Gasohol On Sale Here; Plant Construction Urged

Gasohol, America's homegrown fuel, was offered for sale in Muleshoe for the first time during

the past week by Joe Long, owner-operator of Central Texaco, 221 West American Blvd.

"I have wanted gasohol for some time now" but the tight supply of alcohol was the hold-up. We sure need to get some alcohol production in this part of the country," Long said.

Gasohol is a blend of nine parts unleaded gasoline, and one part 100 percent ethyl alcohol.

Long's gasohol is blended by Morrison Oil Co. of Muleshoe from alcohol purchased from Archer Daniels Midland company in Cedar Rapids, Ia.

"A lower proof of alcohol can be burned," Morrison said, "but, for quality control and bulk handling, a 200 proof water-free, grain alcohol is used for our commercial resale."

Alcohol has proven itself as an excellent fuel over the years, according to the distributors. Alcohol can be mixed with gasoline in different portions or can be burned in gasoline engines straight. At current prices, however, of \$2 a gallon, grain alcohol is not economically feasible to burn straight, said Morrison.

With the rising prices of

imported crude oil, alcohol is looked as a viable answer to America's energy problem and a boost to our sagging agricultural economy, reminded Long. "By blending grain alcohol from renewable domestic sources with gasoline, we could reduce oil imports and create investment and jobs in a new alcohol industry," the distributors cited.

Ethyl alcohol is made from corn and other high

For sheriff, the runoff will be between Bob Henderson, Bailey County deputy sheriff and Jerry Hicks, Muleshoe city police officer.

Runoff elections will be on Saturday, June 7, with all voting boxes open for the balloting. Although discussions were held on the possibility of combining the boxes for the election, it was decided to open all eight voting boxes for the runoff. Polls will be open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for voters.

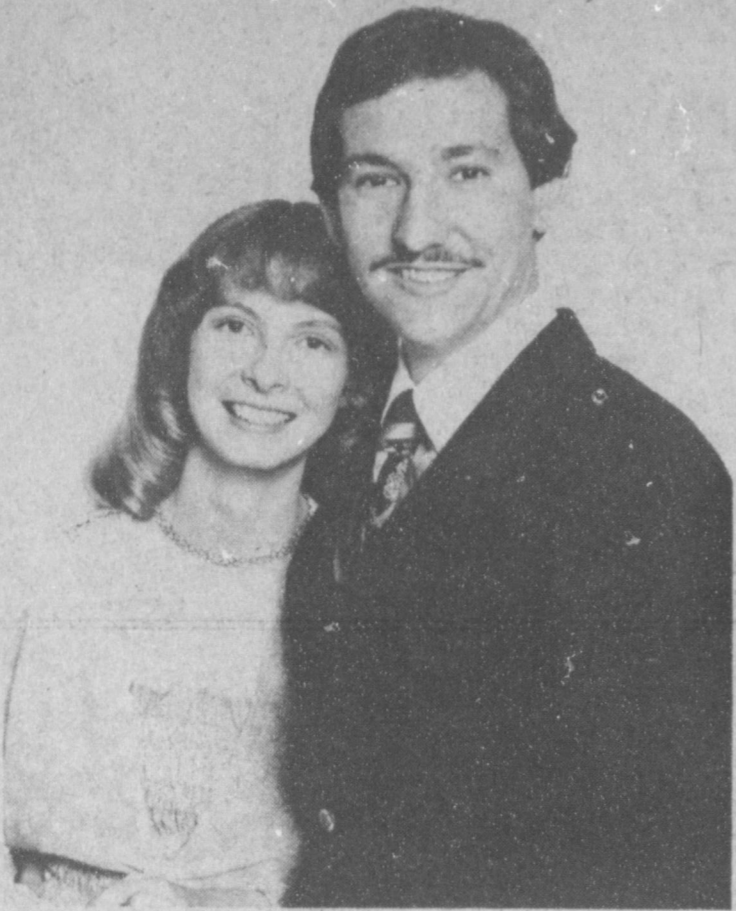
Progressive Home Club
