The Borden County Coyote girls basketball team defeated Hermleigh by a score of 42-13 the first night of the Borden Tournament and the 29 point victory proved to be the closest contest the Lady Coyotes had as they then beat Sands 51-17 and Jayton in the finals, 61-27.

In the Hermleigh game, Kelly Williams had the hot hand as she cashed in on 16 points. Following her in scoring were Roxie Wolf and Shawna Vaughn with 8 each. Teri Billington had 4 points and Kelli Williams, Simona Benavidez, and Shana Bradshaw each added 2. The Borden defense held Hermleigh scoreless the second period and to only one point in the third stanza.


BOYS BORDEN COUNTY TOURNAMENT



Weather is Attending to Business

Lubbock--It was Mark Twain who said that the weather "is always doing something....always attending strictly to business; always getting up new designs and trying them on people to see how they will go."

He declared that in a New England spring he counted 136 different kinds of weather inside of 24 hours. Texans might have called

that a pittance of a spring. Only 136 different kinds of weather? But Texans now have a clear explanation of how it all comes about.

"Blue Northers to Sea Breezes, Texas Weather and Climate" is a brief book of fewer than 100 fact-filled p ages written by meteorologist Donald R. Haragan and published this month by Hendrick-Long Publishing Co., Dallas.

Haragan is associate dean of the Texas Tech University College of Arts and Sciences and chairperson of Atmospheric Sciences.

His well-illustrated book explains the text in easy-to-understand line drawings, and explanations are clarified by example--for instance, how to convert Fahrenheit temperatures to Celsius or Kelvin scales. Haragan has brief, straight-to-the-point

explanations of what causes changes in weather. "The secret to better

weather forecasts," he said, "is better understanding of atmospheric behavior. The book presents an up-to-date synopsis of the science of meteorology and the physical laws upon which it is based."

Written as an introductory text in meteorology, the language makes the subject clear to any English reader. Of tornadoes, for instance, Haragan's advice is sensible.

"When seeking shelter from a tornado," he writes, 'common sense is a good guide. It's safer to be inside than outside, preferably in a basement." He adds detailed instructions on safety, including the point that "since most deaths are caused by flying debris, it is best to stay where you are rather than risk a frantic dash to an outdoor shelter." For anyone interested in what lies behind a weather forecast, "Blue Northers to Sea Breezes" can make learning easy.



Whether to purchase a phone?

Christmastime is here again - and with it our annual quest for new and unique bargains.

And taking its place beside cabbage patch dolls and personal computers as a hot holiday gift idea is that "American as apple pie" staple - the telephone.

Since most Texans have never shopped for a phone, and since the newly-created competitive market offers a veritable smorgasbord of prices, styles and features, the timeless expression: caveat emptor ("Let the buyer beware'') has seldom been more appropriate.

It wasn't always this complicated. Once Ma Bell and other phone companies called the shots on the type of telephone equipment and services you could have. Most of you rented your phones.

But times have changed. The telephone equipment business has been deregulated and opened to free-market forces.

Now it seems everyone is selling telephones. And you have been offered choices for equipment and services you've never had before.

Contrary to what many of you have heard, you will not have to buy a telephone after Ma Bell breaks up on January 1. You may, however, choose to buy your own equipment, either your existing phone, or a new one from a store operated by the phone company or an independent dealer. If you presently rent your phone from Southwestern Bell, AT&T will assume ownership of and responsibility for your phone beginning January 1. Therefore, if you choose, you would buy your existing equipment from AT&T, not Southwestern Bell.

Should you rent or buy? That's the first choice you will make in the new telephone marketplace.

It's not a simple choice. Renters have an advantage in that companies will make free repairs at any time on the phones they rent. But many consumers

are buying phones because in the long run, it is cheaper to buy than to rent.

A special note to Southwestern Bell customers: After January 1, you will be renting your phones from AT&T, not Southwestern Bell. As a convenience, Southwestern Bell will handle the billing of phone leases, but will merely pass that money along to AT&T. Thus, if your rented telephone breaks, Southwestern Bell won't fix it; you must return the phone to an AT&T service center for repairs.

If you decide to buy, you've still got choices to make. Choosing among numerous prices, styles, features and warranties can be quite complicated.

Phone prices start at about \$10 and can range into the hundreds of dollars. There are an equally large number of features from which to choose. The style and features of a phone determine its price. For example, a cordless phone costs more than a push-button desk model.

The most important part of any phone you buy is its warranty. A manufacturer's warranty may be as little as 30 days or as much as one year. Some phones may be replaced at the stores from which they were purchased. Other manufacturers require that broken phones be mailed to a factory or service center for repair.

Before you buy a telephone, find out the specific terms of the phone's warranty. Get specific answers to specific questions: What happens if the phone breaks or malfunctions? Where can the phone be repaired? Will the store from which you bought the phone loan you another phone while yours is being repaired? Can you get a new phone to replace the broken one?

Remember, repairs to phones you buy are your Asking responsibility. questions and shopping wisely when you buy can save you time, money and annoyance later.

Selecting the "Perfect" ham for your holiday dinner can require some careful label reading.

Variations in the moisture content, style, cut and brand of ham affect its price and the quality of the product you put on the table.

But these variations are clearly stated on the label so consumers can compare features and cost.

The first choice you have to make is between a fully cooked or cook-before-eating ham.

The two types of hams are processed for different amounts of time, but both are pre-cooked long enough to make them safe to eat.

Fully cooked hams offer convenience since they can be eaten as is, or baked for about ten minutes per pound. Smoked or cured hams require further cooking to develop desired flavor and tenderness, usually 18 to 20 minutes per pound for whole hams.

Fully cooked and cook-before-eating hams contain equal amounts of moisture at the end of processing, but usually differ in moisture content by the time they are served. Hams that contain no

more moisture after processing than before, are labeled "cured smoked," or "fully-cooked", with no further qualifying statement on the label.

Because cured or smoked hams require additional home cooking their moisture content at serving time is lower than fully cooked hams. This means the meat will be somewhat denser and less juicy.

The 'water added' statement on fully cooked hams is there to call attention to the amount, rather than the presence of water.

If more moisture is added to a ham than is removed during processing the label must carry the words, "water added." Even then, the weight of the finished product cannot exceed the weight of the fresh ham by more than 10 percent.

The choice of a bone-in or boneless ham has a great affect on yield.

In a semi-boneless ham, bone is removed to the joint at each end of the ham, leaving only the long bone in the center. These hams yield four to five servings to the pound.

Boneless hams may be purchased in a wrapper or in a can. Wrapped boneless hams have about five servings to the pound; but canned hams yield only four, because the net weight will include the congealed juices in which the ham was packed.

Shank or butt portion hams are often not the good value they appear to be because they are ham ends with center cuts removed. Yields vary, but an estimate of two and one half serving per pound is usual for shank or butt hams with bone.

The committee hopes to receive a new 3xperimental chemical (Dowco 290) for use in controlling mesquite. Researchers are boasting of 80 percent kill. We hope we can kill some of the mesquites in Borden County.

4-H AND YOUTH COMMITTEE

During 1983, the 4-H and Youth Committee met once to plan 4-H educational activities for the year. 1983 was a very busy year for Borden County 4-H

The year started, as always with several livestock shows. 4-H'ers showed livestock at Odessa, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston and San Angelo as well as the Borden County Junior Livestock Show. 54 youth were involved in teeding, fitting, and showing lambs, steers and parrows for these shows. Several of these animals placed high at these shows.

The 4-H shooting sports project gained a few more members this year as 29 youth participated in skeet and trap shooting. The 4-H Skeet and Trap Club hosted an invitational shoot June 23-25 and also hosted the District 2 4-H Skeet and Trap Shoot July 6th. 4-H shooters attended 3 other shoots including the Howard County Invitational District 6 4-H shoot held in **Udessa and the State 4-H** Skeet and Trap Shoot held in San Antonio. Several of our 4-H shooters placed high throughout the year, winning high individual sub-junior trap at the State shoot.

The 4-H Horse Playnights started the last Tuesday night in May and continued throughout the summer. They were concluded August 16th during the County Horse Show. 18 4-H youth were involved in the horsemanship project.

3 4-H members attended 4-H Electric Camp in New Mexico during July and 2 of our members attended the State 4-H Horse Show in Waco during late July.

Two 4-H'ers attended South Plains 4-H Leadership Camp at Western Texas College in Snyder in June.

The 4-H Clothing project involved 8 4-H'ers with four of them representing Borden County at the District Fashion Show. One of these 4-H'ers placed first at the district show.

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JOHNNY, THEY HARDLY KNOW YE

Twenty years after his death, John F. Kennedy presents a sticky problem to liberals hoping to bask in the fading glow of Camelot.

And that problem is, by today's standards, JFK was no liberal. He was a hard-core anti-Communist whose speeches make Ronald Reagan look like a whimpering dove. And he was a "fiscal conservative," to quote a recent lament by TIME magazine.

Recognizing that JFK's White House record is one they would be embarrassed to call their own, today's liberals have set out to separate the image of JFK from the reality. They want to play up the image of the bold young leader struck down in the prime of life. But they want to disavow Kennedy's pledge to "bear any burden" in the fight against communism. They want to remember Kennedy's commitment to civil rights, while ignoring JFK's effort to protect the civil rights movement from Communist infiltration. And they certainly want to forget that JFK was willing to wiretap Martin Luther King, Jr., to do it.

Today's liberals also want to forget that JFK authorized the Bay of Pigs invasion of Castro's Cuba by Cuban exiles. It might sound too much like Ronald Reagan aiding the Contras in their fight against the Marxist government of Nicaragua. And the no-nukes crowd pushing for the nuclear freeze certainly wants to forget the Cuban missile crisis. After all, JFK was willing to go to war with the Soviets unless the Kremlin removed the missiles it sought to install in Cuba. JFK would never have winked at the degree of Soviet penetration of our hemisphere we see today.

Liberals want to forget that JFK was the first supplysider, cutting taxes across-the-board in a period of deficit spending. They want to forget that his secretary of the treasury was a Wall Street Republican. It might make JFK's administration look like a government "of, by and for the rich." After all, JFK was no poor boy either.

And the liberal discomfort increases tenfold with the mention of Vietnam. As the producer of the recent PBS series "Vietnam: A Television History." proclaims, Vietnam "was the place JFK had chosen to make his stand against communism."

No, Kennedy was not the kind of man today's Democratic party would consider nominating for the presidency. He wasn't a feminist. He never spoke out for gay rights. As America's first Roman Catholic in the White House, he could never have endorsed abortion on demand.

In some ways it's amusing to see what the liberals have done to the Kennedy legend. These folks, who seek to find excuses for (or worse, ignore) every vile act by the Kremlin, would look at the Berlin wall today and say "Ich bin *nicht* ein Berliner." (I am *not* a Berliner.)




