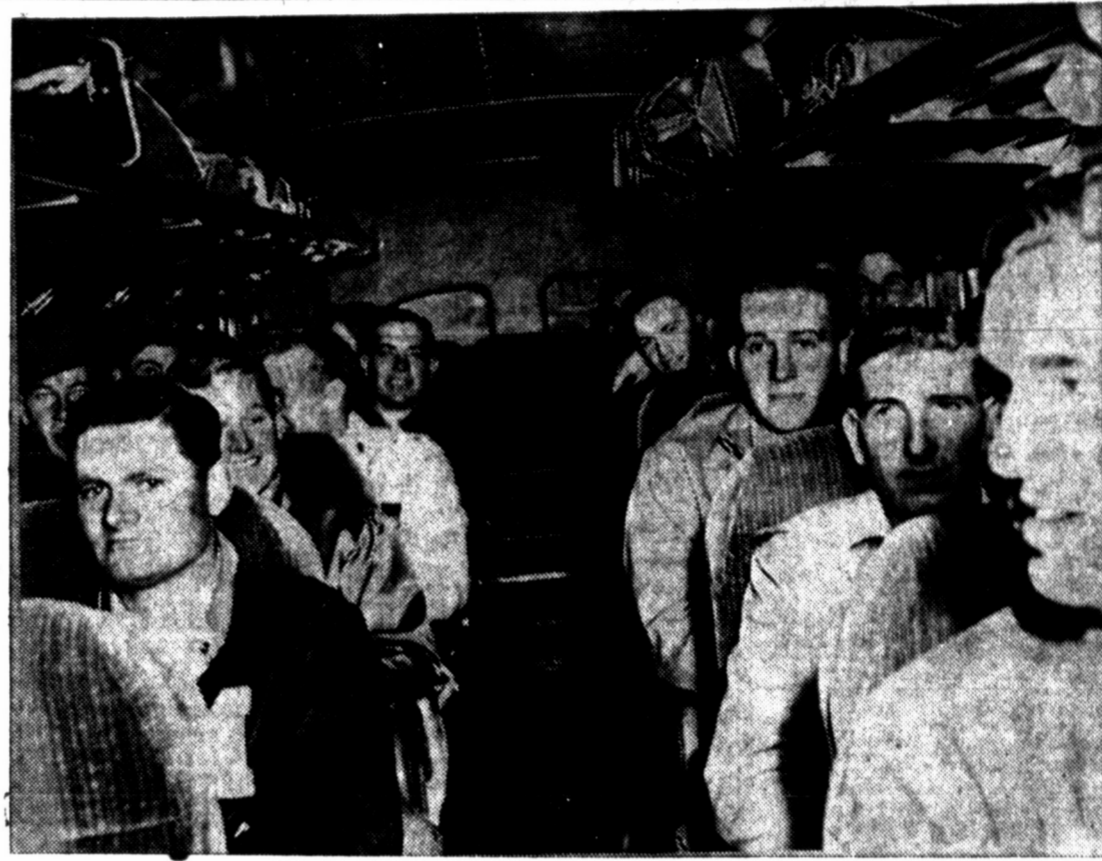

Cities Asked To Retain Rights
ABILENE — (AP) — The West Texas Chamber of Commerce asked the cities of Texas to join a battle to retain municipal rights to surface waters as they now exist.

Homer D. Grant of Lubbock said a proposed new water code being considered by the legislature "seriously threatens access to surface water for future growing needs of most Texas municipalities." He is president of the West Texas Water Association and chairman of the WTCC's water committee.

Lion History Is Reviewed

Lackland Air Base Back To Normal

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — Lackland Air Force Base here, swamped with recruits since the first of the year, is getting back to normal.

Snyder's Oil Boom Has Reached Top

SNYDER — (AP) — The climax of Snyder's fabulous oil boom apparently has passed.

This capital of the Scurry County oil boom is counting its trailer houses and finding them fewer. The Snyder Daily News says there are only about 1,250 of the mobile homes here now. At the height of the boom there were at times 3,000 trailer houses.

A little over two years ago Snyder was hardly more than a crossroads town of some 4,000 on the West Texas Plains. It depended mainly on cotton, peanuts and cattle. Its only bid to history was that some of the last buffalo herds in the country were slaughtered in its vicinity.

The county had been explored and wildcatted for oil, but even Humble Oil gave up and let its leases lapse. Then Sun Oil brought in a well and next Standard Oil of California and the boom commenced. It proved to be the greatest since the East Texas boom of 1930.

Snyder like Ranger and Spindletop, boomed. The population mushroomed 4,000 to 15,000 in less than a year. A chunchgoing town with local prohibition laws, perhaps it wasn't as roisterous as the wide-open Ranger of 1917, but it had its share of bootleggers, juke-joints and finally a "Juarez Alley."

Then, too, it drew some famed names as speculators. Singer Bing Crosby and Comedian Bob Hope brought in a 1,000-barrel well to swell the boom.

A well went down on a Baptist Church yard in the town. The court house was remodelled and its lawn bulldozed to make room for parking space. Building lots shot up from \$300 to \$3,000.

It produced colorful figures like the widow Edith McKanna who bought up 86,000 acres and brought in seven producers.

At the height of the boom, the Scurry area had 208 rigs in operation. Less than 80 rigs are in operation at this time. The county now can boast 1,600 producing wells.

The population of Snyder now has settled down to around 13,000. It was an estimated 20,000 during the rash days of the boom.

During 1950, the town erected and the oil gushers followed. Then came the boom, with its nearly \$5,000,000 worth of buildings. Its postoffice receipts of \$100,000 in 1950 were double those of 1949.

The discovery of the Scurry Field was dramatic because it came at a time when there was worry in the country about dwindling oil production. It is storied also because the country fooled the geologists. Nearly all had decreed there was no oil under the Scurry prairie of thin mesquite and shinnery oak.

Then the vast canyon reef limestone formation was tapped overnight millionaires.

Wholesale Prices On Foods Climbing

NEW YORK — (AP) — Wholesale food prices, as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet index, continued the long climb upward this week and were only two percent below the record peak of summer, 1948.

The index advanced four cents to 37.21, which is 24.3 percent over the year ago level of \$5.89. The index has climbed 21 percent since the Korean war began, and has not dipped in any week since early last October.

The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use.

Operation Shaves Woman's Weight To Mere 296 Pounds

BURNIPS, Mich. — (AP) — An operation has reduced the weight of Mrs. Gertrude Levandowski by half.

Two weeks ago she weighed 600 pounds. Now she weighs 296. By dieting she hopes to get down to 200.

Congenial Mrs. Levandowski, 58, a widow, is recovering at her Allegan County farm home near here from an operation to remove an abdominal tumor.

The tumor, from which she suffered for ten years, created her excess weight by causing a secretion of liquid.

Before the operation Mrs. Levandowski said she was "just waiting to die." She agreed to the surgery because "perhaps doctors could learn something that might help others." Even so, she refused to let it get her down.


Elephant Herds Terrorize Natives

MOMBASA, Kenya — (AP) — Huge herd of elephants, driven from the interior toward the coast in search of water, threaten to isolate many terrorized native villages, Game Warden Jack Bonham has reported.

Many natives were killed by the frenzied animals in a similar coastal invasion two years ago. Bonham said he had to kill 11 elephants among wandering herds in January, compared with only six in the whole of last year.

The Santa Fe Trail was the overland route used by explorers and traders from Independence and Westport, Mo., to Santa Fe. It was not a clearly defined road but a combination of Indian trails.

"I always made a lot of fun out of this because there was no use to cry," she said.

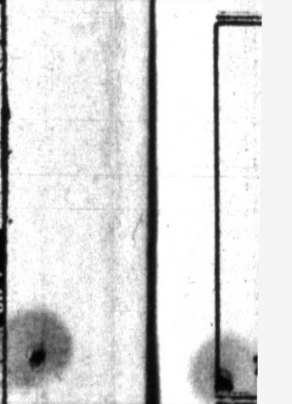

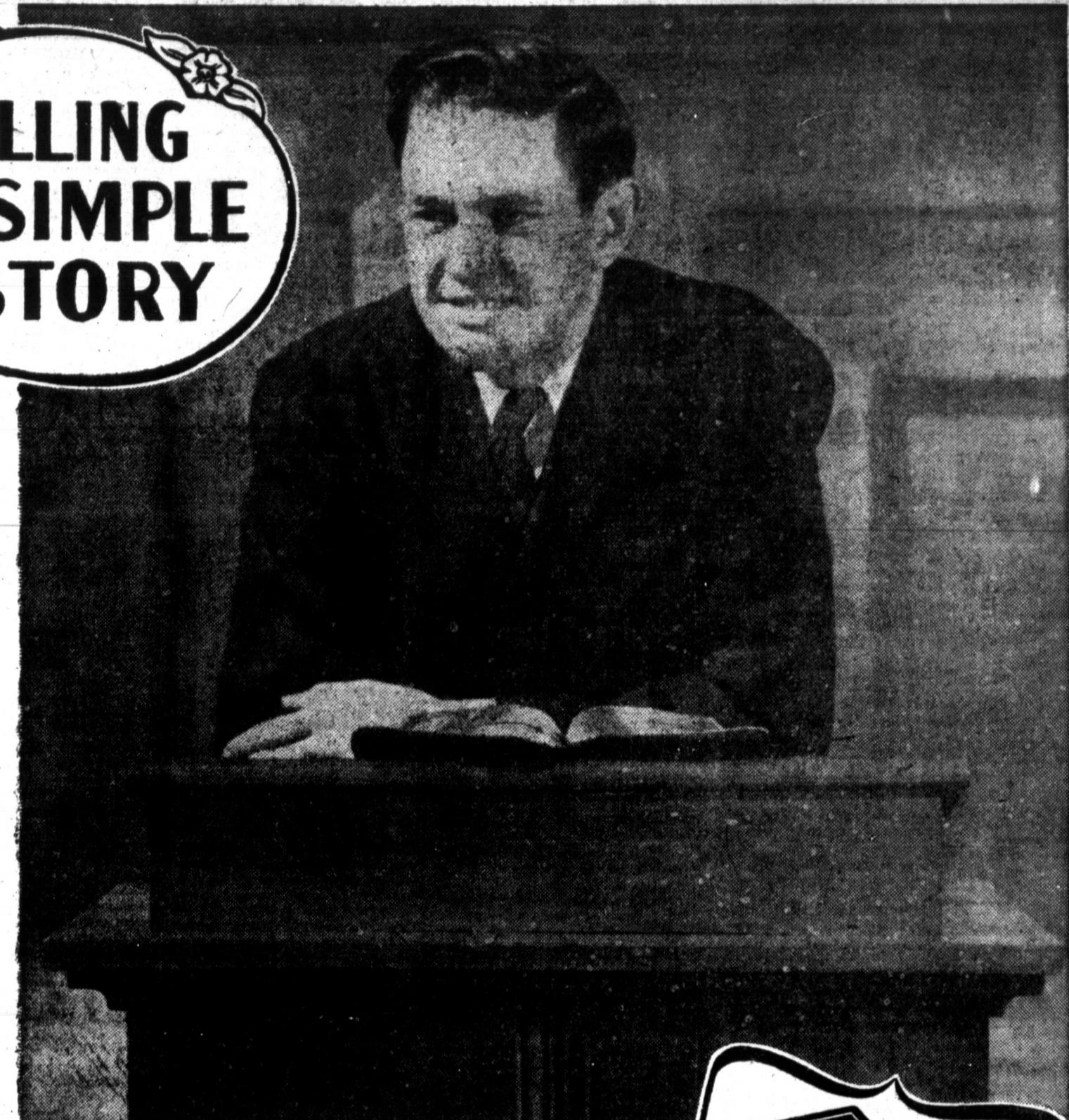

Jesus: Savior And Friend Of Mankind

It was as the Savior of men, the Redeemer, that Jesus fulfilled His earthly mission, but the Gospels reveal on almost every page how the Savior of Men was also teacher, healer, and friend.
It was Paul who admonished his fellow-Christians to "rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep," but this was among the many things that Paul had learned from his Master.
For Jesus was the great Sympathizer, entering into the joys and sorrows of life, weeping with those who wept, but sharing the joys of a wedding feast. He freely accepted hospitality and mingled with men, especially with the common people "who heard Him gladly." In innumerable ways He revealed His true humanity.
We call Him "the Man of Sorrows," and it befits one who bore the world's sins, and invited the heavily laden to come to Him for rest. But back of the sorrow, and the tragedy of the sin that crucified Him, was One who was neither recluse, nor ascetic.
If we would see Jesus as He

was, let us read into the nicknames that He gave to some of His followers — the wavering Simon, whom he called Peter, a Rock, and the flaming and ambitious zealots, James, and John, who He called the "Sons of Thunder."
It is this humanity of the divine Christ that must be experienced, if we would know in its fullness the continuing Presence of the Master.
He is not only our Savior, but also our Friend. He called His disciples "friends," and He is the friend of all who would be His disciples.

This continuing Presence and Friendship of Jesus is not a myth, nor an imagination, nor an emotional illusion. Nothing is more sure than that thousands have felt, and feel the reality of that spiritual Presence.
It brings into daily life and experience the warmth and tenderness, the faith and hope, the uplifting word, that helped and inspired and blessed those who met the Master in his earthly life.
But if one would have that experience of the present Christ today, he must know that Master in His earthly life. We cannot have spiritual communion with those whom we do not know. To those who would know and feel the presence of the Christ, as Friend, Inspirer, and Helper, I commend the reading of the New Testament, and especially of the four Gospels.

It is not enough to read a chapter, or an incident, here and there. One should read it as one would read a book that he wished to know in its heart and in every part.
To one who thus reads the Gospels the New Testament will, I believe, undoubtedly reveal its message, and make the Christ not only a great Savior in an ancient Holy Land, but a living Presence, a Companion, and Friend in life's daily way.

Let us have faith that right makes might, and in that faith, let us to the end, dare to do our duty, as we understand it.

Abide With Me

A sick preacher takes a walk

During the first half of the last century it was not uncommon for the seaporters of Britain, England, to see a frail middle-aged man stroll thoughtfully along the seashore. The mild-mannered man was the town's parson and he had taken his daily walks by the sea for 20 years. That was the way he worked out his sermon.

But on a Sunday afternoon in September, 1847, the Reverend Henry Francis Lyte took his walk with a heavy heart. He knew it was the last time he would tread the familiar path. When he was 30 years old he had taken the little church at Brighthelm because he thought the salt air would help his health. Now he was 54 and his long trouble had grown worse. Doctors

said he would have to go to the warmer climate of Italy. As the morning service Lyte had conducted his last sacrament. And now, as he walked beside the sea, he made notes for his farewell message to friends whose joys and sorrows he had shared for nearly a quarter of a century. In July he would be among strangers. But the gentle man knew there was one friend who would go with him... "In life, in death"... whenever he went. He put his sentiments on paper, gave the paper to a relative who put it away in a trunk. Henry Francis Lyte died in Southern France two months after leaving Brighthelm. He never reached Italy. In 1891 his poem came to the attention of a London publisher, Composer William H. Monk set it to music... thus was born an immortal hymn.

Abide with me; just fall the evening;
The darkness deepens; Lord, with me abide;
When other helpers fail, and comforts flee,
Help of the helpless, O abide with me!

A British court ordered the gold given to Lim Chye Seng when the prosecution case collapsed and Lim was acquitted on a charge of importing the bullion without a permit. The court ruled he was a public carrier who had picked up the shipment in the harbor in good faith. He had not broken the law and remained in possession of the gold when no one called for it.

If it weren't unmanly for a man to cry, I'd break out in tears right away. I'd plumb, plain boo-hoo, and all because of my early teaching about the importance of keeping a budget. A week or so ago I went to a stationery store and bought a budget book. On the surface a budget book is just about as lovely a thing as a man wants to put his eyes on. Clean, sweet pages marked "Rent," "Clothes," "Insurance," "Entertainment," "Savings."

Plan likes to remember I have been making my living, a up-nothing people, and trying to put aside a nest egg for a rainy day. Most of the newspaper men I started out with have accumulated quite a bit of life's goods. The didn't fret when round steak began to cost more than square steak. When I asked them why they could be happy in the face of tremendously rising costs they told me that they lived on a budget. I might as well confess right now that I can't. Things happen to me that are not listed in that budget book. For example, there isn't a place in that budget book to take care of the holes that I burn in my trousers and coats with cigarettes. As I write this I can see, if I lower my eyes a trifle, a cigarette burned hole that will cost me \$13 at least to have repaired by the re-weavers.

To get that hole re-woven, and still keep the budget book straight - I can't have an aching tooth fixed. That's why, in an earlier paragraph, I told you I would cry if it were not unmanly. Am I to go through the rest of my life with an aching tooth or not be accepted in polite society where holes in trousers are frowned upon? Which is more important - good, sound teeth or immaculate trousers with no holes in them? Frankly, that's why I don't like budgets. They put too many difficult questions to a fellow. I wrote something about this several years ago and I wouldn't mention it now unless I knew it still held true. A budget serves chiefly to remind those in straitened circumstances just how poor they are. By itemizing how little you've got, you're shown in black and white just how little you have got. Ford never kept a budget. You can't find an old Astor budget book. I'll pay \$100 if you'll deliver to me the Aga Khan's budget book listing his kitchen expenses. Those of us who are poor should never keep a budget. Every time we look at a budget, we have either overdrawn it or are so close to overdrawing it that we have to turn off the light in the bathroom to keep the darned thing even. Rich people, as I said, don't work on a budget but they should. Rich people could look at a budget and say I have \$200,000 more to spend this month. That would make them happy. With two hundred grand to work on they could buy themselves a chinchilla poker for the fireplace, dine on plover's eggs every morning, and polish their furniture with beluga caviar.

As soon as I finish writing this I am going to tear up my budget book and burn it. The theory that you can't take it with you. I'm tired of trying to whip light cream. I'm tired of using oleomargarine for butter. I'm tired of waiting for fire sales to buy my suits. Poor people can't live within their income. I say this after decades of experience trying to. What's wrong with having creditors for your palbearers? Gets their names in the paper and, as for the man they're pal-bearing, he might feel hurt but up until now we have no record of a corpse pecking back and saying, "Sorry, fellows." 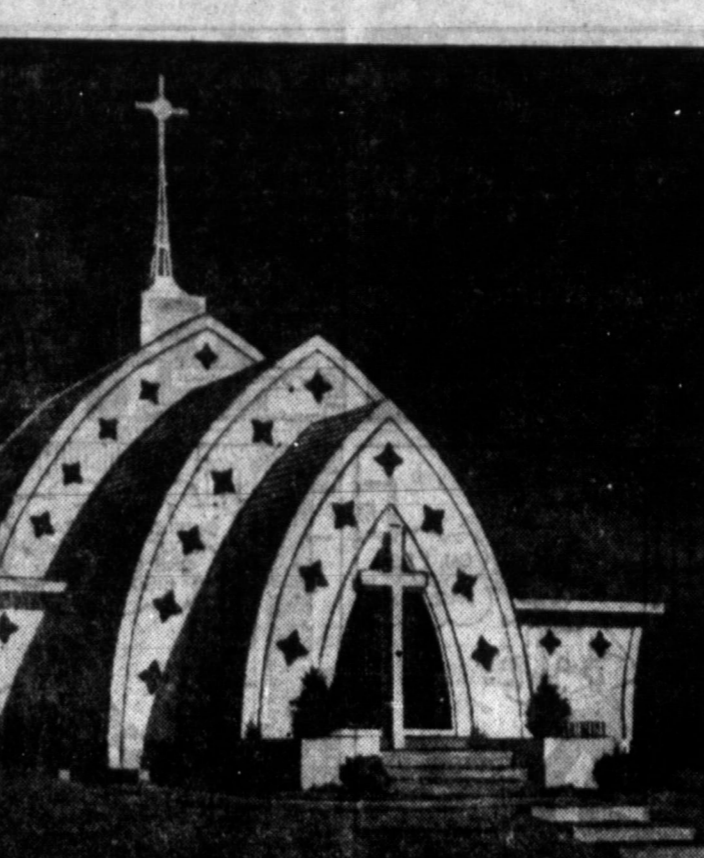

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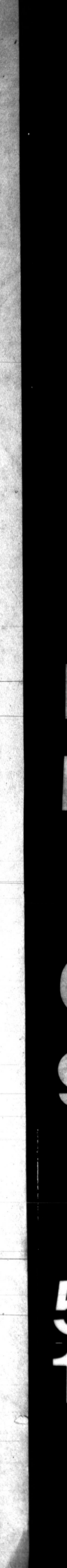

New H-Bomb Plant Breeder Of Stars

(Editor's Note: Howard W. Blakeslee, Associated Press science editor, visited the site of the government's huge new hydrogen plant on the Savannah River in South Carolina, just across the Georgia border, at the start of construction work. Here is one of the stories he obtained. Another will follow on the new plant's use as a first-line A-bomb source.)

AUGUSTA, Ga. — (AP) — The new H-bomb plant in nearby South Carolina is likely to become known as the breeder of man-made stars.

Any one of these stars will be about two miles in diameter, and as hot, or hotter than the sun. It will last about ten seconds. In this period it will be as destructive as a chunk of the sun itself, brought down to hang just above a city.

Two miles will be the size if an H-bomb is a thousand times more powerful than present A-bombs. Nothing has been mentioned officially about this great H-bomb of fire. But the facts which indicate the size were published in "The Effects of Atomic Weapons," issued by the U. S. Department of Defense and the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission last August.

In that book the secrets of the A-bomb fireball are told for the first time. The hydrogen ball of fire will follow the same physical laws, and the dimensions

That will be for a burst in the air. If an H-bomb explodes on the surface of earth or water, the ball will be smaller. But still a man-made star. There are estimates showing that the hydrogen star may not be much hotter than the A-bomb fireball. There also are estimates showing that the hydrogen star certainly will not be cooler.

This star will rise rapidly, at about three miles a minute, and that is the principal reason why its perils will last only about ten seconds.

While still close to earth the heat is searing enough to melt paint. Even the little A-bomb yolk is for a small fraction of a second one hundred times brighter than the sun even when you are five miles from the ball.

These nuclear fire balls are really round eggs, with a center corresponding to a small yolk, surrounded by a white which is much larger. In the A-bomb this hot yolk gets to be about 90 feet in diameter. The yolk is the expanding heat of the bomb, and its top temperature is momentarily more than half a million degrees fahrenheit.

At 90 feet diameter the heat ceases to expand as fast as the blast or concussion of the explosion. At that point the blast runs ahead and actually sets the air on fire. This blast fire forms the "white" or outer part of the fireball. The spread around the yolk swells until the fireball has a diameter of about 900 feet maximum. If this blazing ball stood like a balloon at New York City street level, its upper edge would tower two-thirds the height of the Empire State Building, the world's tallest skyscraper.

The A-bomb fireball lasts nearly ten seconds, with a surface temperature part of the time at ten to twelve thousand degrees fahrenheit. This is hot as the sun's surface.

The H-bomb's fireball will be that of the A-bomb which is the trigger, plus additions from the hydrogen part of the explosion. The heat, at 1,000 times more powerful, will extend 30 times farther and the blast ten times farther. That is, you can multiply the yolk of the A-bomb by 30 and the white part by ten. This gives 10,800 feet diameter.

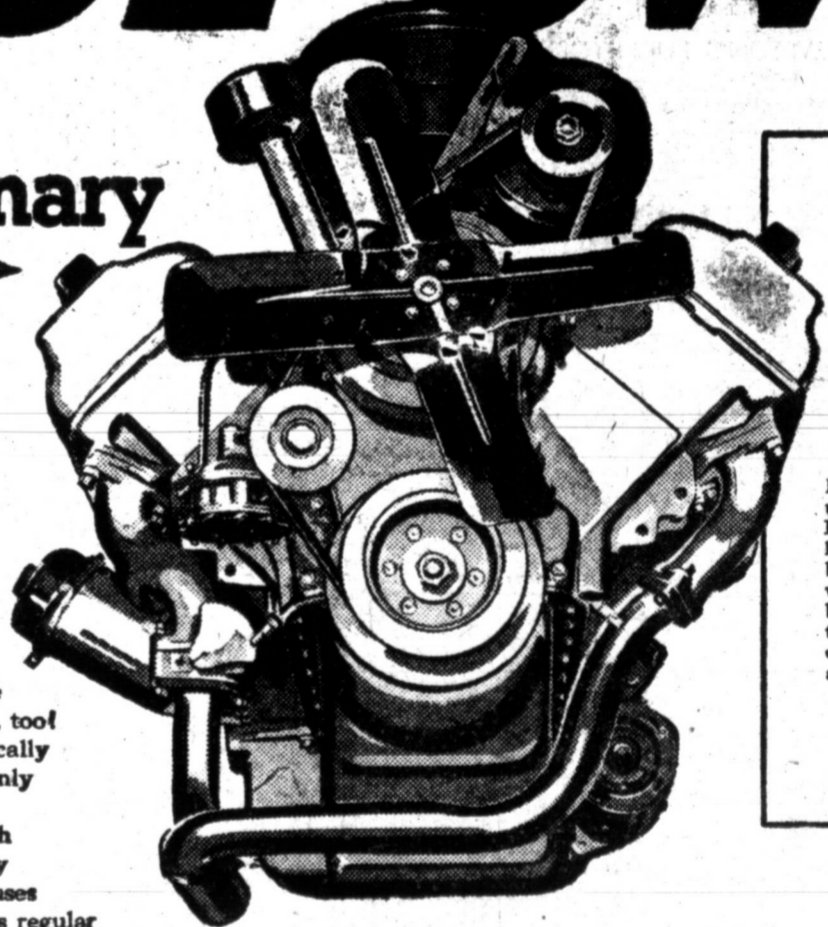

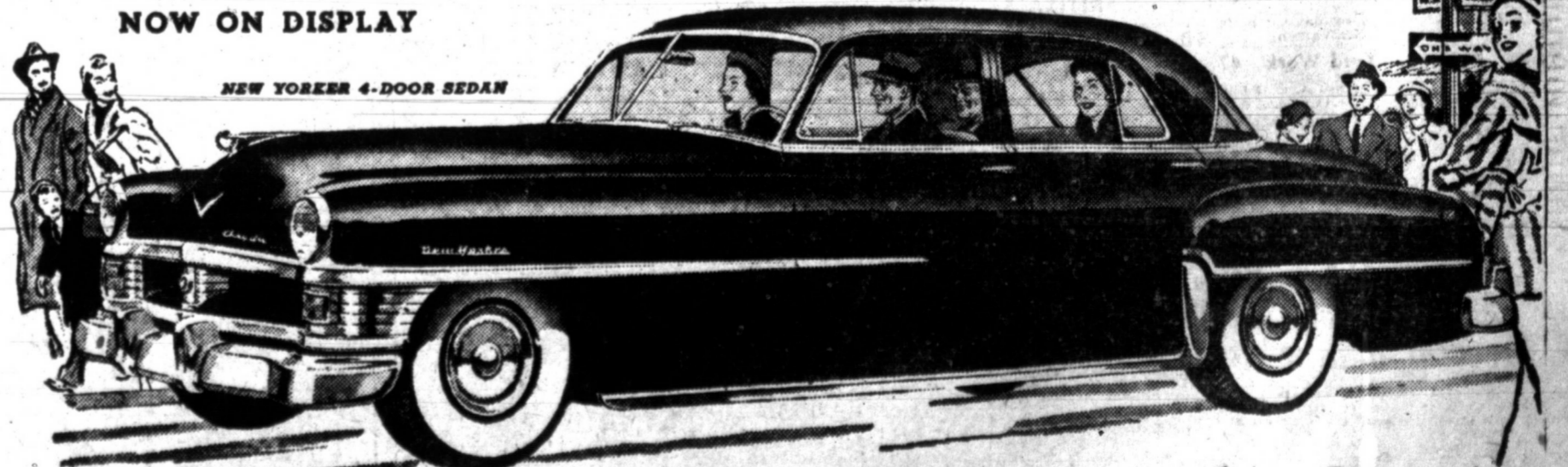
