

"What happened when the issue was put to vote in New York? The 'New York News' carried a series of a dozen or so articles on juvenile delinquency, much of the cause pointing to the school system and the 'permissive' at Aude of progressive education. The editors wanted to know how their readers felt about progressive education and printed a ballot so they could mail in their votes. The final count showed: 41,370 opposed; 361

In June, 1944, I was assigned to speak at a meeting of more than 500 communist teachers and their friends at the Jefferson School on the new communist perspectives as applied to education. I held out the prospect of a new approach to education soon to be disclosed by American leaders who controlled the purse strings of the nation. I urged the communist teachers to exercise their influence for unity on all teachers' and citiezns' groups. I pointed out that the NAM had established a tie with NEA and had pledged itself to help build education and to support a nation-wide school - building program; that this would grow into a program of continued co-opera-

tion on all educational subjects.' "To find the National Education Association working with the Communists is disturbing, but to find the National Association of Manifacturers workers with the NEA n the same connection is alarm-



She ex plained the peels should be cut in one - quarter - inch pieces, with care being taken not to cut into the fruit. The peels should be boiled three times for 10 minutes each to remove the bitter taste, she stated. They should then be drained and the moisture removed with paper towels.

Next step Mrs. Kelley demor strated was putting the peels into heavy sugar syrup and cooking until the peels turn transparent. The final step, she pointed out, is t roll them in sugar.


