## NO DEEP SLUMP OR DEPRESSION

Washington, D.C.—Current fears of a serious recession are not warranted, according to a special report by the Kiplinger organization, released today. A period of "normal progress" for the next five or six years is predicted by the Washington business reporting firm.

Any letdown or slump will be temporary, the editors say, a pause—not a deep slump or depression.

Then, in five or six years, a new boom will set off "the greatest era of economic growth this country has ever known". Underlying the new boom are these facts:

Population: Extra high birth rates in the '40's and '50's will produce a population bulge in the '60's and '70's of young men and women marrying or ready to marry. Marriage makes homes, homes make business.

New products, new ideas: Technical, scientific and mechanical developments of the past few years are being rushed into use, producing a crop of new products.

Government policy: Both parties and all political groups are bullish,

committed to full employment and an economy going at full speed, with the government an active partner.

## More Inflation

The bad news is that more inflation will accompany the boom, according to the Kiplinger report. Prices will go higher — in ten years, 15 per cent higher, in 25 years, 50 per cent higher.

Behind the inflation are three major forces, pushing hard:

Wages rising faster than productivity: A continuous push for higher wages can be expected, causing higher prices and then demand for more wages to cover increased living costs.

World-wide pressure on prices: Demand for goods everywhere else in the world is greater than the supply. Prices are going up in all countries and they affect our economy, too.

Government spending: No matter what men of either party say the pressure is to expand public spending, so deficits may plague budgets in the future. Public pressure continues to be for big spending, regardless of inflation that comes in its wake.

Not all states and localities will share equally in the growth of the next 25 years, the Kiplinger report points out. The biggest single area of growth is the "heartland" area from Pittsburgh to Chicago.

Next in growth comes the Atlantic seaboard, New York to Baltimore. Then spectacular California, heading toward beating New York as number one state in population. Then Texas, then Florida, which is gaining at the highest rate of any large state.

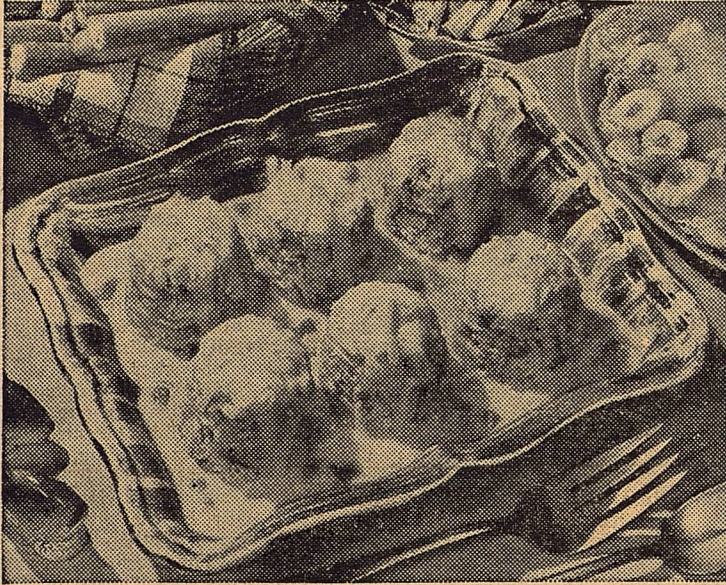

### Quick-To-Fix Tuna Timbales— Really Wonderful Eating!

Take it easy and still treat your family to some of the most marvelous eating they have ever experienced! Just plan these Tuna Timbales as the main dish. They are made in a matter of minutes and the saving in "kitchen time" is all yours.

And oh, my, you have never seen such a satisfied bunch as your family will be when they taste this perfectly flavored tuna main dish. The cheese and the mushroom sauce becomes hot and bubbly in the oven to give the tuna timbales a positively irresistible look.

#### INGREDIENTS:

- 1, 6½ ounce can chunk style tuna
- 2 tablespoons finely grated onion
- 2 tablespoons finely grated green pepper
- 3-½ cups hot cooked rice
- Dash of Tabasco sauce
- 1, 10½ ounce can (1-¼ cups) condensed cream of mushroom soup
- ½ cup water
- 1 cup grated American cheese

**PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE:** To make 5 heaping cups of white, fluffy, perfectly cooked rice:

1. Put 1-½ cups uncooked rice, 3 cups of cold water and 1-½ teaspoons of salt into a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil.

2. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking.

3. Leave saucepan over this low heat for 14 minutes. Remove from the heat. The rice is now ready to use. Leave cover on 'till ready to use.

For extra fluffy, tender, separate grains allow the rice to steam for an additional 10 minutes — with heat off, but without removing lid, keeping the extra cups of unused ready-cooked rice in the refrigerator in a covered container. Use this rice as needed in quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

**METHOD:** With a fork, break the tuna into small pieces. Add the onion, green pepper, hot rice and Tabasco sauce. Rinse a custard cup with water. Pack about ¼ cup of the mixture into the custard cup. Unmold immediately into a shallow baking-serving dish or into individual baking-serving dishes. Make the rest of the mixture into timbales, moistening the cup with water before molding each timbale.

Mix together the mushroom soup and water. Pour over the timbales in the baking-serving dish. Sprinkle the cheese over the timbales. Bake in a preheated 350°F. oven for 30 minutes or until the cheese is browned. This recipe makes 6 timbales.

## Motion Sickness Need Not Spoil Family Vacation

CHICAGO—You don't have to worry about that old vacation bug-aboo, motion sickness, according to a Minneapolis doctor.

Under most circumstances, motion sickness can be warded off, and even when preventive measures fail, drugs are available to give relief, Dr. John E. Eichenlaub said.

Motion sickness results from "too much nerve-tickling action" in the ear's labyrinth, the organ that helps a person keep his balance. Keeping the head steady reduces this action. The head can be steadied by leaning it against a headrest, bracing it in position with pillows or by focusing the eyes on the horizon.

It is not wise, he said, to focus on rapidly passing objects, such as autos or telephone poles, since the background seems to "dip and plunge." The same thing happens when one reads or does fancy work. It's all right to read if you choose big type, and periodically look away. Crocheting and knitting should be done only if you can do it without looking, he said.

Youngsters can be encouraged to focus on the horizon by playing animal-or tractor-spotting games, but not license-spotting games.

This background dipping and plunging effect is probably the chief reason for extra risk of sickness in certain airplane seats, especially in those on the left side just back of the wing, he said. The plane usually turns left and when the passenger can see down but can't get a broad long view, he looks at the passing landscape with short, rapid eye movements. So stay on the right, either front or rear, and keep the eyes on the horizon to minimize air sickness, Dr. Eichenlaub advises.

## Eyesight Tests Show Child's Need

NEW YORK—For some time Kansas has been conducting a statewide program of giving comprehensive eyesight tests to school-children, tests which go much farther than a mere check with the old Snellen chart. The purpose is to screen out children with seeing faults and advise them to get eye care from specialists.

Results show that one out of every five of the Kansas youngsters had some visual trouble serious enough to impair his school-

work—and the children in other parts of the country are undoubtedly fully as deficient. Specialists, teachers, mothers, and high school student volunteers cooperate in giving the 20-minute tests.

Out of one group of 1,200 Kansas children screened, more than 300 revealed seeing troubles which had never been detected before. The ones which show up most frequently are nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism, lack of depth perception, one-eyed seeing and glaucoma.

## Women Better Spotting Cancer Than Men

NEW YORK — The average housewife has to be fast on her feet to cope with all the high-pressure salesmen that come pounding on her door. She has to detect the good from the bad—the reliable from the phony. But this training, this ability to tell true from false is paying off in women's lives—this year 19,000 women will be saved from cancer who would have died a decade ago largely because they have learned to sift facts and do the right thing.

The result is that for the first time on record, less women than men are dying of malignant tumors. Women just can't be fooled by household remedies, by pills or secret cures for cancer. More and more they are heeding the advice of the American Cancer Society and going for regular physical checkups.

## Oldest Annuitant Is 104 Years Old

NEW YORK—The oldest annuitant on the books of the nation's life insurance companies recently celebrated her 104th birthday.

Miss Sarah A. Walker, who was born March 30, 1853, in Wayland (then Marshall), Iowa, and now lives in Los Angeles, California, has already received \$2.50 for each \$1 invested in the annuities in 1919 when she was 65. She bought three small annuities to supplement her other income resources and has been drawing income checks for 38 years.

At last count, there were 600 annuitants who had reached 95 years of age, and 40 of these were centenarians.

## Total Construction Should Set New Records in 1957

Chicago—Construction will continue at a record pace this year, although there will be little change in the volume of residential building.

This is the opinion of John M. Neff, manager of the ceramics and minerals research department at Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago.

He believes total construction will set a record in 1957, as it did last year, but that private home construction—which failed to live up to expectations last year—will not do much better in 1957.

"This latter point does not reflect a recession in the building industry as some people seem to think," Neff declared. "The building industry is holding its own in our growing economy, but not in the areas that were expected."

The volume of all types of construction last year totaled over \$44 billion, an increase of 3 per cent over 1955. Residential construction in 1956, however, was down 8 per cent from the previous year.

This does not indicate that the supply of housing is catching up to demand, Neff contended. But it does reflect, he said, a more cautious attitude on the part of people who are house hunting.

"The public is standing off and giving more consideration to how they want to live 20 years from now," Neff declared. It is largely this thoughtful pause in making a decision, he said, that is responsible for the slowdown in private home construction.

## Human Body Reacts To Hunger, Pain

Los Angeles—What happens to your body when you are hungry or hurt?

Dr. Bernard Engel, University of California, Los Angeles, psychologist, has made a study of such "abnormal" conditions.

Subjects who fasted up to 24 hours showed a slight drop in blood pressure, a very slight rise in temperature, increased saliva flow, decreased respiration rate, and an increased incidence of stomach contractions.

Subjects who had their feet suddenly plunged into a bucket of ice water showed a marked increase in blood pressure and an increased heart rate. The blood

volume in their fingers also dropped, and a blocking of stomach contractions occurred. Anticipation of pain produced similar but not identical results.

In general, Dr. Engel said, the studies did not support earlier theories which had suggested that the body did not physiologically distinguish between hunger and pain.

## Official Asks for— Gets Speedy Service

NEW YORK — One of New York's outstanding optical firms recently had an urgent call from the State Department in Washington. A prominent member of the Department had had his bifocals swept into the Caribbean Sea by a wave while he was struggling with a big fish. The request was that a new pair of glasses be made and shipped by an afternoon plane that same day.

It was 11:30 a.m. when the call came. The manager of the optical firm, who had served this official for 25 years, knew his prescription was a complicated one. Nevertheless, he immediately asked a master technician to drop everything else and grind lenses. The grinding was done with unusual speed, the manager himself set the lens in a suitable frame and made meticulous adjustments. An airlines pilot grabbed them and raced to the airport.

The State Department official was wearing his new glasses down in the Bahamas by the time the sun set. His name was John Foster Dulles.

## Med Students Liable For Military Duty

CHICAGO—Military service hands like a sword over the lives of students enrolled in the country's 76 approved four-year medical schools.

A recent survey by the American Medical Association disclosed that 81.5 per cent of all male students enrolled in medical schools during the 1955-56 academic year were subject to military liability. The number cited as liable for service makes no allowance for physical disabilities and other factors that would render an unknown percentage ineligible for service.
