"No doubt he feels that cancer is contagious and wants to his family and himself. Is his action one we should all follow even though my husband's

Dear Lady, there is not the slightest evidence that cancer is contagious.

If your son-in- law doubts this hospital that admits patients with malignant disease. He will see that none of the patients with cancer is isolated, that no special precautions are taken by members of the hospital staff, eluding nurses and doctors.

"I have a kidney that has dropped 21/2 vertebras and would like to know if it's best just to leave it or have an operation to put it back in place? Would it stay in place if it were sewed back?" asks a reader.

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
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


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
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
