Successful completion of the advanced camp and graduation from college results in a commission as a second lieutenant in either the U.S. Army, Army Reserve or National Guard for the cadet.

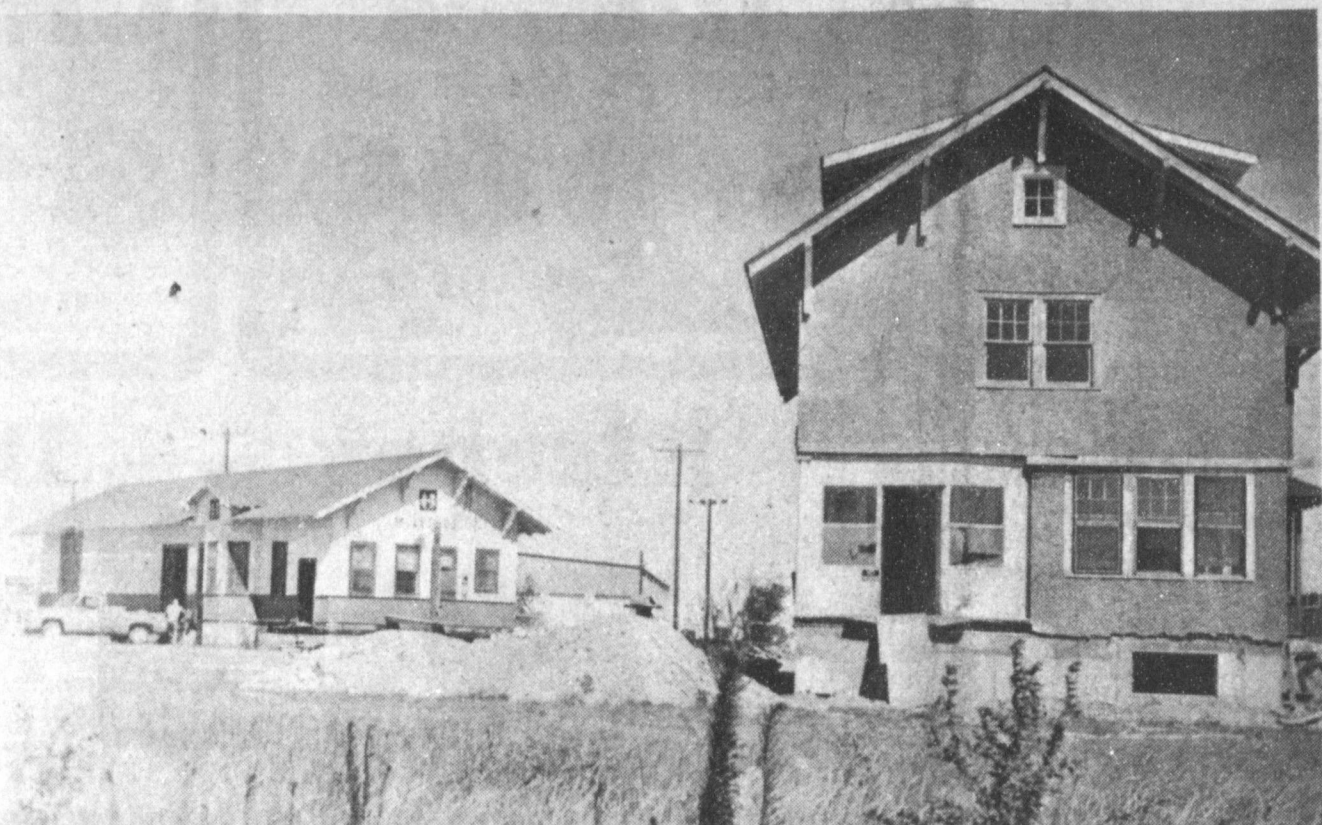

Muleshoe Schools Implement MET-Pro As Improvement

H. John Fuller, superintendent of schools has announced that Muleshoe ISD will be entering into a school improvement program this coming school year. The school improvement program, known as The Muleshoe Effective Teaching Program (MET-Pro) is research based, he said, and utilizes the most successful and appropriate techniques in teaching as found in the latest research and most recent professional literature.

"The school district has gone through several readiness activities over the past two years preparing for the implementation of MET-Pro," said the superintendent. "The MET-Pro plan program is founded on the belief that teaching is a profession and that teachers have areas of expertise that are unique to their training. The MET-Pro plan calls for teacher collaboration, high expectations (for students, teachers, and administrators), emphasis on being Goal driven, and a commitment to utilizing the best teaching techniques available."

MISD Driver Training Slated During Next Week

With the 1986-87 school year fast approaching, one of the 'get-ready-for-school' functions has been scheduled, beginning August 1.

According to David Gray, certified bus driver instructor, and teacher at Muleshoe High School, it's time for bus driver school.

Gray will be teaching a 20-hour course for new drivers, plus conduct a refresher course for drivers who have previously taken the 20-hour course.

Included in the school will be loading and unloading of students, First Aid, driving procedures, disciplinary problems, and how to determine whether or not to drive on rural dirt roads in bad weather.

Classroom work and actual bus driving will be a part of the 20-hour bus driver school.

Irrigation customers of South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. of Lubbock and Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association of Muleshoe, could benefit from an experimental rate structure agreed to by the cooperative and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The rate structure is pending approval by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC).

This arrangement would allow the cooperatives to surpass their target demands for electricity without increasing their cost of electricity per kilowatt-hour or interrupting service to their irrigation customers, said J.C. Roberts, general manager of South Plains Cooperative, and Duane Lloyd, general manager of Bailey County Electric Cooperative.

SPS supplies wholesale power to the cooperatives.

Under the existing rate structure, the cooperatives interrupt service to irrigation customers when a target peak demand is reached. This is done because the cooperatives' electric bills for the next year are based, in part, on the peak demand during each preceding summer. The concept is that classes of customers who cause the need for more power plant capacity to meet brief peaks in electric usage should pay their fair share for the cost of additional capacity, said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president-marketing.

The experimental rate structure is possible because there is ample electric generating capacity available due to the completion last year of SPS' Talk Station power plant unit

Plant Clinic Scheduled Here This Wednesday

Bailey County Agent Spencer Tanksley has reminded that it's time for the annual Homeowners Plant Clinic. It will be conducted in Muleshoe on Wednesday, July 30 with Dr. Pat Morrison, plant entomologist and Dr. Bob Berry, plant pathologist.

Both the representatives of Texas A&M University, Texas Agricultural Extension Service are stationed in Lubbock, but will be in Muleshoe to assist homeowners with their sick plants, trees, yards, shrubs and other growth, including flowers.

People with problem plants are asked to call the Extension office in the courthouse, leave your name, address and you will be given the approximate time your home visit will be made by the TAES representatives. You may make your appointments by calling 272-4583.

If you expect to be out of town, you may take your sick plant, or samples of plants or insects by the Extension office in the courthouse to be sent off for diagnosis, added Tanksley.

number two near Muleshoe, Gibson said.

Under the new rate structure, prices effective September 1986 through August 1987 would be based on the target or actual peak demand--whichever is lower--that occurred from June through August 1986. Thus, if farmers need to irrigate this summer more than the cooperatives' target amount, they wouldn't risk having their service interrupted simply because demand is exceeding the target.

South Plains Electric Cooperative serves 5,570 irrigation wells. Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association serves 2,449 irrigation wells.

This rate structure would be instituted on a one-year basis. After one year, the electric cooperatives and SPS will review the effectiveness of the program, explained SPS and the cooperatives.

CRP Signup Starts Soon; To August 15

Next signup for the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program will take place August 4-15 at the Bailey County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office in Muleshoe.

Farmers may offer bids to place highly erodible cropland into the reserve for the third time this year.

Annual payments for 10 years will compensate for retiring highly erodible land from crop production. The amount of the payment is determined by the accepted bid per acre times the number of accepted acres.

Participants will also receive cost-share assistance for establishing grass, trees, or wildlife plants on the acreage placed in the reserve. Hunting is allowed on the land but no crops can be harvested while it is in the reserve.

James Lutz, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Muleshoe, said land that is eroding at more than three times the tolerance level is eligible to be placed in the reserve if it was farmed two or more years between 1981 and 1985.

During the first two signups, bids were tentatively accepted from more than 1,200 Texas farmers on 310,000 acres. Bids accepted ranged from \$25 to \$50 per acre. In Bailey County, 103 bids were accepted on 33,669.1 acres. Bids ranged from \$29 to \$40.

Macaroni Crabmeat Salad

- 8 oz elbow macaroni
- 1 c. cooked crabmeat
- 1 c. green pepper chopped
- 1/4 c. chopped pimientos
- 1 c. chopped celery
- 1/4 c. slivered almonds

- 1/2 c. mayonnaise
- 2 t. salt

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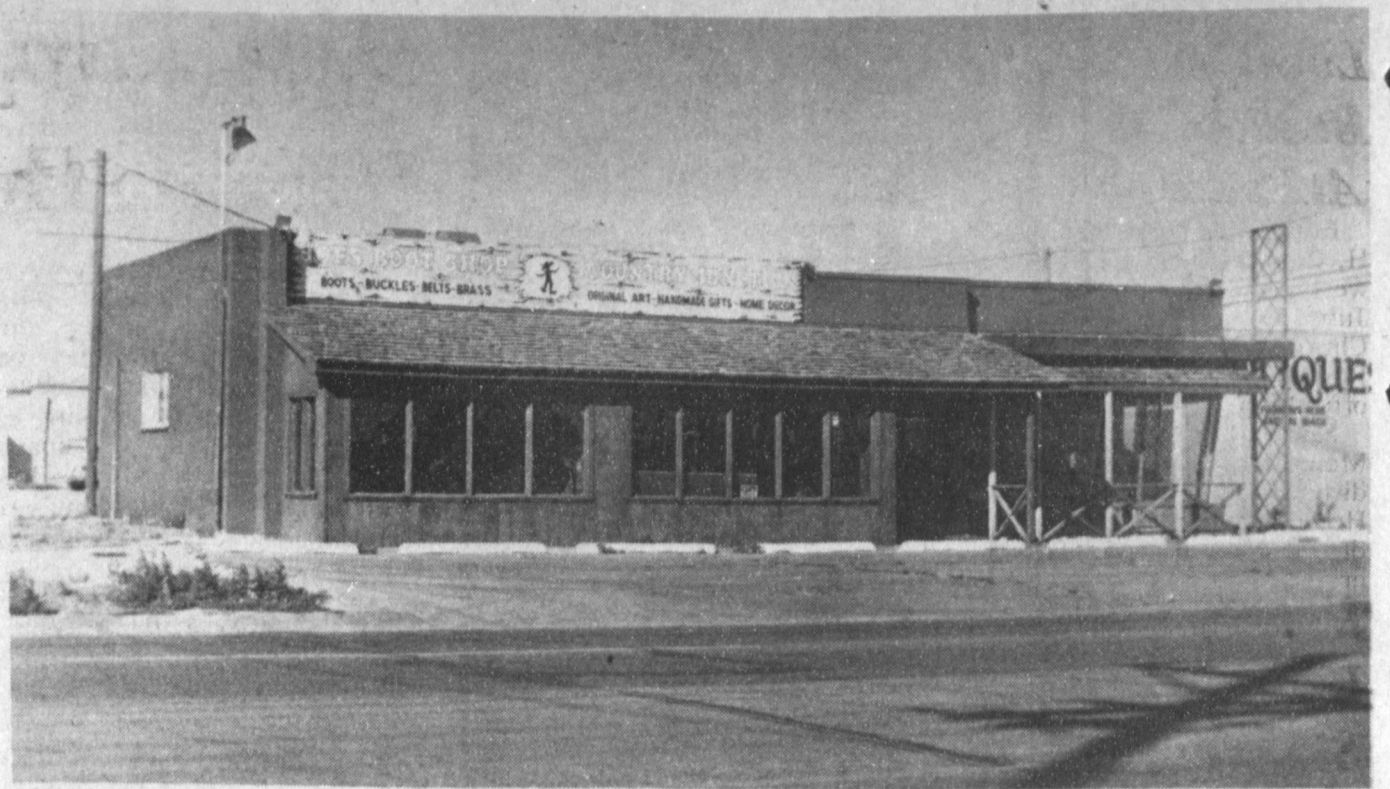

Mammography: Is it worthwhile?


Breast cancer remains one of the most significant health problems among American women, claiming more than 33,000 lives each year. Nuclear Waste Project Hearing Held By DOE

Congressman Larry Combest (R-Texas) today joined with Members of the Science and Technology Subcommittee on Energy Research and Production in conducting a hearing to determine whether the Department of Energy (DOE) has complied with the Nuclear Waste Policy Act regarding site selection.

Combest was invited to be a special member of the subcommittee to investigate whether the DOE is presently implementing the Nuclear Waste Policy Act (NWPA) to the letter and spirit of the law. "Recent actions by the Department, such as the 'indefinite postponement' of second repository site identification activities and the serious questions raised over site-ranking methodology application, create a reasonable justification for this inquiry," Combest said during the hearing.

"The lack of attention given to these critical matters is indicative of DOE's continued failure to comply with the criteria set forth in the NWPA, and the basis for my continued insistence that the DOE must address these questions before it progresses further in its identification process," Combest stressed.

"At times, it appears that the DOE is on a predetermined, preconceived course in its efforts to identify a nuclear waste storage facility," noted Combest. "The NWPA was designed to preclude political considerations entering into the site activities, the DOE appears to have violated the letter and intention of the law."

During the nuclear waste hearing, the Energy Subcommittee heard testimony from DOE and Texas officials including Ben Rusche, Director of the Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management and Steve Frishman, Director of the Texas Nuclear Waste Programs Office.

When questioning Rusche, Combest pointed out that he continues to receive complaints from the people of the 19th District of Texas and throughout the state regarding DOE's lack of cooperation in addressing the serious questions and concerns

surrounding the site identification. Rusche responded that he realized that the DOE's responses had not adequately addressed the concerns to the state's satisfaction and assured Congressman Combest that his office would attempt to answer those problems on a more timely and thorough basis.

Combest concluded that he will continue to "Pursue a halt of DOE repository activities until we in Congress can determine if the intent of the NWPA is being fulfilled by DOE policy."

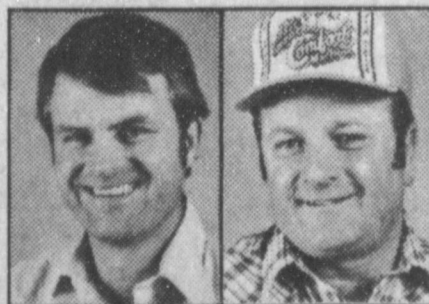
