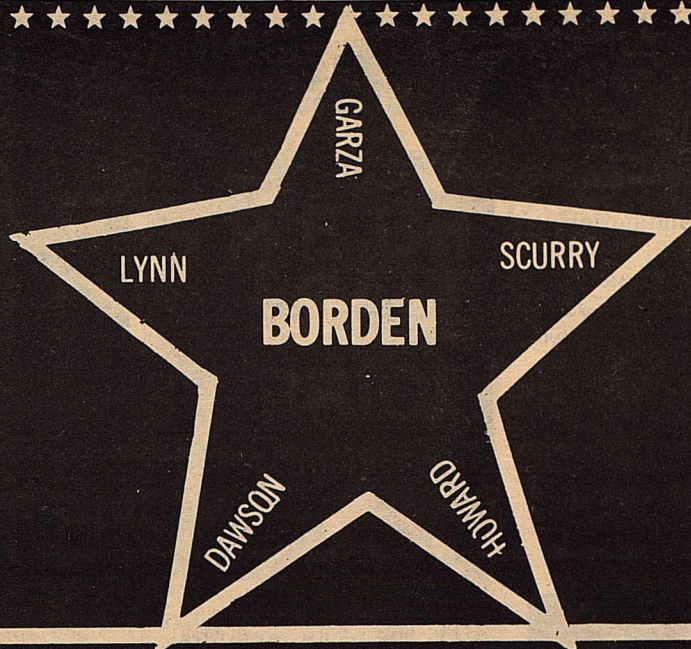

Open 4-H horse show June 5

The Borden County Open 4-H Horse Show will be held Saturday, June 5 in the Gail Rodeo arena. Entry fees are \$3 per event and will be collected before the horse show begins at 9:00 a.m.

Mr. J. T. Sullinger from Dermott will be the judge for the 1982 show. The classes that will be held are: Grade Mare; Registered Mare; Grade Gelding; Registered Gelding; Showmanship; Western Pleasure; Reining; Pole bending; Barrel Racing and Flag racing. Each performance class and the Showmanship classes will be broken into

age groups, Pee wee, Junior and Senior age groups.

Awards in the Pee wee classes will be trophies through 6th place and ribbons through 10th. Tack will be awarded in the Junior and Senior classes through 5th place and ribbons through 10th. Tack awards will consist of halters, feed buckets, brushes, and other tack.

Pee wee classes are eligible for youth less than 9 years of age as of 1-1-82. Juniors are youth ages 9-14 years of age as of 1-1-82 and Seniors are those 15-19 years of age.

Entry blanks are available in the county extension office and will be available the day of the show. For more information call 856-4201.

Warning to home pesticide users

As spring approaches, homeowners must once again begin their yearly battle against weeds, insects and other yard pests.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown warns those planning to use pesticides in fighting these pests to exercise extreme caution.

"These chemicals are only as safe as the person who is using them", Brown said.

"Some of the worst problems with improper use of pesticides occur in urban areas," Brown added.

"Studies have shown that in 14 U.S. cities the pesticide levels in urban soil were higher than in adjacent cropland."

A Texas Department of Agriculture study performed in 1972-73 showed that residues of pesticides were in heaviest concentrations in silt and sediment of major Texas rivers below cities, rather than in rural areas upriver.

It is most important that

the pesticide user read all labels carefully before making a purchase. This assures him that his is getting the most effective product for his problem. It is the wisest to purchase pesticides in small quantities to avoid the need for storage. It is also important that the container be disposed of properly. If the user mixes more than is required, the additional material should be disposed of immediately. I also recommend that the pesticide user not smoke while using these chemicals," Brown warns.

"It can take a company ten years and \$15 to \$20 million to get a safe product on the retail shelf, but this effort is wasted if the applicator does not follow directions," he added.

"The rates of application for pesticides are set at levels which are effective, but not harmful to the applicator or most wildlife. Yet, many homeowners

assume that if a little does some good, a lot will do even better. This carelessness results in problems with applications.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) registers 8,000 products from about 800 companies annually. Detailed information is required on the label which covers the chemicals included in formulation, plants or insects designated for treatment, and the proper procedures for use and storage. TDA also requires warnings and information on emergency medical steps. If a pesticide applicator has any questions or doubts about a certain pesticide, he may call TDA for analysis.

Persons using restricted use pesticides must go through a special training session and become licensed or certified by TDA before they may obtain permission to use these restricted chemicals.

As a rule of thumb, any land title that pre-dates the American Civil War ought to be good. Territorial claims that go back 200 years should make Texans nervous about giving Texas back to Mexico, or even to Spain. England has claimed and occupied the Falkland Islands since 1831, and that ought to be long enough to establish ownership in anybody's court of law.

The Argentinian government gambled that England would protest, perhaps to the United Nations, scream a lot, and then back down and give up. The Falkland Islands as real estate are not worth going to war over, especially war against one of the world's stronger military powers. The Argentinian leaders must have believed that the English people did not have the will or the economic incentive to fight for such a small, insignificant unproductive piece of property such a long way from home. Would the Argentinian government have taken such a chance if

the Falkland Islands belonged to Russia?

England is morally right. The consequences of England's backing away from this fight would have been tragic for the free world. Any ambitious dictator would have been given the signal to go ahead with whatever aggression he might have in mind, knowing that the free world powers would tolerate without retaliation any military action anywhere, perhaps short of invasion of the homeland. Knowing the principle involved, why did the United States not vent its outrage against Argentina rather than take the mushy friends of both sides approach? Why did not the President declare the United States unequivocally against military aggression, regardless of past friendship? What would have been the effect if President Reagan, in his dramatic style, had publicly denounced Argentina's actions, in wrathful indignation and repudiation of the use of military might, partly supplied by us, in the invasion of a defenseless land, peaceably occupied by a small, unarmed populace?

By shuttling Alexander Haig back and forth between the two countries, pleading with both sides to negotiate, thereby implying that their causes were equal, did we not give Argentina's case some undeserved credibility and Argentina's leaders some reason to believe that they would get away with it?

Is our State Department so bound up in concern for Latin American opinion and Russian reaction that we are unable to recognize a principle or a moral issue and act on it? When the United States gave up the Panama Canal Zone, an infinitely more valuable property than the Falkland Islands, did this example of spineless acquiescence and appeasement serve as a precedent on which all Latin American countries could base their future actions or territorial demands?

Bully for you, John Bull, and shame on us.

Nine Million Eligible Texans Fail To Vote

Rep. Larry Don Shaw Reports From Austin

A few years ago, I was reminding a friend to be sure to vote in the general election when he cut me short to say that he hadn't voted in twenty years and didn't plan to vote ever again. It only encourages 'em," he explained with a straight face.

It's hard to be encouraged by the turnout in this year's primary elections in Texas. With our state's population fast approaching the 15 million mark, there are more than 10 million Texans who are 18 or older therefore eligible to vote. Of those, only 6.6 million are registered to vote. And of those, only 1.35 million 21 percent went to the polls on May 1st. As usual, the turnout in rural counties was higher than the statewide average. The turnout in Harris County (Houston), however, was a pitiful nine percent. It would be nice to have interest rates that low again, but a nine percent voter turnout

doesn't indicate a great deal of appreciation for what should be our most cherished right.

The turnout in this year's primary elections was approximately the same as in the primaries in 1952. Texas' population back then was less than eight million, and the number of registered voters was less than one third what it is today.

Let's hope the turnout in the June 5 runoff election is higher.

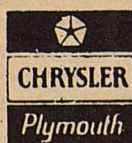

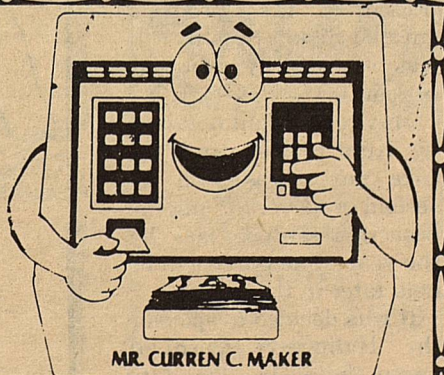

SEWING STRETCH WOVENS

Have you tried sewign with today's stretch woven fabrics?

Sew with stretch woven fabrics to make active sportswear as well as tailored garments.

They're durable and flexible-and easy to sew.

Just follow a few guidelines.

When laying out the pattern, make sure the fabric is flat with no part hanging off the cutting surface-and be sure to place the pattern pieces so that the stretch is going in the right direction.

Avoid stretching the fabric during cutting to prevent distorting the garment.

When stitching, use a polyester thread because it has the stretchability and strength needed.

A sharp needle or ballpoint needle in size 14 is recommended with 12-13 stitches per inch.

Use a slightly loose

tension and light pressure on the pressure foot.

Use a straight stitch or a stretch stitch or a tiny zig-zag or an overcast stitch that stitches the seam and over-casts at the same time.

To finish the seam with a straight stitch machine, stitch on eighty inch from the seam through both seam allowances and trim close to the stitching.

To finish the seams with a zig-zag machine, double stitch with the zig-zag.

For stretch wovens, use an interfacing that has built in stretch where the stvetch of the fabric is to be maintained.

Use conventional interfacing where stability is needed.

If you're making buttonholes, remember that machine made buttonholes will function better if they are placed in the opposite direction to the stretch of fabric.

Topstitching is an excellent trim to get the seam allowances to lie flat. Try a longer stitch for topstitching-about nine stitches per inch.

When pressing, use brown paper strips under the seam allowances and under darts to prevent impressions from showing on the right side.

COTTON PLANTING TIME

I know that by the time some of you read this article you will have already planted several acres of cotton. If you haven't started, you most likely have your fingers on keys to tractor and are ready to plant.

Second Grade Wins Coke Party

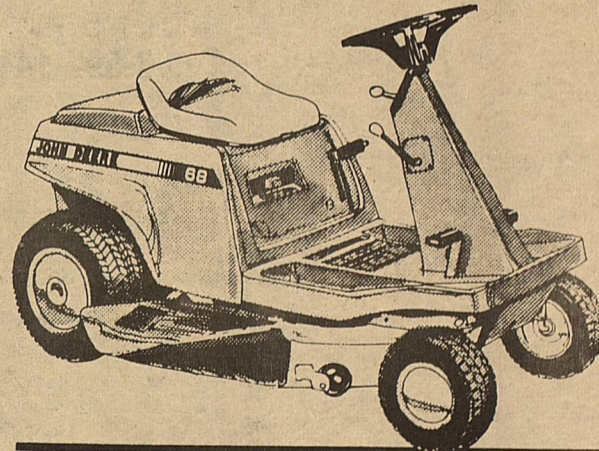

1982 WHEAT CERTIFICATION

Did you plant wheat? Have you certified your wheat acreage? If you did plant wheat and have not certified the crop acreage you have until Monday May 17th to do so.

Acreage not certified by this date will not be eligible for any program benefits, such as price support loan and possible wheat deficiency payments of .50 per bushel.

Only producers who filed an intention to participate and submit an accurate acreage certification (by the May 17th deadline) will be eligible for program benefits. However if you are not a participant but wish to establish a base for the 1983 crop year, or you have a base and did not plant for 1982 you too need to certify by the May 17th deadline. (A zero certification will protect the base established for 1983)

SMALL GRAIN ON CONSERVING USE ACREAGE

Small grain acreage of wheat, barley, or oats planted prior to January 29th, may be designated as cover for conserving use acres (CUA). The acreage can be grazed or hayed with out regard to the six month non grazing period. If cut for hay it must be bailed by May 17th and then devoted to an approved conserving use. Acreage being grazed must also be substantially grazed out by the May 17th deadline, but cattle can remain on the acreage past May 17th. This acreage must also be devoted to an approved conserving use after being grazed out and cannot be grazed for the remainder of the six month non grazing period.

Small grain acreage used as conserving use acreage must be certified by May 17th.

SIX MONTH NON GRAZING PERIOD

Remember-conserving use acreage cannot be grazed during the continuous six month period of April

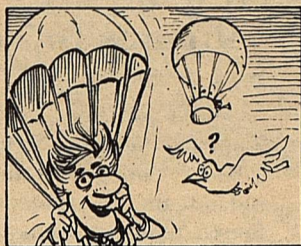
1st through September 30th. (With the exception of small grain planted prior to Jan. 29 and designated by May 17)

MAY INTEREST RATE

Commodity loans disbursed in May will carry a 14.125 percent interest rate.

COTTON AND GRAIN SORGHUM LOANS

May 31st is the final date to place 1981 crop cotton or grain sorghum into the Commodity Credit Corporation Price Support Loan program.
