HOUSTON FAT STOCK SHOW



Looks like the State Legislature has picked themselves a fight. Senator Jack Ogg has offered a bill which calls for a presidential primary in March of 1980, followed by the regular party primaries in May. His opinion is supported by Bill Hobby and Bill Clayton-pretty powerful folks to have on your side. But the Demo-

crat and Republican party leaders in the great state of Texas are of a different mind. They feel the presidential primaries should be held on the very same day as the regular primaries—for two very good reasons. One—the cost of split primaries would be unreasonable and extravagant. Two—the we akening of party purity would be devastating. Then there are also a couple of devious reasons for the same date.

As everyone knows, the Republican presidential field of aspirants has grown to an unwieldy number. Especially in Texas does it look like a real cat fight. We are going to have Texas' old favorite, Ronald Reagan. Then we'll have Big John Connally who'll drawfrom both parties. And Texan by choice, George Bush who will poll the come lately Ivy Leaguers in the state. It adds up to a plus for Republicans. And

it is easy to understand why they would prefer a single primary date. Just think of the conservative Demos who will sneak over with the elephants in order to vote for their friend John. Course that will mean the defeat of all conservatives running for all other offices on the Democrat ticket. There is nothin' wrong with that only if the Republicans have sense enough to field a full slate of qualified candidates on their ticket.

The Democrates say they are for the single slate in order to preserve party purity. Ok-but they have a lot more confidence in their party than I do. Poor kids-they are really between a rock and a hard place. A single date will siphon off former Democrat strength. A split date will dilute party interest.

I can surely understand those who prefer the split idea. If I were a Democrat, I wouldn't want the term "presidential primary" mentioned. Just look at their choices--J.E. Carter, Theodore Kennedy, and Jerry Brown. It would make it much less embarassing for all concerned if they split the datesallowed cross over voting from one primary to the other. For example, you could vote for Connally in March and Phil Gramm in May--and then in November, you could even vote for Jim Collins over that Bentsen fellow.

Yes, I see the dilemma. But me, I'm for the single date. If the Democrats don't have an attractive slate, then they'll just have to live with it. That's party politics.

How do you feel about it?

Tax Law

Dallas, Texas -- A relatively new tax law allows taxpayers who have sold property after October 31, 1978 to keep an extra ten percent of the gain. The Revenue Act of 1978 has increased the exclusion for long term capital gains to 60 per cent on all sales or exchanges after October 31, 1978. Sales and exchanges on or before this date still get the old 50 percent exclusion. The 60 percent deduction also applies to install-ment payments received on or after November 1, 1978, no matter when the actual sale took place.

Taxpayers who had taxable transactions both before and after the cutoff date must combine all transactions to find their actual, reportable capital gains. Part III, Schedule D (1040) should be used to figure capital gains.

The new rates of exclusion for capital gains and other recent changes in the tax law are covered in IRS Publication 553, "Highlights of 1978 Changes in the Tax Law," available from most IRS offices.

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Americans "eat smart" to alleviate existing health problems or to avoid potential ones.

These were reasons expressed by consumers--interviewed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture--for altering, or planning to alter, their food buying habits.

Higher income households and highly educated homemakers were more concerned with changing eating patterns than respondents from smaller households, older, poorer, and less educated people.

HEALTH PROBLEMS
Health problems listed as concerns include: Overweight, high blood pressure (hyper-

high blood pressure (hypertension), allergies, heart disease, kidney problems and diabetes.

DIET CHANGES

Consumers reporting diet changes were avoiding such foods as sweets and snacks, fried foods, fatty red meat, ice cream and soft drinks.

Leading additions to diets were low-fat milk and cheese, lean red meat, fish, fresh fruits and vegetables, poultry, and broiled and baked foods.

Diet conscious consumers sought to cut down on items high in sugar, saturated fats and oils, and in many cases, calories.

READ LABELS

In order to learn what to include and what to leave out of the diet, consumers are reading labels more closely as their main means of determining whether or not a product contains whatever they should add or delete from their diet.

Many respondents said they read labels in attempting to prevent potential health problems.

The extensive labeling now offered for nutritional contents and ingredients are making this easier.

OTHER FACTORS

Other factors changing the food consumption patterns include changes in prices, incomes, household size and age structure of the population.

More salad vegetables and increasing sales of dietetic soft drinks are part of the picture.

The shift to low-fat milk is another.








SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (SBA)

The deadline for filing an application for SBA assistance for 1978 losses has been extended to April 5,1979, for physical damages and July 6, 1979 for economi injury.

WHEAT, FEED GRAIN, AND COTTON SIGN-UP GETS UNDERWAY

The Borden County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), began accepting applications for the 1979 wheat, feed grain, and cotton program on February 15. Participation thus far has been light, but greater activity is expected during the next few weeks.

Program participation is voluntary. However, farmers with set-aside crops of barley, corn, grain sorghum, or wheat must file their intentions to participate during the signup period to be eligible for deficiency and disaster payment protection, for these crops, as well as upland cotton, and be eligible for price support loans on all crops.

All producers planting wheat and/or feed grains for harvest in 1979 on farms with a normal

crop acreage are eligible to participate.

Participating farmers agree to take out of production one acre for every ten planted in 1979 to corn and sorghum and two acres for every ten planted to wheat and barley for grain. Corn and grain sorghum voluntary diversion payments may be earned when farmers sign up to take an additional acre out of production for every ten acres planted.

Farmers who may be undecided about the program or have questions are encouraged to contact the ASCS Office or one of the ASC committee persons for more information.

SPECIAL GRAZING AND HAY PROGRAM PROPOSED FOR 1979-CROP WHEAT

Under the proposal, farmers would be allowed to graze cattle or cut hay on wheat acreage equal to a maximum of 40 percent of their total intended plantings of wheat, feed grains and upland cotton or 50 acres, whichever is larger. Wheat that was grazed or cut for hay would qualify for the same deficiency payment rate as wheat harvested as grain. The deficiency payment rate will be computed in December.

The deficiency payment rate is the difference between the established target price and the higher of either the national average market price during the first five months of the marketing year, or the national loan rate. For 1979, the target price is \$3.40 per bushel, the national loan rate is \$2.35 per bushel and the first five months of the marketing year are June through November.

ALIENS MUST REPORT FARMLAND OWNERSHIP

Aliens who own or have a 5 percent interest in farmland in Borden County must report ownership at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office (ASCS) ASCS county offices across the Nation have the job of keeping track of how much farmland is owned or controlled by foreign individuals or interests.

The reporting requirement stems from the Agriculture Foreign Investment Disclosure Act of 1978. Aliens, foreign governments, or foreign interests who owned land on Feb. 1, 1979, must report ownership by August 1, 1979. Those acquiring land after Feb. 1, 1979, must report the transfer within 90 days. Fairlure to report could result in a fine up to 25 percent of the property's fair market value.

Interest, means any right title, or legal share or ownership in farmland, such as partnership, trusts, estates, or shares in a corporation that owns farmland.

Often, a farm operator, real estate dealer, bank, attorney, holding company, or other institution will report in behalf of foreign clients, Individuals or companies that specialize in land holding, land transfers, or management services should contact the local ASCS office for details.

COTTON MARKET PRICE CANCELS OUT *DEFICIENCY PAYMENTS

Upland cotton growers received an average market price of 55.1 cents per pound in calendar year 1978. Since this price is above the 1978 target price of 52.0 cents apound, no deficiency payments will be made.

Under the program, deficiency payments are made to farmers when the national weighted average price received by farmers for upland cotton during the calendar year is less than the established target price.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or Nat-



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
