

GOP Steers Truman Program Toward Filibuster

500 Feared Dead In Germany Blast

MANNHEIM, Germany—(AP)—Possibly 500 persons were killed or injured today in a devastating explosion in the I. G. Farben Chemical Plant at Ludwigshafen, a U. S. military government official announced.

'Round World B-29 Crashes; One Survivor

ADEN—(AP)—An American B-29, one of three making a circuit of the globe, crashed into the sea last night after taking off from this port on the south coast of Arabia.

One survivor—identified only as Sergeant Gustafson—was reported picked up by a local fisherman, who brought him to shore. He now is in the RAF hospital and reported resting comfortably.

Capt. Percy H. Kramer, public information officer at Davis-Monthan Field in Tucson, Ariz., said the plane was on a mission to drop supplies to the Chinese in the Hainan Islands.

The crash occurred about a mile off shore. The wreckage is visible from the shore. The RAF and Navy patrolled the beach through the night and early this morning but found no bodies.

The three big planes left the Air Force base at Tucson, Arizona, five days ago when the Air Force called a "routine long distance training" flight. It was the first around-the-world attempt for B-29s.

They reached MacDill Field at Tampa, Fla., for refueling the same day they took off. They landed at Laguna Air Base in the Azores the following day. Their next stop was at Wheelus Field, Tripoli, and they reached this port Monday morning.

The three planes carried a total of 33 men, an announcement in Tucson last week said the customary complement of a B-29 is nine men.

The planes were scheduled to return to Tucson Aug. 5.

The Air Force was careful to note that the crash had no connection with the State Department, which had taken a dim view of previous Air Force projects to send big flights of warplanes on globe-girdling scouting trips.

According to their original flight plan, the B-29s were to go to Ceylon from Aden.

The crash occurred at 7 p. m. Aden time, authorities here imposed restrictions on outgoing dispatches concerning the crash.

West Planning Approach to Molotov In Effort to Negotiate Settlement

Deadline for Even Exchange Set Tonight

BERLIN—(AP)—Disorders broke out in the Russian sector of blockaded Berlin today when thousands of Germans jammed streets before banks in an effort to exchange their money for new Russian-sponsored currency.

French officials on the scene reported to U. S. military government men here that the explosion occurred in a structure known as the "nitrate building."

"Flames shot two miles into the sky when the explosion took place," said an American official.

Hundreds of windows in Mannheim were smashed by the concussion.

Scores of injured were rushed across the river to Mannheim, from the French to the American Zone.

Doctors in Mannheim City Hospital said "the hospital is full of victims. They said the other victims pouring in would have to be sent to Heidelberg."

Several telephone lines between Mannheim and Ludwigshafen were destroyed. The stricken city could not be reached from Frankfurt.

U. S. officials here said the plant was burning furiously two hours after the explosion.

The plant has been reported making dyes.

Complete unconfirmed reports in recent months have stated that French authorities were making in the plant high-explosive propellant fluids for experiments with V-1 and V-2 missiles.

Mannheim police headquarters said "many" persons were injured in Mannheim by concussion from the explosion. Some 300 policemen were sent from here to help rescue work.

American Military Police also went to the scene with American and German fire companies.

All police from the American Zone state of Hesse and from the French Zone state of Rheinland-Pfalz were ordered to send men to the area. Red Cross workers also rushed to the scene.

U.N. Life Depends on End Of Red World Revolution

The working committee of the United Nations Commission for Conventional Armaments (those apart from atomic weapons) finally has decided that armaments cannot be reduced and controlled until the big powers agree on a U. N. police force, atomic energy is shared with Germany and Japan.

The blunt fact is that the United Nations cannot function as a peace-controlling agency until the cold war between Russia and the democracies has been settled.

It can't function until the issue of world revolution for the spread of communism has been dealt with. A British viewpoint of the fundamental difference between Russia and the West is summed up by the weekly publication "Time and Tide."

"The issue is whether Russia means to carry on with or abandon her plans for the destruction of the democracies. If she will abandon them, there is no issue between Russia and the West which cannot be peacefully solved. The argument as to whether Russia wants war is beside the point.

"In all probability she does not want it now. From Russia's point of view a "shooting war" is not undertaken until the process of internal erosion in the democracies has reached the point where only the very slightest push from without would be necessary to topple over the whole structure.

That's the story. The battle of Berlin, and the numerous other cold hostilities all hangs on the shambles of the German imbroglio, and the hundred and one other difficulties encircling the globe, if and when the Russians decide that they have carried their aggression about as far as they can for the present.

Man Is Held In Assault

Len Royall Bowie yesterday was lodged in the County Jail charged with illegally carrying a pistol while further disposition on a charge of aggravated assault with intent to murder was pending with the district attorney's office.

Bowie pleaded guilty before County Judge Sherman White yesterday and was ordered to jail until the Court arrived at a complete judgement in his case.

Bowie was apprehended by city police Saturday night in The Flats by Captain E. G. Albers, Jr. and Patrolman H. H. Gates after Bowie had allegedly threatened residents of The Flats with his pistol.

The charge of aggravated assault with intent to murder might arise from the police report that Bowie, after being relieved of his gun by Albers, grabbed it out of the officer's hand and ran away.

In the chase that followed, Bowie was reported to have fired at least three shots at the pursuing officers. He tossed his pistol aside and surrendered when they returned his fire.

Leaders Lay Plans For Adjournment

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Republicans running Congress steered President Truman's special session program today toward a civil rights filibuster almost certain to scuttle it.

And as the GOP leaders laid plans for a speedy adjournment, they announced complete willingness to let the voters decide in November whether they had done the right thing.

Democrats promptly shouted "sabotage." They accused out deliberately to wreck the the majority party of setting President's program for anti-inflation and housing legislation which he pleaded for to avert "another great depression."

Privately some Republicans questioned the wisdom of their leaders' strategy, which GOP Senator Robertson of Wyoming said had been arrived at after consultation with Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the party's presidential nominee.

Robertson emerged from a meeting of the Senate's Republican Policy Committee and told newsman Charles Tamm of Ohio he relayed the advice from Dewey to "stay around a week or so and then go home."

This report was relayed in turn to James C. Hagerty, Dewey's press secretary, at Pawling, N. Y. Hagerty at first said Dewey had relayed the advice from Dewey to "stay around a week or so and then go home."

The Governor feels that the Congress should stay in Washington and give careful consideration to whatever was proposed in the President's message.

The GOP decision to give top priority to civil rights legislation instead of to the anti-inflation measures asked by Mr. Truman was announced in a joint statement by Senate and House leaders.

After blasting the special session call as a "political maneuver" in Mr. Truman's election campaign, the Republican chiefs promised "consideration" of the President's proposals and plans to wind up the session "as soon as possible."

Here's what they said they will do.

Take up in the Senate perhaps today but probably tomorrow — anti-poll tax bill already passed by the House and fiercely opposed by Southern Democrats.

Mr. Truman, without naming it, asked for such a bill when he urged action on his February civil rights program.

Southerners who belted the Democratic National Convention in opposition to the civil rights platform said they are all set to filibuster, although only one of them used that term.

Senator Hoyt (D-NC) told a reporter "we are ready to speak any civil rights bill to death." Then he added:

"The Southerners are lining up to filibuster."

Several House GOP chieftains said privately the present plan is to run the Senate into a filibuster that may last several weeks and then adjourn Congress with an announcement that the Democrats were to blame for blocking action on other bills.

Allied Labor Leader Quits

TOKYO—(AP)—James S. Killen, head of the allied labor section, threatened to resign today because of General MacArthur's statement that Japan's 2,000,000 government workers should not be allowed to strike for higher wages.

"I propose to resign," Killen said in a statement, "because I cannot adjust myself to the new occupation labor policy which denies the government workers the right to collective bargaining."

The government workers' union has not acted on the MacArthur letter which quoted the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt as saying a strike by government employees was "unthinkable and intolerable."

MacArthur said in his letter: "I am in full accord with this view."

Killen, 40 years old, has been a member of the I.L.W.U. since 1933. He is the union's eighth vice president and its international representative.

During the war Killen was an official of the War Production Board specializing in the paper and paper products production and allocation divisions.

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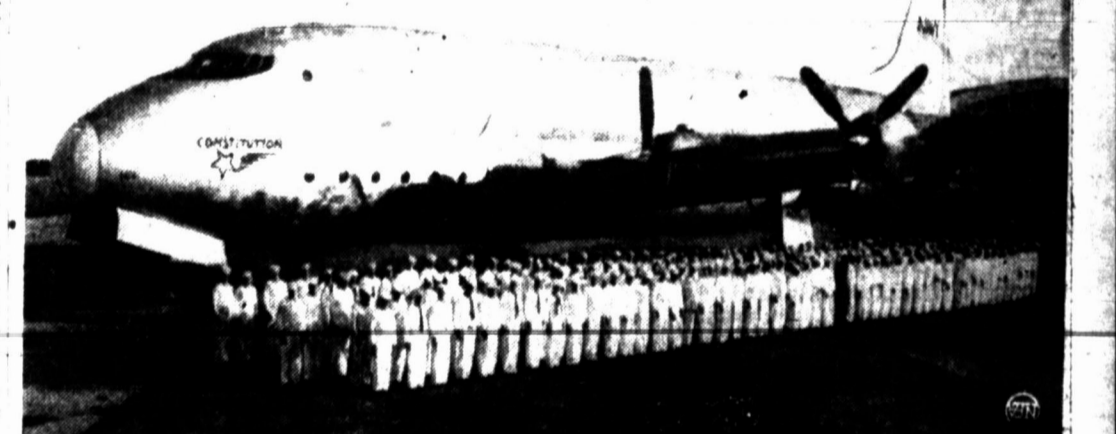

In communicating with various sports enthusiasts around town, several very commendable statements have been made concerning Howard Bass' pitching control. During the hurler's last night's Oiler-Duke tilt, it thought by many to be one of the best hurlers in the league. His earned run average is only 2.99 per game which tends to bolster this feeling, since it is one of the lowest in the league.

But anyway, getting back to what we started to say, several people have been wondering just how many pitches Bass tosses in a normal WT-NM League game. (Normal that is) Assuming that last night's tilt was an average affair, this writer finally made use of his elementary arithmetic by at least attempting to get an accurate tabulation of Bass' evening performance on the mound.

All in all, Bass threw in exactly 112 pitches, which is 20 less than the Albuquerque hurler, Joe Behl. Assuming that every ball that the Duke's swung at, fouled, or connected with in any fashion, was a strike, Bass tossed in exactly 83 strikes. By simple division, this should, and does, give him the incredible 73 percent of his pitches being strikes. Last night he threw only 29 balls.

In comparison with Duke hurler Joe Behl, the Albuquerque right-hander threw 144 strikes and 56 balls for an even 71 percent of 5.2 percent which is not a bad average in itself. But one would have certainly needed a working knowledge of the WT-NM League standstill last night to be sure which team was an "off" pitcher.

The Oilers outplayed the Dukes in every department. They outthrew them, outdid them, and, in all, looked much sharper in executing their plays.

ONE FOR THE BOOKS. Despite the fact that Bass struck out only four men in last night's game, the Dukes missed under their own power or by calls from the umpire, exactly 45 of the 83 strikes he pitched, which means that he got two strikes on an opponent by six out of every 45 pitches that the Dukes made contact with, only 11 of them went for safe hits. So, it seems as if you fans are certainly justified in commending Howard Bass for his excellent pitching control.

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Bob Crues Is Near Hauser's Homer Record

AMARILLO — Pounding Bob Crues hammered his fifty-second and fifty-third home runs last night and at the pace he's now traveling will break the all-time record of 57 seasonal bases hit with circuit clouts to spare.

That record is 69 set by Joe Hauser with Minneapolis of the American Association in 1933. And today Crues is only four away from playing only 146 with Amarillo of the West Texas-New Mexico League.

But with 44 more contests to go, Bob, by maintaining his present average, will hit the 77 mark. Today Crues is only four away from tying the league record in home runs set last year by Bill Serena of Lubbock. Bill got 13 more in the playoffs for a total of 79 for the season but it appears Bob should beat even that.

And Crues also is after another league record—the 190 runs batted in by Serena. He's just four away from that mark, too.

Crues started in pro baseball as a pitcher and in 1940 won 23 of his last 24 games with Borger in the West Texas-New Mexico League. But in the Boston Red Sox training camp the next spring he injured his arm and never was an effective hurler after that.

However, his arm has improved steadily since late last season and he has been throwing well and accurately. He even has asked to be allowed to pitch.

Bob is brilliant on fly balls, specializing in one-handed catches on those hit to his right and behind him.

But at bat he's the terror of this hard-hitting league. The slugger's longest loop in pro baseball is his hitting in clusters, which usually are regarded as bad pitches and hits to all fields.

They figure he has an excellent chance to beat the record because he's showing a familiar trend—his hitting in clusters.

Last season battering Bob got 52 homers so he's already ahead and the pitchers aren't coming close to getting him out of these a homer he makes up for it by clouting two the next night.

U. S. Olympic Athletes Stay Where Britain Heroes Lived

LONDON — (NEA) American, Canadian and Filipino Olympic athletes, sharing their food at Uxbridge, dine in a hallowed hall. It was in this room at this old-fashioned base of the Royal Air Force that the greatest heroes of the Battle of Britain were kept alive while flying almost continuous missions in the late summer and fall of 1941.

"Never before have so many owed so much to so few," as Winston Churchill said.

No one is going hungry here. The American brought 5000 pounds of roast beef, lamb, ham and bacon 75 cases of eggs, a ton of butter, cases of soup, 150 cases of fruit juice, 15,000 bars of milk chocolate, fig newtons, etc.

When chairman of the U. S. Olympic food committee, Charles L. Orstein, New York hotel manager, took A. J. Adams to breakfast, the British Olympic official in charge of the camp said he would be arrested for eating that much at home.

There was the Turkish equestrian team arriving at night, with no one able to speak English too clearly. So the Turkish officers wound up at Alershot with the horses, while the grooms had a high old time at Uxbridge.

There is the case of Pak Pong Shik, the only girl athlete among the 1500 quartered at Uxbridge. Miss Shik, only 17, is also the only girl member of the Korean Olympic team. 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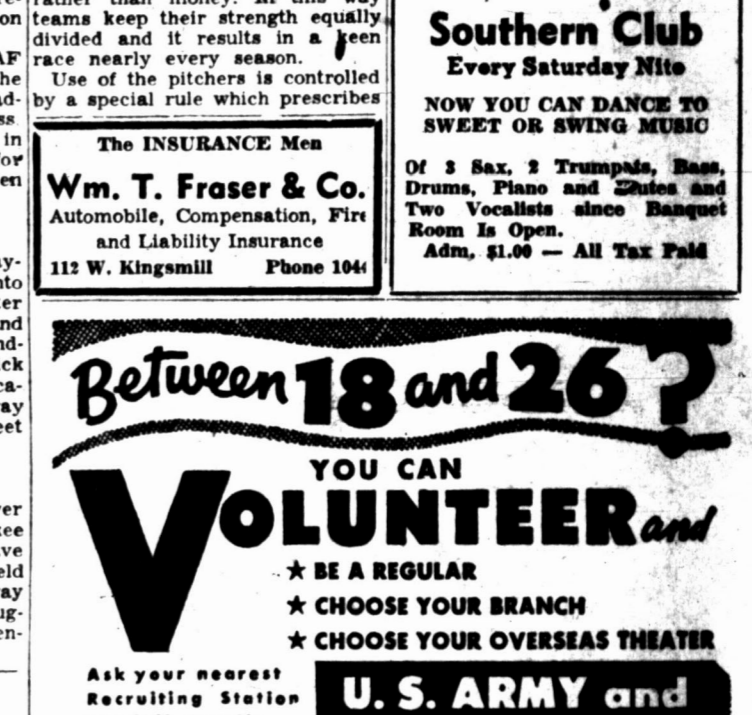

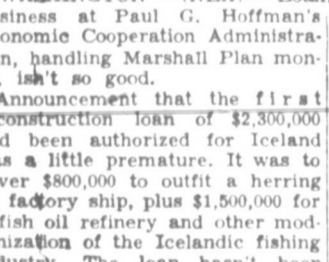

'Electric Nerve' Aids Polio Victims



A new "electrical nerve," which acts as a substitute for human nerves affected by infantile or other paralysis, is demonstrated at the first international polio conference in New York. The device generates mild electric currents which replace lost nerves. They cause muscles to tense, swell and relax the same as they do in mild exercise. This helps to restore limbs wasted by polio. The "electric" nerve was developed by General Electric engineers and the G-E X-ray corporation.

2,000 Reds Die In Chinese War

PEIPING — (AP) — Government troops killed or wounded 2,000 Reds today and captured 2,000 more, a report from a Communist source in the southwest of Taiyuan, national reports said.

As the national forces pressed their advantages around the once besieged Shansi Province capital, government planes blasted Communist positions west, southwest and southeast of the city.

Independent private sources here said Taiyuan had quieted down. Planes were reported flying in Calgo to Taiyuan and returning empty. Last week 150,000 Reds besieged the city and refugees were flown out.

From Manchuria the Peiping Daily News reported Red forces were trying to starve the 180,000 in the District of mountain-walled Changchun, once the Manchurian capital. These reports said 500 persons had died.

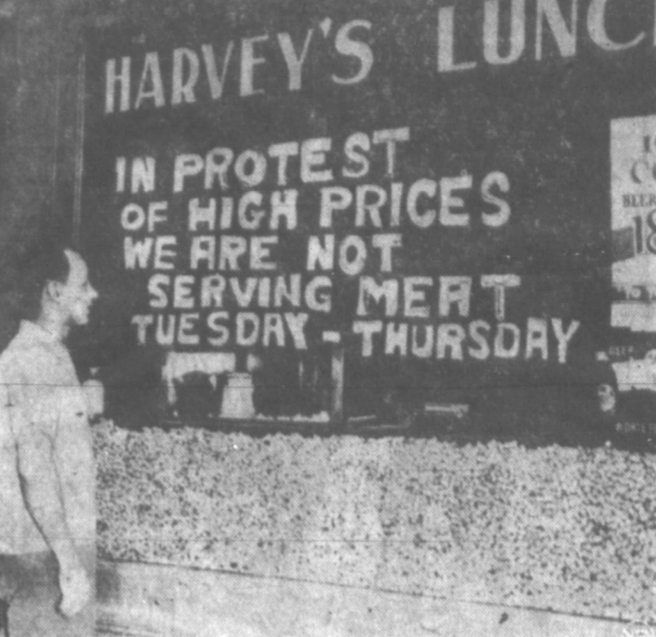

Two Texas Democratic Party Factions Line Up for Fight

AUSTIN — (AP) — The fight between Texas factions of the Democratic Party was more sharply defined today.

It appeared a coalition of Gov. Beauford H. Jester's "middle-of-the-road" followers and the strongly pro-Truman Democrats may develop to meet the challenge of Texas Dixiecrats who definitely want to beat Truman.

Jester made it clear that he expects Texas Democrats to stick to the pledge of a Brownwood State Convention in May to support the presidential nominee of the Democratic Party.

The Governor rapped those who would bolt the party. At his press conference yesterday he posed this question: "Suppose we leave it to the Wallaceites and leftwingers and all those other people like that who have come in in recent years. How would there be any hope for us to help rebuild it (the party)?"

Later in the day he turned a cold shoulder on the appeal of two Texas men to give Texas voters a choice between President Truman and J. Strom Thurmond, the Dixiecrat candidate for the presidential nomination.

Palmer Bradley of Houston and Arch Rowan of Fort Worth asked Jester's influence in getting the State Democratic Executive Committee to put Truman and Thurmond on the ballot at the Aug. 8 primary. This, they said, would make possible a referendum by Texas voters on whether they want to go along with Truman's civil rights program.

The two men told reporters that Jester flatly refused to consider their proposal. "Gov. Jester refused to help us, but on the contrary said he thought the Democrats of Texas should vote for Harry Truman

since he was nominated at Philadelphia," they said in a prepared statement.

The two said they will continue their fight by having Dixiecrats submit resolutions at Saturday's County Conventions asking the State Executive Committee to submit the referendum Aug. 28.

"Anticipating the Executive Committee's refusal to call a referendum, Bradley said the next step would be to fight for control of the State Democratic Party at the State Convention in Fort Worth Sept. 14.

"I think the states righters will absolutely control the Harris County Convention," said Bradley, and Rowan expected the same to be true in Tarrant County where he lives.

Bradley declared the South to be the true Democratic Party and said the Philadelphia Convention was dominated by extreme "leftwingers and representatives of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

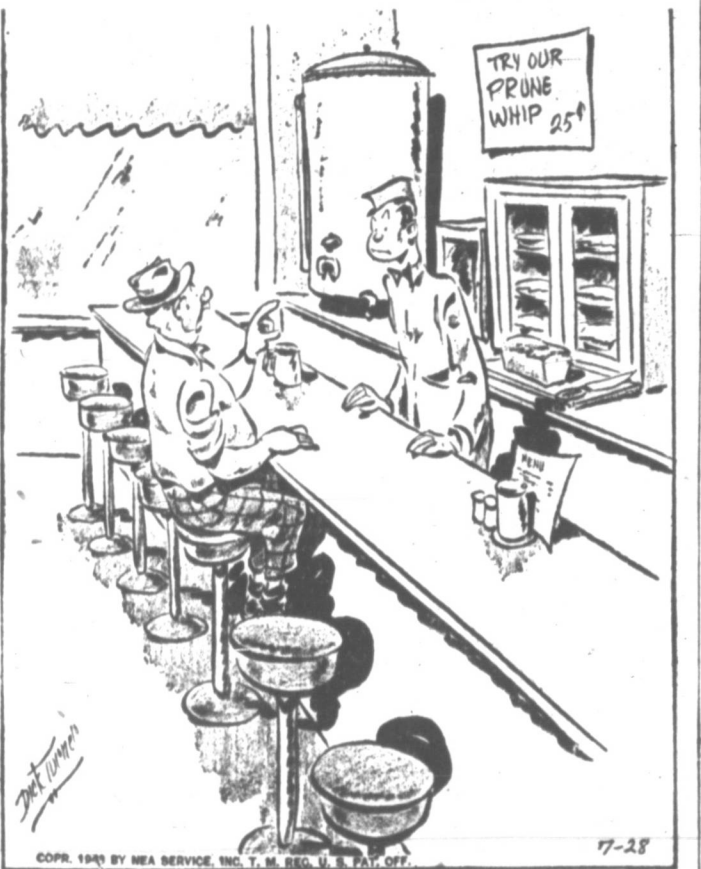

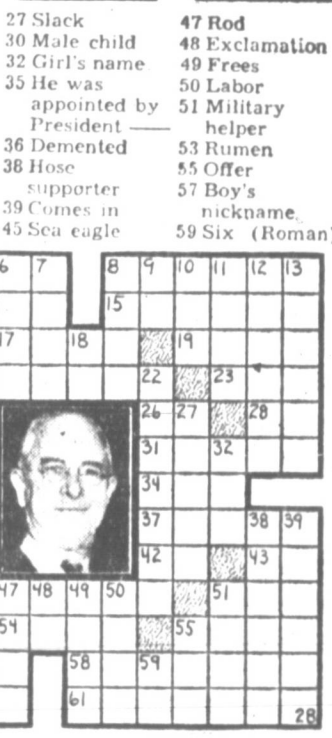

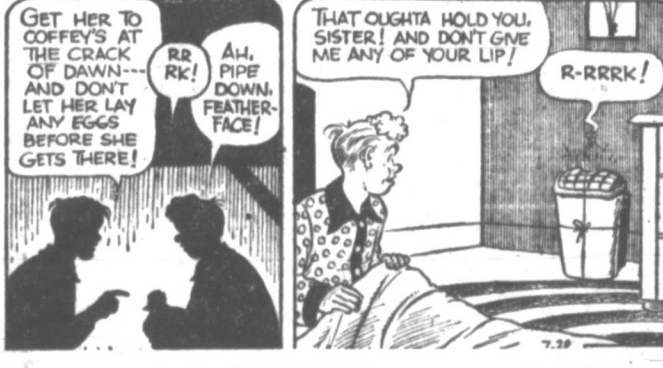

The man who started the famous Tinker-to-Evers-to-Chance double-plays for the Cubs was cheerful to the last, despite his impaired health. He had suffered from diabetes for several years and his left leg was amputated last summer because of an infection.

Born in 1880, Tinker started in

organized baseball with Coffeyville, Kans., when he was 19. Three years later, in 1902, he made the major league grade with the Cubs and played with them through 1912. He managed the Cincinnati Reds in 1913 and the Chicago Cubs in the old Federal League in 1914-15.

After four years as manager of Columbus in the American Association, Tinker came to Orlando to pilot the Florida State League entry.

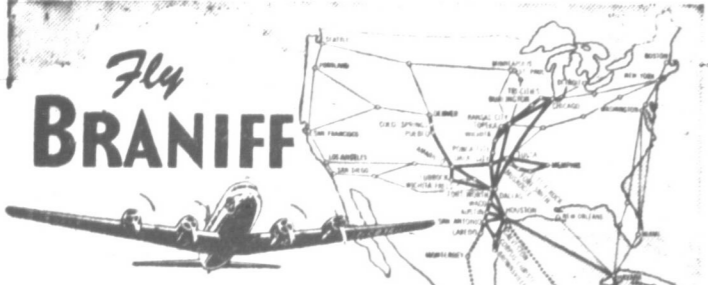

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The 39-year-old grandson of an Italian immigrant has become a Henry Ford of the night club business in America.

And Frank Palumbo built his after-dark empire here in the city of brotherly love, which is popularly supposed to stay up after sunset only on the days when an evening baseball game is being played.

But Palumbo created a multi-million dollar yearly business on the basis that the masses have more money to spend at night clubs than the classes.

"The whole secret of this business is giving the people the kind of entertainment they want," said Palumbo, who owns six night clubs and restaurants in Philadelphia.

Right now he thinks the people are shopping for night club entertainment every bit as sharply as they do for their dollar's value in food or clothing.

"They no longer are just satisfied to go and pay their money and listen to a band," he said. "They want more to stay a while a time. These guys who just play their saxophones and clarinets and turn their back to the audience are finished."

"Night clubs have to get back to their merchandising. The fast dollar is one."

Palumbo, a stocky, dark-haired cheerful bachelor, has made himself a civic institution here by his pleasure in giving. Friends estimate he gives away \$100,000 a year.

By giving the zoo a leopard, four alligators, some South American birds and two rhinos, he has endeared himself to the mal-loving hearts of the main line aristocracy here. And it is a crusty society you just don't crash with a new bank roll.

Palumbo has given blood transfusions as well as dollars. He is easier to hit than a radio giveaway program. As the whim seizes him, he passes out watches, pen and pencil sets, cases of liquor, perfume, gold rings, bracelets, and television sets for orphans.

"I get my chief pleasure out of life in seeing people enjoy themselves," he says. His favorite beverage is a soft drink.

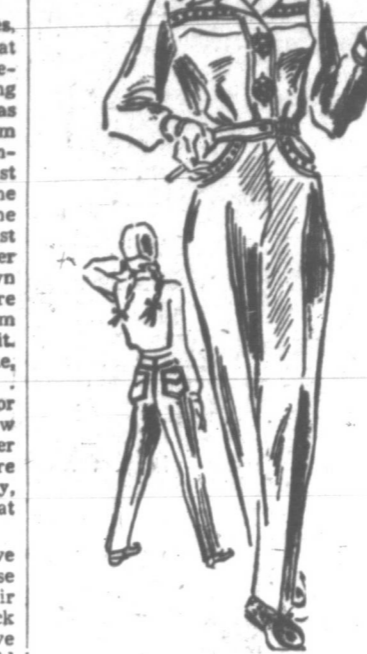
