


How Will They Get Out---

Former Gail Pastor Dies

Services for the Rev. J. Roy Haynes, 71, of Ackerly were held Monday at 10 a.m. at First Baptist Church in Ackerly with the Rev. Jim Mosley, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Monroe Peters, pastor of First Baptist Church in Coahoma.

Burial was in Trinity Memorial Park in Big Spring under the direction of Nalley-Pickle Funeral Home.

Rev. Haynes died at 6 a.m. Friday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after an illness of several months.

The Eastland County native married Pauline Steel Dec. 19 1930 at Rising Star. He was ordained a minister at the First Baptist Church of Rising Star June 19, 1940 and graduated from Howard Payne College in Brownwood.

His first pastorate was in Eastland County at Sabanno Union and Hodnett Grove Baptist Churches. He also has pastored at Blanton and Valley View Baptist Churches near Ballinger, Loco Hills, N.M., First Baptist Church of Ackerly, Woodrow Baptist Church near Lubbock, Westside Baptist Church near Lamesa, Lakeview Baptist Church in Howard County, First Baptist Church in Ira and Gail.

He retired from pastoring full time in 1971, but served as interim pastor of First Baptist Church in Gail form 1973 to 1978. The Rev. and Mrs. Haynes lived in Lake Thomas from 1973 to 1978 before returning to Ackerly in January 1978.

Survivors include his wife; a son, the Rev. James D. Haynes of Fort Worth; two daughters, Lenelle Simpson of Hobbs, N.M. and Jeanie Porter of Lovington, N.M.; two sisters, Allie Steele of Bryan and Betsy Smith of Rising Star; and eight grandchildren.

Borden Well Logs Strong **Oil, Gas Flow**

A major flowing discovery oil well has been completed in Northeast **Borden County by Pioneer** Production Corp. of Midland.

It is the No. 1-414 Davenport, located some 12 miles northeast of Gail. Completed from the Strawn formation it logged a daily potential flow of 1,369 barrels of oil and 700,000 cubic feet of gas on test between 7,889 and 7,900 feet.

The total depth was reported as 8,460 feet and 4½-inch casing was set on bottom.


Crusade Begins





The smartest thing Gerald Ford has ever said was, 'Carter Must Go'. That conclusion doesn't sound like it comes from a man who has bumped his head too many times, now does it? Ford said several more things at a fund raising dinner that sounded as if he was in complete control of his faculties. In fact he presented a program that he would use should he become a candidate for president of US. He took off the gloves and stated that it was time for the Republicans to speak out---to refuse Carter's cry for unity and a moratorium on discussion of our foreign policy until the hostages are released. Well, it is about time. What we the voters need to know is what these various aspirants for the presidency would DO as president of US. What we don't need is a group of attractive, qualified men wasting their time and our money cutting each other up.

Ford is to be commended also for his promise to support the Republican candidate (even should he be Ronald Reagan). He hit the issues, refused to criticize his fellow Republicans, and said what has not been said---we have to get rid of Carter. In his insistance that a Republican can and must be elected, he just almost announced his own candidacy.Mr.Ford believes he is electable---the only one who can beat Jimmy the candidate. There is where the rub comes. He is saying what should be said, but how come he wasn't willing to slug it out along with the pack of pachyderms? And what makes him think he is anymore electable against Carter in 1980 than he was in 1976?

Sorry---but I don't buy it. It is my opinion that Gerald Ford and his advisors simply can't bear for Ronald Reagan to be



president or even be the candidate for president. He has proven he can do that much---wrest a nomination from a man who went into the convention with the most delegates. And isn't it also peculiar that John Sears has cropped up in Ford's camp? If you remember, many people attributed Reagan's defeat at the convention to Sear. Some even said Sears was for the other side. In which case, maybe he has now surfaced.

Still another reason for Ford's latent move could be Bush's popularity wane. The two, Ford and Bush, belong to the same clubs--CFR and Trilateral Commission. PROVEN YIELDS

Producers will have 15 days from the date the yield notices, ASCS-476, are mailed to request a proven yield for each feed grain and wheat, and 30 additional days to furnish production data when a appeal is filed. This time limit for furnishing production data is set so that all yields may be processed by or soon after the end of signup.

If you had acreage of the crop in at least one of the three preceding years, you could benefit by bringing this data to the county office. The rules for proven yields have been changed and you could probably increase your yield with the one year's production.

Producers will be required to report production data for each year that the yield is proven.


The Borden County EMT's had their regular monthly meeting on Monday March 3, 1980, at 7:00 pm.



AUSTIN—Flooding is a massive problem which affects all Texans. Many Texans have been forced to rebuild their material assets time and time again because of flood devastation.

In this age of modern technology, all Texans should be able to live in any city without fear of losing their homes and automobiles to flood waters. To help achieve this goal, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and I have appointed a Regional Citizens Task Force on Flooding which has already begun its work.

The committee, chaired by Senator Gene Jones and Rep. Bill Caraway of Houston, is composed of 31 elected officials, civic leaders, private citizens and drainage experts from Harris, Galveston, Brazoria, Fort Bend and Montgomery

counties. Its purpose is to examine the flooding problems in Houston in hopes of finding solutions of benefit to the entire State of Texas. The possibility of creating a single regional flood authority for these five counties has been widely discussed. If accepted by the committee and the 67th Texas Legislature, this authority would have the necessary jurisdiction to coordinate a flood abatement

program in Houston. Creating a regional flood authority may prove to be a viable solution to Houston's flooding problems. Many believe that it would solidify the numerous agencies currently have which various responsibilities in the area of flooding control. However, flooding is a and complex serious

problem which cannot be dealt with overnight. No simple solutions exist for Houston or Kerrville or any other town in Texas where flooding is a chronic problem.


Your County Agent'Says by Sam Field
