Rodeo competition is Gail cowgirl's life and lifestyle

'Riding horses and traveling the rodeo circuit for years has been a very big part of my life,' admits 20-year-old Gayla Newton. 'If you're going to be good at something, it takes lots of hard work.' And hard work is what the Western all-American sport is all about.

For the pert Gail, Texas sophomore, getting horses trained for competition means riding each day, keeping the animals in top physical condition, trotting and loping them up to 10

miles to enhance their alertness.

One of Gayla's specialties is barrel racing. 'I take my barrel horse around a set of barrels maybe once a week, depending on where I may be traveling.' Then, at the meet, she simply aims for a 'smoother ride, especially if they've been knocked over by earlier contestants.'

But team roping is a good event, too. 'It relaxes my horse and gets his mind off the barrels,' she says.

What is it like for the college rodeo team member to compete in different

arenas throughout the year? Her mother prepares food for the motor home('my home away from home') which 'sure beats cafe cooking,' she admits, especially when it's a one-day trip to Sweetwater or a whole weekend in Ft. Worth

Equipment for grooming and competing (like ropes, goat strings and special tack) 'must be remembered each time we hit the road.' During the college year, she goes to at least six school events. But summer is the busy season with three or four rodeos scheduled weekly, sometimes two per day. Sleeping late isn't unusual when competitions run from 8 p.m. to the wee hours of the morning.

So a cycle is set--'this is rodeoing full time, day and night,' as Gayla puts it.

Energetic and involved, the 'Western and boogie' dance enthusiast was Miss AJRA (American Junior Rodeo Association) here last year. She has been a member of the organization since age 10. Not surprising, Mom said before I walked I was riding a horse, she shares, grinning.

But, for now, Gayla admits that the WPRA (Women's Professional Rodeo Association) and NIRA (National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association) are channels providing events like open barrel races that are considered money-making competitions based upon entry fees and prize money offerings. The NIRA

This will be the last issue of the Borden Star until the January 5, 1983 issue.



STORING **NON-PRESCRIPTION** DRUGS

The bathroom medicine cabinet despite it's name is not the best place to store most pharmaceuticals.

Keeping non-prescription drugs away from the bathroom's heat and humidity can extend their lifetime and effectiveness.

A better place to store most drugs is a linen closet outside the bathroom. A convenient way to organize medicine in the closet is in an airtight container, large enough to hold a variety of bottles, jars and tubes and small enough to fit neatly on a shelf.

You should also observe these other safety tips for storing medicine.

1. Always recap tubes and bottles tightly.

2.Don't refrigerate medicine unless instructed to do so.

3. Discard cotton padding under the lid of pill bottles, but don't throw out the little white disc of silicagel that is found in many bottles. It helps keep the pills dry.

4.Examine such topical antiseptics as hydrogen peroxide or iodine periodically. If peroxide loses it's fizz, it should be discarded. And if iodine is allowed to evaporate and condense, it becomes too strong and can burn the skin.

5. Keep track of pruchase dates by labeling medicine bottles. Go through the storage box annually and discard items over one year

WINDBREAKS

CONSERVE ENERGY

Rising energy costs have made windbreak plantings real assets to rural farm families.

Fringe benefits of windbreaks can be protection for cattle and a refuge for birds and the wildlife.

well-designed windbreak will reduce wind speed, prevent drifting snow and lower heating bills. Even a small windbreak can make outdoor living and working conditions more enjoyable during the winter. Plant screens also help reduce

thoroughfares.

location of The windbreaks is the key to their effectiveness. Evergreen windbarriers on the north and west sides of the house can cut 10 to 40 percent off winter fuel bills. Junipers and pines provide the most protection.

Plant windbreaks four to six times the height of the windbreak away from the house. We recommend growing species that will mature to about one to one-and-a-half times the height of the house. Locate large trees 100 to 150 feet from the north or west side of the house and roads to

prevent snow drifts.


For maximum protection, three to six rows of trees are needed on farmsteads and one to two rows in suburban areas. Six to eight-foot spacings are appropriate for most evergreen plants used for windbreaks.

Trees for windbreaks are available from the Texas Forest Service and should be planted in late winter or early spring.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is reminding producers that they have the option of extending their 1980 and 1981-crop cotton loans.

The 1980-crop loans were given a special 12-month extension last March, for a total loan period of 30 months. Loans on 1981-crop cotton which are reaching their 10-month maturity date are renewable for an additional 8 months. We encourage farmers to extend their loans rather than forfeit the crop. This is because it would be in the farmer's best interest to maintain control of the cotton if market prices increase during the extending loan period.

Producers whose cotton loans are maturing will be notified approximately one month prior to the maturity date. To extend the loan, producers must sign a loan extension agreement and either mail or deliver it to the county ASCS office.

If market prices do not improve and the producer chooses to forfeit at the end of the extended loan period. the Commodity Credit Corporation will assume the charges against the cotton. Thus, there is no additional cost to the producer for renewing cotton loans.

Under the commodity loan program, farmers borrow money using their crops as collateral. When the loan matures, producers either repay the loan plus interest or forfeit the crop the the CCC.
