City Council approves sewer rate increase

The Muleshoe City Council nearly doubled the city sewer rate in an effort to balance next year's budget.

The Council voted 4-1 Tuesday to raise the city sewer rates \$5 for both residential and commercial customers during its final budget meeting.

The increase, which takes effect Oct. 1, is part of a \$2.7 million budget proposal the Council will adopt following a public hearing Thursday, Sept. 11 at the city hall. The meeting starts at 7 p.m.

The new rates are \$11 for residential and \$11.50 for commercial.

It will generate roughly \$110,000 in additional rev-

City Manager James Fisher said the rate hike was needed to balance what was already a tight budget. The new budget includes just

one capital outlay project, \$100,000 for the state-mandated closing of the city landfill.

"There is little to no fat in the budget," Fisher said. "If something major goes wrong, it will be a challenge to find the additional dollars to cover it."

City reserves have dwindled from \$800,000 five years ago to less than \$200,000, according to the city manager. The sewer increase comes

on the heels of a substantial increase in the garbage rate last Larry Kirk was the Council-

man that voted against the sewer increase.

"It's easier to vote with than against them," Kirk said." But I felt it's too much to ask citizens to pay an additional \$100 a year in utility fees."

Fisher said he realizes raising utilities is a burden on the citizens of Muleshoe, but there just isn't any other option.

"The community is taking a big hit — and we're aware of that — but we didn't look to or want to raise taxes," Fisher said.

After pouring over the proposed budget item by item last month, the City Council is well aware of how tight money is, Fisher said.

Mules open season with shutout

Muleshoe rolls to 403 yards of total offense

Muleshoe is tired of being the underdog.

The Mules gained a step toward respectability Friday night in their season-opener by dominating Portales 31-0 in front of a crowd of 1,500 at Benny Douglass Stadium.

"The kids are just tired of hearing it," said Muleshoe head coach David Wood, who reminded his team before the game that one out-of-town writer picked the Mules as 18-point underdogs. "They're been tired of hearing it for a decade.

"One game doesn't change a whole decade. But it's a good start."

Wood was soaked and sticky after a postgame Powerade compliments of his players.

"I'll do it every game if it means a win," Wood said.

Muleshoe finished with 403 total yards while holding Portales to 79 yards and three first downs.

Junior Greg Pena's 90 yards on 11 carries led a balanced Muleshoe rushing attack that piled up 343 yards.

Senior Chris Shelburne scored twice for Muleshoe, the first touchdowns he has scored at any level.

"It was great," said Shelburne, who injured his left knee and ankle on an eight-yard run in the first quarter. "The second one I got to enjoy.' Shelburne caught a 10-yard pass


from backup quarterback Breck Brown in the fourth quarter to complete the

Muleshoe scored the first three times it touched the ball.

So much for first game jitters.

"We were real confident coming into the game," said junior quarterback

Sanitation contractor working on alley cleanup

The contractor for the City of Muleshoe's sanitation services announced this week it has changed its company name to Duncan Disposal of Lub-

General Manager Jack Reid said the name was changed to eliminate confusion.

Duncan Disposal, which took over the city services Sept. 1, was formerly known as WesTex Waste Services.

Earlier this year, WesTex purchased the Midland and Lubbock operations of Waste Management of West Texas.

Duncan Disposal is in the process of a city-wide alley cleanup campaign.

Reid said it is important that customers make it clear items placed in the alleys are for disposal.

"We need people to place items away from the fence so we know it is clearly intended for pickup and disposal," the general manager said.

Alley cleanup is part of company's normal service.

The city will be divided into quadrants, each of which will be picked up once a month.

Additional pickups can be scheduled by calling the Muleshoe City Hall, Reid said.

Included in alley pickup are items like brush, tree limbs and bulky items like old furniture and appliances.

The company asks that tree limbs be cut into a four-foot

"We're going to have to find a way to restructure the financial status of the city. The next five years are going to be tough."


Fisher said the city doesn't have the funds for several overdue capital outlay projects.

Projects needing immediate attention include replacing an aging above ground water tank that is leaking, increasing the capacity of the sewer treatment plant and painting both city water towers.

He said the city will probably have to go into debt to pay for the projects. The money would be borrowed against the utility fund.

"We have several major facilities that are on borrowed time," Fisher said. "The City of Muleshoe does not have first-rate facilities. Things have simply worn out."

Fisherdidn't want to speculate how the city got into its current financial crisis.



Charlie Brown had the Great Pumpkin. Jerrell Otwell has the Colossal Cantaloupe.


The longtime Muleshoe resident has a whopping, 32pound cantaloupe ripening in his home garden and another two dozen in the 20-pound range.

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



Back-to-school advice: get involved

Children and young adults are not the only ones heading back to school this fall. Parents should be close behind being involved in their child's education.

Research shows that when parents take an active interest in their child's education, the child does better in school. Higher grades, improved attendance, and better behavior are among the positive results.

There are many ways parents can be involved in helping their child succeed in school. Here are a few tips:

Encourage your child to read:

Read aloud to younger

children. Get them to comment studying at home is expected and ask questions.

- When your child first learns to read, let him read to you; listen attentively and be sure to praise his efforts.
- Have a discussion with your child about the books she reads - whatever her reading
- Be a role model make sure your child sees you reading regularly.
- Involve other family members, especially older children who can read to the younger ones.

- Discuss the assignment, give your child feedback, and praise his/her efforts.

Talk to your child about what's happening in school:

- Encourage your child to describe what the school day was like, don't accept "nothing happened" as an answer.
- Ask questions about teachers, your child's friends. favorite subjects, and the new things that he or she learned.

Talk to your child's teacher(s):

- Get to know your child's teachers, and stay in touch with
- Ask about your child's strengths and weaknesses.
- Find out what you can do at home to monitor your child's progress and help him/her succeed in school.



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

Entry forms now available for sorghum yield contest

ABERNATHY — This year marks the 13th year for the Grain Sorghum Yield and Management Contest which is sponsored by the National Grain Sorghum Producers.

Each year, growers from across the United States compete to see who can produce the best yield for their county and state. Entries must be postmarked at least 30 days before harvest of the contest field.

In the sorghum contest, yields are compared to the county's five-year average yield as estimated by the National Agricultural Statistical Service. The contestant's score is the number of bushels the contest plot produced over that average.

The contest is divided into four divisions: dryland conventional tillage, irrigated conventional tillage, dryland notill and irrigated no-till.

The only change in this year's contest is that high-tannin, bird resistant sorghum seed varieties will no longer be accepted as entries in the contest. Producers who are uncertain about the tannin content of their seed can contact their local seed dealer for more information.

Producers may enter as many contest plots as they wish. A \$35 entry fee must accompany each entry. Contestants must be a member of the association; however, the \$40 membership dues may be sent in with the entry.

Winners are named for the county and state. State firstplace winners go on to compete for national honors. State and national winners will be honored at the association's annual convention which will be held in Reno on Feb. 18-19,

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
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"The Strong-willed Child": Do You Know Any?

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

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


