Two killed in explosion of offshore well platform

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - An offshore drilling platform exploded in flames early today in the Gulf of Mexico, killing two persons and injuring at least 19 others, officials said. Five other persons were missing and feared dead.

The injured and others of the crew of 42 aboard the platform were taken by boat to another drilling platform five miles away, where they were met by a medical team flown in by helicopter.

We have no idea how seriously they are injured. They sent out a medical crew to treat and evaluate them and bring them back in," smid Mike Riordan, a spokesman for John Sealy Hospital in

The drilling platform was operated by Pennzoil for a group of several owners and was located about 100 miles southeast of Galveston

Of the 42 persons aboard the drilling platform at the time of the explosion, between midnight and 12:30 a.m., only one was a Pennzoil employee. The others were contract workers from Pool Offshore Co., headquartered in Harvey, La., Harper said.

A Coast Guard helicopter trying to transport the most seriously injured to John Sealy Hospital had to be tied to the platform to keep from being blown overboard into the Gulf

But about 7:15 p.m., seven hours after the explosion, the helicopter risked the turbulence and safely got off the platform. For awhile, officials considered lifting the helicopter empty and hoisting the

'We're moving the four most seriously injured first, and we're leaving five more that we'll go back after," a Coast Guard official in

He said two of the four being taken to the hospital were able to walk on their own and two were not.

Bob Harper, a spokesman for Pennzoil said the Coast Guard sent one helicopter to the scene from New Orleans and Pennzoil dispatched another helicopter from Galveston with two nurses, three paramedics and four emergency medical services people

Harvey estimated the flying time of a helicopter from the drilling platform to Galveston at between one and two hours.

Coast Guard Petty Officer Kenneth Harry of Galveston said the Coast Guard helicopter was dispatched to the area from New

After the explosion, the workers were taken by boat to the second drilling platform, where they were met by the medical team for

treatment prior to being flown to Galveston. 'We really have no idea what caused the blowout." Harper said. There were 42 on the platform at the time of the blowout.

The dead, the injureed and the 26 who escaped injury got off the platform via two "evacuation capsules," Harper said.

"They were evacuated from the platform into the water using the evacuation capsules, and our boats picked them out of the capsules. We had a 185-foot-long work boat and a 90-foot-long standby boat at the rig. That's standard procedure," Harper added.

The evacuation capsules, which Harper said "look a lot like flying saucers," can hold 28 persons each. The capsules are completely sealed and have a small power unit aboard that allow persons inside to lower the unit into the water and then to move at relatively slow speeds through the water.

Harper said the drilling bits were about 2,500 feet deep when the blowout occurred, he said

Sgt. James Lopez, is among the hostages. "I'm hoping it doesn't have an effect on the hostages, but then you can never be sure of the reaction with the Iranian people.

Hostage families oppose Shah

Toni Sickmann, of Krakow, Mo., mother of Sgt. Rodney "Rocky" Sickmann, said she felt the shah should return to his country. "It would be nice if he would go back to Iran and face up to things that are wrong to try to get it settled. It would bring the speedy return of our hostages, but it doesn't look like he's going to do that.

The shah's departure worried Dick Gallegos, of Pueblo, Colo., whose son Marine Cpl. Billy Gallegos is a hostage. "This is going to prolong the stay of the hostages because they (the Iranians) won't be able to extradite him from Egypt.

In the joint letter, the families told Carter that the shah's arrival in the United States

had precipitated the Nov. 4 seizure of the Americans at the U.S. embassy in Tehran and that further U.S. aid would not help get the hostages home

"The letter basically spoke about the total outrage the families felt when they heard about" White House adviser Hamilton Jordan's mission to determine the shah's medical needs, said the mother of one of the hostages. Barabara Timm of Wisconsin

The New York Times also reported that a letter, approved by 47 of the 53 families of hostages, told Carter the families would break with him if he allowed the shah back into the United States.

A White House spokesman said late Sunday that officials there had no knowledge of the letter from the hostages' families, the Times reported today.

Shah arrives safely in Egypt

Reza Pahlavi arrived in Egypt today from Panama. escaping extradition proceedings and leaving behind a medical wrangle over his ailments President Anwar Sadat said the deposed Iranian monarch would be staying in Egypt permanently.

Iranian officials reacted with outrage. Tehran Radio accused Sadat and President Carter of conspiring to "save the Hitler of our age." one official said it would cause "great difficulties" in resolving the crisis

over the U.S. Embassy hostages in Tehran. and another revived Iran's threat to put the hostages on trial as spies.

A spokesman for the young Moslem militants holding the 50 American captives declined to comment. But he said their price for the release of the hostages — the return of the shah and his fortune to Iran remains unchanged.

Sadat met the shah at Cairo airport, and

the two took a helicopter to Maadi military hospital on the outskirts of Cairo, where the shah is to undergo medical treatment.

There. Sadat was asked whether the shah would be staying in Egypt permanently. 'Yes, yes, permanently," Sadat said in his booming voice.

The shah looked thin and very tired after his overnight flight. He declined to answer reporters' questions, saying, "After the operation we shall have ample time to speak with you.

the flow of crude oil and natural gas. The first plug consisting of about 200 sacks of cement was inserted at a depth of 2.705 meters Sunday, and a second plug was dropped in a few hours later at a depth of 2.591 meters. The third plug went down to 2.332 meters.

Thus ended the life of the test well that permitted discovery of one of the richest offshore oil deposits." the spokesman said.

Ixtoc 1 exploded June 3 and went out of control at a depth of 3,267 meters below the 51-meter

Campeche that Pemex estimated contains at least 800 million barrels of crude oil

The flow of crude was reduced to neglegible amounts of crude and some gas March 18 by pumping sea water, mud and thekening substances through two directional wells drilled over a period of months. A drill-bit collar hit a so-called "caren" and dropped several hundred feet, cracking the floor

under which lay huge quantities of oil and gas. setting off the pre-dawn explosion followed by fire that wrecked a \$22 million drilling platform under rental by Pemex from a Texas company. The 64 men on board were unharmed and were

Members of the community, churchs and local organizations have contacted the girls home officials offering items, time and money to help in the aftermath of the destructive blaze.

A passing motorist saw the flames coming through the roof of the building about 3 a.m. Saturday and notified them, Superintendent Robert Wilson said.

Several grass fires had already broken out, threatening five other cottages and storage buildings, when they ran out to see what was happening, he said.



Many of the losses of the fire are irreplaceable. Mrs. Dorothy Wilson said. For example, an original landscape by Pampa artist, the late Lola Mae Cator; one of the girl's dolls and clothes she had outgrown, but still wanted and an antique Underwood typewriter believed to be valued at \$1500 to \$2000.

A large amount of the girls' allowance money. waiting to be deposited was destroyed in the flames. The youngest member of Girlstown, 10-year-old Rebecca McClain offered her allowance money to the Wilson's after the fire. Mrs. Wilson explained her money was also lost in the blaze, to which she replied, "But someboy will send me some soon.

Items lost in the fire included: all the personal belongings of houseparents, Terry and Janice Sanders except their clothing; office equipment - typewriters, copying machine, etc.; extra clothing for about 25 girls; appliances - a freezer containing 500 to 600 pounds of beef and a refrigerator of vegetables; hand tools and power tools; eight sewing machines and supplies; makeup and toiletries; 200 pairs of pantyhose; plastic mattress covers; all school supplies; three lawn mowers, one was a riding mower; extra furniture and all birthday gifts for the







Computer can't change diapers

LONDON (AP) - Four-week-old Gemma Zawadski has a computer for a nanny.

• Instead of an apron and a cozy lap, it has tape drives and typewriter keys. Instead of a nickname like Nana, it's called ORCA III. But it soothes Gemma when she cries, tells her a bedtime story and will teach her English, French and German when she starts to

"About the only thing it can't do is change the baby's nappies," said Gemma's father, Richard Zawadski, the 28-year-old computer consultant who built ORCA III.

ORCA III is more than just a nanny. Zawadski has programmed it to do household chores as well - turning on lights, opening the garage door and guarding the house against burglars and thieves. "Pretty soon I can just ring up from work and have it switch on the microwave oven before I come home," he boasted.

Last November, for \$6,600, Zawadski bought the American ITT 2020 home computer to use in his business and educational work. The baby arrived on Feb. 29.

"I think my daughter has been born in an age when technology is going to have a bigger impact than ever before," said Zawadski.

wanted to introduce my daughter to computers at an early age.' So he purchased several pieces of hardware to expand the computer's range to include speech synthesis and voice recognition. With the help of his wife, who is an engineer, he rewired their home in St. Albans, outside London, and rigged up a set of microphones in the

ORCA III, named after a British science-fiction TV show, sits in the utility room, but its power extends throughout the house. Zawadski said he programmed the computer to switch on the

instant the baby begins to cry and to talk back in a soothing tone reproducing both his and his wife's voice.

'If Gemma stirs in the night, the computer will react to the sound of her voice and start talking to her," the father said. ORCA III also is programmed to make up its own bedtime story,

always beginning with "Once upon a time" and ending with "They lived happily ever after." Zawadski said. The plot is up to the computer's choosing from sample stories fed into its memory. Gemma is too young to talk, but her nanny is ready. ORCA III is programmed for three languages - English, French

and German — to teach her vocabulary and correct pronunciation. Zawadski said he plans to show his daughter how to program ORCA III by the time she starts school. But he worries that if she gets

too good, she'll use the computer to play tricks on her parents. But isn't the computer nanny too much like George Orwell's

HOUSTON (AP) - Attorneys predicted final arguments would begin Tuesday in the federal court challenge to Texas law prohibiting illegal alien children from attending state

public schools free. The state statute is being challenged before U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals in a suit brought by Hispanic parents whose children were either denied admission to public schools or were charged tuition.

For five weeks, attorneys for the Hispanic parents have attempted to show the law is inhumane, and to discredit the state's claim that neither enough money nor enough bilingual teachers are available to absorb the influx of school-age illegal aliens.

Many Texas school districts enroll the illegal alien children, provided they pay tuition, generally about \$1,000 a semester. Other districts deny admission to any child without proper proof of residence.

The state said a recent survey showed there were at least 111,000 illegal school-age children in Texas. Attorneys for the plaintiffs contend the count was inflated.

New system will handle auto repair complaints

Consumers frustrated by auto-repair problems may get some relief under a plan worked out by government and industry officials to upgrade existing complaint-handling systems.

According to Esther Peterson, the president's special assistant for consumer affairs, the plan is the result of a two-year study by the Office of Consumer Affairs of the way auto dealers were responding to customer problems

* The office looked at the operation of AutoCAP - the Automotive Consumer Action Program - established by the National Automobile Dealers Association to mediate disputes that cannot be settled between individual customers and dealers. It found that there were no comprehensive standards for the mediation panels and there was little supervision of local AutoCAPs by the dealers' association.

As a result of the study and at the urging of consumer representatives, the dealers' group, which represents 75 percent of the nation's 26,000 franchised car and truck dealers, agreed to set new standards for the program. Among the highlights -The percentage of consumer representation on each panel will be

-Each AutoCAP will be encouraged to ask community members

All panel meetings will be open to the public.

 Dealers will be bound by the decisions of the mediation panels. Mrs. Peterson urged individuals to contact local and state dealer associations to find out whether they are participating in the complaint program. "If the association seems reluctant ... write to NADA itself for assistance and advice," Mrs. Peterson said. The AutoCAP panels involve new car dealers only; they do not cover repair shops or mechanics. Consumers looking for an independent repair facility or garage can minimize problems, however, by taking a few precautions.

Shop around for a garage. Ask if mechanics are certified and, if so, in what areas. The National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence, set up by auto manufacturers and dealers, tests and certifies mechanics in eight fields. Ask for a written estimate in advance. In some states, such estimates are required by law. When you pick up your car, check the receipt. Ask to see all replaced parts. Even if the parts must be returned to the manufacturer to meet warranty conditions, you should be able to inspect them first.

A Department of Transportation brochure, "Consumer Problems with Auto Repair," offers advice on avoiding trouble. It is available, at no charge, from the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 505H, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

But can Congress learn to say no?

A reduction in deficit spending by the federal government is the single most important step the government could take against inflation

Other steps are important - such as the moves by the Federal Reserve Board to raise interest rates.

But now that the most recent news on the inflation front has become so horrendous some leading congressmen and Carter spokesmen are actually talking about cutting the budget. We hope they are serious. People are becoming alarmed about the shrinkage in their real income.

A bipartisan group of 43 senators lead by William Roth, R-Del., and William Proxmire, D-Wis., have introduced a resolution proposing to cut about \$26 billion from the Carter administration's budget for fiscal 1981. That's good, but it is far easier to come out in favor of a budget ceiling involving unspecified budget reductions than it is to vote for cutting specific programs that are supported by powerful interest groups

The Congress is about to levy a huge new oil tax. Is this new money going to be used to reduce the deficit? Of course not. Instead it will be spent on new programs or used to finance a popular tax cut.

There can be no sacred cows when it comes to budget cutting. In the whole herd of budget items there is not a single animal that is not considered holy by some group.

An increase in defense spending seems inevitable. That doesn't mean we can buy national security simply by throwing money at the Pentagon. There must be no pork-barrel military spending and every budget item for defense should be scrutinized to make sure that we are getting our money's worth in increased military effectiveness.

But it is clear that, if there are to be significant budget cuts, they must come in domestic programs. Why, for example, should the federal government continue distributing nearly \$7 billion a year to the states and local governments in revenue-sharing money? Can we afford to charge these local projects and programs to the fedeeral debt? Should we mortgage the future of the dollar for these purposes which local and state taxpayers apparently are not willing to finance?

Another example. Under current federal pay measurement standards, the government will "owe" federal workers below the executive level a pay raise of 10.9 percent in October. President Carter, however, has proposed that fringe benefits as well as wages be used in comparisons of federal and private pay. That would reduce the pay increase for federal workers to 6.2 percent this year. But will Congress go along, under the disapproving stare of the government workers in Washington?

It will take guts, not just affirmation of good intentions, to slow the spending binge. The Congress has got to learn to say no.

Restraint on U.S. Steel

There is no secret about why U.S. Steel, the nation's largest steelmaker, is awash in red ink. Many of its plants and the manufacturing technology they utilize are relics of the past. Production costs at these aged mills are such that U.S. Steel is losing a competitive struggle against state-of-the-art plants in Japan, West Germany, South Korea, Taiwan and Brazil.

Faced with this dismal predicament, U.S. Steel's management is doing the only thing it can to restore the corporation to profitability. It is cutting losses by closing the most antiquated plants and hoping to use whatever profits can be earned by the remaining mills to finance

Alas, the company reckoned without U.S District Court Judge Thomas Lambros. Not only has Judge Lambros temporarily restrained U.S. Steel from shutting down its two mills in Youngstown, but he has also suggested that the corporation should be made to pay reparations to the community if the plants are ultimately closed.

Presumably the judge would not shrink from the responsibility of deciding how much U.S. Steel should cough up for the privilege of conducting its own affairs. Lambros acknowledged that such intervention by a federal court would be unusual. His honor was too modest. It would lack not only a precedent in law, but any jurisdictional basis in the U.S. Constitution

The judge handed down his restraining order in response to a plea by the United Steelworkers Union which has charged U.S. Steel with breaching a verbal commitment to employees to keep the Youngstown plants in question running.

The suit is to be heard later in March. Should the decision go against the company, it will almost certainly appeal

In the meantime, U.S. Steel might consider offering Judge Lambros a seat on the board of directors. If he is going to run the company, he should at least learn something about the steel business.

I propose to accomplish this spending cut not by a mindless across-the-board cuts in all programs but by submitting legislation to eliminate the CETA-program, housing subsidies, the Department of Education, the Department of Energy, the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Federal Trade Commission, and every regulatory agency established since 1960. Furthermore, I am calling for tax cuts equal to the cuts in Federal spending. I woke up.

What would happen if President Carter actually did this - would he be re-elected? I don't know the answer to that question but I do believe that intelligent political debate would follow from such an announcement. As it is now we are getting mindless rhetoric from all the candidates -Republican and Democrat alike.

That the Federal budget is out of control can hardly be doubted. The current budget (due to expire in September) is \$32 billion over its original projection. The 1981 budget makes no attempt to bring runaway programs under control and will probably miss the mark as badly as the 1980 budget. It is an inflationary budget at a time when the economy is on the path of an 18 percent inflation rate. The current deficit of \$40 billion is putting economic pressure on credit markets while the Federal Reserved is fighting to keep money supply growth under control. Clearly there is going to have to be substantial budget cutting combined with substantial tax cutting. There really are no other options.

But even as the candidates talk, without saying anything, new spending programs are being proposed. As reported in the Wall Street Journal, the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee just voted a, 25 percent increase in budgetary authority for next year: the subcommittee on aging demanded a 202 percent increase in its. programs and the Child and Human Development Committee demanded a 31.3 percent increase, just to mention a few. President Carter has called for a 24 percent increase in his housing assistance program on top of last year's 22 percent increase even though studies show that the housing built under this program cost 30 percent more than comparable housing. The list . could go on.

National debate on radical proposals is healthy and desperately needed. What candidate is prepared to state his position on the size of the budget, whether or not it should be balanced, what programs should be expanded, contracted, created or eliminated: whether or not taxes should be increased or decreased where or how?

While the economy is rapidly bleeding to death no one is really saying anything. Why do we stand for this?

It was first reported in Germany in 1956, but the first cases in this country were not diagnosed in the U.S. until the 1960s.

Victims of the Prader-Willi Syndrome will eat themselves to death if allowed to. They don't care what they eat, and have been known to gorge on rotten apples, sticks of butter. garbage and entire loaves of bread. They become extremely obese and literally eat themselves into an early grave because of their bizarre eating marathons.

A Prader-Willi child in a mental institution was caught in the kitchen finishing a three-gallon jar of jam. Later, to discourage her, an attendant laced one of the jars with a large amount of salt. The child disregarded the taste, and ate the whole jar anyhow, later dying from salt poisoning!

Bruins must stop Griffin to win

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - UCLA, the Cinderella surprise of the NCAA basketball tournament, has one All-American hurdle to clear before it can go to the ball: Darrell Griffith.

"Griffith is a super player, one you look to in games like this," said UCLA Coach Larry Brown, who sends his unranked but undaunted Bruins after the school's 11th national championship in tonight's NCAA final against No.2-rated Louisville.

"Griffith reminds me so much of David Thompson," added Brown, comparing Louisville's 6-foot-4 All-American to the star guard he coached in the pro ranks. "He's gonna score, I don't think anyone can stop him. But I hope he's gonna have to work for his points.'

The challenge of an opponent with an All-American in its lineup is nothing new for the Bruins, who have clawed their way from an 8-6 start to within one win of their first NCAA title since 1975, when they won the last of their 10 championships under Coach John Wooden.

They limited Player of the Year Mark Aguirre to 19 points on 8-for-18 shooting in beating top-ranked DePaul 77-71 in the West Regional, and they held 7-foot-1 center Joe Barry Carroll to 17 points and eight rebounds and forced him into six turnovers in defeating Purdue 67-62 Saturday in the semifinals.

Brown told a news conference Sunday that he was unsure who he'd match against Griffith in UCLA's aggressive man-to-man defense. "I wouldn't be surprised if everyone got a chance to play him," said UCLA's first-year coach.

Griffith was awesome in Louisville's 80-72 semifinal victory over Iowa in Saturday's opener, scoring 34 points on 14-for-21 shooting. He was equally effective inside and out, hitting high-arching jumpers from 20 feet and soaring over taller opponents with his 48-inch vertical jump to score from in close.

"You stop Darrell Griffith by getting two balls-and-chains and hooking them onto both legs, because I don't think one would be enough," suggested Iowa Coach Lute Olson. "He is one great player

How would Griffith guard Griffith?

"That's a tough one," replied the senior and team captain, who has dedicated this tournament to a boyhood friend, Jerry Stringer, who is stricken with cancer. "I guess I'd have to say don't let me get the ball, because once I get it, you've got to respect me.'

Griffith's play has earned more than respect. He's Louisville's atl-time leading scorer and a sure-fire pro first-round draft choice. "He's the best college player in the nation, and he's going to make some pro coach awfully happy," said Louisville Coach Denny Crum.

"If it were not for Darrell, we would not be here. We start three sophomores and a freshmen, but Darrell has been our stabilizer. He plays with so much confidence, it rubs off on everyone else "Everyone knows he can shoot and score, but he's also unselfish.

That's the mark of a great player."

UCLA starts 6-1 Rod Foster and 6-3 Michael Holton in the backcourt, with 6-7 Darren Daye in reserve. All three are freshman. Holton and Daye might take turns guarding Griffith, or 6-7 senior James Wilkes, a forward who is UCLA's top defensive player, may draw the assignment.

UCLA's scoring leader is Kiki Vandeweghe, who averaged 19.5 points per game during the regular season and had 24 in the victory over Purdue, including four clutch free throws in the final minute. "I wish Kiki would look in the mirror one day and see how talented he really is," Brown said of the 6-8 senior.

The Bruins' other starter is 6-6 sophomore Mike Sanders, whose insertion into the pivot slot in midseason was one of the keys to UCLA's turnaround. Since then the Bruins have won 14 of 17.

For Louisville, Griffith starts in the backcourt alongside sophomore playmaker Jerry Eaves. The forwards are a pair of sophomores. Derek Smith and Wiley Brown. Freshman Rodney McCray is the starting center. a job he's had since his brother Scooter was injured in the third game of the season.

This is Louisville's third trip to the Final Four in Crum's nine seasons, but it's first time as a finalist. Ironically, the Cardinals lost both previous times to UCLA - 96-77 in 1972 and 75-74 in overtime in

If UCLA, 22-9, wins, it will be the losingest champion in the NCAA's 42-year history, surpassing the 25-7 mark of the 1977 Marquette team. If Louisville, 32-3, wins, it will be the second winningest champion ever, behind only the 1948 Kentucky team that went 36-3.

UCLA, which finished fourth in the Pacific-10 Conference and got an NCAA bid only because the field was expanded to 48 teams this year and the rules changed to permit bids to more than two teams from a conference, has beaten Old Dominion, DePaul, Ohio State. Clemson and Purdue on the road to the final.

Louisville, which swept through the Metro Conference with a perfect 12-0 slate, received a first-round bye, posted overtime victories over Kansas State and Texas A&M and then beat Louisiana State and Iowa to gain the final.

Two Big Ten rivals. Purdue. 22-10, and Iowa, 23-9, will meet in the consolation game tonight before the title clash.

Westerners win JUCO crown

HUTCHINSON, Kan. (AP) - It was way back before Christmas that Western Texas won its first basketball game of the season. And it was Saturday night that the Westerners from Snyder won their last one with an 85-72 victory over Jefferson State of Alabama to

claim the Men's National Junior College Basketball Tournament. Western Texas, - which also won 35 games in between while losing none - rode 20 points from Greg Stewart and 19 from David Brown to lock up the national title.

For the third straight night, Western Texas found itself trailing in the first half, but behind the shooting of Stewart and Brown, the Westerners rallied to make Jefferson State their 37th victim in 37

Trailing at the half 38-31. Western Texas finally took the lead at

55-54 with about 81/2 minutes to go. But it was a technical foul on Jefferson State Coach Bill Lankford

that put the Westerners back in command. Western Texas was ahead by four points when Jefferson State guard MikeAnderson was called for a foul. Lankford protested, and

was whistled for a technical, sending Westerner guard Phil Spradling to the line to hit four straight free throws. Brown then scored a bucket, and the Westerners were coasting

again with a 10-point lead. Fred Freeman led Jefferson State with 24 points while Harvey Cr3ig had 16 as the Pioneers ended the season with a 24-10 mark. Tyler, Texas, got 18 points from Elton Webster and 14 from Virdell

Howland to beat Yavapai of Arizona 69-65 in the third-place game. In other losers bracket games Saturday, Three Rivers, Mo., edged Baltimore 57-56 for fifth place and Monroe of Rochester, N.Y., downed North Idaho 95-76 for seventh place.

Old Dominion romps past Tennessee, 68-53, to win AIAW cage championship

MOUNT PLEASANT, Mich. (AP) - Having won it three times on the floor and twice from the bench, you'd think Marianne Stanley might be a tiring of the national women's college basketball

No way, says the young coach who guided Old Dominion to its second straight Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women crown

"I've been here before as a player and a coach, but personally, it's a big thrill for me," the 25-year-old former Immaculata All American

So much so she plans to win it again next year. despite the loss of graduating stars Nancy Lieberman and Inge Nissen.

"We've got a great nucleus of players coming back," Stanley said following Old Dominion's 68-53 title romp over Tennessée. "We feel like we're going to be very good. We'd love to defend our championship.'






Exercise can slim your body and firm your sags. But few people lose weight from exercise alone. That's too difficult and time-consum-

To take off a pound of fat, you have to spend an extra 3,500 calories. That's a lot of exercise.

Consider that the strenuous butterfly stroke in swimming consumes only 12 calories a minute. To lose a pound of fat, you would have to swim the stroke for nearly five hours. Even advanced swimmers have difficulty swimming the butterfly for more than five minutes.

Dieting is far more effective than exercising for losing weight. For instance, you would lose a pound in seven weeks just by giving up your daily bottle of cola. The most effective way to

The truth is that as you use more calories, eat fewer calories or both, fat will be used up from your body's major fat depots, located primarily under your skin and in your abdomen. But your body determines from where it will take more fat and from where it will take less.

In general, women accumulate more fat on their breasts and below their waists than men, who have most of their fat above their waists. Fat usually comes off these major depots first.

But you can exert control over firming some areas of your body. You can, for instance, firm up your waist, arms and legs by exercise. That is because stressing your muscles causes them to grow, reducing the layers of fat directly over them.

If you are losing some fat by dieting, exercise will reduce fat in certain areas still more while firming up the skin and underlying muscles. The net effect is a slimmer waist or thinner

arms or legs.
The best firming exercises make the muscles repeat an action for a long period. Lots of sit-ups, for instance, will firm the abdominal muscles. So will lots of leg raises. So will jogging, since lifting the legs is involved.

But there is no magic. Men with "beer bellies" often note that there is little fat under the skin of their protuberance. Even after they jog or do sit-ups, their bellies are still

They don't realize that their fat is under their muscles, dispersed among the various organs in the abdomen. They can un-pot their bellies only by reducing their total body

You can assess the total fat on your body by simply hold-

ing up your arm and pinching the soft tissue that hangs from

the back of your upper arm. It should measure between ½

inch and 1 inch. Any thicker is

a sign of obesity.




