WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy Saturday summoned Adlai E. Stevenson and other of his top United Nations advisers for a report on negotiations now underway to confirm the removal of Soviet missiles from Cuba. The White House said Kennedy would meet with Ambassador Stevenson, John J. McCloy, head of the three-man committee overseeing U.N. negotiations on the dismantling of the missile sites, and Charles Yost, alternate U.S. delegate to the United Nations.

### Red Chinese Moving New Troops To Front

NEW DELHI (UPI) — India Saturday was reported re-activating World War II U.S. air bases to speed the flow of American arms to the Northeast Frontier before 50,000 Chinese troops massed on the frontier can launch a new offensive. Calcutta's Dum Dum Airport, where American supplies began landing Saturday, was used by the U.S. Bomber Command against the Japanese invasion of Southeast Asia. The United States also built bomber bases throughout the north-eastern areas now threatened.

## Campaign Eyes A Noisy Climax

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 1962 political campaign roared toward a noisy climax Saturday with candidates scrambling for votes on the stump, on television and in the courts. It will end Tuesday when about 10 million voters elect 35 governors, 39 U. S. senators, all 435 members of the national House of Representatives and thousands of state and local officials. Political barometers indicated a Republican minority would capture some governorships from Democrats and perhaps make modest gains in the House. The GOP would like to settle for an even break in the Senate. The Democrats were fighting for an even break across the board—in statehouses and in Congress. Their hopes were brightened in the Senate, where they least needed more strength. Thirty-five of the nation's 50 governors will be elected Tuesday. Of the 35, 21 are now Democratic and 14 Republican. Thirty-nine of the 100 senators will be elected, including 24 for regular six-year terms and five fill vacancies.

### Texas G.O.P. Is Given 'Chance' In House Races

Texas Republicans are given an "outside" chance of increasing their strength to as high as four seats in the U. S. House of Representatives in Tuesday's general elections. The GOP presently holds only one Texas seat in the House—by Rep. Bruce Alger of Dallas. But many observers give Desmond Barry of Houston a better-than-even chance of winning the congressman-at-large post, and some say the GOP could pick up two more seats.

## Gray County's Ballot Is Full Of Names

In addition to the statewide races in Tuesday's general election, Gray County voters will elect 14 district, county and precinct officials. In only half of these races will there be contests. The seven Democratic candidates who have no opposition at the polls in local district, county and precinct races Tuesday are: Allan B. Chapman, for associate justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District of Texas; Lewis M. Goodrich for District Judge, 31st Judicial District; Charlie Thut, for Gray County Clerk; Helen Sprinkle, for District Clerk; Ota Gregory, for County Treasurer; B. R. Nuckolls, for County Superintendent of In-

struction; and A. H. Doucette, for County Surveyor. However, there are seven other contested races between Republican and Democratic candidates. Of these, probably the most spirited campaigns have been conducted by Republican Jack Seale of Amarillo and Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa for the 18th Congressional District seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, and between Pampa's Republican candidate Warren Fatheree and Democrat Grainger McLihany of Wheeler for 8th District State Representative. Rogers and McLihany are seeking re-election. A great deal of interest also has been shown in the 18th District

contest for member of the State Board of Education between Mrs. E. D. McKay of Amarillo and Herbert O. Willborn. The only county-wide contest in Gray County finds GOP candidate Bill Watson pitted against incumbent William J. Craig for County Judge. There has been a very little campaigning by either contestant in this race. Democrat Clyde Organ and Republican W. C. Epperson are bidding for the post of Gray County Commissioner in Pct. 2. Also in Pct. 2, Democratic incumbent, J. W. Graham is seeking re-election against his Republican opponent, Jerry Coley, for Justice of the Peace. The polls in Gray County will open at 8 a.m. Tuesday and remain open for balloting until 7 p.m. County Clerk Charlie Thut said Saturday that the heaviest absentee balloting in the history of off-year elections in Gray County totaled 490 votes when the deadline fell Friday night with a few more expected in the mail. Gray County has some 8,755 eligible voters on the rolls. There are 12 voting precincts in the county. They are located as follows: Pct. 1—Lefors Community Center; Pct. 2—Baker School, Pampa; Pct. 3—Grandview School; Pct. 4—Alamere School Gym; Pct. 5—McLean City Hall; Pct. 6—Laketon Store; Pct. 7—Horace Mann School, Pampa; Pct. 8—Hopkins, C. M. Gatlin residence; Pct. 9—First National Bank Annex; Pct. 10—Courthouse, Pampa; Pct. 11—Phillips Camp, Community Center, and Pct. 12 South Side Fire Station, Pampa. County Clerk Thut said today counting of the ballots in Gray County probably would not be completed until midnight or later. Counting votes on the 14 Constitutional amendments is expected to delay the final count. Election officials advised voters to be careful in marking ballots. The best rule to follow, they said, is to mark lines through the name of every person on the ballot for whom you do not wish to vote.

### Republicans In Big Effort For Two-Party State

DALLAS (UPI) — An expected one million voters will decide in a general election Tuesday whether Texas will get its first Republican governor since the days of Reconstruction. Beyond that, they will decide whether the GOP enlarges its political beachhead in other offices, including the Texas Congressional delegation. The Republicans are making their greatest effort since Reconstruction to turn Texas into a real two-party state. Their gubernatorial candidate is Jack Cox, supported by Democrat John Connally. Robert L. Johnson, manager of the Texas Election Bureau, which will count the votes doubts that the total vote will get over a million. He pointed out that one million votes Tuesday would set a record for an off-year election. The highest previous vote in an off-year election was 781,000 in 1950. Polls Open Early The polls open Tuesday at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Tabulation of the returns probably will be slow because of 24 proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot. Republicans oppose Democrats in 16 of 23 congressional races. They stand their best chance in the Fifth District (Dallas) where incumbent Republican Bruce Alger is running against Democrat Bill Jones, and in the congressman-at-large race. Former State Rep. Joe Paul, St. Dallas, a Democrat, is running in the at-large race against Des Berger, 54, a Houston trucking operator and Republican. Republicans also are running against Democrats for lieutenant governor, state land commissioner, agriculture commissioner, railroad commissioner and comptroller. They are seeking 14 of the 21 seats in the state Senate and 16 of the 136 seats in the state House of Representatives. So, the main issue before voters Tuesday boils down to Democrat versus Republican. The Republicans, making more of a conventional than of a party label, have daily decried "Washington control." Cox, 41, has hit this issue hard. Connally, 45, a former secretary of Navy in the Kennedy administration, has accused Cox of being a "narrowed" reference to the fact that he once ran for governor as a Democrat. Casually Officers Leadership Connally, Fort Worth, contends that only he can provide the leadership necessary to improve the state's educational system, attract new industry and bring tourists into the state. Cox, a Breckenridge businessman, charges that if Connally wins, the leadership will come from Washington. He says that Connally is a stooge for Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. This Johnson and Connally have denied.

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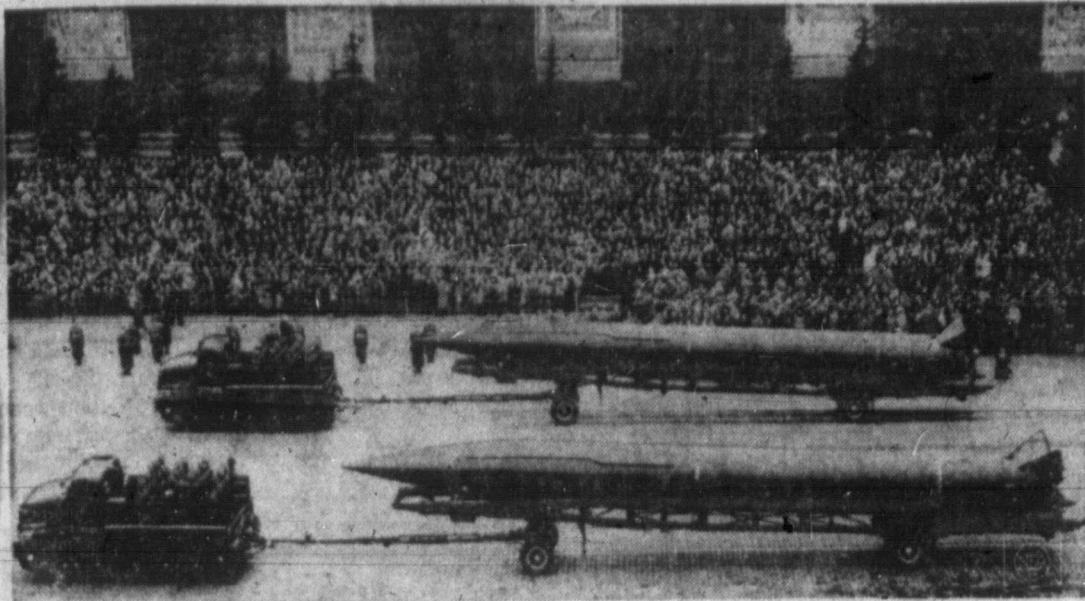

### Surgeon Cites Correction For Disease

HOUSTON—(UPI)—A New York brain surgeon has described an operation that can correct the disfiguring disease acromegaly, which caused the facial features of famed wrestler "The Swedish Angel."

Dr. Bronson Ray, speaking before the 12th annual Congress of Neurological Surgeons, described present treatment of acromegaly, a disease of the pituitary gland.

Some 400 leading brain surgeons from the western world attended the opening session of the three-day congress at the Shamrock-Hilton Hotel.

Dr. Ray explained how surgery can sometimes correct the ugly enlargement of lips, nose and other facial features as well as the fingers and other extremities.

Because Dr. Ray is one of the best known authorities on pituitary ailments, the congress scheduled considerable attention to diseases of that tiny, but vital gland that controls key life processes.

Dr. William German, of the department of neurological surgery at Yale University School of Medicine, also discussed the pituitary gland in a morning address. Dr. E. Graeme Robertson of Melbourne, Australia, and Dr. Donald D. Matson of Boston also address the opening session.

Also prominently scheduled are addresses and papers on stroke.

Dr. Michael DeBakey, Baylor School of Medicine, Houston, and Dr. J. Whitehead, Memphis, will discuss stroke diagnosis Saturday.

Scientific papers also will cover such topics as radiation treatment of brain ailments and surgery for recurring tumors.

Speakers will come from four countries; Ireland, Canada, Australia and the United States.

### Foreign Commentary

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—The capture in Venezuela of Communist terrorists charged with obeying Cuban orders may have provided the long-awaited breakthrough for the Organization of American States (OAS) to impose a total diplomatic quarantine on the regime of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

Five OAS nations still maintain relations with the Castro government. They are Brazil, Mexico, Chile, Uruguay and Bolivia.

Such a step would be contemplated even if Castro agrees to the swift withdrawal of offensive Soviet weapons from Cuba and the United States lifts its hemisphere-endorsed blockade, diplomatic officials believe.

Should Castro refuse removal of the missile bases, diplomats feel that new measures by the OAS would be academic as the hemisphere nations may be compelled to resort to the use of force.

But with the elimination of Cuba as a direct military threat, the United States and many Latin American governments believe that collective action, shot of armed intervention, will still be needed to curb the threat of Communist terrorism and subversion emanating from the Caribbean island.

**May Provide Solution**

The view of qualified diplomatic officials is that Venezuela may provide the legal solution by asking the inter-American organization to indict Castro as threatening her internal peace and security, an offense punishable by stiff diplomatic and economic sanctions under existing treaties.

The sources indicated that Mexico would support the move if it is confronted with hard facts that the Cuban government directed the dynamite attack earlier this week against oil field installations in Maracaibo, Venezuela.

The Venezuelan government claims to have intercepted radio shortwave broadcasts from Havana carrying instructions to the saboteurs.

### Silver Lining' Is Found In Figures Of Unemployment

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The administration has found a silver lining in the preliminary unemployment figures for October, the first to be released before next week's elections.

Employment was at an all-time high and unemployment was the lowest in three years, Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz pointed out. Furthermore, he said, the figures released Wednesday "show a substantial improvement in the economy since January, 1961"—the month President Kennedy assumed office.

Republicans take a different view. The GOP National Committee issued a statement saying "the number of jobless people is now exactly what it was in Sept. 1960" when Kennedy was promising to bring unemployment down to 4 per cent.

The seasonally adjusted rate dropped 5.8 to 5.5 per cent of the work force, about where it has been most of the year but considerably below last year's rate of 6.7 per cent.


Everyone concerned says the rate still is too high, and Seymour L. Wolfson, the Labor Department's employment expert said the rate is not likely to go below 5 per cent in the next few months. President Kennedy said last January the goal was to reduce the rate to 4 per cent by mid-1963 and even more in the next two years.

There are more people working today—almost 69 million in the civilian labor force during October—than ever before. But this is true almost every month as the economy expands and the population grows.

The 3,294,000 unemployed during October was the lowest since October of 1959. Seasonally adjusted, however, still comes out to 5.5 per cent of the total labor force and the rate of three months ago was lower than that—5.3 per cent for July.

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### Briton Sees Vast Change In Cuba Since 'Crisis' Started

London Express correspondent Colin Lawson was the only British reporter to enter Cuba after the missile crisis flared. He wrote this story in Havana just before catching the first flight out to Mexico.

HAVANA, Wednesday, Oct. 31 (UPI) — The missile crisis has sunk Fidel Castro's popularity to its lowest ebb in the four years since he came out of the hills to make the transition from revolutionary hero to dictator of Cuba.

Cubans are bewildered. There is growing resentment and annoyance over what they slowly are coming to consider as a crucial setback by Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

For five days I was a prisoner in a stinking, flea-ridden jail in the center of Havana's slums. It was located behind the facade of Cuba's chief emigration office.

Vigorous protests from the British embassy secured my release two days ago, but I was ordered not to leave my hotel until I drove to the airport. I chose to ignore this order.

For a time, I mingled freely with Cubans in restaurants, bars and cafes that once had been smart.

Confined to Room  
But one of Castro's security men came up with me and thereafter I was confined to my room.

BOSTON—Ted Kennedy's mother, recalling an earlier election confrontation between the Lodges and a member of her family: "The only time the Kennedys were ever beaten by the Lodges was when my father ran against the late Henry Cabot Lodge and that was before women could vote."

### Officials Study Silverton Death

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Officials of the department of Public Safety today studied the autopsy records of Joe E. Woodard Jr., 40, of Hobbs, N.M., found dead in his car Wednesday.

Woodard's body was found in a car at the bottom of a canyon 22 miles east of Silverton, Texas.

Texas Ranger Capt. Raymond Waters said the car plunged about 250 feet off Texas Highway 256 into the canyon. The dead man had a gash on the back of his head.

Woodard had been missing for 10 days. A physician said he had been dead 10 to 12 days when found.

### Louise Evans To Speak At Local Church

The Methodist Churches, along with the First Presbyterian, First Christian, and St. Matthew's Episcopal churches, will sponsor Louise Evans, editor of the editorial page of the Amarillo Globe-Times Publishing Co., who will speak on "Our Greatest National Resource: Youth," in the patio of the First Methodist Church Education Building Wednesday evening, November 7, at 7 o'clock. The meeting is open to the public.

Miss Evans, long-time member of the staff of the Amarillo paper, is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism, and has worked for the Rockefeller Foundation in New York, the American Council on Education and the United States Department of Agriculture in Washington.

In 1957, she became the first newspaperwoman to be honored by the Texas Social Welfare Association for her contributions in the field of Journalism to the health, education, recreation, and welfare programs of her community. The Rev. Robert S. Tate, pastor of the Alamo Heights Methodist Church of San Antonio, in reading the citation to Miss Evans before the convention delegates, said "she has been the moving spirit behind the development of a Citizen's Health Council, with persistence in the establishment of a three-million-dollar hospital expansion program; awakened others to the problem of the juvenile offender; and cultivated public opinion toward the organization of a Child Guidance Clinic. Her mental health series in early 1956 was a prime factor in the mental health code."

Miss Evans, in private life Mrs. Marion Bruce, is the recipient of numerous awards in the public service field. In January, 1959, she won a citation for outstanding medical writing from the Texas Medical Association, and in April of the same year, Dr. Joe R. Donaldson of Pampa, president of the state medical association public relations committee, presented her with a bronze plaque at the convention in San Antonio.

In December, 1961, Louise Evans was named by Governor Price Daniel to a committee which advises the Texas Legislative Council in a study of the state's health and welfare services, and is serving as a member of the Governor's Committee on Aging.

Those previous photographs had shown fueling and oxidizer vehicles, two launchers, missile-ready tents and a "cherry picker" crane at the Sagua la Grande site. The photographs taken Thursday had showed the tents, the vehicles and at least one of the launchers gone.

So far there has been no agreement on what means will be used to convince the United States that all of these missiles actually will be created and returned to Russia as Khrushchev said would happen.

Kennedy, in his Friday speech, said "the United States intends to follow closely the completion of his work through a variety of means, including aerial surveillance, until such time as an equally satisfactory international means of verification is effected."

Must Agree Quickly Official sources said that Cuban Premier Fidel Castro must agree quickly to independent verification of the departure of the offensive weapons—26 IL28 bombers as well as the missiles—or face indefinite air-sea surveillance and the naval blockade.

One hope was that Anastas I. Mikoyan, Soviet first deputy Premier and an old Bolshevik revolutionary who now is Khrushchev's ace troubleshooter, would be able to work out some arrangement with Castro, whom he met again Saturday in Havana.

One authoritative report here is that Russia now has enough ships in Cuban ports to begin returning the missiles to the Soviet Union almost immediately, possibly by early next week.

But negotiations with Castro could be snagged badly if these vessels sailed before there was agreement on a verification system.

For this reason officials here expected Mikoyan to strike for an "equally satisfactory" means of surveillance by the first of next week.

## Real Question In November 6 Voting

### UPI Election Preview The House

By VINCENT J. BURKE United Press International

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Political strategists of both parties privately agree that the Democrats are very likely to retain nominal control of the U.S. House of Representatives in the Nov. 6 election.

The real question is whether the new House will be more favorable or less favorable to President Kennedy's domestic legislative program than the one which recently adjourned.

If the new House is less favorably inclined to Kennedy's brand of legislation, the prospect is for two years of stalemate as far as really controversial issues are concerned.

That inevitably would set the stage for a bruising 1964 Presidential campaign with Kennedy blaming his critics in Congress for legislative inaction and the Republicans accusing Kennedy of a failure of leadership.

Stakes Transcend Issues Thus the stakes in this year's balloting go far beyond the immediate issues.

Most of the 435 House seats at stake Nov. 6 are relatively safe

for the party now holding them. The outcome will depend on elections in about 100 doubtful, or swing districts.

The party lineup in the House during the 87th Congress was 263 Democrats and 174 Republicans.

But for Kennedy the significant figures have been 217-212, 215-205, 202-197 and 219-186. These are the margins by which Kennedy won four and lost one of his closest battles in the House.

The party in power almost always loses House seats in midterm congressional elections. Not since 1934 has the President's party gained seats in such elections. The average result dating back to 1912 has been a loss of 39 seats for the President's party.

Republican leaders publicly claim they have a good chance of winning the 44 seats they need to control the House. But their private assessment falls far short of that figure.

Kennedy has publicly expressed hope of upsetting the historical trend by picking up 5 or 10 new Democratic seats. Privately Democratic strategists would be happy to hold their losses to 5 seats.

The significant fact is that Re-

publicans do not have to win party control of the House for conservatives to gain a life and death power over Kennedy's legislative program.

A GOP pickup of 20 or more House seats would give Republicans and conservative Southern Democrats the whiphand. Conceivably, a GOP gain of as few as 10 seats could significantly boost the power of the conservative bloc.

Should the election result in little or no net shift in the party lineup, administration forces probably would be stronger in the new House.

Kennedy Gains In South This is because Democrats elected in the South this year almost certainly will include more Kennedy supporters. In a few scattered primary elections, conservative Democratic incumbents were defeated this year by moderate or liberal Southerners. In addition, reapportionment of House seats among states will result in some "liberalizing" of the Democratic party's Southern wing in the House.

The 11 states of the old Southern Confederacy wound up with the same number of seats. But some in conservative-rural areas were eliminated. And some new

districts were carved out in areas with more liberal constituencies, including Tampa, Fla., and the Miami area.

In north as well as the South the result of reapportionment will be to give a greater voice in the House to city-suburban voters and a smaller voice to the nation's declining farm population.

California with a gain of eight seats will elect 38 representatives to the House, 11 more than any state except New York with 41. Florida gained four seats. Seven other states each gained one seat. Sixteen states lost seats.

This reshuffling has assured a big turnover in House membership. It caused collisions between incumbents thrown into the same districts. Five were defeated in incumbent vs. incumbent battles in the primaries and similar contests with unseated seven more on Nov. 6.

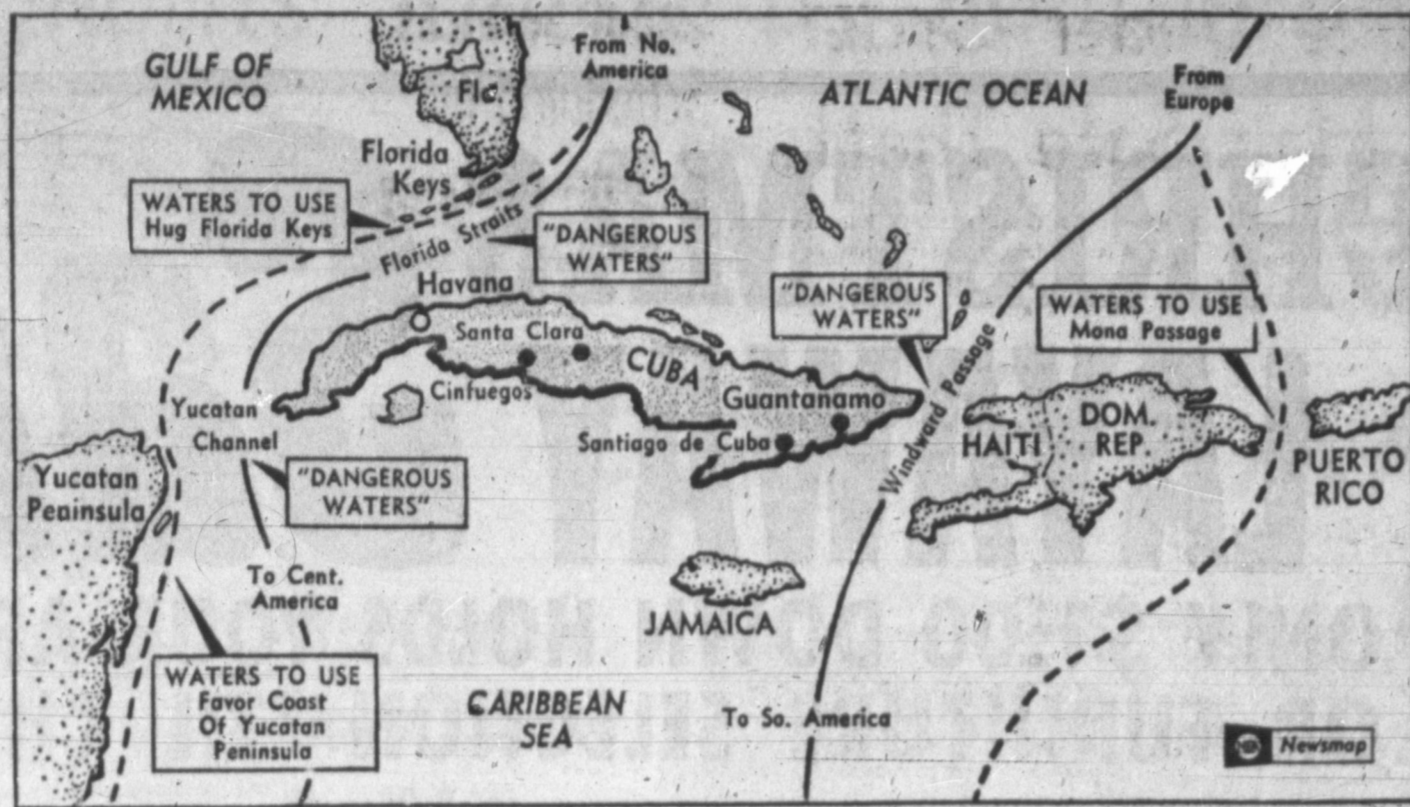

## New Air Mail Envelope To Go On Sale

The Post Office Department has announced that the new embossed 8-cent Air Mail Stamped Envelope will be first placed on sale at Chantilly, Virginia, on November 17, 1962, to coincide with the dedication of the Dulles International Airport, according to O. K. Gaylor, Pampa postmaster.

This new envelope is being provided to meet the increase in the postal rates which becomes effective January 7, 1963. For the convenience of patrons who wish to purchase them prior to this date, the new envelope will be available at other post offices after the first day sale as fast as manufacturing conditions permit.

The 8-cent embossed stamp on the envelope will depict a modern jet airliner in flight, above which is the wording "Air Mail." Across the bottom of the stamp is "U. S. 8 cents." Alternate red and blue parallelograms appear around the edges of the envelope. The background of the stamp will be red.

Collectors desiring the first day cancellation of the 8-cent Air Mail envelope, standard 6-3/4 size, may submit orders to the Postmaster, Chantilly, Virginia, plainly indicating the full name and address, with a remittance to cover the cost, which is 5 CENTS EACH. Addressed gummed labels may be submitted to be affixed to the envelopes if desired. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers 5 Cents Air Mail Envelope."

It has also been announced that pre-cancelled postal cards designed to cut operating costs and speed delivery will go on sale in November for use next January 7, when postal rates increase.

The new 4-cent card is on gleaming white paperstock, a change from the buff color used for many years. A light purple portrait of Abraham Lincoln appears on the postal card, replacing the purple Statue of Liberty three-cent issue.

## 11-Year-Old Runs With Dog Pack

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Juvenile authorities today considered the case of a little boy who grew so lonely he joined a pack of dogs.

The District of Columbia juvenile court will hear psychologists of the court's child guidance clinic tell why the 11-year-old boy felt deserted by human beings.

Psychologist Morton Cooper emphasized that the boy had no illusions about what he was doing when he barked like a dog and ran on all fours through alleys with a pack of dogs.

"I've got enough sense not to run around with dogs during the day when people can see me," he quoted the boy as saying. "I only run with them in alleys at night."

Cooper said the boy turned to dogs for friendship because he received no understanding and friendship at home and at school. He lived with his mother and stepfather and several half-brothers and sisters. He has been in a detention home for the past two months because his parents said they could not control him. Doctors said the boy was "emotionally disturbed" and "emotionally impoverished," but felt that dogs understood him.

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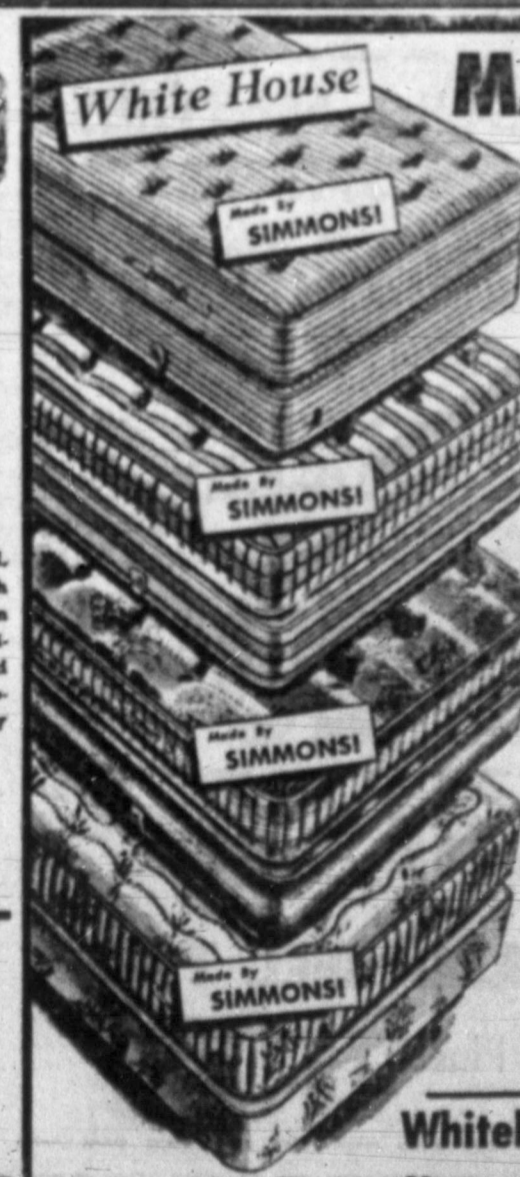

### Six Cornhusker Fumbles

# Missouri Belts Nebraska In Big Eight Showdown

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — Unbeaten Missouri took advantage of plentiful bobbles by Nebraska Saturday and rolled to a 16-7 triumph over the previously unbeaten Cornhuskers in a Big Eight Conference showdown.

While a sellout crowd of 38,000 fans looked on in dismay, the Cornhuskers, who had won six straight, never were able to mount a serious offensive threat.

The only bright spot in the murky 42-degree day was an 88-yard scoring run by fullback Noel Mar-

tin with an intercepted pass. That was the end of the Cornhusker scoring.

Compounding Nebraska's futility from scrimmage were three pass interceptions by the eager Tigers and six fumbles, two of which helped set up the Missouri touchdowns. A third set up a Tiger field goal.

Missouri, which has won six and tied one, sprung sophomore halfback Johnny Roland for a 46-yard touchdown run on a reverse in the opening period after

teammate Daryl Krugman recovered a Cornhusker fumble on the Nebraska 46.

Nebraska tied it up in the second period when Martin picked off a Keith Weber pass at the Nebraska 12 and sprinted unopposed to the end zone ahead of a flock of Cornhusker blockers.

But then the fumbleitis set in. Husker quarterback Dennis Claridge fumbled on the Husker 21 midway through the third period and the bobble was quickly followed by a 45-yard field goal by fullback Bill Leistritz.

A Dave Thiessen fumble on a Missouri punt gave the ball to Missouri on the Husker 26 in the fourth period. Six plays later, Jim Johnson rammed over from the one to run the count to 16-7. Nebraska blocked the conversion try.

Nebraska had ranked fourth in total offense nationally with a 400-yard per game average before Saturday. But Saturday the Huskers gained 141 on the ground and a mere seven through the air.

The game left Missouri in excellent position for the Big Eight title and the Orange Bowl invitation. It was the Tigers' fourth conference win. Nebraska is 3-1 in the conference.

## Football Coaches Report Decrease In Grid Fatalities

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The midseason football fatality survey of the American Football Coaches Association today showed a 28 per cent decrease in deaths attributed to the sport but the report said the toll could be cut by complete physical examinations.

The survey made by Dr. Floyd Eastwood of Los Angeles State College for the coaches association reported 25 deaths thus far in 1952, as compared with 35 at the same time last year.

And of the 25 fatalities this year, only three were of collegiate football players. The other 22 were the result of high school and sandlot competition.

The report said 16 of the fatalities were associated directly with the sport and nine indirectly. Dr. Eastwood classifies direct deaths as those caused by injuries while playing while indirect causes included heat strokes, heart afflictions and others not actually resulting while the victim is participating in the game.

All three deaths among college players were listed by Dr. Eastwood as having been indirectly attributed to football. Two of the victims, Reggie Grob of Texas and Ike Kelsey of Southern Methodist, died from heat strokes while Earl Hundley of George-

town (Ky.) college was stricken with meningitis.

And of the 16 deaths directly attributed to football participation, 11 were in high school and five in sandlot competition. Semi-pro and college teams have had no such direct fatalities this year.

Of the direct deaths, 13 of the 16 were the result of brain injuries. He said most of these were caused by blows to the front and sides of the skull. Dr. Eastwood said helmet manufacturers have made improvements in the padding and suspension of headgear and he tied these improvements to the fact that not a single college player has succumbed to a head injury this year.

### Gophers Drill Michigan St. In Big Ten

EAST LANSING, Mich. (UPI) — Minnesota's grudging defense shut off Michigan State's potent running game with 30 yards Saturday and the Gophers made their own breaks for a 28-7 upset over the nation's seventh-ranked college team.

Two of the Gopher touchdowns came on game-breaking plays, a 45-yard punt return by Jim Cairns and 44-yard pass from Duane Blaske, intended for John Campbell, but which was batted by Herman Johnson of Michigan State to the Minnesota's Bill Muney, who ran in to the end zone.

But these two plays were just partial demonstration of the Gophers' superiority. They hauled in two of 17 passes attempted by Michigan State and they recovered three of four Spartan fumbles, all of which were induced by Minnesota's jarring tackles.

Minnesota drove 80 yards for its first touchdown as fullback Jerry Jones drove over from the five.

The last score, a one-yard plunge by fullback Jay Sharp, with 33 seconds to play, was set up by gopher Bob Praxner's recovery of a Spartan fumble.

### Georgia Tech Halts Devils

DURHAM, N. C. (UPI) — Quarterback Billy Lohridge kicked two field goals, ran for one touchdown and set up a second Saturday to guide Georgia Tech to a 20-8 victory over a Duke team which stalled on the ground and in the air before 44,000 hometown fans.

Lohridge, a do-it-all-yourself field general from Gainesville, Ga., was the standout of the game. He repeatedly hit with his passes and ground out rushing yardage with his sweeps and sneaks.

Tech scored in each period but the fourth. The Blue Devils booted a field goal in the second period, but were not able to cross the goal line until the final quarter.

While Tech rolled with a steady power on the ground and had little trouble finding open pass receivers to hit, the Blue Devils couldn't make their ground attack click for sustained drives. Quarterback Walt Rappold couldn't hit his receivers until the final period when he launched one into the hands of Pete Widener in the end zone.

The game was an exhibition of grinding offensive football. Tech drove for scores every time it got possession of the ball in the first half.

### Illinois Breaks Losing Streak

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (UPI) — Illinois, fighting for every break, broke the longest losing streak in modern Big Ten history Saturday with a 14-10 upset over highly favored Purdue.

The Illini's 15 consecutive losses up until Saturday represented the longest string of defeats for any Big Ten team in the last 47 years.

The last-place Illini, given hardly a chance against third-place Purdue, cashed in on a blocked punt and an intercepted pass for the only two touchdowns they needed to break the Boilermakers.

Then, with Purdue fighting back in the closing minutes, the Illinois defense held.

Illinois' Mike Taliaferro passed 23 yards to Thurman Walker for one touchdown, set up by Rich Callaghan's recovery of a blocked Purdue punt. Ken Zimmerman went 30 yards for the other touchdown on the first play of the fourth period.

## Kansas Batters Wildcats, 38-0

MANHATTAN, Kan. (UPI) — Sophomore Gale Sayers scored three touchdowns Saturday to lead Kansas to a 38-0 triumph over hapless Kansas State in a Big Eight Conference game.

Sayers scored on runs of 10, 11 and 20 yards in the 60th renewal of the intra-state rivalry. He also passed for a pair of two-point conversions. The speedy halfback picked up 156 yards on 17 carries.

Kansas received the opening kickoff and marched on the 25 to a touchdown in 11 plays. Sayers had runs of 14 and 11 yards in the drive. Sayers capped it with a 10-yard scamper around right end.

Three minutes later, Kansas guard Ron Marsh tackled Kansas State quarterback Doug Dusenbury in the end zone for a safety and a 9-0 Kansas lead.

Kansas State, who has lost all seven outings this year and scored but one touchdown, threatened to score in the second quarter after halfback Gerry Condit recovered a fumble on the Jayhawk 29. The Wildcats got to the 18, where Dusenbury tried a field goal that was wide.

Kansas took over again and moved 80 yards for a touchdown in 10 plays, with quarterback Roger McFarland going the last 5 yards.

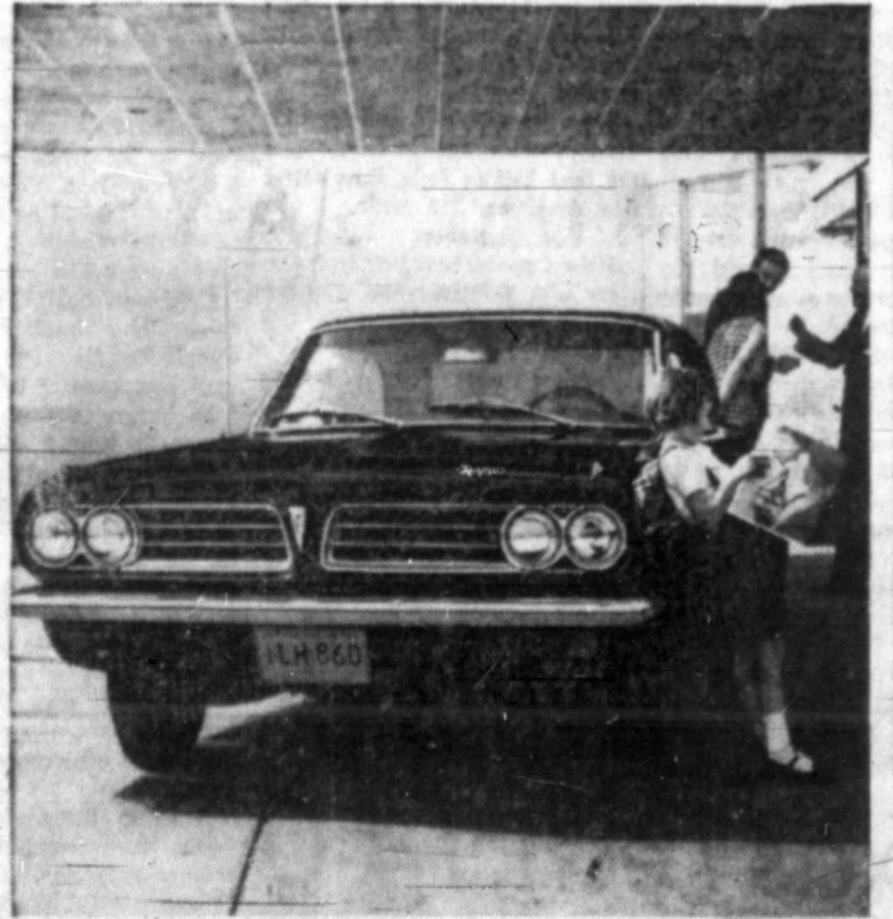
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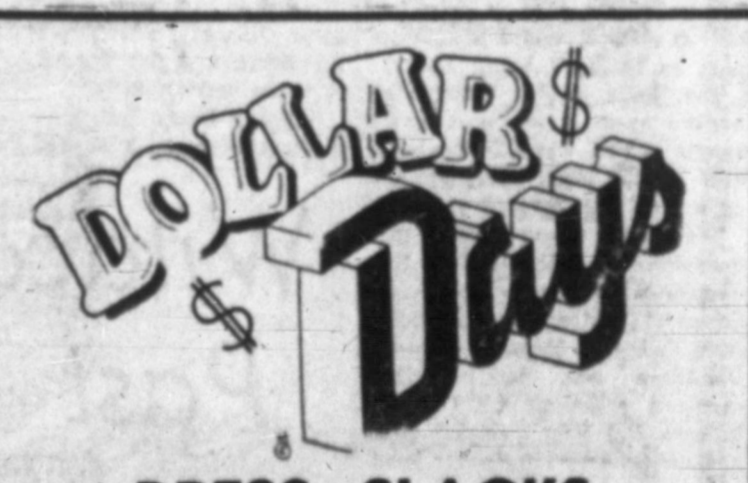

For the White House, however, the significant figures have been 212-212, 215-205, 202-197 and 219-196. These are the margins by which Kennedy won four and lost one of his closest struggles on the House floor in the 87th Congress.

In the new Congress which convenes on Jan. 9 there will be two fewer seats. The House membership, boosted temporarily to 437 with the granting of statehood to Hawaii and Alaska, reverts to its permanent size of 435.

Hopes For Upset  
Kennedy has publicly expressed hope of upsetting the historical trend by picking up 5 or 10 new Democratic seats. Privately, Democratic strategists would be happy to hold their losses to 5 seats.

The significant fact is that Republicans do not have to win party control of the House for conservatives to gain a headlock on Kennedy's legislative program.

A Republican gain of 20 or more House seats would unquestionably give GOP leaders and conservative southern Democrats the whiphand. Conceivably, a GOP gain of as few as 10 seats could significantly boost the power of the conservative bloc.

This is because the Democrats which the South elects this year almost certainly will include more Kennedy supporters and fewer Kennedy foes. In a few scattered primary elections, conservative Democratic incumbents were defeated this year by moderate or liberal southerners. In addition, reapportionment of House seats among states will result in some "liberalizing" of the Democratic party's southern wing in the House.

Seats Re-Shuffled  
The House seats at stake this year have been reapportioned to reflect relative changes in state population during the 1960s.

The 11 states of the old southern Confederacy wound up with the same number of seats. But some of these in conservative rural areas were eliminated and some new districts were carved out in areas with more liberal constituencies, including Tampa,

## Helium Is A Familiar Aid To Industries Now

Helium, a rare laboratory curiosity less than half a century ago, is now a familiar aid to industry, to science, and to those who bear responsibility for the nation's defense.

Today, this once rare element is used in many important applications ranging from the preservation of historical documents to the exploration of space.

At the National Archives, in Washington, D.C., three helium-filled cases display the most precious documents in American history — the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights. Because it won't combine with other elements, helium prevents the decay of these documents that would inevitably take place in air.

Doctors mix non-flammable helium with anesthetics to prevent operating room explosions. They also use the lightweight gas in an oxygen mixture that asthma patients can breathe more easily than air.

Fabricating industries weld metals in a helium atmosphere — it won't combine with the hot metals as oxygen would, and at the same time, it keeps other contaminants away from the weld. Makers of air conditioners and refrigerators use free-flowing helium to test for tiny leaks in their equipment.

Manufacturers of atomic reactors also use this gas as a leak detector, and the ability of helium to conduct heat efficiently makes it useful as a coolant and heat exchange medium in atomic power plants. As an extra safety bonus, helium becomes radio-active only after long exposure to radiation.

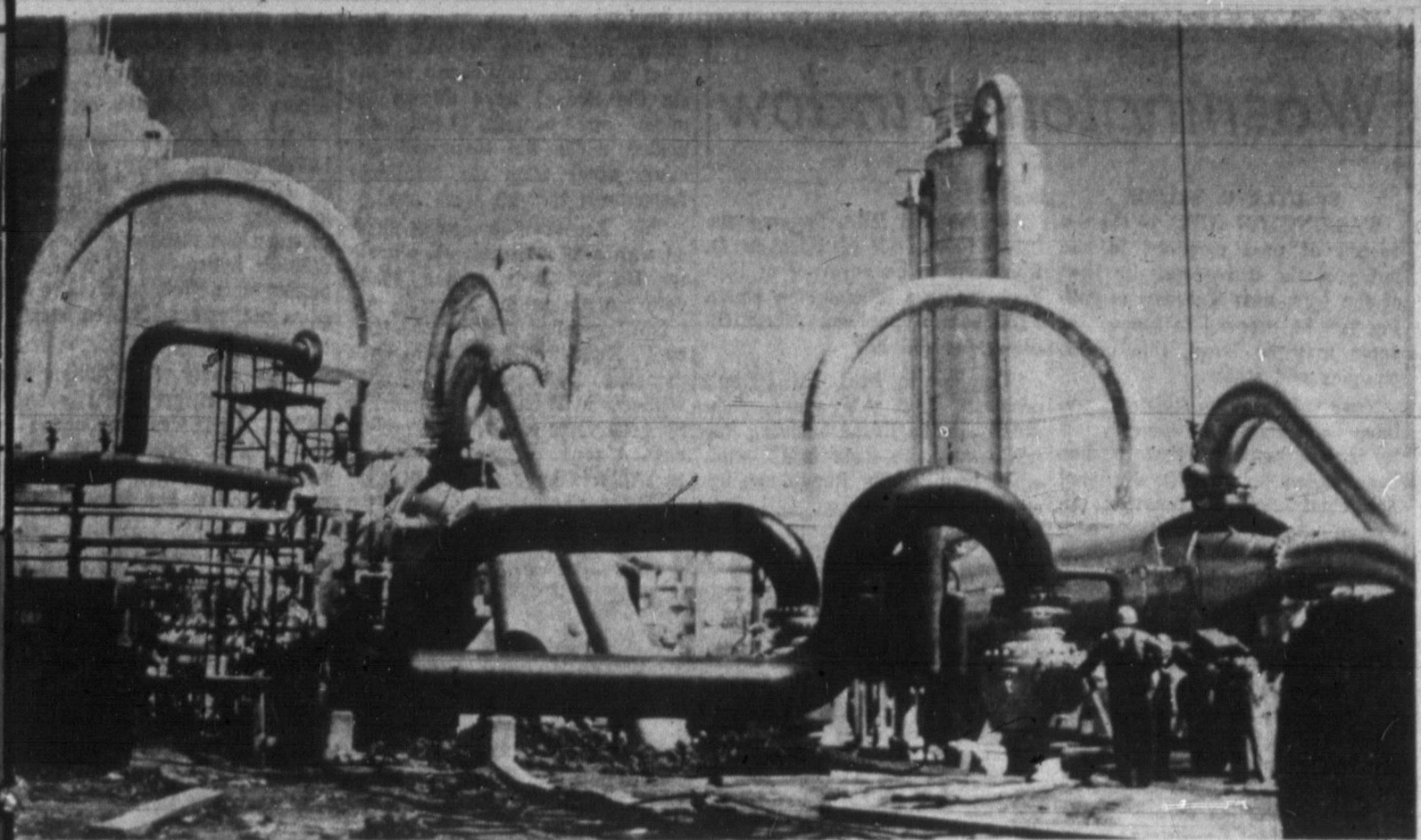
Helium often replaces nitrogen in the air supplied to those working under extreme pressures, such as deep sea divers, tunnel workers, and even pilots and spacemen. Unlike nitrogen, helium won't dissolve in the bloodstream under pressure and then "bubble up" when the pressure is relieved, causing the painful bends, or caisson disease.

This principle was first tested under emergency conditions in 1939 when the submarine Squalus went down off the New Hampshire coast. Breathing an oxygen-helium mixture that had been used only experimentally before, divers rescued 33 survivors of the sunken ship.

"Gas chromatography," a technique for checking the quality of a variety of products from candy wafers to wines and wonder drugs, utilizes helium. The versatile gas is employed as "carrier," sweeping commercial products through testing devices without becoming involved itself in the chemical reactions that indicate the purity of the items tested.

Liquid helium, the coldest substance known to man, is used today to create a vacuum and lower the temperature in a chamber that simulates conditions in outer space. In this application, liquid helium is making it possible to duplicate, in a box no bigger than a small closet, the conditions man will encounter in the infinite reaches of space.

Many metals become super-conductors of electricity when cooled by liquid helium. Using this principle, it may be possible to construct computers no bigger than shoe boxes, or powerful electromagnets weighing only pounds instead of tons. Even today, a liquid helium cooled circuit helps suppress random static in the equipment that receives signals from Telstar, our communications satellite.

Gary refused to campaign for Atkinson after the recount, but said he supports the Democratic ticket. Their quarrel was over a sales tax—a levy Atkinson proposes to increase from two to three cents.

An independent, L. Richard Zavits of Tulsa, also is on the ballot for governor.

A. S. (Mike) Monroney, incumbent junior senator, face, 40-year old Republican B. Hayden Crawford of Tulsa and Paul V. Beas, 71, a Tulsa independent.

There are contests for only four of the six congressional seats. No Republican filed against either Rep. Carl Albert Democratic house majority leader, or Rep. Tom Steed, and both automatically win reelection.

**New Mexico:** The "Land of Enchantment" is a quest on mark, as far as the November gubernatorial election is concerned.

It is a "saw" between two former FBI agents in a state where Democrats outnumber Republicans 2 1/2 to 1, but where Gov. Edwin Mechem, a Republican, has served four consecutive terms and is fighting for a fifth.

The major issue is the state's deficit. Mechem urges a tax increase. The Democrats oppose it. Mechem won with a big stride

and a "just call me big Ed" approach.

His opponent is Jack Campbell, who appears to have voter appeal. Like Mechem, he is a former FBI agent. Further, he was a combat Marine in the Pacific, former state House speaker and has proved to be an effective campaigner.

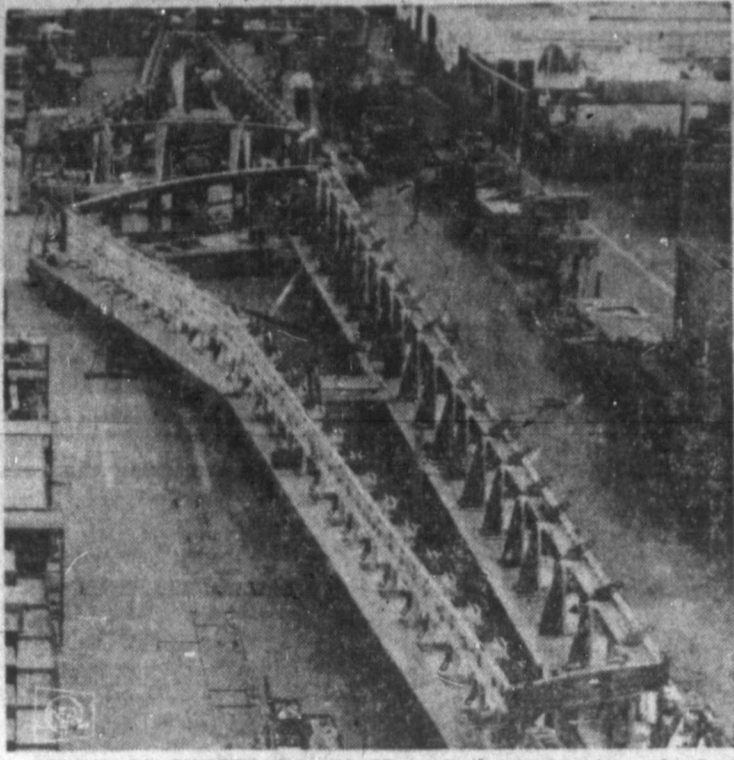
**Arkansas:** Gov. Orval E. Faubus, toned down and more moderate since his battle with the federal government over school integration in 1957, swamped the Democratic field to win the nomination without a runoff and is all but assured of an unprecedented fifth term.

Willis Ricketts, Fayetteville Republican, is his opponent, but is given little or no chance to unseat Faubus.

**Veteran Democratic Sen. J. William Fulbright** was an overwhelming favorite to beat Dr. Kenneth Goss Jones, 43, a Little Rock Conservative Republican, in a senatorial contest.

**Louisiana:** Sen. Russell Long, son of Huey (The Kingfish) and nephew of Earl, appears to face little trouble in his race for a third term and another member of the long clan has appeared on the scene.

Russell's cousin—Gillis Long—is making a bid for a seat in

## Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI)—On the record of past elections in the home of the brave and the land of the free, next Tuesday is polling will be crooked in spots. The spots may be large, like cities, counties and states.

Your vote may be stolen. If you have been voting for many years it is not unlikely that it has been stolen before. The National Municipal Review reported an Honest Ballot Association estimate that at least one million votes were stolen in the 1952 election.

HBA chief investigator George Abrams warned:

"Election frauds are increasing. Nearly every area in the United States — big city, small town, cracker-barrel village—has some type of election fraud. It may be a national election or one involving local school boards, judges or highways."

Samuel H. Still, an election investigator for Congress, said in a 1956 NMR report on election-scandals that:

"Approximately 50 public figures who occupy high state and municipal offices today would not have won them had the election been carried out according to

law."

Abrams and HBA fingered the 1928 election of Franklin D. Roosevelt to be governor of New York, citing a famous slow count. FDR beat Republican Albert Ottinger, or did he?

"Democratic boss Ed Flynn's cronies," said Abrams, "sat quietly in the Bronx counting ballots at a snail's pace until 2 a.m., when traditionally Republican upstate returns showed Ottinger's exact margin."

"When the boys knew how many votes were needed, they went to work. Republican ballots (in the Bronx) were thrown out under any pretext. Lead concealed under the fingernail and every other trick (to invalidate Republican ballots) were used."

"Mr. Roosevelt awakened elected with a 26,000 statewide plurality. He had a whopping 95,000 vote margin in the Bronx."

NMR recalled that in 1956 Harry F. Kelly was believed to have defeated Democrat G. Mennen Williams in Michigan for governor by 4,000 votes of about 1.8 million cast. A recount gave the election to Williams by a margin of 1,154 votes.

A comprehensive non-partisan

study made four years later, said NMR, by the University of Michigan's Samuel J. Eidersveld and Albert A. Applegate conclude

"The law's requirements of ballot security were disregarded by election officials in precincts involving more than 123,000 votes. In one case, testimony of election officials indicates that boxes at officials were violated after having been properly sealed on election night."

While Harry S. Truman was president, congressional election ballot boxes were impounded at the federal building in his home town. Fraud was alleged and a recount had been demanded.

### Guest Speakers Are Featured At City Council P-TA Study Course

Mrs. Brantley Hudson, city council P-TA president, opened the program with a "Welcome" at the City Council P-TA Study Course which was held at the Lamar school auditorium, Nov. 1 from 9 to 11 a.m.

She then introduced the moderator for the group of speakers, Mrs. Jack Foster.

"Know Your School" is the theme for the study course programs this year. "Wake The Town and Tell the Parent" was the topic for discussion at this session.

Floyd Wayston, school board member, praised the Pampa school system, teachers and administrators. He said, "our financial problems in the school district are at a minimum because of good administration. We can keep it this way only if the parents and citizens will keep well informed and interested."

Margaret Taylor, Lamar school nutritionist, gave an interesting talk on problems of food, preparation, variety and nourishment. She said parents must be made aware that the school nutritionists have the welfare of the children in mind rather than the children's wants. She reassured the group present, "that in case of any emergency, where the children would remain in school overnight, the cafeteria personnel would be present to take care of their meals."

Dr. Will Graham, orthodontist and commissioner of Ward Two, was the substitute speaker for Mayor Sidwell, who was out of town. Dr. Graham said that "censorship in Pampa is a great problem. The people in Pampa fail to work together and seem to be proud of it, but the city as a whole suffers for it. The parents and citizens who make advance decisions and stick with them whether right or wrong, should carefully seek out all the information, study it and then make decisions."

L. P. Fort, commissioner of

Ward Four, stated that it is his duty to see that there are equal rights for all and partiality to none. "We hear much and know very little and as citizens and taxpayers we must educate ourselves to act wisely," he said.

Ernest Winborn, fire chief for 15 years, said, "Pampa is growing and the fire department is growing with it. Careless adults cause 99 per cent of the fires and must be taught to act quickly and intelligently in case of fire. But most important we should be taught how to prevent fires." Winborn had high praise for the Pampa firemen and stated, "they are ready to serve you at any time."

Nina Spoonmoore, head of the Welfare Department, said, "the limited staff and lack of trained workers are big problems. The needs in Pampa are, day care centers for working mothers, homes for the aged, family counseling, low rent housing and youth counselors."

She said, "there is a great lack of public understanding."

## Bulky Knits Are Simple To Wash And Textures Are Quick To Dry

By HELEN HENNESSY Newspaper Enterprise Assn. The men who have been bitten by the bulky sweater bug have something to be pleased about this season. Most bulky sweaters not only are handsome and colorful but also as light as the proverbial feather.

For the ladies, to whom the tender, loving care of those cherished garments falls, the good news lies in their easy-care qualities.

Most synthetic, and some wool, sweaters can be washed safely in an automatic machine. They should be enclosed in a mesh bag or a pillowcase, and the water should be cool. The protective cover should be removed before the sweater is put into the automatic dryer, set at a cool temperature.

Many women feel safer washing sweaters by hand. In that case, a bulky knit requires a large tub to allow suds and rinses to circulate freely. Squeeze soap or detergent suds through the sweater. Don't twist or scrub. You'll be surprised at how quickly bulky knits dry, due to their fluffy yarns and honey comb textures. To speed the drying, roll the sweater in a bath towel to blot, or spread it between two Turkish towels and press out excess moisture with a rolling pin.

A sweater knit from synthetic yarn may be spread out flat to dry. Just shape it lightly by hand. Some blocking is required for cashmere or untreated wool yarn.

Before washing bulky knits, turn-down cuffs, button cardigans and run a basting thread through ribbing at neck, cuffs and waist to keep from stretching.

To restore the deep-textured look, tamp the surface with a sponge during drying. The sweater should be turned over carefully during the process to expose the underside to air.

Once it is entirely dry, give it a vigorous shaking to fluff up the surface.

It's not a mammoth task to wash the new lightweight bulky knits. So don't despair when he decides he'd like several in his winter wardrobe.

Dear Mrs. D. H.: Even though your hair coloring has changed lately, David Crystal feels that the

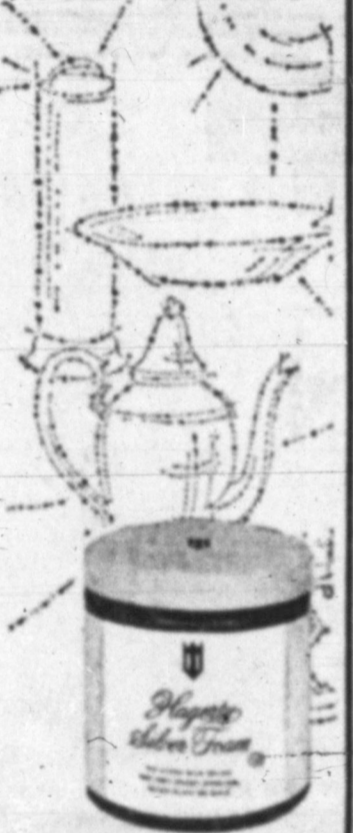

Payne, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" and a vicious rapist and pedophile with a history of foul sex offenses since 1937, is charged with raping a Houston, Texas, girl on July 10, 1959. Posing as manager of a dance troupe and using an alias, he allegedly raped the 18-year-old professional dancer after entering her residence on the pretext of offering her a job and threatening to strangle her if she resisted. He has also been charged with a vicious sex attack on a 12-year-old Houston boy.

A Federal warrant, issued at Houston on September 2, 1959, charges Payne with unlawful interstate flight to avoid prosecution for rape. His prior convictions include ped. rape and sex perversion on women and children.

A white American, born on July 19, 1918, at Haskell, Oklahoma, he is 5'11", 170 lbs., weighs approximately 140 pounds, has a slender build, ruddy complexion, and brown, receding hair. He has worked as a newspaper solicitor, fry cook, farm hand, laundry worker, mechanic, salesman, and tailor.

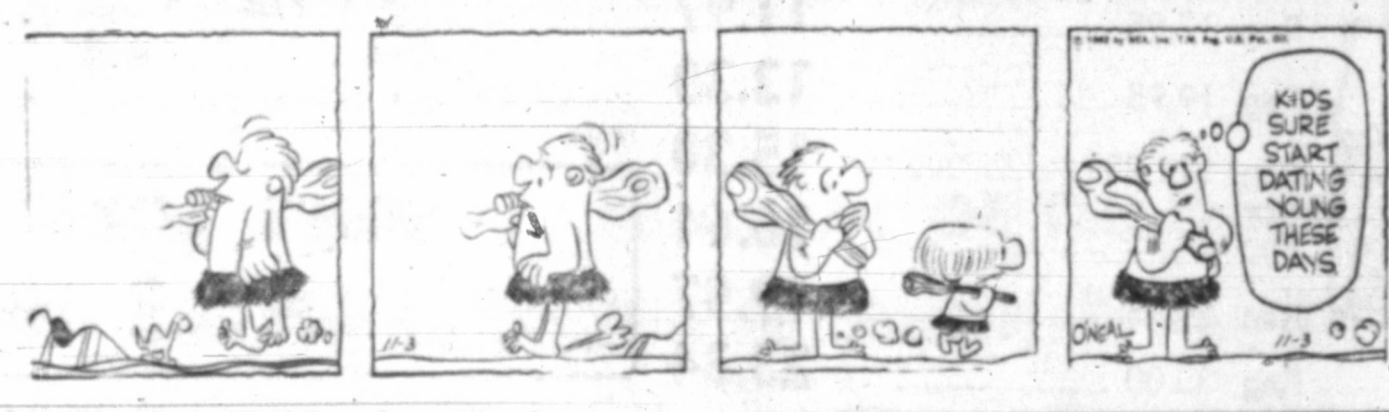

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Violinist Jack Benny was in concert the other night when he should have been in bed.

He would have sounded better snoring. Benny is to concert music what Floyd Patterson is to boxing—a knockout.

If Jack had been playing fiddle while Rome burned, the fire would have been a welcome diversion for his audience.

One thing that keeps Benny going as a fiddle player is courage. And he exhibited it at the \$100 a plate dinner concert for the America-Israel cultural foundation where he shared a podium with violinist Isaac Stern, as good a musician as Jack is a comedian.

Cultural Relations "Strained": By the time Benny finished playing, cultural relations between America and Israel had been dealt a severe blow. The Arabs couldn't have done more damage.

The audience, undoubtedly drawn more to Stern than Benny, included such stars as Milton Berle, Natalie Wood, Warren Beatty, Dolores Hart, Don Murray, Kirk Douglas, Danny Kaye, Alan Ladd, Edward G. Robinson and George Burns.

Borrowing Stern's violin, Benny, with an air of false pride, mounted the stage to play a duet with Isaac, who looked like he wanted to leave town.

"When it was decided that Mr. Stern and I were to be on this program, they didn't know whether or I should be the soloist," Benny said. "So they decided to toss a coin. Well they tossed and tossed and tossed. And he finally won."

Wall Street Chatter  
NEW YORK (UPI) — To say that the stock market is thin is an understatement. The public is still on the sidelines and so are the institutions.

Whether one or the other of these reservoirs of investment funds will soon accept the lure of attractive yields, and well-depressed growth issues, is a moot question still, it says. "After all, the idea that a corrective market, like a common cold, must run its course, is deeply imbedded and this one has not yet done so, according to past patterns, at least."

Thus far in the current rally, the buying looks more professional than public, says L. O. Hooper, The W. E. Hutton & Co., analyst suspects that the public will have to be convinced that it can make money in buying stocks before it comes back in force. For the past year, almost all new purchases have been working out badly — and that makes stocks unpopular.

The fact that the Dow Jones average has closed above its mid-October high, suggests that this index itself may now make another attempt to cross the 300 mark; says Bache & Co. However, the house adds, should such action take place, the important factor to be watched would not be the performance of the average itself, but the support provided by the general list.

## 'We'll Bury You!' To Be Shown In Pampa

Her face distorted with the fear of the hunted, a young girl frantically hurls her body against the barbed wire beside the wall separating the Red regime of East Germany from the freedom of the West. This is the opening scene of "We'll Bury You!," coming to the LaVista theatre Thursday for a 6-day run.

"Most of us know why she fled," producer Jack Leewood said, "but how many know why millions cling to Communism? How many of us know what Communism is?"

At the editorial suggestion of The Pampa News, Paul West, manager of the LaVista and Capri theaters here, went to extra effort to obtain this motion picture for Pampa showing.

It has also received the personal endorsement of Paul Keim, adjutant, and Jack Graham service officer, of the Kerley-Crossman Post of the American Legion in Pampa.

Painstakingly put together from hundreds of sources, including shocking, uncensored scenes from secret archives never before shown, "We'll Bury You!" is Hollywood's and The Free World's answer to Communism, Leewood declared. "We didn't have to cast any talent agency for a cast; we got it out of history," he said, "and it's the most infamous gallery of scoundrels ever assembled in one film." Playing key real-life roles of all-but incredible brutality and savagery are Khrushchev, Castro, Stalin, Mao tse-tung, Lenin, Trotsky, Malenkov and Mikoyan. How it operates and stretched its aggression over the map of the world in the last 50 years, and, therefore, how best to fight it. An extraordinary search then started. It took the partners through dusty archives of the Army, the Library of Congress, the files of all the newspaper companies, and countless privately hoarded collec-

### The Lighter Side Advice To The Politicians

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There is not a more pious sight in America than that of a spavined politician — an office-seeker who pull up lame just before an election.

After all, a candidate is only as strong as his pedal extremities. If his feet let him down, his entire campaign is in danger of collapse.

With the congressional races now entering the sprint stage, I thought I might be able to render a significant public service by setting forth some tips on how to prevent such tragedies.

My authority on feet conditioning is no less a personage than Dr. Joseph Lelyveld, chairman of the National Foot Health Council, I like to thank of Dr. Lelyveld as the Vic Tanny of the metatarsal arch.

Uses Voters' List  
As his first admonition, Dr. Lelyveld advises all candidates, Democrat and Republican alike, to avoid the type of footmanhood that figured in the 1952 presidential campaign.

"Although Adlai Stevenson got a lot of publicity from the hole in his shoe, you may get a thriving fungus infection instead," he warns this year's candidates.

Along with well-soled shoes, he recommends that politicians wear durable cotton socks which absorb moisture quickly and let you run comfortably without giving

yourself a hot foot." This sort of advice struck me as being rather pedestrian. I was more impressed by the foot exercises that Dr. Lelyveld recommends for politicians.

Advices Against Holes  
One way a candidate can keep his tootsies in shape is to "get a bond copy of the list of registered voters, place it on the floor, stand on it and curl toes over the side."

"Do this at least 10 times, or as many times as you hope to be reelected," he suggests.

If a registration list is not available, Dr. Lelyveld says the same results can be achieved by "standing on the complete transcript of your opponent's speeches and curling toes over the edge of that."

Another Lelyveld exercise goes as follows: "Fold a typed list of the poll-writers in your own election district in half. Then fold again. Place it in the center of your room at foot and pick it up with your toes."
