



# Actions of Legislature Have Far-Reaching Effects on Texans.

(Editors Note: Many acts of the 58th Legislature, which just ended its regular session, affect the lives and pocketbooks of the average Texan. Here is a roundup sketch of some of the major laws passed)

**AUSTIN (UPI)** — In the next 90 days, Texans face a sheaf of new laws dealing with subjects ranging from how fast he can drive his car to how much taxes he will have to pay.

In both instances mentioned above, they go up. On July 1, state sales taxes on some items will be higher and are applied for the first time to others. Late in August, the driver who wishes may legally drive up to 70 miles an hour on most of the state's major highways.

The 58th Legislature, which closed out its regular session at midnight last Friday, passed about 500 new laws. A great majority of them are local in nature, but many will affect every resident of the state.

The proposal which will touch more persons than any other is the sales tax revision bill made necessary because of the increasing demands on state spending. The bill will cost taxpayers about \$33 million over the next two years.

**Clothing Exemption Lifted**  
The major change took out the exemption of clothing under \$10. These items were not touched by the original sales tax bill, but after July 1 all clothing regardless of price comes under the 2 per cent sales tax.

Automobiles are affected, too. Previously car sales had their own special sales tax at the tune of one and one-half per cent. But this law was abolished, and all car sales were placed under the general 2 per cent tax. This means the average automobile will sell for about \$12.50 more because of taxes after July 1.

The state franchise tax on busi-

ness will be cut \$11 million annually effective Sept. 1, 1964, as a result of the tax bill which lets this temporary increase automatically die at that time.

Auto owner's insurance bills are going up at the end of this year under a bill that tightens the driver's responsibility act. The law requires new minimums on auto liability insurance which will increase these policies an average of \$6 per year.

**After Tourist Dollars**  
The 58th Legislature put new life in tourism and tourist attractions in Texas. For the first time in history, a major state move will be launched to advertise the state and make an effort to latch onto more tourist dollars.

The Legislature created the Texas Tourist Development Agency and gave it funds to set up House and begin operations. Final action also was taken on creation of Padre Island national seashore, and more funds were set aside to shore up the sagging state parks system.

Major emphasis was put on education by both the governor and members of the Legislature. The governor's 25-member Committee on Education beyond the high school was created and appointments completed before the session ended. This committee is to make a year-long intensive study for higher education needs, and report its findings by Sept. 1, 1964.

**Two Schools Added**  
Two more state-supported colleges, San Angelo and Pan American of Edinburg, were added to the state system. Their inclusion brings the state senior college list to 22 institutions, more than any other state in the nation.

A total of \$18 million went to the University of Houston, which joins the state college system Sept. 1. Also, funds were provided for the new state medical school at San Antonio, and a graduate

school of biomedical sciences in Houston.

Altogether, the state's educational system will get more than \$1 billion over the next biennium, an increase of more than \$100 million over current spending. Of this increase, \$56 million is for higher education.

Many of the major bills passed are in the regulatory field. Some of these include:

**Voting** — A constitutional amendment will be submitted to voters in November to abolish the poll tax. If the voters approve, a new annual registration system

with a 25-cent filing fee will replace the poll tax, effective next year.

**Loan Sharks** — A bill to regulate activities of small lenders was passed and signed into law, ending a long battle for an anti-loan shark bill. It regulates loans up to \$1,500, but gives the state a strict reign over those making the loans.

**Game and Fish** — The State Parks Board and Game and Fish Commission were abolished, bring-

ing the two agencies under a new three-man board. This was designed to put more emphasis on the state's dilapidated parks system.

**Annexation** — A bill drastically limited a city's annexation powers passed. It sets up extra-territorial regions around cities and gives them limited control over these regions.

**Election** — The election code was revised to improve election administration, clarify vague

provisions and remove conflicts and ambiguities.

**Code** — The code of criminal procedure received a major overhaul, the culmination of five years of work by the judiciary, prosecution and defense sections of the bar association.

**Veterans** — A constitutional amendment will be submitted in November to authorize the state to issue an additional \$150 million in bonds to extend the veterans land program in Texas.

Thomson & Mc Kinnon feel that preoccupation with the conduct of the 30 top grade stocks in the Dow-Jones industrial average and the pros and cons of technicians tends to divert attention from the ever-increasing number of stocks outside the average which may prove the mainspring of the remaining drive in this bull market.

Lawrence Bleiberg of Bache & Co. notes that although stocks have been in retreat recently it has at least been an orderly retreat. He feels the market is backing and filling and he looks for possibly further consolidation before another advance is staged.

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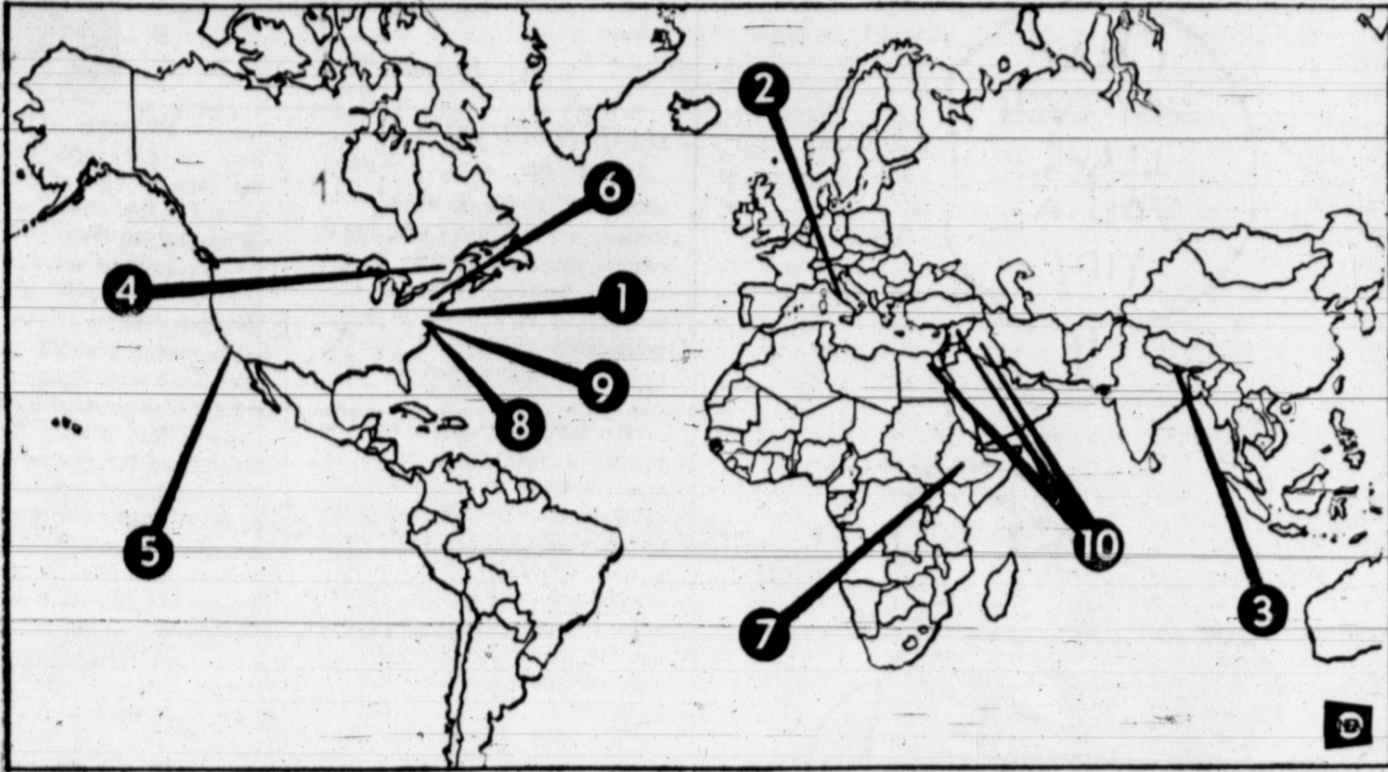

**New Interest in Arts Springs from Tragedy**

ATLANTA (UPI)— Fifty-two Sundays ago, newly elected Atlanta Mayor Ivan Allen was relaxing on his farm in the suburbs before plunging into the problems of his new administration.

In the city, children and their parents were preparing for Sunday school and church on a brilliant early summer morning down South.

For many families, it was an especially important day. It was homecoming day for 122 Atlanta art lovers who were flying in from Paris after a month of touring European art centers and points of ancient historical interest.

Letters home had described the trip in ecstatic terms, but loved ones were waiting with keen anticipation to get all the details from the homebound travelers.

Shortly before 7 a.m. EDT, first details began to hit the city of a massive tragedy that wrenched the lazy summer day from lethargy to agony. The Air France charter jet bringing the Atlanta group home had crashed on takeoff from Paris. The death toll: 134.

Allen had to throttle down his tractor to hear the telephoned information that was brought to him. He leaped into his car and sped into town. He was en route to Paris before the day was over.

Clergymen, preparing for Sunday sermons, shifted to the task of consoling the bereaved families.

Almost in a daze, the city moved through that first day with the sheer magnitude of the tragedy serving almost as an anesthetic.

The crash, as Atlanta Art Association President James V. Carmichael pointed out, wiped out almost all the leadership of

the then struggling association, plus many of the city's cultural prime movers.

Sunday afternoon traffic was heavy on the city's fashionable North Side where most of the victims lived. Friends went from one home to another to express sympathies for the victims of this crash had been closely knit interlocking set of friends.

"I knew most of them closely," Allen said. "We were young together."

That was June 3, 1962, the date of the world's worst single air disaster.

In the year that has passed, time has smoothed some of the sharp emotional edges of the tragedy. But some of the scars remain.

A home, disrupted and put up for sale after two of its residents were killed, still has a "for sale" sign. Some families have never reconciled their lives to the new status produced by the tragedy.

But out of the deaths there also came new life—renaissance it's called in France where the crash occurred.

The Atlanta Art Association, long an organization propped up by the enthusiasm of a few wealthy art lovers, suddenly became the visiting place for thousands. Art treasures from other lands began turning up on loan.

A financial campaign, tried before without notable success, became fairly easy. People whose art tastes had stopped at country landscapes and who had known none of the plane victims contributed to the fund.

The tragic events of a year ago became the springboard for a complete reorganization of the

Art Association and its Atlanta School of Art.

The art association is now thinking in terms of a \$3 million fund to finance a new art school and endowment. Such a figure would have been unthinkable a year ago. The crash spurred membership to a present 3,000, an all-time high.

Ripples from the wave of tragedy produced humanitarian as well as cultural results.

Milton Bevington, 35-year-old owner of an air conditioning firm and father of three young boys, lost his wife and her mother in the crash at Orly Airport. On impulse, he had flown to France on the last stages of the art tour and had joined his wife, Betsy, for a few gala days and nights in Paris before they went to the airport.

The two had agreed earlier that both would never fly together. In event of an accident, they didn't want their children to become orphans. Bevington was to take a plane home that left Orly an hour after the chartered "Chateau de Sully" (Sully's House) was to take off with the art group.

Bevington witnessed the crash, stayed through the agonizing hours that followed, then returned home to pick up the pieces of life for himself and his three sons.

As a memorial to his wife, Bevington during the past year has organized the children's foundation an effort mainly centered at Massachusetts General Hospital for the purpose of finding the best treatment and cure for the emotional ailments of children.

Without an organized campaign, more than \$100,000 has been given or pledged to the foundation.

A. E. Brewer and A. C. Higgins have been instructing these men for several weeks in the art of self defense. To pass their green belt test they must display the 12 basic take downs and know the various falls and movements.

In final swim competition Friday night, Keitha Morris was awarded two gold cups in the 100 yard and 50 yard freestyles for winning those events six weeks in succession. Robert Lockhart was awarded a blue ribbon for winning the 50 yard freestyle three weeks in succession. Deborah Huff qualified for blue ribbons in the 30 yard free style and 50 yard backstroke.

Boys, Beverly Langley will be one of the lifeguards at the Center pool this summer. Come by and be saved. She has been very active in Red Cross instructing during the past several years and she will be a very qualified addition to the Center.

The gym is just about finished and a future open house will be announced in the near future. Pool tables, shuffleboard, horseshoes, tether ball, punching bags, judo and wrestling mats, basketball volleyball will soon be put into function.

# Odds on Inventors Are Formidable

 WASHINGTON (UPI) —Every day 350 American inventors apply to the federal government for a patent and automatically become mental millionaires. They have rosy dreams of quick wealth, but as the days, months and years roll by they are driven to the conclusion that roulette and craps shooting may be better bets.

The odds against an inventor getting rich are formidable. There is almost a fifty-fifty chance that somebody thought up the gadget before he did and already has obtained a patent. In any case his application goes to the bottom of a list of 198,000 others which are awaiting a decision in the U. S. Patent Office, and on an average it will be between three and three and a half years before he will know how he stands.

**Only The Beginning**  
 But his troubles are only beginning. Once he gets the patent, he has to persuade somebody to manufacture and sell his gadget and here, again, his chances are only a little better than fifty-fifty. That nobody happens to fifty. Too many people invent things that nobody happens to want at the moment.

The classic example is Johannes Gutenberg, a German who invented movable type in the middle of the 15th century. He made crude block letters and printed a 28-page book in Latin advising people how to make speeches. Then he ran out of money and got a loan from Johann Fust, a banker. Gutenberg then printed some bibles, but they didn't sell well. The miscalculation in Gutenberg's plan was that very few people knew how to read and there wasn't any market for printed pages. The banker foreclosed on him, seized all of his equipment and Gutenberg wound up working for the archbishop of Mainz at a salary of one new suit of clothes a year.

**Has Same Problem**  
 Bartolomeo Cristofori ran into the same problem when he invented the piano in 1709. The Italians didn't like the piano, preferring the dulcimer and the harpsichord, and Cristofori's pianos rotted in the warehouses.

Long after the inventor's death a German, Gottfried Silbermann, read about Cristofori's pianos and began to build them. He got rich fast. The Germans happened to like pianos.

American industry is highly competitive and the natural assumption would be that corporations would slug it out with each other in an attempt to get an invention that would improve their product. But sometimes they appear to be completely blind when a new idea—patented and proved—is put before them.

**Tells Amazing Story**  
 In 1925 F. W. Davis invented power steering for automobiles. It made a car infinitely easier to handle and obviously was a strong selling point to women drivers. But just the other day Davis, in Boston, told in the Wall Street Journal an amazing story about his invention.

As soon as he had perfected the device he took it to Detroit and demonstrated it to 10 automobile companies. None was interested. In 1928 he stirred some interest in Cadillac Motors, he said, and a tentative licensing agreement was drawn up. But Cadillac decided the cost of tooling the invention was too high and the agreement was allowed to expire.

Davis said he then went to the Bendix Corp., which agreed to experiment but only on pilot models for buses and trucks. Sometime in 1940 Davis said he got the Buick Motor Co. interested in power steering.  
 "It looked like we were ready to go," he said, "but then came Pearl Harbor and the end of civilian automobile production."  
 "After the war I went back to Cadillac and they told me they didn't need anything new because they were selling all the cars they could make. It was not until 1951 when a buyers' market returned that the automobile makers became interested in power steering. When Chrysler introduced a power steering model, everybody wanted one and I began to make some money."

**Gets First Patent**  
 Before adoption of the U.S. Constitution the American colonies and states issued patents and the first one went to Samuel Winslow of Massachusetts, who in 1641 devised a new method for manufacturing sail. President George Washington signed the first federal patent law on April 10, 1790, and since then the U.S. Patent Office has granted 3,050,044 applications.

## The Lighter Side

### Where Do Women Belong?

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — Some body has got to wash the dishes. There's no getting around that. Let us keep this in mind as we proceed now to look further into the question of whether American women are victims of a conspiracy to keep them "trapped in endless and empty housewifery."

In a recent debate before the Women's National Press Club here, a strong case for the affirmative was presented by Mrs. Betty Friedman, author of a new book entitled "The Feminine Mystique."  
 What I regard as an equally strong case for the negative was made by Robert Stein, editor of Redbook Magazine and one of the targets of Mrs. Friedman's attack. It was the balanced weight of the two arguments that I found disturbing. If this thing ends in a tie, the sink is going to get awfully full.

As I understand Mrs. Friedman, she passionately believes that women should not have a choice between homemaking and a career. They should have both. Mrs. Friedman charged that women's magazines, such as the one edited by Stein, are trying to sell the ladies a bill of goods on staying at home to empty the ashtrays rather than working a 9-to-5 shift at the poolhall.

Or, as she put it, "taking a full and equal place in society." Stein said that wasn't so. He agreed "it's wrong to try to convince every woman that she will find fulfillment in having babies and baking bread."  
 But he said, "it's equally wrong to try to convince every woman that she will find fulfillment in practicing a profession or pursuing a career."  
 All of this started me to wondering why it is that such discussions always involved the woman's place in home versus career. Doesn't anyone ever worry over whether a man can successfully mix marriage with a career?  
 In all my life I have never heard of a man giving up a job to get married. Oftentimes, the opposite is true.  
 The magazines seem to take it for granted that men are capable of holding down a job without interference with their roles as husbands and fathers.  
 We men may foster this illusion to keep from having to do the dishes, but down deep in our hearts we know it isn't true.  
 I myself probably would be president of General Motors today were it not for the fact that I chose to devote myself to my family instead.

Most of them have been forgotten, and that is the reason few inventors get rich. But when a man comes up with the right thing at the right time, the money rolls in like the tides of the ocean. Take Cyrus H. McCormick, for instance. His father owned four farms in Virginia, two saw mills and a blacksmith shop, and was constantly tinkering with the idea of a machine for harvesting his grain.

**Solves Problem**  
 Young McCormick went to work on the problem and in 1831, at the age of 22, submitted his plans to the family blacksmith. What he had done was to solve the problem of how to keep stones and stumps from breaking the sharp edge of the knives which cut the grain. He did it by protecting them with a string of metal fingers which brushed aside the rocks.

Before 1831 a man with a scythe could cut about half an acre of grain a day. Soon McCormick's reaper was cutting 16 acres a day, even though it was horse drawn. McCormick had hit the jackpot and he moved to Chicago, where he put up a factory and sold reapers as fast as he could make them.

One by-product of McCormick's invention was that the Chicago lawyers never had it so good. They went up and down the land suing people who were infringing on McCormick's patents. When an inventor has to spend lots of time in court, he knows he has it made.

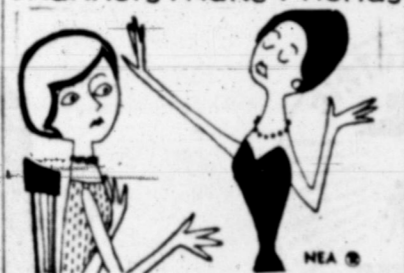
PUZZLED RELATIVE

## Complete Foods, Yes Perfect Foods, No

Q—Are milk and eggs perfect foods?  
A—There is no one perfect food. But both milk (and dairy products generally) and eggs are relatively complete foods. Dr. Roger J. Williams, director of the Clayton Biochemical Institute at the University of Texas, states, "As is well known, milk is a relatively perfect food for young animals, including young children."

In his widely read "Nutrition in a Nutshell," Dr. Williams adds, "It (milk) is not quite perfect for an indefinite period; it lacks iron for one thing, but it has many virtues. Nature has prepared it for us; unlike most foods it is not one-sided, and the nutrition of most people would be improved if they consumed more of it. Cheeses and

other dairy products have many of the advantages possessed by milk itself.

Eggs are valuable as a relatively complete food, because each egg has in it everything that is required to build a complete baby chick. Eggs contain all the building materials necessary for the nourishment of every kind of cell that enters into the make-up of an entire fowl, and for this reason constitute one of the most complete foods available.

For best flavor, a watermelon should be chilled about 12 hours before serving. Other flavors mix with watermelons, so when storing, cut the melon and wrap the cut surface with waxed paper.

**Stuffed Spuds Are Surprisingly Good**

Ever stuff baked potatoes with a combination of finely chopped onion, ground black pepper and sour cream? Or make quick sesame seed dinner rolls from a mix plus toasted sesame seeds?

**BAKED POTATOES WITH ONION-SOUR CREAM DRESSING**

Wash 6 baking potatoes and pat dry. Bake in a preheated hot oven (450 degrees) 1 hour or until done. To test for doneness: Press sides of potatoes with fingers wrapped in a towel. Cut off a slice from the top of each potato and scoop out centers, being careful not to break the shells. Mash until fluffy. Add a little top milk and season to taste with salt, ground black pepper and butter or margarine. Pile into shells. Combine 1/2 cup sour cream with 3 tablespoons finely chopped onion and spoon over each potato. Garnish with paprika, if desired.

Note: If desired, sour cream and onion may be beaten into the mashed potatoes. In that case, place the stuffed potatoes under the broiler until tops are crusty and brown.

**SESAME SEED PARTY ROLLS**

14 1/2-ounce package hot roll mix  
1-3 cup toasted sesame seeds  
1 egg white

Prepare hot roll mix according to directions on package, adding 1/4 cup toasted sesame seeds to dry mix. Let rise according to directions. Punch down and work dough on a lightly floured board, kneading about 1 minute. Pinch off pieces of dough and roll between palms to 5-inch lengths. Shape into bow-knots. Place on lightly greased cookie sheets. Beat egg white until foamy. Brush over top of rolls. Sprinkle with remaining sesame seeds. Let rise until doubled in size. Bake in a preheated hot oven (400 degrees) 15 minutes.

To toast sesame seeds: Place on an ungreased cookie sheet, in a preheated moderate oven (350 degrees) 20 to 22 minutes.

By JACK GAVER UPI Drama Editor NEW YORK (UPI) — A major assignment for the coming Broadway season puts Beatrice Lillie in the cast of the musical being made from Noel Coward's successful comedy of about 20 years ago, "Blithe Spirit."

The noted comedienne, who has worked often with Coward in the past, will have the role of Madame Arcati, the wacky medium involved with a remarried man who can't get rid of the spirit of his deceased first wife.

The musical will be entitled "High Spirits." Timothy Gray is adapting the play and will write the lyrics to the tunes of Hugh Martin, currently represented by the off-Broadway revival of "Best Foot Forward."

Coward will direct the musical for producers Lester Osterman, Robert Fletcher and Richard Horner. The schedule calls for rehearsals to start Jan. 2 and first performance Feb. 3 in New Haven, Boston will get it Feb. 10, Philadelphia March 2 and New York March 31.

Coward will be involved earlier in the season as author of the musical based on Terence Rattigan's play, "The Sleeping Prince," starring Jose Ferrer.

Gertrude Berg, presently doing well at the Music Box in "Dear Me, the Sky Is Falling" by Leonard Spigelgass, vows that her next stage effort, a year or so from now, will be a musical.

The musical is in state of preparation by Spigelgass and Mrs. Berg, using an idea of the star The Theater Guild, sponsor of Mrs. Berg's current play, will be in on the musical, if all goes well.

The successful revival of Eugene O'Neill's "Strange Interlude" by the Actors Studio Theater will move May 27 from the Hudson, where it opened March 11, to the Martin Beck Theater. The latter is larger and has a better air conditioning system.

The play will close definitely on July 13. The producers intended that it run only four months because this is part of an eventual repertory scheme in which members of Actors' Studio are involved. Players cast in such productions are to be freed for four months of such service a year.

"Strange Interlude" is scheduled to turn up in future seasons of the repertory.

Rip Torn replaced Ben Gazzara in one of the top roles on May 13 because Gazzara had a commitment to star in a new television series.

He's Everything To Sophia Loren

ROME (UPI) — Short, balding Carlo Ponti is the man Sophia Loren describes as "my husband, my ex-husband, my fiancée... or whatever one should call him."

The romance between the glamorous star and the Italian producer almost twice her age has landed them in the headlines and also into Roman courts on charges of bigamy.

It also has left a large part of the Italian male population envious and somewhat puzzled. Ponti just does not look like the type to get one of the world's most attractive women.

The only person who is not at all puzzled by the romance is Sophia Loren.

"Who wants a pretty man?" she asks with an eloquent shrug. Ponti is a shrewd and successful international film producer who recently announced the screen version of Boris Pasternak's novel "Dr. Zhivago" as one of his forthcoming projects.

He was one of the bright men from Milan who came south to Rome to try their luck in the post-war film industry. When he and Sophia Loren met some 10 years ago, she was an unknown starlet struggling to overcome the poverty of a Neapolitan childhood.

From then on their personal and professional lives have been firmly linked.

In 1957 Ponti divorced Giuliana Fiastri in Mexico and married Sophia Loren by proxy in the same country.

Since Italian law did not recognize the Mexican divorce, the marriage, which later was annulled, brought the couple into a series of court cases that are still dragging slowly through Rome's Palace of Justice.

Legal tangles have marred their personal lives but both their careers have boomed.

Though both object to attributing a Svangeli role to Ponti, his guiding hand has helped Sophia on the road from pin-up roles to flesh extravaganza to the Oscar for her part in "Two Women."

Friends and colleagues describe Ponti as a man of great charm and equal shrewdness who manages to get exactly what he wants.

and make friends at the same time. One of his interests outside the cinema world is antiques. The Ponti apartment in a patrician palace in the heart of Rome is furnished carefully but comfortably with antique furniture.

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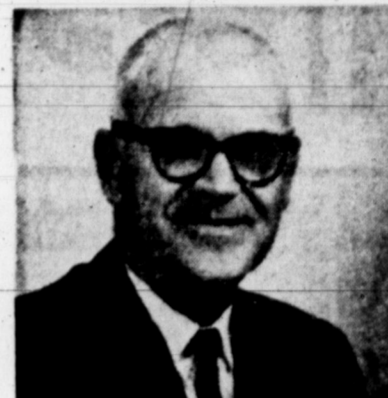
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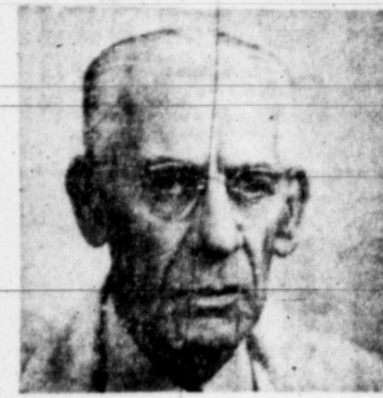
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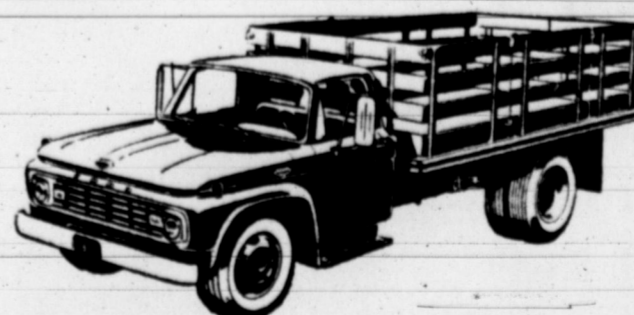
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
