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## Progress: Muleshoe's Newest Asset

### Continuous Growth With Construction

Progress, by building and remodeling, is taking all the spotlight in the Muleshoe area at the present time. With the City of Muleshoe in an extensive building program at this time and many local businesses either in new construction or remodeling programs, "Progress" is truly the watchword in the area.

Last September a bond issue in excess of \$800,000 was voted on and passed in the area for various improvements in Muleshoe. First on the list was \$365,000 and an additional \$50,000 Waterworks Revenues Bonds and Pledging the Revenues of the City's Combined Waterworks and Sanitary System to the Payment thereof for improvements to the water and sewer systems of the City of Muleshoe.

Another area covered in the issue was \$40,000 for street improvements. Sixty-five thousand was voted for sewer improvements and \$90,000 for park and recreation improvements.

The final four items on the bond ballot were \$105,000 for a new city hall; \$60,000 for a community center; \$40,000 for a new library and \$20,000 for a fire station building.

Since the citizens of Muleshoe expressed their approval of the entire issue and also voted to construct a new law enforcement center, action has been constant in Muleshoe.

Construction on the city-county law enforcement center is well underway, perhaps running slightly ahead of schedule because of good weather in the area. A lot was obtained for the new library and application made for matching federal funds for the building.

Such work has been done on the existing streets and preliminary plans have been made for the new proposed Muleshoe Park, which tentatively will be located between ninth and seventeenth streets and from Avenue D South. Students from the architect department at Texas Tech-Cont'd, on Page 3, Col. 7

## Implement Company Starts New Building

Whitt, Watts and Rempe, local implement dealer, will start construction Monday, April 7, on a new building which will nearly double the size of their present building.

A & B Construction Co., Lubbock, will begin construction on a steel building which will be located in the 1400 block of West American Blvd.

Completion date on the new structure is expected to be around the first of August. Presently, Whitt, Watts and Rempe has 3,000 square feet. The new building will be 15,000 square feet and will include sales area, parts storage and parts office, business offices and a larger service department. Costing in excess of \$60,000, the new building will be of steel construction with volcanic rock trim in front. It will have central heating and evaporative coolers. The doors in the service department will be of fiberglass. The floors in the parts and office areas will be of vinyl asbestos and the ceiling will be of acoustical tile.

Roy Whitt has been with the company since 1954 when he bought out F.H. (Short) Davis who had been a partner of Jack Lenderson. Whitt then bought Lenderson's interest in the company in 1964. F.W. Watts bought a part interest in the company in 1967, at which time the company name was changed from Whitt and Watts to Whitt, Watts and Rempe.

## An Easter Message

Easter really comes to the one whose heart is in tune to receive the message from God. We have no record that Easter came to Pilate, Caiaphas, or any of the mob which shouted "Crucify Him, Crucify Him!" just a couple of days before the resurrection of Jesus from the grave.

Easter has many meanings in the culture of our times. Spring is here, plant life begins its apparent new year of life, determining of fashions in clothing, the Easter Bunny makes its appearance, eggs are dyed many colors and hunted by children, and many others can be listed.

Unless one has really considered the events leading up to Easter, I doubt if one can really understand the full meaning which the resurrection holds for him. The events of the last week seem incredible to us today. Palm Sunday-Triumphant entry into Jerusalem with the multitude proclaiming Him as the Messiah; cleansing of the House of Worship; Extra-ordinary teaching regarding true obedience of teachings of Jesus; Judas turning traitor; Last supper in the Upper Room; Garden of Gethsemane's agony of Jesus, yet his commitment to serve the will of God; arrest of Jesus; Mockery of a trial with multitude crying "Crucify Him!" instead of Hailing Him as Messiah; Pilate's sentence; crucifixion on Calvary, taking Him from the cross and the placing of the body in a borrowed tomb; the apparent end of Jesus of Nazareth; discouraged and defeated disciples and friends of Jesus. Then, early on the first day of the week as some of the close friends of Jesus approached the tomb only to discover He was not there for He had risen.

Throughout the Biblical record, only a few really knew the resurrected Jesus; hence really understanding the real significance of Easter. Easter is simply taken for granted by many in the world today. To the Christian, however, it is the greatest event of all time. In Christ's resurrection is the assurance, beyond any shadow of a doubt, that all of the promises that God made to man are true. Easter is the time for all mankind to sing praises unto God and for Christians to deepen their dedication unto God.

## New Church To Be Located At 16th and D

E.T. Ford has been awarded a contract to build a new Church of Christ at 16th and Ave. D. Construction will begin this week on the new church which will be 40 x 80 feet and will be of red brick veneer built on laminated arches.

The auditorium will have seating capacity of 206 and included will be a study and nursery. Features will be a colonial-type structure of red brick with white colonial columns. Furniture in the new church will be appropriate to carry out the colonial theme.

Tentative completion date is 150 days after construction of the above \$40,000 church begins this week.

## County Agent At Tulia Pecan Course

County Agent J.K. Adams was in Tulia Wednesday to attend a Texas A & M short course on "Pecan Culture; Including Budding and Grafting."

The course was given by Dr. Powell on J.H. Adams' farm, six miles south of Tulia. J.H. Adams is the father of J.K. Adams.

Dr. Powell spoke on the nature of pollination, Western Sly, Wichita and Mohawk breeds of pecans and stressed they are the three types of pecan to attempt to grow on the South Plains this far north.

He said because of the nature of pollination, Western Sly and Wichita need to be grown together for proper pollination. Four rows of Wichita for each row of Western Sly make a good combination stressed Dr. Powell as the Wichita is the best marketing pecan. All pecans should be treated when the leaves are one - third grown said the A & M specialist. Five percent zinc sulfate should be mixed with 10 gallons of water to prevent pecan rosette.

## Pete Guinn Is Injured In Vietnam

PFC Pete Guinn, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Guinn, Muleshoe, received severe injuries to his right leg near Da Nang, in Vietnam, on March 3.

First surgery on his leg to repair the wound was in Quang Tre, after he was removed from the battle scene by medic helicopter. From Quang Tre, he was taken to the USS Repose and moved to San Francisco, then to Corpus Christi on Monday to the Naval Hospital there. Monday, skin grafting was done at the Naval Hospital on his lower right leg.

Guinn, who graduated from Muleshoe High School in May, 1968, joined the 2nd Battalion, 3rd Division of the United States Marines in June, 1968 and underwent basic training in San Diego. He had been in Vietnam for about two months before he was shot.

We wish to thank those who came in during the "Garden Fair". To go into the history of the garden fair is to go back some three years when the effort was made to interest people in gardening. Not only the old timers who are more or less familiar with climatic conditions but the new comers as well. The purpose of the garden fair is to meet, compare new ideas, swap some of the old methods, or see the new items that go to make gardening more enjoyable, convenient, or otherwise more profitable. The thought that a person gardened last year so thereby that qualifies him as an expert is quite wrong. To meet and discuss some of methods practices, and material that one person has used successfully and then to pattern from that and adapt it to our own situations.

Luther Burbank devoted most of his lifetime to the plant world. Undoubtedly he realized that he could learn considerable that had not been thought of. There is always a challenge, as well as some disappointment, in the world of plants. Nature, by necessity, has become a rather ruthless proving ground and only the better adapted can survive. Ruthless, maybe-effective, very!

We often wonder why we do this and that and the other that we think is entirely proper for the plants and then have them die or not do as well as we would like. If the plants could talk they could tell us some of the things that we do not know about the general well being that they need to survive. If plants could talk some would still have to talk very plain and maybe in some language like English for a lot of us to understand. There are so many varied factors that enter into the things that a plant has to put up with and the methods that we have of measuring them are so inadequate that it is a wonder we get along with plants as well as we do. As one example, how do we explain the difference of fruit trees losing the fruit at our temperature reading of 29 when it is very dry and still the same fruit will stand our measure of 26 degrees when the air is moist or saturated with moisture.

To sum it up we might say there is still considerable to be learned.

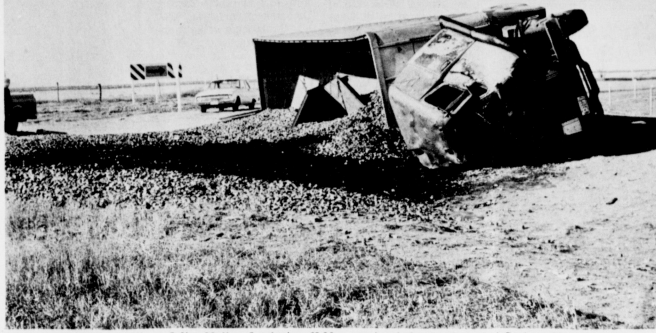
A spokesman for the group organizing the appreciation night said, "The right of people to be safe in their lives and property is one of the principal purposes of government.

TO COOK AN EASTER TURKEY

More and more turkey is being used on the Easter table. Large size turkeys, 18 or more pounds, usually cost less per pound and provide more meat in proportion to bone.

If turkey is on your menu, follow the directions for cooking on the package and check for doneness during the last hour of roasting.

Without a thermometer, use the pinch test. Protect the fingers with a paper towel or cloth and pinch the thickest part of the thigh.

OLD-FASHIONED BREAD STUFFING 1 qt. diced celery 1 c. finely chopped onion 1 c. butter or margarine 4 qts. bread cubes and crumbs (use cornbread generously, mix with 2 1/2 day old bread)

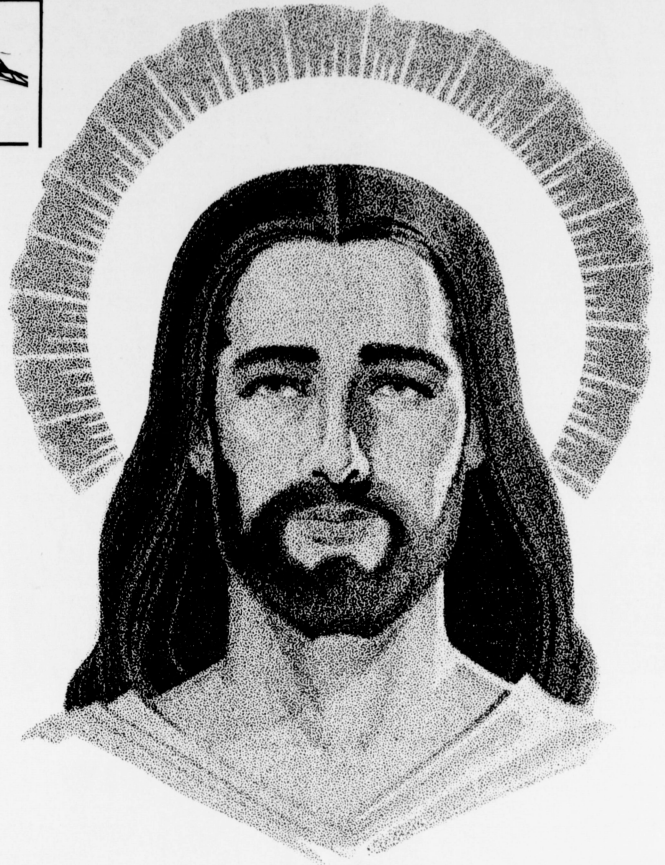

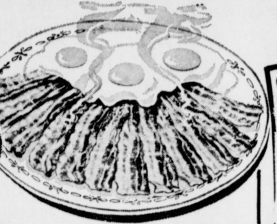
