## Display, Handling Of U. S. Flag


-When displayed over the middle of the street, the flag should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in the east in a north and south -When the flag is displaye from a staff projecting horizontally or at any angle from the a building, the union of the flag the staff (unless the flag is to be displayed at half-mast).

- Flags are customarily dis played in good weather from or outdoor flag staffs. A flag may be displayed outdoors a night if properly illuminated
and in bad weather if it is all-weather flag. -When the flag is suspended across a corridor or lobby in a building with only one main entrance, it should be suspended vertically with the union, the blue field, to the observer's let
upon entering. upon entering
played with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property. $\bullet$ The flag should not be fastened, displayed, used or stored in such a manner as soiled, or damaged in any way, -The flag should not be used as a covering for a ceiling. -The flag should not be used for advertising purposes in any
manner whatsoever.
-The flag should not be used as wearing apparel, bedding of festooned, drawn back nor up in folds, but allowed to fall free. -No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform, except a flag of military personnel, firefight-
ers, police otficers

worn on the pins should be heart. -Marks, insignia, letters, words, figures, designs, picshould not be placed on the flag.
