## Back - to - school promotions will test economy of nation

HOUSTON (AP)—Edward F. Gibbons, chief executive officer of F.W. Woolworth Co., believes retail merchants will get a preview of things to come when the back-to-school sales begin in August. Gibbons, talking with newsmen before speaking to Woolworth shareholders in Houston, said August "would be a clinical test of the economy, how much consumers have to spend, how much they will spend for the children's clothes and shoes and other things." And, he said, Christmas sales also will be a barometer. "We are being careful about our inventory level, but the shelves won't be bare. You can never tell about the American consumer. They may say things have been so tough, lets have a good Christmas anyway." The Woolworth chairman predicted Thursday the current recession would continue through this year and probably into the first months of 1981. He said "There is something unusual about this recession, and that this is an election year. There are devices in Washington available to make the recession easier and shorter, such as tax reductions, and that could happen."

"Another difference in this recession as to the one in 1974-1975 is that it is geographical. In the Midwest, because of the auto industry layoffs, sales have fallen flat. In other sections sales seem to be going along as usual." Hardest hit, Gibbons said, have been the sales of furniture, rugs, appliances. He explained, "with the home mortgage money dried-up, people were not moving, as they had in the past, from the two-bedroom to the three-bedroom homes. So the sales of home furnishings plunged." Despite the cloud of recession, Gibbons said the company would open 10 J. Brannam stores, a name-brand outlet of Woolworth, in Houston on the same day in August. "We think this is sound business now," Gibbons said, "because the people of Houston are the type who want style, want name-brands, but because of the recession will be shopping for bargains." The chairman said that Christmas also "will be August and December."

## Workers in demand: recruiters wooing grads

WORCESTER, Mass. (AP)—Earlier this year, prospective employers visited Raymond Cronin on the campus of Worcester Polytechnic Institute. In all, representatives of 21 companies gave Cronin the grand tour of New York and Massachusetts firms, and flew him to Houston, Cleveland, Detroit and Santa Clara, Calif. The 22-year-old senior from Scituate, Mass., who was still months away from his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering when the wooing began, settled on a job with a California company at a salary "somewhere over \$21,000 a year."

"I didn't think it would go as well as it did," he said, "but once I saw the need for engineers, I got to expect it." At a time when economic indicators point to recession, engineers, programmers and computer technicians are in demand. The boom in the high technology industry has made them the sellers in a sellers' market and has forced companies to use new recruiting tactics. Many companies have abandoned traditional want ads in favor of television commercials, open houses, and lucrative bonuses to draft college graduates and lure help from other companies. "When there was no response to its want ads, ASA Inc., a Boston software firm, offered free Bermuda vacations to those joining the company. The same deal was available to employees who recruited friends. ASA got eight new programmers." Companies like Wang Laboratories and Data General offer workers "bounties" of \$200 to \$300 if they bring people into the company. Wang is considering an in-company campaign exhorting employees to "Turn in Your Friends." Advanced Micro Devices, a Sunnyvale, Calif., semiconductor manufacturer spent over \$200,000 on a "Catch the Wave" recruitment program that carried the message on billboards, television and radio and national magazines. Texas Instruments personnel officers invade cities rich in engineering talent for "hire-ins," held at local hotels and advertised on local television. "It became apparent two years ago that our normal means of recruitment was not working," said Ed Haynes, a TI employment manager. Haynes, whose Dallas office sports the sign "Recession? Hell no! We're too busy!" leads teams to cities as far away as Boston in search of new talent. Such promotions cost about \$70,000 each, but they get results. "We used to take out an ad in a city, put a personnel guy and two engineers in a hotel and wait for the phone to ring," said Haynes. "We'd get 15 or 20 people and wind up hiring one or two for \$15,000. Now we talk to 300 people." Wang Laboratories turned over recruitment to its marketing department. "Everybody hires through want ads," says Ted Leonsis, Wang's public relations manager. "We thought we could get more people through marketing-oriented ads." Recruiters are turning to the Madison Avenue approach because of the sharp competition among employers. "There is just a finite number of people out there that are trained," says John Custy, a Wang personnel officer. "If you're good, you have no problem picking your own company." What caused the shortage? Haynes blames universities for not counseling students on the realities of the job market. "You can sit in the lobby of

## Republicans study issues

HOUSTON — Resolutions on the 17 topics selected for presentation to the state Republican convention Saturday are expected to include statements against the windfall profits tax and favoring right-to-life stands. The state Resolutions Committee narrowed the number of topics Thursday and briefly discussed most of them before splitting into smaller groups to write the resolutions. Committee members will vote on the completed resolutions today before presenting them to the convention's permanent committee Saturday. Energy and national defense generated the most interest among committee members Thursday. Most spoke in favor of a statement condemning the windfall profits tax and some favored statements supporting abolition of the Department of Energy. The 17 topics selected for resolutions include agriculture, Equal Rights Amendment, balance federal budget, busing, federal judges, energy, mandatory health insurance, right to life, reduction of taxes and reduction of bureaucracy.

Also included are right to bear arms, right to work, silent prayer in schools, national defense, the traditional family, education and Workfare, a coined word stipulating no welfare without work. Among the topics rejected by the committee were illegal aliens, limiting terms of elected office and establishing guidelines for selection of a vice-presidential nominee. Members turned down the nominee guidelines by a slim margin. That resolution stated that any present or past member of Congress considered for Ronald Reagan's running mate have at least a 75 percent conservative voting rating. Tennessee Sen. Howard Baker and Former CIA director George Bush both maintained more moderate voting records in their latest terms of elected office and would have been eliminated from consideration under that resolution. A total of 1,419 resolutions covering 120 subjects were introduced at the county level. If the 17 resolutions decided by the committee are passed by the convention Saturday, they will be presented next month at the national Republican convention in Detroit.

## Demo convention begins

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Texas Democrats begin their state convention today with lines already drawn between backers of President Jimmy Carter and Sen. Edward Kennedy. The first official session was scheduled tonight with proceeding continuing through Saturday. Preliminary committee meetings and caucuses began Thursday. Carter's forces held an easy majority but Kennedy's supporters promised loud and long opposition to retain as much power as possible in the national convention delegation and in state party control. A key figure in the struggle was State Democratic Chairman Billy

Goldberg, an avowed Carter supporter who recently led a group of other state chairmen in urging Kennedy to drop out of the presidential race. Goldberg, a wealthy Houston businessman and chief backer of former Attorney General John Hill in an unsuccessful 1978 gubernatorial campaign, reportedly wants a convention appointment to the Democratic National Committee, plus a hand in running the Texas delegation at the New York convention Aug. 11-14. "If Billy Goldberg will be floor fight," said Louise Caddell, San Antonio member and a prominent Kennedy campaign organizer.

## Oilman plans tribute to buffalo

ABILENE (AP) — Oilman Jack Grimm has spent part of his millions searching for the sunken Titanic and the Loch Ness monster. Now the Abilene millionaire plans to carve a monument to the buffalo atop a 500-foot-tall mesa on his ranch about 15 miles south of here and, appropriately, near the community of Buffalo Gap. New York sculptor Robert Berks will engrave a series of pictures 2,000 feet long and 40 feet high portraying the creature's history. The stone carving will be the largest in the world — four to five times the width of Mt. Rushmore, Grimm said Thursday. Grimm said the project would take about five years to complete, and estimated it would cost \$2 million to \$3 million. "I've been looking at that mountain for a long time, and I just thought there should be something up there," Grimm said. "The settlement of West Texas is closely linked with the life and death of the buffalo," he told a luncheon group at the Petroleum Club. "Our story will be engraved into the cap rock, which has not changed for 80 million years. It will endure as the Pyramids have endured, and it will hand our story down through the millennia." "It will make Abilene the center for the new culture, which is the Sunbelt," Berks said. "The future of our country lies in the Sunbelt. As Florence attracted the greatest artists of

the Renaissance, so should Abilene attract the artists of the new culture. This is my hope." Berks said the engravings would start out with a large herd of buffalo and then would show Indians, hunters, and pioneers, and finally a desert scene strewn with buffalo bones and two lone buffalo.

## New bill could release 'captive coal shippers'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas congressmen are promising a push on behalf of the so-called "captive shipper" when the railroad deregulation bill comes up on the House floor.

"The bill in present form would enable a monopolistic railroad to continue raising freight rates on coal," Rep. J.J. Pickle, a Democrat from Austin, said Thursday.

"I am not opposed to wholesale deregulation of railroads," he said in a statement. "But we should not rush pell-mell into accepting (the bill) without some changes."

"Deregulation is to promote competition, and if a monopoly exists deregulation simply opens the door to exploitation," Rep. Phil Gramm, a Democrat from College Station, said at a news conference.

Pickle was one of 19 Texas congressmen who signed a letter to President Carter endorsing an amendment by Rep. Bob Eckhardt, a Democrat from Houston.

The letter to Carter noted that the increasing cost of rail freight rates for coal threatens the national energy policy of converting from oil and gas to coal.

The Eckhardt amendment would set a more lenient guideline, after deregulation, for allowing the Interstate Commerce Commission to examine a railroad rate case if rail transportation is the only method available for shipping a commodity.

"The energy inflation embodied in this bill places an unnecessary burden on coal use and thus on utility consumers and dampens efforts toward coal conversion," the letter said.

Eckhardt and other Texas congressmen fear that

"We would hope that you would support our effort to make these needed changes in the bill looking toward a balanced and effective rail deregulation policy," it said.

## Cubans in El Paso uncooperative

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Cuban refugees, apparently irritated by hot weather and lack of second helpings at dinner, instigated a "ruckus" at the processing center here Thursday night, Immigration and Naturalization officials said.

The Cubans "immediately settled down and became very docile and quiet," he said.

No one was injured in the disturbance, but "15 or 16" refugees were tagged as instigators and separated from the other Cubans, said Mike Trominski, senior district INS officer in charge.

"It was a ruckus, not a riot," he said. "There was no physical violence, no physical contact with officers."

He also said 11 refugees would be flown to Atlanta today or Saturday, but that he did not know whether the 11 were involved in the uprising.

Trominski said the Border Patrol officers carried riot gear but no guns.

They were being shipped to Atlanta because of their "moral turpitude," INS officials said.

The refugees apparently were upset because they "had no second and thirds in the chow line" and because a water fountain did not emit cold water, he said, adding the hot weather probably contributed to their irritation.

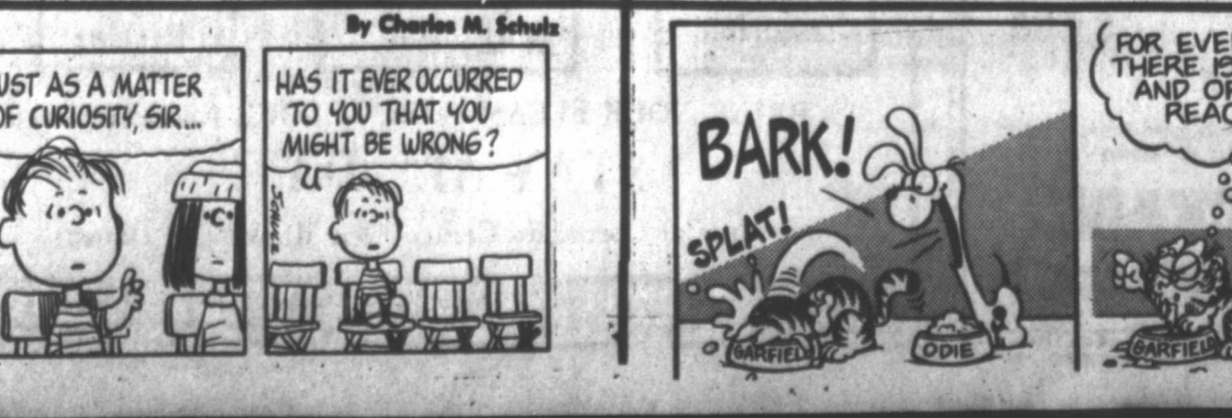
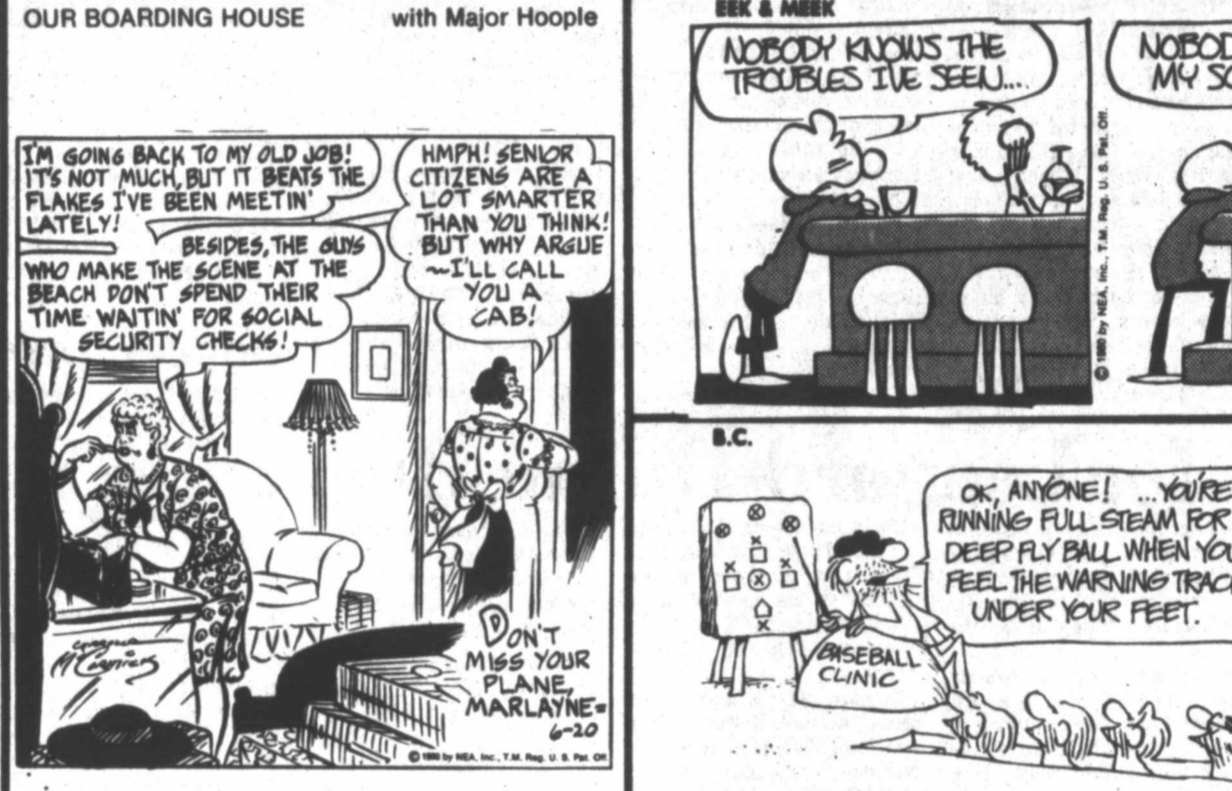

PITTS PRAISES BENTSON
DALLAS (AP) — President L. Frank Pitts of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association said Thursday Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's proposal to exempt royalty owners from the Windfall Profits Tax "is right on target."

"We appreciate your concern for the hundreds of thousands of Texas royalty owners whose income has been drastically reduced by what in reality is an excise tax on Texas mineral rights," Pitts said in a letter to Bentsen.

"These hearings will provide hundreds of affected royalty owners who could not travel to Washington, such as retired couples and small farmers and ranchers, the opportunity to express to the committee the hardships placed on them by the tax," said Pitts.

SUSPENDED JUDGE GETS SUSPENDED SENTENCE
EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Suspended Municipal Judge Glen Sutherland has received a suspended one-year sentence on an income tax conviction.

Sutherland also was placed on probation for three years. Sutherland was convicted of failure to file returns on \$46,000 earned in 1976 and 1977.

A conviction on a traffic ticket fixing charge is being appealed by Sutherland. He was sentenced in April to two years in prison on the ticket fixing conviction.

REFUGEE SLASHES WRISTS
EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A Cuban refugee who cut his wrists with a piece of metal this week was reported in good condition Thursday.

Pedro Herrera Gutierrez, one of 60 refugees detained at El Paso's Immigration and Naturalization Service processing center, had been separated from the other Cubans, according to acting INS District Director Pete Reyes.

Reyes said other prisoners did not want Herrera in their area at the detention center. Reyes said Herrera gave no explanation for his behavior.

COUPLE HELD IN BABY PROBE
JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) — Juarez police say they are holding an El Paso couple who allegedly purchased newborn Mexican babies for sale to childless persons in the United States.

Juarez Police Chief Refugio Ruvalcaba says the man arrested admitted his activities when he was questioned following a traffic accident. The chief said officers found \$7,400 in cash in the couple's vehicle.

Ruvalcaba says the man and his wife told him they purchased babies from a doctor who operates a maternity clinic in Torreon, in the interior of Mexico.

MOTHER OF EIGHT MAKES ONLY ONE 'B'
AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Eleanor Foley, a mother of eight who just graduated from St. Edward's University with straight A's, says she made a B in college 25 years ago in Marriage and Family Living, and added:

"After eight children, I think that should be looked over again." Prior to resuming her education at St. Edward's New College, Mrs. Foley had completed 45 semester hours of college.

She received 21 hours of credit for her work as manager of a greenhouse business and Sunday school teacher and 15 hours credit

on advance placement tests in American literature, American history and Human Growth and Development classes.

CLARK PAPERS DONATED TO UT
AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court papers of the late Tom C. Clark have been donated to the University of Texas by Clark's family.

Clark was appointed to the court by President Harry Truman and served as an associate justice from 1949 to 1967. He died in 1977.

THE MID EAST WAY OF OIL CONSERVATION
AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A former executive of the Kuwait Oil Co. said Thursday Middle Eastern oil-producing countries are determined to conserve oil by keeping production down.

Mansour Abu Khamseen told a seminar at the University of Texas OPEC — Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries — members are aware that as the rate of production rises, the rate of recovery declines.

"A textbook case of oil depletion is the saga of Spindletop," near Beaumont, Khamseen said. He predicted less and less OPEC oil will be on the market in the future.

News Glances
Rome (AP) — President Carter and his aides are minimizing their differences with allies over Soviet aggression as they begin a week of talks in Europe.

During the long flight from Washington that brought Carter to this ancient capital late Thursday night, Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie told reporters that he believed one potential point of major friction with West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt will evaporate.

Israelis Seize Guerrilla Suspect in Lebanon
TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli troops crossed into southern Lebanon, took a suspected Palestinian guerrilla "for questioning" and blew up a house used as a guerrilla army, an Israeli army spokesman said today.

Congress may move to shore up Social Security System.
WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress will move quickly to shore up the financially fragile Social Security system and make sure that retirement benefits continue to be paid on time, the chairman of a key House subcommittee promises.

The system's trustees, in their annual report to Congress on Thursday, said the Old Age and Survivors trust fund, which paid out almost three-quarters of the \$124.9 billion in Social Security benefits in 1979, could run out of money in late 1981 or early 1982 unless it can borrow from the Disability Insurance and Medicaid funds.

Under adverse economic circumstances, they said, the three funds together might not have enough money to pay benefits on time beginning in 1983.

\$20 billion program for synthetic fuel
WASHINGTON (AP) — Seven years after the Arab oil embargo, the United States has taken the first big step toward energy independence, say supporters of a massive energy bill now heading for final congressional approval.

### Farm scene

WASHINGTON (AP) — A buildup in the world's oilseed supply appears to be continuing with little sign of leveling off soon, meaning a possibility of a further price crunch for U.S. soybean farmers if they bring in another bumper crop this year.

The Agriculture Department said Wednesday that world production of oilseeds — mainly soybeans but also including a variety of other crops — in 1979-80 now is estimated at 177.5 million metric tons.

That is a decline in prospects from a month ago primarily because of "lower soybean estimates for Argentina and Brazil," two leading competitors of American soybean farmers in the world market.

But the report added: "The growth in world consumption of oilseed products is slowing, and 1979-80 use is not expected to absorb the estimated output.

"As a result, carryover stocks of both oilseeds and oilseed products are expected to rise substantially this year. Much of the ... buildup will be in U.S. soybeans, cottonseed, sunflowerseed and soybean oil.

"Canadian rapeseed and Brazilian soybean and soybean oil stocks are also likely to expand."

A metric ton is about 2,205 pounds and is equal to 36.7 bushels of soybeans.

The record U.S. soybean

harvest last year — part of the 1979-80 world production total — was about 61.7 million metric tons, or more than 65 percent of the world output of 94.5 million tons.

All told, as an illustration of the impact of U.S. soybeans, the crop accounted for about 41 percent of all oilseed produced in the world in 1979-80, according to the report's figures.

"It is still too early to predict 1980-81 oilseed output reliably," it said. "However, an analysis of U.S. planting intentions and probable yields, combined with trend projection of the foreign oilseeds crop, implies a 1980-81 harvest somewhat below the unprecedented 1979-80 level.

Thus, the report added, world production of oilseeds in the year ahead could range between 162 million and 178 million metric tons, depending on actual plantings and weather conditions.

According to recent USDA calculations, American farmers may average about \$6.10 a bushel for last year's soybean harvest, an average based on prices over the entire 12-month marketing year that will end on Aug. 31. That compares with \$6.66 a bushel in 1978-79.

The price outlook — as well as production — is extremely fuzzy for the coming year, but USDA analysts currently are projecting soybean prices at the farm in 1980-81 at between \$5.75 and \$7 a bushel.

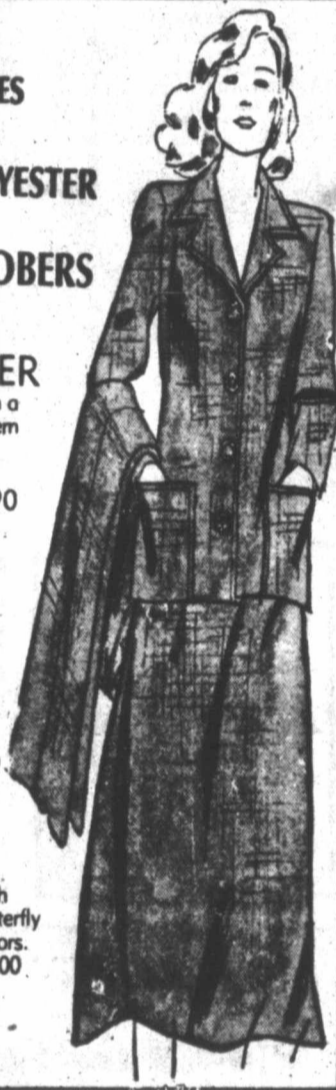

NEW YORK (AP) — Mary Crosby says her decision to live with a man before marriage would have caused her father great pain had he lived. But she says she wishes Bing Crosby was alive to share her happiness now.

In a copyright interview in the July issue of McCall's magazine, the 20-year-old daughter of the late crooner said Crosby once "painted himself into a corner" in telling an interviewer he would disown his daughter if she ever made such a decision.

"I'm grateful that I never had to use one of Daddy's greatest lessons to me — that there is a time to be selfish — in a way that would have hurt him, hurt us both, in those last years of his life," said Miss Crosby, who is now married and a member of CBS-TV's "Dallas" cast.

eventually won out over his anger."

Miss Duncan, whose matinee performance Wednesday marked her 321st show in the starring role, told the Daily News she doesn't know if she'll be back after her upcoming honeymoon with dancer Don Correia.

"They want me to tour with the show or even do it at the Palladium in London," she was quoted as saying. "Both ideas intrigue me, especially London."

"But this has been a long run and while I love doing the show, the flying sequences take a lot out of you. It's hard on my back, although I see a chiropractor regularly."

A show press agent said Miss Duncan, who has lasted longer in the part than Mary Martin in 1954, has flown 45.7 miles in the show.

### Corporate taxes may increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee is proposing raising taxes by \$4.2 billion — primarily on large corporations — as its chief contribution to the beleaguered drive to balance the 1981 budget.

Meanwhile, the House seemed to shed its recent rhetoric about budget restraint Wednesday as it expanded from \$15 billion to \$16.5 billion an emergency spending bill needed to keep some federal programs solvent.

The package includes money for refugee-aid, disaster relief, black-lung benefits to disabled coal miners and a special federal unemployment fund that went broke earlier this month.

The House hoped to complete action on the spending bill today and send it to the Senate.
