirring constantly, until excess moisture evaporates. Combine spinach mixture, cheese, eggs, milk, salt, basil, and celery salt in large bowl. Stir to mix well. Turn in an unbaked pastry shell. Arrange thinly sliced tomatoes around outer edge of quiche. Combine bread crumbs, Parmesan cheese and peanuts in small bowl. Sprinkle over tomato slices. Bake in 425 degree oven for 15 minutes, lower oven temperature to 350 degrees and bake 20 minutes longer or until top is puffy and center moves slightly when moved. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

PUMPKIN NUT BREAD

- 3 1/2 cups all purpose flour

- 1 cup peanut oil
- 1 30-oz. can pumpkin pie filling
- 4 eggs
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups chopped dates or raisins
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 cup chopped roasted peanuts
- 3 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- Preheat oven 350 degrees.
- Grease and flour four 9" loaf pans. In large bowl beat eggs slightly. Gradually stir in sugar, oil, water, and pumpkin. Add in flour, salt, soda and cinnamon and mix well. Stir in dates and/or raisins and nuts. Pour 1/4 of batter into each loaf pan. Bake for 1 hour or until bread pulls away from sides of pan. Cool in pans on wire rack 10 minutes and remove from pan and cool completely on rack.

Some of the statistics about Cote d'Ivoire, formerly known as the Ivory Coast, include a population of 11.1 million, and growing at 4.2 percent per year.

Primary school enrollment is 78 percent, while only 20 percent of the population is enrolled in secondary schools.

Their average income per person (1987) was \$740 per year and the average lifespan for both males and females is age 52. Their infant mortality is very high.

Cote d'Ivoire is the largest producer of cocoa in the world, and the fourth largest coffee grower.

Because of plummeting cocoa prices, some farmers are turning to food production -- corn, plus limited rice and tuber growing.

Other crops now being produced are eggplant, rice, tomato and okra; as well as pimiento and ground crops.

The country imports about

two-thirds of its meat. They generally import lower priced frozen meats. Even with meat, fish, dairy and wheat imports, the country is largely self-sufficient in food production.

Kenneth Henry was in charge of the program and introduced the Woods, who are farmers in the Quitaque area.

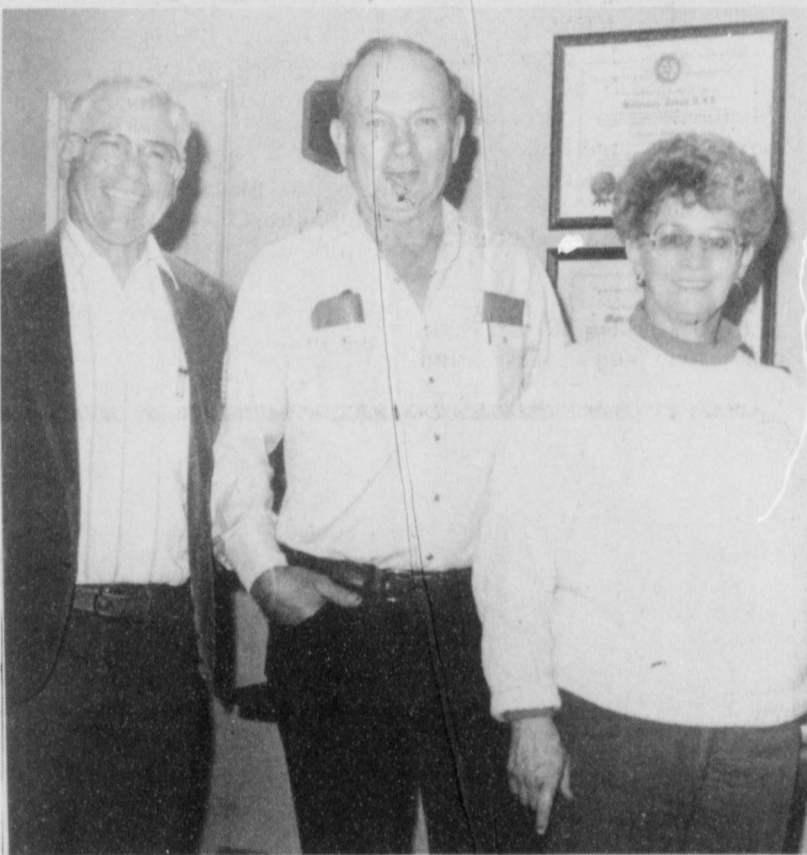

1990 High Plains Precipitation Lower Than Normal

Even though the amount of precipitation received on the Southern High Plains of Texas during the latter portion of the 1980's was below average, the total for the 10-year period (1980-1990) was approximately 17 percent above the average received in the area up to 1980.

The benefits of the above-average precipitation and an increased conservation effort were reflected in the reduced rate of water depletion in the Ogalla Aquifer that occurred during the 1980's. The Ogallala Aquifer in the 36,000 square mile area of the Texas High Plains contained approximately 415 million acre-feet of water in 1990. This volume is approximately 30 million acre-feet more than expected, based upon computer models operated by the Texas Water Development Board staff (TWDB) in Austin.

The TWDB uses this computer model to maintain a current inventory and project future changes of the amount of groundwater in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer.

In calibrating the 1980 computer model to reflect the actual quantity of water in storage in the aquifer in 1990, the calculation for pumpage for the period based on the irrigation surveys was entered. The computer model then compared the quantities known to be in storage in 1980 and 1990, deducted pumpage, and calculated that an average annual recharge rate of 1.71 inches per surface acre per year across the area would have had to occur for the ending balance to equal the actual quantity of water in storage in 1990. This is almost twice the 0.86 inch per acre per year of natural recharge calculated to have occurred during the 1960's and 1970's, when a similar model and similar methodology was used by the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) to reflect the changes in water levels which occurred during that time period.

The net depletion of the Ogallala Aquifer in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's 5.2 million acre service area averaged 1.6 million acre-feet per year from 1965 to 1970; 1.4 million acre-feet per year from 1970 to 1975; 1.2 million acre-feet per year from 1975 to 1980; 0.85 million acre-feet per year from 1980 to 1985; and 0.03 million acre-feet per year from 1985 to 1990.

The reduced rate of the net depletion of the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area in the 1980's can be attributed to a combination of many factors. However, two of the major factors have to be the increased conservation effort by area farmers and the benefits of the above-average precipitation which occurred during the early 1980's.

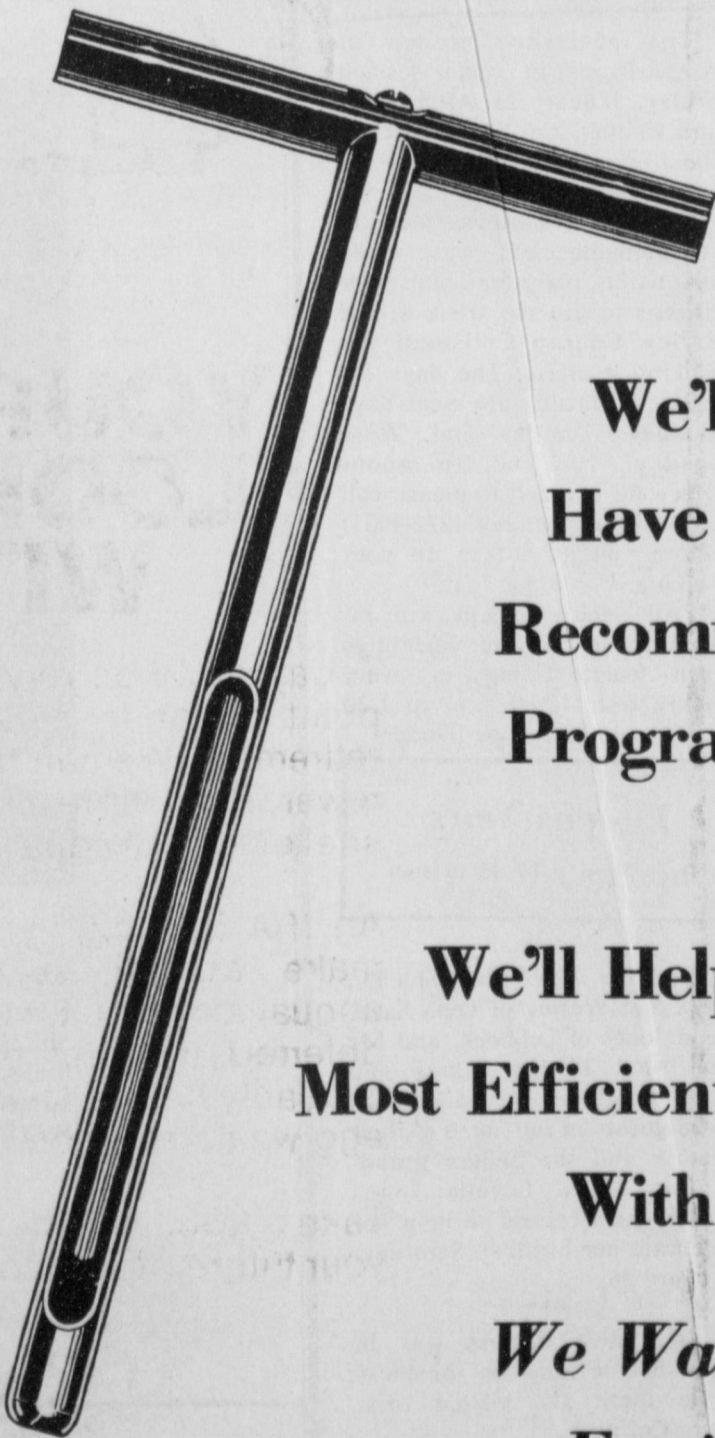
If precipitation averages return to normal during the 1990's--even with additional conservation efforts--the TWDB computer model projects the groundwater reserves for the Ogallala Aquifer within the Texas High Plains area will be reduced from the 415 million acre-feet calculated to be in storage in 1990 to approximately 380 million acre-feet by the year 2000.

Certainly no one can predict the future, but it is evident we must continue to do our utmost to use our groundwater reserves with as little waste, or loss, as possible. Who knows? Perhaps with a maximum conservation effort and a little extra precipitation to reduce irrigation water demands and provide a little extra natural recharge, the aquifer might yet reach a state of equilibrium.

CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead Exemption

lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify

for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available

to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 or over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to

your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this address.

if you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1990 you won't need to apply again for 1991 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you moved to a new home, make a new application for 1991.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1991. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Dependents and Exemptions

These are typical of questions asked by taxpayers and are presented as a public service of this publication and the IRS.

Q. What qualifies a person to be claimed as a dependent on my tax return?

A. Five tests are used to determine dependency in order to claim an exemption on your tax return. They are: member of household or relationship test, citizenship test, joint return test, gross income test and support test. Each of these rules has its own criteria. If you have a question as to whether or not to claim a dependent, consult the instructions in your tax package.

Q. Even though my dependent did not live with me the entire year, does he or she still qualify as a dependent on my tax return?

A. Yes, if he or she meets all of the tests mentioned above, he or she may still qualify as a dependent.

Q. How much is each exemption for a dependent worth?

A. For tax year 1990, each exemption, including yourself, is \$2,050.

Q. What do I do if I need more time to file?

A. You must apply for an extension of time to file using Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return. You must file Form 4868 by the regular due date of your return, and you must enclose payment of any tax you estimate you will owe. You will then be allowed four more months to file your return. You cannot file Form 1040EZ if you get an extension.
