Today (Sunday) at 2 p.m., Morton will be in Muleshoe to take on the Senior Babe Ruth at 2 p.m.

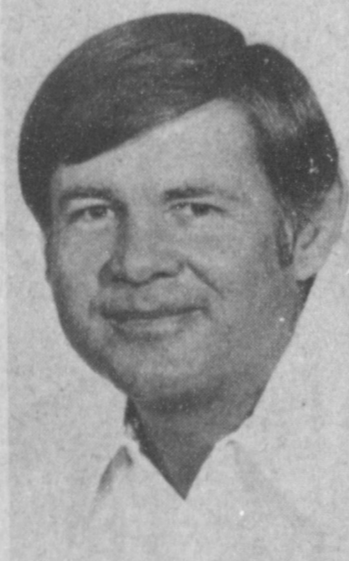

Spotty Moisture Delaying Planting

Although farmers in the area still have time to get crops into the ground, many of them are beginning to feel the 'pinch' of not enough moisture to get spring crops planted despite spotted showers that fell during the past week in this area.

During the week, rain ranged from one-fourth inch to around three quarters of an inch with most of the rain falling on the parched dryland in south and southwestern Bailey County.

In irrigated areas, corn already has a good stand, and wheat is growing. At this time, predictions are for another 'bumper' crop in 1980 for wheat.

Cotton farmers are just beginning to plant in some areas, especially on the irrigated fields.

A lack of the moisture needed for planting will not begin to hurt the producers until around the first of June when the cutoff date for planting cotton approaches.

Around Maple, Bill Eubanks at the Maple Grocery said the rainfall has ranged from one-half inch to up to near two inches during the past week.

Around Bula, the rainfall was just about the same, but mostly around three fourths to one inch fell as a combined total for the week.

The Lazbuddie area still is missing the rainfall,

with showers being reported from that community, however, most the land around Lazbuddie is irrigated.

In Muleshoe, from one-half to nearly an inch of rain was recorded.

A possible effect on young growing crops and vegetation could be the cooler than normal soil temperature. Soil temperature continues to run some five to seven degrees below the normal temperature for this time
