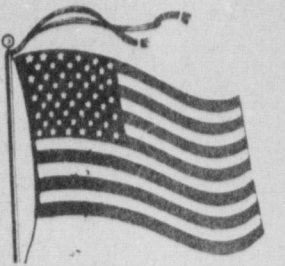

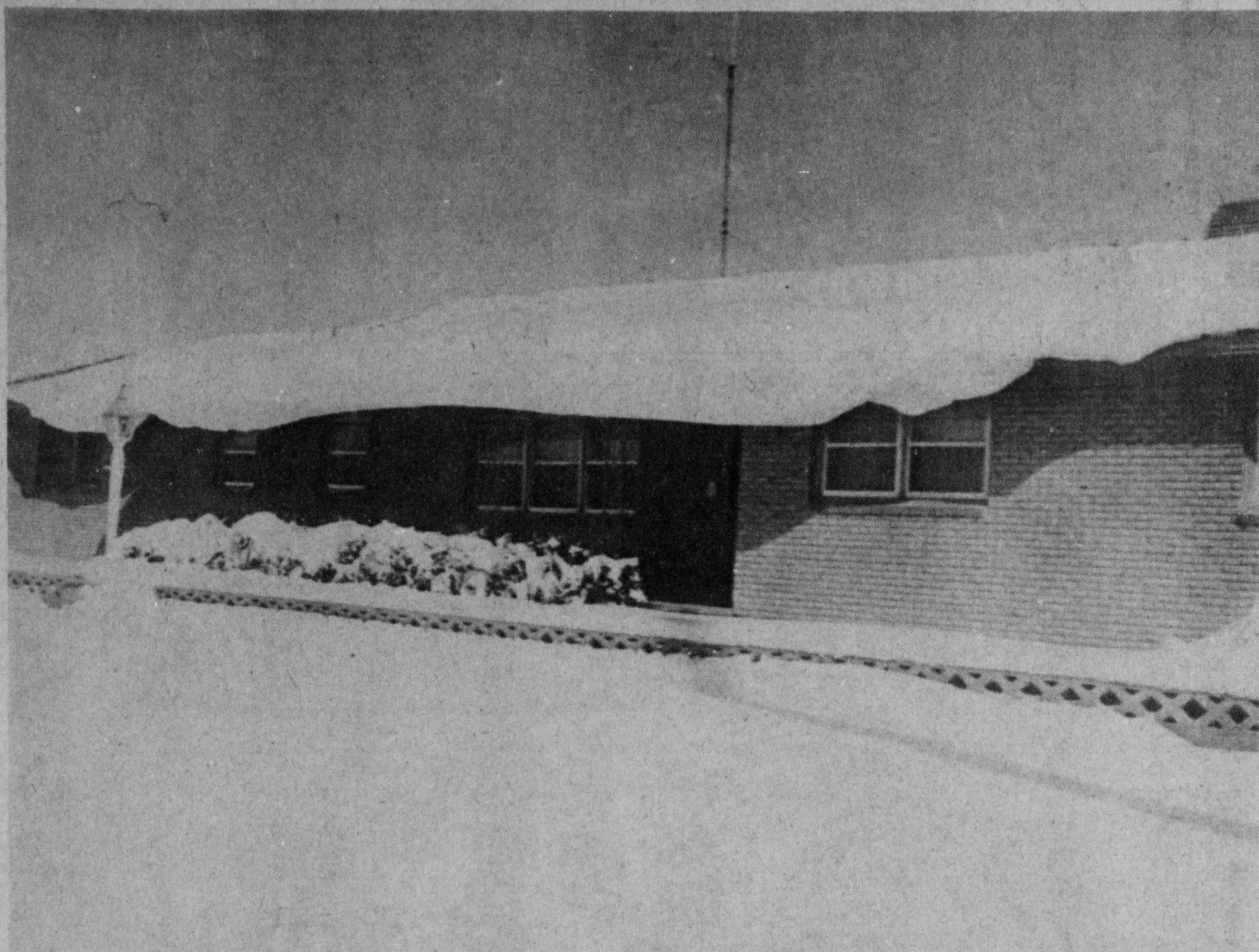

### Soil Testing Aids Farmers With Growth

Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever, emphasizes Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. And getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the level of available nutrients in the soil before fertilization.

That calls for a soil test. A soil test will determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement those nutrients. Tanksley said it's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Tanksley also emphasizes that now is an excellent time to take soil samples and have soil tested for fall crops as well as those for the 1981 season. Soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of

### New Cycle Law Will Require More Training

Following a story last week about the new laws governing mopeds and laws for 15-18 year old operators, the following information has been released:

Legislation effective January 1 requires Texans between 15 and 18 to complete a motorcycle driver education course before they can receive a license to operate a motorcycle.

Col. Jim Adams, director of the Department of Public Safety, asked that parents keep the requirement in mind when considering whether to give teenagers motorcycles for Christmas.

"We are currently working with the Texas Education Agency and the Motorcycle Safety Foundation to make this training available through our public schools," Adams said.

"An applicant will be required to complete our regular 32 hours of classroom driver education before enrolling in the motorcycle training course."

The course may also be offered by colleges and universities, educational service centers, or licensed commercial driving training schools, Adams added.

He noted motorcycle accidents killed 356 persons in Texas during 1979 and said more than 70 percent of all motorcyclists killed during 1978 and 1979 were not wearing helmets.

Since August, 1977, Texans over 18 have been allowed to ride motorcycles without protective headgear.

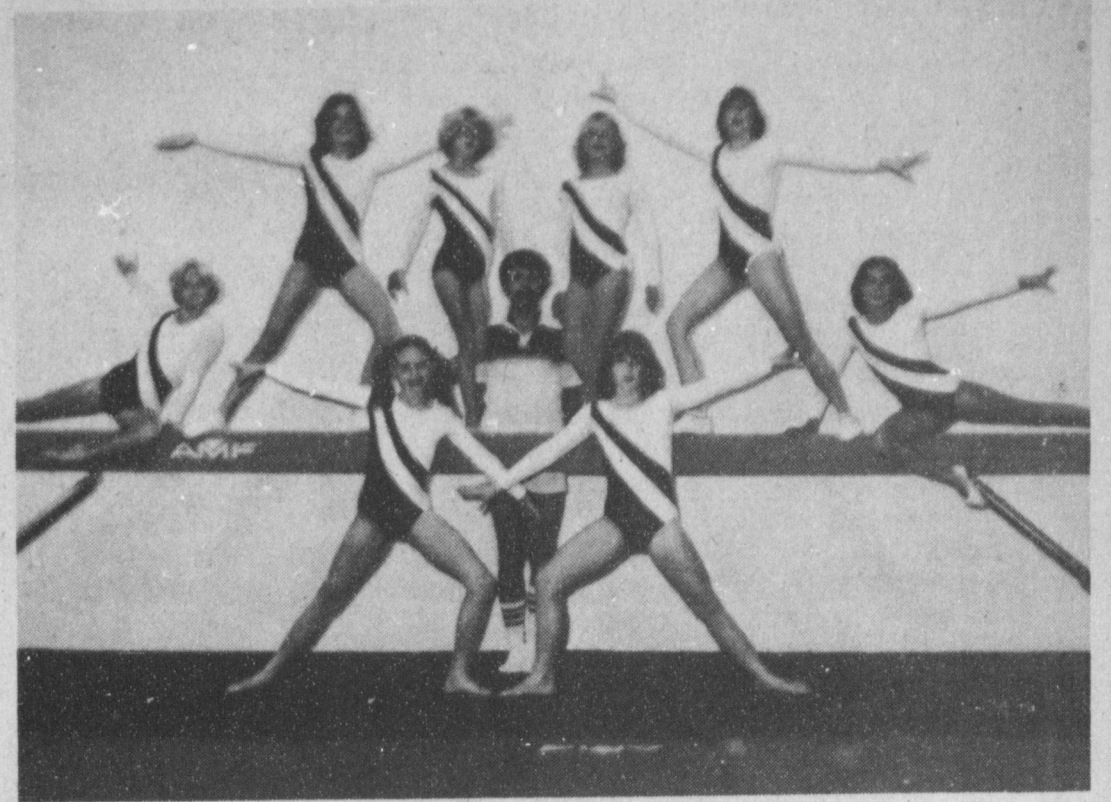

**The Scientists Tell Me . . .**

**We Can Use Lignite Energy Without Permanent Loss of Cropland**

Texas has an estimated 110 billion tons of lignite, a low-grade coal often called "brown coal," that so far, we've used very little. In heat value it lies between peat and bituminous coal.

Not considered worth developing as long as we had plenty of oil and gas, it's now of great interest as low-cost fuel for power generators. Estimates are that the State's 110 billion tons are the equivalent of about 500 billion barrels of oil, or about twice the amount of Texas oil we've discovered until now.

Of course not all of this fuel is available with present methods of surface mining. About 10.4 billion tons of lignite are within 200 feet of the ground surface, and that's about as deep as practical for surface mining. But as much as a million acres of land could be disturbed by surface mining, and there is concern that this could spoil land needed for food and fiber production.

Since 1974, a team of scientists with Texas A&M University has been working on problems associated with restoring this land to production after completion of mining.

Their minimum goal is that the land should be at least as productive as it was before the mining operation. And they believe that in some instances it will be possible to improve productivity.

"We have found that these lands usually require heavy applications of both nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizers," says Dr. Lloyd Hossner, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"This is to be expected since the original soils overlying the lignite are some of the more infertile soils in the State and require heavy application of fertilizer under normal conditions to produce good yields.

"After several years of testing such crops as corn, soybeans, and grain sorghum, we're convinced that with proper handling during min-

ing and after, land can be returned to production agriculture.

"Note, though, I said proper handling; this is the key! Unless mining is done with full understanding of the soils being worked with, very difficult problems with excess acidity, water pollution, hard pan, etc. can be created," Hossner said.

A national surface mining law was enacted in 1977 and is administered by the Surface Mining Division of the United States Department of Interior.

Current Texas regulations concerning surface mining were generally promulgated during the 1970's as a result of public concern about environment. The Texas Surface Mining and Reclamation Act established a permit process for coal, lignite, and uranium mines and is presently administered by the Texas Railroad Commission. It is empowered to declare areas unsuitable for mining, to reject inadequate applications, and to deny or condition permits if the applicant's reclamation plan is unsuitable.

All applicants for surface mining permits are required to describe the existing environment, including the geology, topography, land use, vegetation, wildlife habitats, and soils.

A plan must be presented for reclamation of the mine spoils, including vegetation of the area. The applicant is responsible for the success of the vegetation for 5 years and must determine alternative end-use of the reclaimed land.

"Mining companies are anxious to comply with all regulations in the easiest, fastest, most economical way possible," says Hossner.

"To do so, they're finding that the detailed information required to get a mining permit can often serve as a blueprint for restoration, if used intelligently.

"By this, I mean that knowledge of the soil characteristics can dictate its order of restoration. Often, you can avoid excess acidity, or restoration of a claypan, or similar problems and actually improve soil productivity.

"In restored soil, lack of

humus can cause problems with crusting, but this can be remedied by plowing under several crops.

"In fact, the majority of surface-mined lands in the United States have been re-vegetated with forages, primarily because of their erosion prevention and soil building capabilities.

"The relatively quick financial return from a livestock grazing system makes this reclamation alternative especially attractive.

"It was found that good yields of both grasses and legumes can be obtained on

mined soils with adequate fertilization. Kleingrass and Coastal bermudagrass were the highest yielding grasses in a study in Freestone

County, while Yuchi arrowleaf clover proved to be the most productive legume.

### Small Cotton Crop Brings High Prices

AUSTIN--Some Texas farmers will be in "high cotton" this year, at least those with harvestable acreage of good quality, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

Spot market prices for certain grades of Upland cotton have hit 92.29 cents a pound this month "the highest price anyone in the industry can remember," Brown said. Economists are predicting the futures market will soon be at \$1.00 with further increases ahead.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service's September estimate for cotton production was for a harvest of 3.6 million bales. "That could mean a potential value of nearly \$1 billion for cotton this year," Brown said. "Some of our cotton was forward contracted this year

at specific rates below current levels, but many farmers will be in the position to receive these better prices," Brown said.

Drought reduced the 1980 crop significantly from the 5.5 million bales last year, and prices started rising in mid-summer.

Cottonseed prices have not risen at the same rate as those for lint. Seed for oil processing is in competition with other vegetable oils. Currently prices are at an average of \$110 a ton, which is lower than the average price in 1979 of \$117 per ton.

Texas is the leading exporter in the U. S. of cotton and accounts for 30 percent of all production in the nation.

"While it is great to see rising prices for cotton, we have to realize that if prices get too high, the mills will substitute synthetics," Brown said.

One's the price of fat cattle... the other, the price of feed. By the time a proper prediction is put together there are more "ifs" than there are cattle. Usually the answer gets worked out - about April 1st.

### Bob Bullock Reports Texas Motorists Buying Less Gas

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that during the past year gasoline consumption in Texas took a nosedive at a time when the number of vehicles on the state's roads increased.

He said during the state's past fiscal year, which ended August 31, Texas motorists consumed 8 billion gallons of gasoline.

Figures for the 1979 fiscal year show that more than 8.5 billion gallons of gasoline were sold in Texas and about the same amount sold in 1978.

Bullock put total vehicle registration in Texas for the 1980 fiscal year at 11.9 million vehicles, compared to 10 million vehicles on Texas roads during 1979.

"A half billion gallon drop is significant at a time when the state's car and truck population is skyrocketing," Bullock said.

"Our analysis doesn't show whether people are driving less or getting better mileage, but they are definitely buying less gas," he said.

Texas motorists used between 600 and 700 million gallons of gasoline a month, Bullock said.

Bullock said his office collected \$399.4 million in gasoline taxes during the past year, compared to \$417 million turned into the state during 1979.

He said three-quarters of the tax goes to the highway fund and one-quarter is put into the Available School Fund.

Gasoline is taxed at five cents a gallon and diesel fuel is taxed at six and a half cents a gallon, according to Bullock.

Diesel fuel tax revenues amounted to more than \$78 million during fiscal 1980, compared to \$70.7 million during 1979.

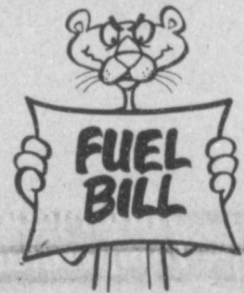
About 5 billion gallons of

diesel fuel were sold in Texas last year, Bullock said.

A comparison of vehicles and consumption of gasoline for 1980 shows the "average" automobile or truck used 680 gallons of gasoline during the 12 month period.

Registered vehicles and gasoline consumed during 1979 "averages out to 843 gallons a year.

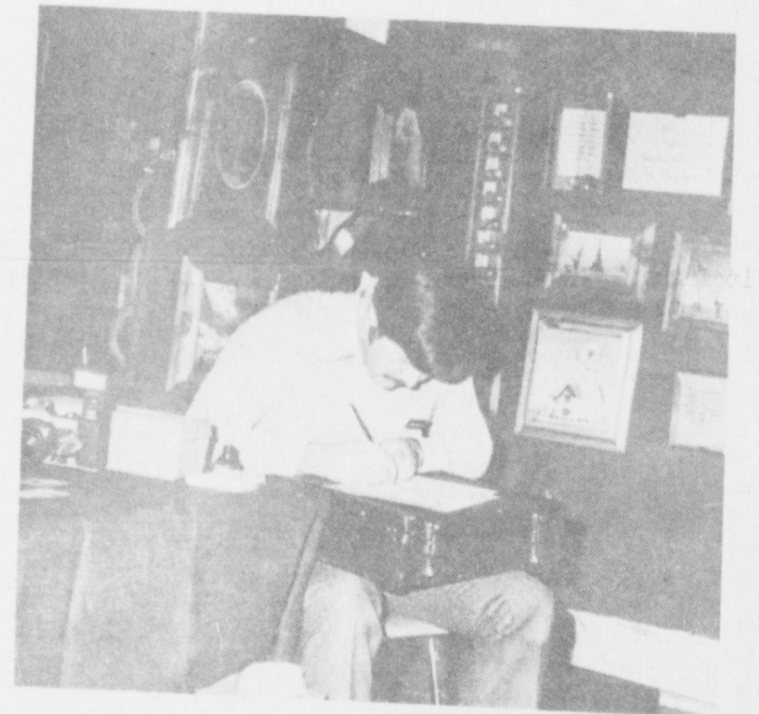


