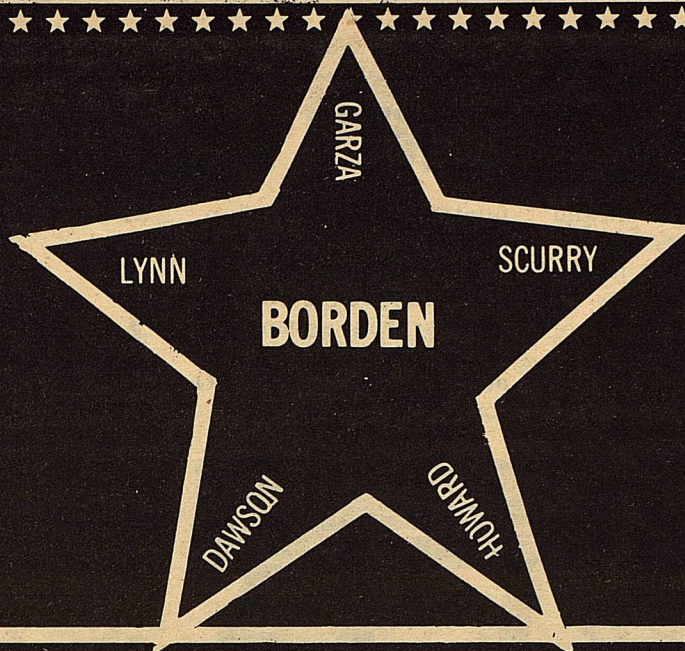

Sale breaks all records

Large crowd at show

How often has the Borden County Jr. Livestock Show been set on one of the coldest days of the year? The 1982 show was no exemption.

After several days of 80 degree temperature a cool 32 didn't slow down the heated competition of 236 animals brought through the show ring Feb. 26 and 27.

At 1:00 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 26, E.L. Farmer's voice sounded a familiar note as he announced the official opening of the 1982 Borden County Jr. Livestock Show. Beginning with the Swine show, Judge Eddy Puckett of Sweetwater had his work cut out for him as 65 animals were shown. Although this division was down drastically from the 113 swine shown in 1981, the task was still formidable.

Prior to announcing the grand champion, Judge Puckett complimented the showmen on their fine animals and the way they conducted themselves in the ring. This is my first time in Borden County, continued Puckett, and I find just what I had heard about the best class of young people you will find in any community.

First year showman, Miss Kandy Belew walked away with the Barrow show hands down winning both Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion her light weight Hampshire and heavy weight Hampshire. These animals, weighing 230 and 237 pounds respectively, were bred by Denny Belew of Anton, Texas, uncle to the

Recipients for the handsome buckles were 4-H and FFA members who placed first in each class in every division in the 1982 Jr Livestock show. Each deserving showman was to be awarded only one buckle, so, in case a youngster placed first in more than one class, the buckle was given to the next in line.

Animals average \$580

Gail-There was certainly no evidence of a recession in Borden County Saturday as an unofficial \$47,030 exchanged hands at the Borden County Jr. Livestock sale.

The over-all sale average for the 81 animals sold came to \$580--again, unofficial. This compares to an average of \$539 in 1981.

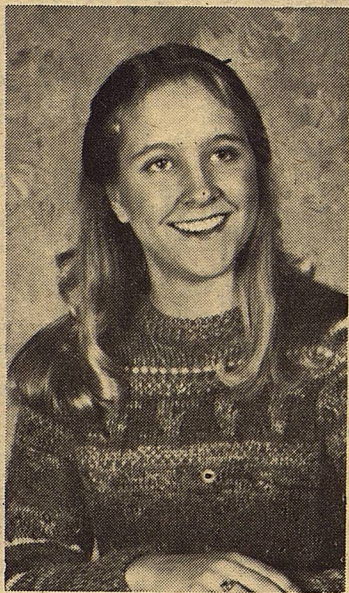
Starting at 1:00 p.m. Saturday, February 27, Ralph Miller introduced auctioneer Monte Paxton--How long have you been working the Borden Co. sale, a hundred years?

'At least', said Monte. 'Actually it has been seventeen years' continued Monte as he reached the auctioneers microphone. 'But I did tell my daughter she couldn't set her wedding date on February 27 because I had to be in Gail,' he added.

Getting the sale off to a good start, Paxton accepted a floor bid from Monfort Packing of San Angelo of 54 cents a pound for the 110 lambs selling. This was up \$1.00 from 1981. Tamda of Amarillo bought the 36 barrow for 48 cents-up \$2.00 from last year. Order buyer W.C. Hart of Snyder received the 5 head of steers for 65 cents a pound, down \$3.50.

The first animal selling through the ring brought top dollar. The Grand Champion Commercial steer owned by Sharon Brummett received a premium bid of \$1500. Buying this 1265 pound steer were: Bill Buchanan, Coahoma State Bank. Con't on Pg. 10

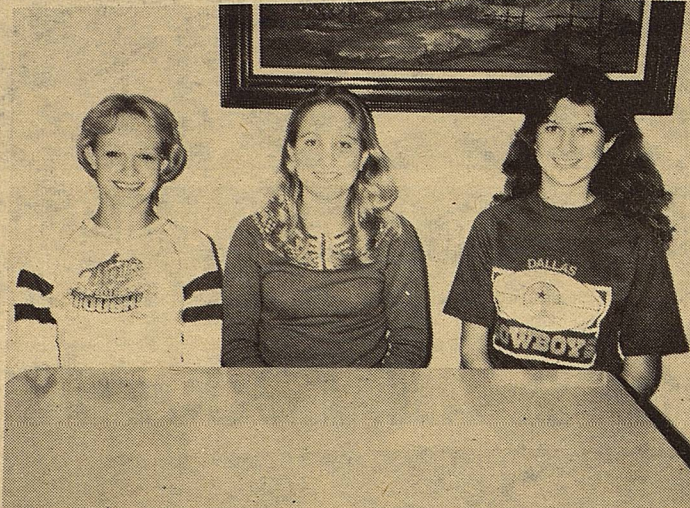

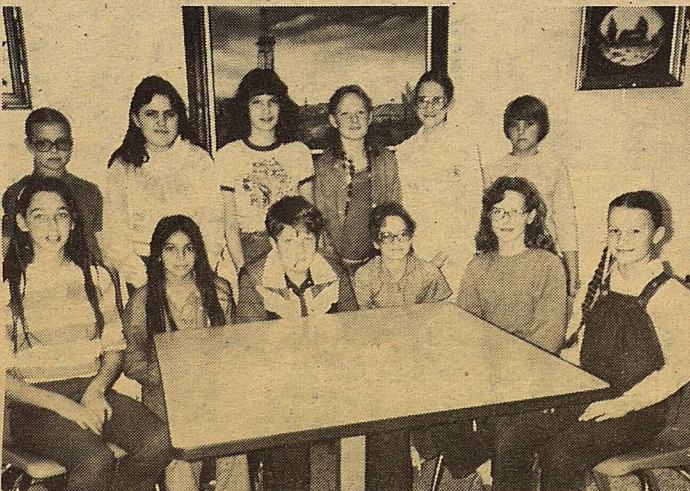
Jennifer is a member of Beta Club, Vice-President of the student body, participates in UIL journalism, one-act play,

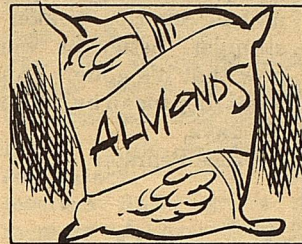
Coyote Boys Final Statistics

Although winning only 8 games and losing 18, the Coyote season stats reveal a season filled with close games and much improved talents. The team statistics showed the Coyotes averaging 41.4 points per game while holding their opponent to 48.6 points per game. However, the averages from the district competition (last 14 games) was even closer with the Coyotes averaging 42.7 and their opponents averaging 44.8.

Jym Rinehart led the Coyotes in scoring this season averaging 11.8 points per game. He was also the leading rebounder averaging 6.8 per game. Jym was also the team

leader in assists and steals (3.7 per game). Jeff Martin led the team in field goal percent (41 percent) and fouls (3 per game). Jym Rinehart was the leading free throw shooter with 59 percent for the season. Doug Love was the number 2 rebounder averaging 5.4 per game, followed closely by Jeff Martin's 5.2 per game.

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Every now and then some reference is made to the Protestant work ethic, not as a viable concept in today's society, but rather as a relic from America's history, a social phenomenon now ridiculously out of date and unfashionable. The Protestant work ethic was a sort of religious and moral code based on the biblical belief that man was divinely designed and destined to work, that idleness and sloth were sinful, eroding the soul, and that each man was morally obliged to pull his own weight. Every man was made to help his neighbor, who was eager to help him back. For an able-bodied man to accept money without working for it was both wicked and shameful. No man with any pride would accept charity, public or private, unless he were absolutely physically unable to provide for himself and his family. Slacker, shirker and draft-dodger were ugly words. Wandering hoboes and tramps expected to do chores in return for meals or handouts. Even in the early days of Franklin Roosevelt's plunge into socialism his Works Progress Administration (note the word 'Works') and Civilian Conservation Corps required labor in return for help from the government. The Protestant work ethic was so ingrained in the American character that if Roosevelt had then suggested that money should be distributed on the basis of some civil entitlement or right to a living, regardless of worth or effort, the average American would have rejected this insult to his character, this governmental immorality. It was commonly accepted that man was born to work and to enjoy the fruits of his labor. Okies, at the very bottom of the social and financial ladder at the very worst of times, packed up and left Oklahoma during the drouth to find a new place in California, looking not for wealth and easy living but for the chance to find work. They neither expected nor wanted benevolence or a guarantee of success. They abandoned their homes, tied their mattresses on top

of their worn-out jalopies and headed west, in the American tradition, to where there was work to be found. America was a nation of boomers, going to the gold fields and following the oil booms, moving on when the ore bodies were mined out and the drilling stopped, leaving the west full of ghost towns in their tracks. Nowadays, when old timers refer to the good old days, they are not recalling the soft living and high times, but rather the days when the Protestant ethic provided a simple set of values that a man and his society could understand and live by, with a sense of pride in himself and

confidence in his neighbors, a feeling of fulfillment and accomplishment in the performance of his life's work, whatever it happened to be. The Protestant work ethic has been abandoned as a bulwark of the American way of life, perhaps as the result of social evolution, greater prosperity and the coming of a life style which emphasizes the desirability of leisure rather than work as a man's principal goal. Maybe the passing of the protestant work ethic was inevitable, but what then, today, is taking its place, and is America weaker or stronger, better or worse now that it's gone? That's what they mean by the good old days.

Steer Show Given Boost

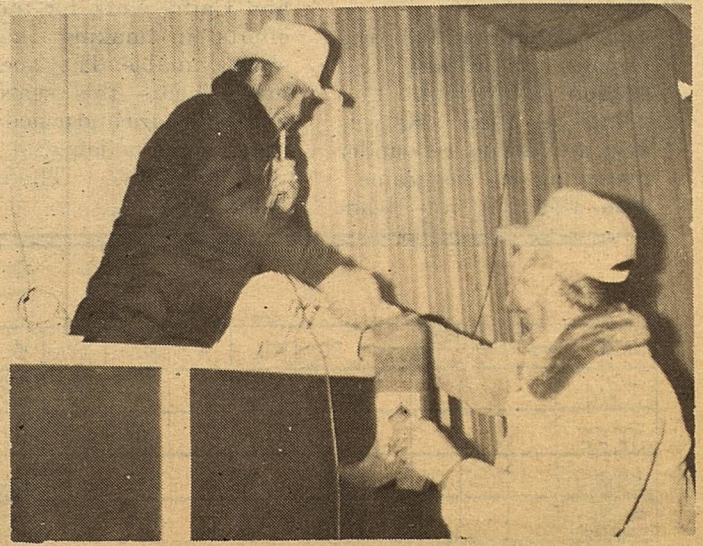
The number of steers being shown at the Borden County Junior Livestock Show has been going down hill for the past several years. This is primarily due to the expense of owning and feeding such an animal. Recognizing that this division of the show was in real danger of becoming history, the cattlemen in Borden County formed a group called The Borden County Cattle Breeders Association (BCCBA). The purpose of this organization is to encourage ranchers in the county to donate a range steer to be fed out and shown by an FFA or 4-H member in the county show. This was tried for the first time this year. Five steers were donated. Recipients names were drawn from a hat. Three of the five animals donated made it to the show. As was pointed out by Ralph Miller, these animals were selected right out of the pasture and

delivered to the feeders only last October. The youngsters showing them worked exceptionally hard, Miller said, in the time allotted them. However the association is working on ways to refine the program. For instance, choosing the calf earlier would give a better show animal. A more adequate screening was also discussed. "This is a new concept" Miller said, and one enthusiastically endorsed by the Breeders--however, it still has some kinks to be worked out," he concluded. Donors this year were: Ralph Miller, Warren Beaver, Moorehouse, and Borden-Spade. Feeders were Glen Bacon, Tim Buchanan, Junior Benavidez, Shelly Buchanan and Shannon Biggs. The association is looking forward to a more competitive steer show next year with Borden County stock.

Volunteers Pull It In

The concession stand at the 1982 Jr. Livestock show in Gail was a whopping success. As some one said "If you went home hungry it was your own fault." Your choices were many including everything from homemade ice cream to sausage and bicquits. The booth opened it's windows in the county barn at 8:00 a.m. on Thursday and didn't close them again until after the sale Saturday afternoon. The concession committee included Kandy McWhorter, county home demonstration agent, Mary John Phinzy and Betty Beaver. Their work began weeks ahead of the stockshow date. They

planned what to serve, bought supplies, asked for donations and lined up workers to bring food from home and keep the booth manned twelve hours a day. The Spanish Inn of Snyder donated nacho chips and Claibornes Bakery of Lamesa made donuts by the dozen. Contributions were also made by Gibsons of Big Spring and J. B. and Jess Claiborne of Lamesa. Homemade bar-b-que, sandwiches, and desserts of all kind were donated by 4-H mothers. Money earned by this effort goes into the Borden County Livestock Association.



The "Top Hand" is determined by the point system. Points are made by the number of animals shown and their placing. Jeffrey placed 4th in the Chester white heavy weight barrow class. He showed five lambs, receiving one 1st place, one 3rd, and one 4th place. He also received a Reserve Grand Champion and a 3rd place rating in the Commercial Steer division. The name Jeffrey Martin will be engraved on the handsome roving trophy which remains in the high school trophy case.

The Top Hand award was started in 1967 by Mr. and Mrs. Max Zant in memory of their young son Larry who was killed in a tractor accident that year. Mrs. Zant also gives a check of \$50.00 to the winner and a large plaque to take home is donated by Sunshine Unlimited.

LAMBS

Saturday dawned clear and crisp as the steer show got underway at 9:00 a.m.

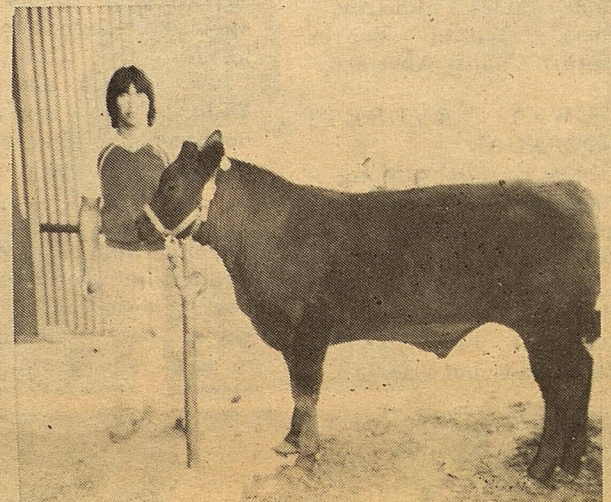

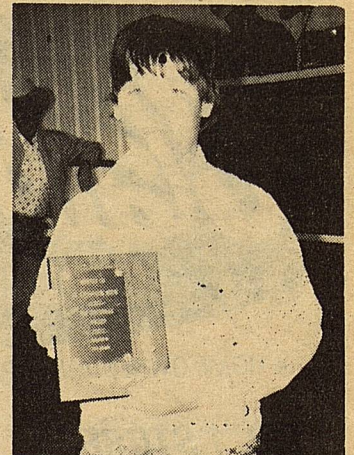
Jeffrey is another senior having exhibited animals for a long time. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Martin of Fluvanna.

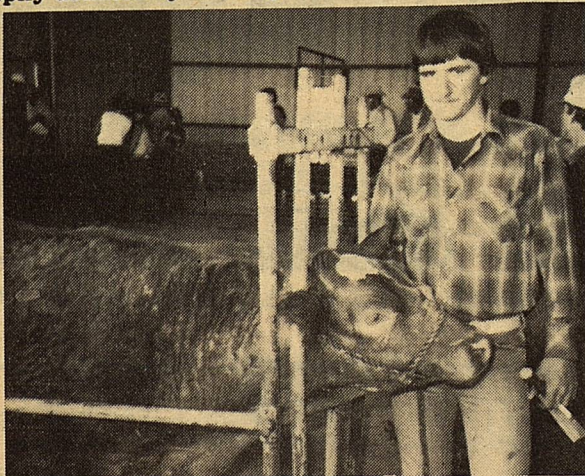

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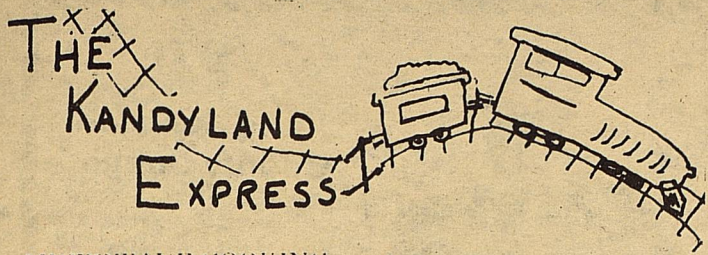
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MICROWAVE COOKING
A wide variety of microwave ovens is available today to make almost all food preparation faster and easier. Like conventional ranges, microwave ovens differ in their rate and evenness of cooking.

**VEGETABLES
PROVENÇAL**

4 cups small cauliflowerets
2 cups sliced carrots
¼ cup water
½ cup sliced pitted black olives
2 medium green peppers, cut into thin strips
1 bottle (8 oz.) Italian salad dressing
1 t. sugar

In 2 qt. casserole, combine cauliflowerets, carrots, and water. Cover. Microwave at High 6 to 11 minutes, or until cauliflowerets are tender-crisp, stirring after

half the cooking time. Drain. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours, stirring occasionally. Remove vegetables with a slotted spoon to serving tray or dish.

TART LEMON SQUARES

1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
½ cup lemon juice
1 ½ cups graham cracker crumbs
1-3 cup brown sugar
1-3 cup mlted butter

Stir milk and lemon juice together until thick and smooth. Set aside. Mix crumbs, sugar and butter. Put half of mixture into an 8 inch square dish and press firmly. Cook about 45 feconds. Pour milk mixture over crust and spread evenly. Sprinkle remaining crumbs over top and pat down gently. Place dish in oven and cook 7 to 8 minutes. Rotate after half of cooking time.

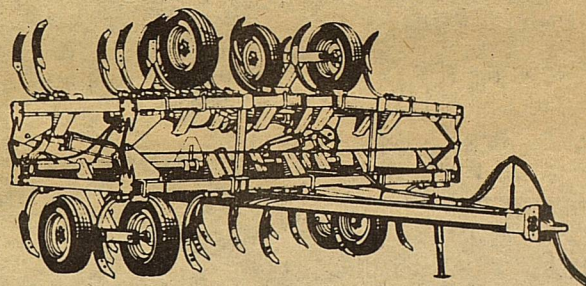

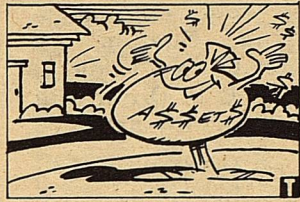
