

# Senate overturns gas tax veto

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate, following the lead of the House, today overrode President Carter's veto and crushed his dime-a-gallon gasoline fee.

The vote was 68-10, well above the two-thirds majority needed to brush aside Carter's veto of a congressional measure repealing the fee.

\* It was the first time a Democratic-controlled Congress has failed to sustain a Democratic president's veto since Harry S. Truman was overidden in 1952.

Carter vetoed the bill Thursday, saying the fee was needed to help conserve imported petroleum. But two hours later and with no debate, the House voted, 335-34, to override the veto.

Today's Senate vote administered the final death blow. While either chamber of Congress can sustain a veto, two-third votes in both houses are needed to override one.

Arguing unsuccessfully for the veto to be sustained, Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., told the Senate that failure to reduce U.S. dependence on foreign oil only makes military action in the Persian Gulf region that much more likely

"We need to take some strong medicine and unfortunately this body is unwilling to do that," Hart said

But Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., denounced the fee as "bad economic policy and bad energy policy."

The Senate margin was narrower than the nearly 10-1 override vote in the House. The original Senate vote rejecting the fee and setting up the veto confrontation was 73-16.

As in the House, a large number of Democrats joined with Republicans to override the veto.

Carter cast 21 previous vetoes, all of which were sustained. Although no Democratic president had been overriden since 1952 Republican Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower, Richard M. Nixon and Gerald R. Ford had a total of 19 vetoes overidden.

Democrats have controlled both houses of Congress for the better part of the last 50 years. In his veto message Thursday, the president told

Congress that while he knew the fee was politically unpopular, members should rise above politics and let him impose it. He called the levy an important step in oil conservation, "good policy and good common sense.

His veto took two hours to reach the House and two minutes to discuss. "We've talked the matter to death," said Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, as the roll call was

Pampa man charged with rape of girl

Carter wanted the fee to help the nation begin withdrawing from its 8-million-barrel-a-day consumption of foreign oil. But opponents -Democrats as well as Republicans - called the fee a \$10.3 billion tax on drivers that would serve little purpose but to help balance the budget.

The president announced the fee last March 15 and it was to have gone into effect May 15. But a federal judge blocked it, saying Carter overstepped his authority in trying to place the levy on all gasoline instead of limiting it to oil imports.

The administration is appealing that order. However, an override of Carter's veto could make the outcome of that appeal a moot issue. It was not immediately known if government lawyers planned to pursue the appeal if the veto is overturned.

Carter reiterated his claim Thursday that he moved to impose the fee in part because congressional leaders urged him to do so last winter.

Without naming names, Carter lambasted "public officials" whom he said are unwilling "to face the political heat when the time comes to make a tough decision for the benefit of this country." He made the remarks to reporters in the Oval Office as he signed the veto message.

# **Increase of \$200 million** asked for Texas needy

AUSTIN. Texas (AP) - The Texas Department of Human Resources staff today recommended an increase in state spending on programs for the needy that would boost the budget by more than \$200 million a year.

Deputy commissioneer Wes Hjornevik told the three-man State Board of Human Resources the proposed budget includes an increase, from \$33 to \$44, in the basic monthly grant for Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

But, Hjornevik added, the department went through the "crucible" of a major staff reeduction when it lost more than 2,000 emeployeees in 1977-78, "so we can feel a little less guilty.

Hjornevik said the food stamp case load of 1 million people represents only a third of those who are eligible, and far fewer elderly persons receive food stamps than are legally entitled to them.

# Curve's neighbor heard bus's plunge

JASPER, Ark. (AP) - Lorene Fancher has lived near "Suicide Curve" for eight years and knows the screeching sounds of trucks plunging into the ravine below. But the bus accident that claimed 20 lives "was the biggest and longest crash of them all.

Federal officials were working today to determine what caused a chartered tour bus from Texas to leave a twisting mountain road in darkness and careen 50 feet down a steep, wooded ravine.

The accident was the worst in Arkansas history, said Maj. Buren Jackson of the state police. The bus driver and 19 of the 32 passengers were killed and the other 13 were injured.

Some relatives were asked to identify jewelry, rather than the bodies themselves, because the bodies were badly battered. Four of the victims were decapitated.

"It looks as though the brakes apparently had failed," said Capt. Billy Bob Davis, commander of the Arkansas State Police at Harrison, a town of 9,000 20 miles north of the ravine.

Ross Goodwin, vice president of Central Texas Buslines Inc., which owned the bus, said the bus's brakes had been checked last week. He declined further comment

Newton County Sheriff Ray Watkins and Coroner C.J. Easley said it appeared the driver of the bus may have tried to use the ravine as a braking mechanism. They speculated Jimmy Thigpen had given up his life in an effort to save others.

"I tell you one thing, he was one hell of a bus driver," Easley told the Dallas Morning News. "He laid that bus in on an embankment to stop it. He eased it in there on an angle, not straight on. If he hadn't done that, all of them would have been killed.

The twist in the road, known to people in this town of 400 as "Suicide Curve," has been the scene of numerous past accidents. The crash of the bus occurred just past the point where a 1,000-foot escape lane is currently under construction

Patches of the highway bear deep grooves that produce vibrations and warn motorists of the curves in

two-lane Arkansas 7, which winds through the Ozark Mountains.

Passengers said they remembered hearing "a grinding noise" or "the bus hitting some rough places" before the crash

Davis said the bus traveled along a shallow ditch, then hit a culvert and plunged down the embankment, cutting through trees like a bulldozer.

"We were all praying and some of us must have been crying because we were so scared," said Jessie Morgan, 67, of Irving, Texas. She suffered broken ribs and cuts when she was thrown two seats forward.

"I was stuck between the seats. I caught a hand that was just swinging there ... Oh, it was so dark.'

At least four bodies were found on the highway. The passenger list had indicated 34 people were aboard the bus. However, authorities later determined that one of those listed, Enola Sheeley, injured her toe just before the trip and stayed in Dallas.

"I sure thank the Lord I wasn't on the bus," she said.

# Statewide jewelry ring cracked by investigators

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Robbery investigators say they have uncovered a statewide jewelry store hold-up ring that netted over \$1 million in five recent robberies.

Police say the ring also is under investigation in connection with a slaying during a Del Rio robbery.

Three of five alleged members of the ring have been charged in the May 30 robbery of Leutwyler Jewelers here, but only two have been arrested, officers said

Investigators say the ring was involved in robberies in Houston, San Antonio, Corpus Christi and Shreveport, La.

"They hit some places for gold, some places for diamonds, some places for rings and some places for wrist watches," said Lt. Olan Kelley

"It was lke somebody was shopping," added Sgt. David Neely, who led the investigation

Kelley said investigators are trying to determine how the ringleader could convert stolen jewelry and gold into cash so quickly

"He could do it just like that," Kelley said, snapping two fingers.

The first arrests were made when police caught two men hiding in the trunk of a Mercedes Benz parked two blocks from Leutwyler's after the robbery. An estimated \$200,000 in unmounted diamonds were recovered.

Police turned two .357 Magnum revolvers over to the Department of Public Safety for ballistics tests to determine whether one of them fired four shots that killed Del Rio shopkeeper Joe Keller on May 24.

Charged in the Leutwyler robbery are Norbert Ding Jr., 21, of Houston; Norman Wade Dozier, 21, of Houston; and Richard M. Avery, 30, of Houston. Avery remains at large.

"They just swooped on him," she said.

Tony's, a favorite gathering place for Houston's exclusive River Oaks crowd, was immediately swamped with requests for reservations as soon as Mrs. Mesinger announced the party three weeks ago.

One Houston publicist called it "Travolta mania.

Outside Houston's Gaylynn theater Thursday night, hundreds of spectators watched the steady stream of limousines arrive for the premiere.

Travolta's car arrived just minutes before the film started and was immediately surrounded by reporters, photographers and some screaming fans.





# Olympic agony nothing new

In recent months attention was focused on the United States Olympic Committee, as people around the world waited to see if it would send a team to Moscow. Now that it has decided in the negative, attention has become divided as the world wonders what London, Tokyo, Bonn, Paris, etc. will do, and whether the International Olympic Committee will change the ground rules on national identification of participants.

The decision of the various national Olympic Committees will, without a doubt, be of great importance, just as the USOC's was. One can only hope they will be as courageous. The problem is, these individual national decisions should not have to be made, and would not have to made, if the International Olympic Committee had acted virtuously in the first

The IOC claims it can do nothing; its

Dear Reich Chancellor Hitler: I have been mandated by the governing

body of the International Olympic Committee to transmit to you the following resolution "Whereas, the German Reich repeatedly has violated various international accords.

and 'Whereas the German army, in a particularly flagrant violation of such accords, has marched into the Rhineland, 'The International Olympic Committee is compelled by principles superior to its charter, indeed principles on which that charter is based, (a) to inform the German Reich that the International Olympic

Committee views the above mentioned violations with alarm, and (b) deems itself to be under no obligation to uphold its end of agreements contracted with a national whose actions so clearly demonstrate that it holds international agreements to be of little or no worth

"Therefore, if the German armed forces are not withdrawn from the Rhineland within one week of the date of the letter of transmittal of this resolution, the International Olympic Committee will (a) sume that the German Reich considers all international agreements made with it to be non-binding, and (b) transfer the site of the 1936 Olympics to another, more suitable country.

We await your response to this resolution.

We need not concern ourselves with the remaining details of this letter, since it was never written. The 1936 Olympics were held in Munich; and the Wehrmacht was not

Let's give marriage an income-tax break

The 1980 Census is expected to confirm that couples in increasing numbers are living together without getting married. This apparently results from a complex of forces - changing moral values, new social attitudes, and economic pressures among them. It turns out that some couples are consulting not only their consciences but the tax accountants before making the decision.

For many years the tax laws conspired on the side of matrimony. Two people both paying income tax could save money by getting married. But in sympathy for single persons who felt cheated, Congress rejiggered the tax rules in 1969. The result was like trying to fix a wobbly table and sawing off too much of one leg. Now the tilt is toward staying single

The House Ways and Means Committee has several proposals before it for changing the law covering joint returns to eliminate the present tax penalty when a husband and wife are both working. The trouble is, the government would lose anywhere from \$3 billion to \$10 billion a year in revenue, depending on which plan is adopted. And the committee is taking a dim view of any "tax cuts" at a time when Congress is trying to balance the budget.

Perpetuating inequities in the tax system for the sake of a balanced budget is a poor philosophy. If members of Congress are worried that this reform would cause a budget deficit, they can keep their consciences clear by pairing it with spending cuts to make up the difference

The number of couples living together outside of marriage in America is believed to have doubled in the last decade. The implications for the family structure in our society are troubling. Whatever it all means, the government should not be aiding and abetting the trend with a "marriage penalty" in its tax structure.

While we approve heartily of the use of newspapers as a tool for learning in the various educational institutions, we object to the newspapers' turning to the state for funding for such a program.

Such a wedding of state and press can mean only an irreversible step into the foggy abyss of socialism by one of the last stalwart guardsmen of man's right to speak out.

Let us elaborate:

Newspapers in Education is a worthy concept. News - current events - in print can make a long-lasting impression on students, and the variety and detail found in newspapers can help the pupil grasp the total significance in what is happening in the world today tomorrow's history, the true story of our times. In addition such a program attracts young readers to the nwspapers, an important plus for the publishing business.

The foremost newspapers of Texas are members of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association. The association has formed a relationship with education coordinators to the extent that the Texas Daily Newspaper Association-Newspapers in Education (TDNA-NIE) committee a short time ago began work in submitting a proposal to the State Board of Education for state funding for placing newspapers in the classrooms.

Some federal funds are available in a few special cases for newspaper purchase by schools, and in view of this limited source. apparently the TDNA-NIE has considered for some time a goal of state funding of NIE copies. A TDNA official said the other day that "we are now optimistic that the State Board of Education will at least hear our proposal

The official said two major points TDNA will make to the state board will be that reliable research can document the effectiveness of NIE, and the recent switch in textbook rotation from five to eight years necessitates that current supplemental material be used in classrooms.

The TDNA proposal calls for state funds to be appropriated so that every high school in Texas will be eligible to receive funding for 25 newspapaers every school day.

The cost would be \$542.062.50 a year, based on 10 cents a copy. That is a small amount for which the Texas press would sell its soul.

It comes as a shock to us that the state's daily newspapers would ask the state for any money. We would like to point out first that this would be a matter of newspapers' seeking to gain at the taxpayer's expense. no matter how well intended the proposal as it relates to futhering the education of the state's young people.

It also is a matter of paradox. It may already have been forgotten by many, but only a short time ago the newspapers won a victory in this state for freedom of the press in the elimination of the sales tax on newspapers. What is going on is one-way - not right-way - thinking.

We cannot approve of the state's funding a NIE program as a joint venture of the Texas newspaper industry and the State Board of Education. What concerns us most is that the matter ever came up in the first place, and it is very disconcerting that it has gone as far as it has

We understand that the TDNA proposal would be complete for submission to the state board by mid-July. We hope that on the way to Austin the proponents are detoured to a stop at a Fourth of July celebration and take time to think of the American freedoms the observance spells out and of the principle they are discarding as they court the state for its hand that clutches the tax money.

## California's crucial Chicanos

LOS ANGELES (NEA)-Polls here show that the June 3 primary race between of bilingual education, the issue that is President Carter and Sen. Edward perhaps most important to Hispanics here. California has bilingual education in his "balanced" fiscal no bigger voting bloc than its 1981 budget while cutting back on many

Hispanic-Americans, so both Democratic candidates are going all out to woo them. There are almost 1 million Hispanics registered to vote in the state out of a total registration of a little more than 10 million. Since most of them are Democrats, their influence on the Democratic Party and its primary is even greater. If either candidate could sweep the Chicano vote, he would have nearly half of California's votes at the Democratic Convention.

The problem in the Carter-Kennedy race, however, is that both have substantial Mexican-American support.

What kennedy has going for him first and foremost is his name. It is almost impossible to overstate the importance of the Kennedy family in Hispanic politics.

Like the Kennedys, most Hispanics are Roman Catholics. They considered John Kennedy, the only Roman Catholic president, to be one of their own. Robert Kennedy was further revered for his civil-rights stands and particularly for his considerable efforts for farm workers.

Teddy Kennedy is the heir to this legacy. Many Chicanos write to Kennedy with their problems before even thinking of writing to their own congressmen. To them, Kennedy is their senator

On the other side, Carter can point to his record.

He has appointed a number of Hispanics to high administration posts. Many of them have recently been stumping the state on the president's behalf. They include Esteban Torres, former head of the East Los Angeles Community Union, who is Carter's special assistant for Hispanic affairs, and Rick Hernandez, a Texan, who is deputy assistant for White House

Carter can also point to the drop in Hispanic unemployment from 12 percent when he took office to less than 9 percent before the recession caused it to turn up again. The administration has poured millions of dollars into Hispanic community organizations and programs away, was moving toward them now screaming now -- "Stop it I say! I'll call the police!" They stopped singing.

Kennedy scored an upset in the April 12 Arizona district caucuses thanks mainly to Chicano support. But he was unable to repeat that feat in the May 3 Texas primary. To a great extent, the campaign is one of

endorsements. Both candidates have their share. Kennedy's leading Hispanic spokesman is State Sen. Art Torres, perhaps the most important Chicano politician in the state. Carter's leading Hispanic spokesman is David Lizarraga. current head of the East Los Angeles Community Union and a major figure in the California Democratic Party.

As the California campaign enters its final days, the Hispanic vote appears still up for grabs. One private poll shows that both candidates have a solid base of about 30 percent with the remaining 40 percent undecided.

The winner may well be the candidate who can sway those voters in the final days before the primary. This would seem to give the edge to Kennedy, who will be spending considerable time in the barrios while Carter relies on a media camp (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Attorney General Mark White has escalated the fight over which state agency helps district attorneys with tough cases by saying the Texas Prosecutors Council must get his permission each time it wants to hire an outside lawyer.

White issued his legal opinion Thursday to Comptroller Bob Bullock, who has been sitting on the council's voucher to pay Houston lawyer Robert Sussman to prosecute a white collar crime case in Belton

The attorney general later said in an interview, however, he would rant permission for Sussman to stay on the case, clearing the way for Bullock to pay Sussman's \$1,400 fee.

The opinion was the newest development in a flap that began when Gov. Bill Clements started phasing out White's criminal justice grant for aid to rural prosecutors.

Clements said White's program had not been effective. He designated the council to furnish help sought by district attorneys. Funds for both White's program and the council's come from

federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration money granted by Clements through his Criminal Justice Division.

The council hired Sussman to prosecute a complicated white collar crime case against Herbert Hargett in Belton. When the council presented a voucher for Sussman's fee, Bullock questioned its egality and requested White's opinion.

Last week, the council asked the Texas Supreme Court to order Bullock to pay Sussman, but the court said it would not consider the case until Bullock actually refused payment.

White's opinion said the General Appropriations Act forbids state agencies to hire outside lawyers unless the attorney general certifies he cannot provide the services requested.

"Before the Texas Prosecutors Coordinating Council may spend appropriated funds to hire an outside attorney to assist a district attorney in prosecution of a caase, it must request the attorney general to perform the services and receive his certification that he is unable to do so," the opinion said.

White said in an interview, however, Sussman could stay on the Hargett case, which is scheduled for trial June 16.

We are going to send a letter over authorizing the retention of this lawyer for this job. ... This lawyer has done the work on this case, and I want it to be abundantly clear that I am not in a turf fight. ... This is an important case," White said.

White's opinion did not address the council's claim that Sussman's services are "technical assistance" which the council could provide without any need for White's clearance. But White rejected that argument in strong terms during the interview. 'Technical assistance - that's the same kind of talk you get from

the Russians. You call something anything but what it is," he said. The attorney general's decision to certify that Sussman may

remain on the case apparently removes for the time being any likelihood of court action to test his opinion.

# **Conservationist blasts** Parks and Wildlife group

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission seems more interested in exploiting the state's environment than protecting it, according to a conservationist leader.

Ned Fritz, chairman of the Texas Committee on Natural Resources, was backed by leaders of several other environmental groups Thursday as he assailed the commission in a news conference at commission headquarters.

"I am more concerned about the chairman (Perry Bass of Fort Worth) than any other member," Fritz said.

He said he twice had been denied a position on the commission's agenda to address his complaints to the six commissioners face to

Fritz was finally allowed to speak to the commission after a day-long meeting that ended about 6 p.m.







# Actor predicts dim TV future

**Of The Pampa News** James Drury, well-known from the popular TV series, "The Virginian," plans to stay as far away from television as he possibly can.

"What's on now, in my opinion, is trash," says the actor, who was in Pampa Wednesday. "It's not worth watching, and if it's not worth watching, it's not worth

He's quick to say he's not criticizing the actors, just the material. As he puts it, "It stinks," and he sees no indication that the major networks will change their strategy in the fight for ratings.

Drury, who's preparing for a month's run of "The Rainmaker" at the Country Squire Dinner Theater in Amarillo, has turned down four TV series offers and starred in one since the cancellation of "The Virginian" in 1970. "It was a terrible thing called "Firehouse" and lasted a total of 13 weeks," he says. "I hope nobody saw it." Not unlike others in his profession, Drury

has sworn off appearing on television until the quality improves. And as he says, there's no indication that that will ever happen

"I see cable TV coming along and thing." explains Drury. "People will be able to enjoy quality with their hard-earned money. I think it will be the salvation of the industry.'

That's when the actor says he'll get back into television, when they start making worthwhile things of quality.

Drury, who lives in Houston, portrayed the Shiloh Ranch foreman for nine years on television. Since 1970, he's performed across the country, in theaters ranging from 3800-capacity to 200-seat houses. Also involved in the movie business, he's hoping to begin production this fall on a new film called "Crater County Wars"

"It's a modern-day action-adventure picture involving the drug traffic across the border in the Rio Grande Valley," says the actor, who says the film will cost about \$6 million, a small sum compared to many being produced today.

Drury, an Oregon native, got his acting start at the age of 8, when he played King Herod in a children's biblical play at the Greenwich Settlement House in New York. "They clapped and I was astonished," he remembers.

He's been acting ever since, he says, and providing a renaissance, providing a fine is involved in the oil and insurance business on the side

> "The Rainmaker" role is one Drury has played before. About the script, he says, 'It's a very fine classic romantic comedy - it's very, very funny and very, very romantic.

"It's the story of a young lady who thinks she's going to be an old maid who blossoms into full womanhood during the course of the play," says Drury, "and a gentle Irish con man and dreamer who makes good. He says he can make rain and he finally does."

The rainmaker, Bill Starbuck, is Drury's role. The part of the young woman, Lizzie Curry, is played by Dorothy McDonald; Don Wyse is cast as her father. The three-act play opens Tuesday and runs through July 12.

Drury recently returned to Oregon to celebrate his mother's 85th birthday - and had a little trouble getting back to Texas. "The mountain (St. Helens) blew up and they closed the Salem airport," he says. "I had to take the train from Salem to Oakland, then a plane from San Francisco to Denver and then on to Houston. It took us three days to get home.'

My first husband never complained, so I never thought anything about it until I met this man.


Can a problem like this be solved at my age? (I am 60.) I really love this man and want to be a complete woman for

## **Religion roundup**

NEW YORK (AP) - Although some organizations in the United States claim it's necessary to smuggle Bibles into the Soviet orbit, the president of the Bible Society in communist-ruled Poland, Mrs. Barbar Enholc-Narzynska says:

"We send thousands of Polish Scriptures to many other countries and Bible societies. The highest number goes to America, where the Polish population is still great."

She told the American Bible Society's annual luncheon meeting that the number of New Testaments distributed in Poland last year nearly doubled, climbing from 22,000 to 40,000, and that total Scripture distribution, including Scrpture portions, New Testaments and complete Bibles, totalled 160,000.

She said more than 7 million Scriptures have been distributed in Poland since World War II.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Baptist theologian Carl F.H. Henry told a briefing for the National Association of Evangelicals that when it comes to politics, evangelicals usually focus on the wrong things.

"We have a history of rallying to single issues or personalities, and our track record is that of ignoring principles, programs and party involvement," he said. "We are intellectally lazy and give no guidelines for Christian philosophy when our nation is in crisis.

NEW YORK (AP) - The Central Conference of American Rabbis, representing 1,300 Reform rabbis, has protested legislation in Israel which transfered authority for determining which rabbis may perform Jewish marriages to the Chief Rabbinate of Othodox Judaism

Noting the authority formerly was held by the Israeli Ministry of Religion, the executive board of the Reform rabbinical organization urged repeal of the change and called for recognition in Israel of equal rights for all branches of Judaism.

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) - The Lutheran World Federation's commission on world service said at its annual meeting it plans to allocate up to \$3.5 million this year to help restore stable life in long-embattled Zimbabwe, which recently attained its independence.

NOTRE DAME, Ind. (AP) - A group of U.S. and Canadian Roman Catholic bishops are to meet at the University of Notre Dame June 15-18 to examine family life issues, prior to an international Synod of **Bishops** in Rome this fall.

Participants in the Notre Dame preparatory sessions will include 0 bishop - five from the U.S. and five from Canada - plus two uperior generals of men's religious orders, all of whom have been named delegates to the synod of about 200 Cathholic leaders from wound the world convening in Rome Sept. 26.

Others attending the closed sessions at Notre Dame will be bishops armed as alternate delegates to the Rome meeting and various pecialists to examine current issues of marriage and family life.

# Court refuses to halt probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today refused to halt alifornia's investigation into alleged fraud by some leaders of the 'orldwide Church of God.

The justices, handing the church a major defeat in its institutional showdown with the state, turned away arguments that e investigation is trampling religious freedom.

The church and its leaders now face complying with state court ders to surrender numerous documents or being held in contempt. The punishment for such contempt could be fines or jail ser r the church leaders and default in the state's civil suit against the urch Numerous religious and civil rights organizations rallied behind e Worldwide Church and urged the justices to hear its appeal. Founded in California 47 years ago and now claiming some 70,000 embers, the Worldwide Church is led by 87-year-old Herbert W. mstrong. Court documents show that the church receives some \$70 million in ember donations each year. California Attorney General George ukmeijan alleges that church leaders have diverted and siphoned money from member contributions for their own enrichment. The controversy began in January 1979 when Deukmeijan asked a te court to place the church into receivership while his office restigated complaints lodged by six church members against mstrong, who lives in Tucson, Ariz., and others. according to Deukmejian, he took the action "to protect the assets the church, its Ambassador College and church-related bassador International Cultural Foundation from fraudulent sappropriation for the private benefit of persons in control."

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Lamar Case, car salesman, reckons he should be on television. "The Tonight Show," perhaps, or at least "Merv Griffin."

Why Lamar?

"I am unique unto this world, or at least, this country," Lamar replies. "I don't have a theory as to who shot J.R. Ewing on 'Dallas." Johnny and Merv have had less qualified guests. Still, Lamar would have to be taken at his word, and it's hard to believe there is really anyone without a theory on the shooting of J.R. Ewing.

A rerun of "Dallas" finished No. 3 in the ratings last week suggesting that viewers are poring over old episodes for clues to the crime, which occurred in the season's final episode.

At this very moment, "Dallas" producer Leonard Katzman is in Texas. preparing for next season. On Wednesday, shooting begins. Extra caution will be used to keep the cat in the bag through the summer.

Katzman, of course, knows who plugged J.R., the dastardly villain-hero of the CBS' Texas soap. Since Ladbrokes, the British betting house, began taking bets on the culprit, Katzman has received a number of interesting business propositions.

The long-awaited 40-page order ruled against a challenge to the act lodged by Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana, Wyoming and an independent gas producer who claimed the act robbed states of their power to

regulate in-state trade. The order has national impact in that it underlines the authority of Congress under the Commerce Clause

of the Consitution to regulate the intrastate natural gas market just as it controls price ceilings of natural gas sold between states.

But U.S. District Judge **Ralph Thompson indicated** he based his decision not on the wisdom of the act itself, but on Congress' legislative authority under the Constitution to reach inside a state to govern trade.

President Carter pushed Congress in 1978 at a time whem gas supplies in the large gas-producing states was plentiful, but widespread shortages were prevalent elsewhere in the

nation The government argued the formerly unregulated producing states were able to secure "the lion's share" of new gas supplies by offering producers higher prices than they could get in the regulated insterstate

market. The act erases such distinctions by setting uniform price ceilings throughout the nation. Congress had the right to regulate intrastate markets because they ultimately affect commerce between states. Thompson ruled. The states argued Congress was usurping state

sovereignty with the threatened result that the economies of Sun Belt states would be tossed into chaos.

The states, joined by the president of Marlin Oil Co., of Oklahoma City, and the Washington D.C. Legal Foundation Inc., alleged the result of the act would do the opposite of what Congress may have intended.

They argued intrastate regulation will jeopardize "an adequate supply of energy for all citizens of this country" because it fails to give producers price incentives for future exploration.

# Gas discovery Oregon's larges

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - A new gas deposit found near Mist i northwestern Oregon might become the largest find in the field s far, officials of Northwest Natural Gas Co. said Wednesday night.

The stepout well, one-half mile southeast of the 10th and last we dug in the area, tested at 6 million cubic feet per day through a 916 c an inch pipe.

A company spokesman said the flow probably will be much greate through a larger pipeline. It became the sixth productive well completed in the Mist fiel

since May 1979 by Northwest Natural Gas and its partner: Reichhold Energy Corp. of Tacoma, Wash., and Diamond Shamroc Corp. of Dallas, Texas.

About 13 million cubic feet of natural gas per day is being pumpe from four of the six productive wells.





# **CBS-TV to carry Belmont Stakes**

CBS, the beneficiary of ABC's lead-in coverage of the Kentucky Derby and Preakness, gets to finish the Triple Crown story Saturday when Genuine Risk and Codex renew their rivalry in the Belmont Stakes.

Genuine Risk won the Derby while Codex was not entered. Then Codex was first across the wire in the Preakness but had to withstand a foul claim for bumping the filly. The incident, labeled a mugging by backers of Genuine Risk but considered a mere love tap by Codex's supporters, serves to build interest and excitement for CBS' Belmont.

"Everybody wants to know what's going to happen when the two race again," said Mike Pearl, producer of the telecast.

And if Genuine Risk and Codex decide to dance cheek to cheek again. Pearl can air the exact videotapes the Belmont stewards used to rule on any foul claims.

The New York Racing Association has a sophisticated closed-circuit TV operation at Belmont. Cameras are stationed at five strategic points around the track. The stewards, in constant communication to the production truck, can get tape replayed from the camera with the best view of any incident.

"Once the stewards release the tape to the public, we can feed them right on the air," said Pearl. Even if CBS' cameras had a better view of any possible foul, it's good that TV viewers can see exactly what the stewards saw in reaching a decision

With post time scheduled for 5:38 p.m. EDT,

this could mean an extension beyond the 6 p.m. scheduled signoff. Pearl doesn't have the final decision on a runover, but he says: "If there is an inquiry, the stewards' tapes would be shown on CBS. I would ask to stay on the air until the full story is explained."

Pearl also said a shot of a possible photo finish, like the one in last month's Metropolitan Handicap at Belmont, could be shown as soon as it's released by the stewards.

The tapes used by the Pimlico stewards in ruling on the May 17 Preakness foul claim were not available to ABC right after the race but were seen on "Wide World of Sports" one week later.

ABC's own cameras at the Preakness showed Codex racing wide and moving into Genuine Risk, but that was only a side angle. A head-on camera, which would have provided the best view of any contact, was not possible since the horses were approaching the turn for the homestretch and were not in the stretch itself.

"When I saw it happening, I said I wouldn't be surprised if the stewards flashed the inquiry sign," said Bob Fishman, who will be directing the 12 cameras for CBS' Belmont broadcast. "But when I watched the straight replay, I thought it was no worse than something I've seen at Belmont or Aqueduct many times. I agreed with the stewards that the horse's number shouldn't have come down."

Fishman says the use of slow-motion on ABC's replay provides a distorted picture and is not valid. "Slow-motion makes things much worse than they are," he said. "You begin to see different things because slow-motion plays tricks on you.'







# Howe was hockey's Dimaggio

**AP Sports Writer** The hockey odyssey of Gordie Howe, an incredible journey through five decades of greatness, has come to an end. At age 52, the quintessential iceman has announced his retirement

Hockey will never forget him.

Howe was the greatest scorer in the history of the sport, with more goals, more assists and more points than any man who has ever played this game. But that simple sentence doesn't begin to scratch the surface of the man. He played for an unbelievable 32 years, so longevity alone would give him the opportunity to score more goals than anyone else. The goals are only part of the Howe saga, though.

Perhaps the best way to describe his impact on his sport would be to compare him with his contemporaries. If Maurice Richard was hockey's Babe Ruth, the explosive home run hitter, then Gordie Howe was the game's Joe DiMaggio, a man of consummate skills on skates.

Howe came to the National Hockey League with Detroit in 1946 when Harry Truman was president of the United States. That's seven presidents ago, if you've lost count. With the Red Wings for 25 magnificent years, he carved a legend for himself as the ultimate hockey player.

Howe could skate. Oh, how he could skate. He accelerated instantly, zooming after the puck sometimes, it seemed, from a standing start.

And Howe could shoot. He frowned on those booming, banana blade slap shots that fly off in all directions. Rather, Howe used a deadly wrist shot. He would snap his powerful wrists and the puck would zip toward the net. Give him a open corner, even for an instant, and he'd fire away.

Howe did everything on ice that a hockey player must do and he did most of those things with a special flare that set him apart from other players.

In 1971, Detroit thought a quarter century of hockey was enough to ask from this legend and retired him gracefully. But the sedentary life didn't satisfy him and two years later he was back on the ice with the Houston Aeros of the World Hockey Association. The lure was the chance to play the game with his sons. Mark and Marty, a rather unique accomplishment in any sport.

Later, he moved on to New England and was with the Whalers when they moved into the NHL last winter as the Hartford franchise. It was a special treat for NHL fans, one more chance to see a Hall of Famer play the game the way it was meant to be played.

Howe is a grandfather now and it's time to write finis to his legend as an active player. The final figures, including both NHL and WHA regular season and playoff production read 1,071 goals, 1,518 assists and 2,589 points. They are numbers that will never be matched.

There's just one more thing. Has anybody ever played hockey with his grandsons?




