PHS renovation nearing final stage

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees set June 30 as the date for a public hearing to discuss and adopt the proposed 2009-2010 budget and tax rate.

Carol Fields, the district's business manager, told the school board at their meet-

ing Tuesday night that she had not yet received the appraisal information yet, but the budget has to be adopted by the end of June.

Construction, a lawsuit and a logo for the new Pampa Junior High School were also main topics of conversation at the school board Tuesday night.

The board of trustees heard progress reports on

the high school renovation and expansion project and construction of the new junior high. They also amended the contract with the construction company installing the new synthetic turf on the football field at Harvester Stadium.

Randy Stephenson, construction coordinator for the district, told the board that faulty tile on the sec-

ond floor of the science area of Pampa High School was being replaced by the tile company at no cost to the district. He also said that everything had been moved into the new library and most of the equipment had been installed in the new kitchen.

Stephenson said minor work still remained to be done in the commons area,

but the district already had plans to use the commons, which will seat almost 600 people, for training sessions beginning in August.

The most visible signs of construction at the high school this summer, he said, would be work in the parking lot on the north side of the school.

"It will look complete-

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City, PEDC to team up against trash

The city and the Pampa Economic Development Corporation are ironing out the details of a PEDC funded clean-up program for non-profits.

City of Pampa Public Works Director Donny Hooper told commissioners at the regular meeting Tuesday afternoon that one of the most consistent problems is the city's alleyways. PEDC board members and city staff are currently hammering out details for a Cash for Trash program exclusively for non-profits.

"They have come forward in the past and offered to help," Hooper said. He explained that the basic proposal has the group picking a day and an area, obtaining a permit from the city and then being paid for the trash they bring in.

Hooper gave a short recap of ways the city has committed to programs since 2001. "Sometimes I think we don't toot our own horn enough," Hooper said.

The most popular program seems to be loan-a-bin. The city has two 10-yard rolloff bins that residents can use and have the items they dispose of hauled away for free. Hooper said the bins are both in fairly constant use. "The tonnage generated is pretty extensive," he told the commissioners.

The landfill is also open all day the first Saturday of every month, and until noon other Saturdays—on top of the normal hours of operation on week days.

In 2001, the city began demolishing abandoned house. Personnel have completed 400 demolitions so far, 49 in the last 14

Debate on name of PJHS mascot favors unity

Eloquent pleas by a teacher and a coach from Pampa Junior High School and a change on the school board may lead to a change in name, mascot and logo.

The Pampa Independent School District Board of Trustees were to vote on the adoption of a logo for the new junior high being during their meeting Tuesday night, but Coach Jim Gill and Miranda Bailey, both from the junior high school, told the board that the majority of the teachers, staff, students and athletic department wanted the junior high teams to be the Harvesters.

Earlier this year, after months of debate, the school board had selected the name 'The Reapers' and had reviewed several proposed logos for the new junior high. Before the end of school, they narrowed the selection of logos and sent their selections to the junior high for review.

The school board was to make a final selection on the logo Tuesday night, but Gill told the board that as a coach, he would like to see the name Harvesters applied to both the high school and junior high teams.

"Pampa is a great town," Gill said.

He said it should be one town and one team.

"It's hard to beat one team," Gill said.

He cited several towns where school pride is centered on one team and one mascot, saying the students grow up in a tradition.

"They start when they're little bitty," Gill said.

He said the junior high students should be Harvesters in name as well as in spirit.

"Please let us be one town, one team," Gill said.

Bailey said Pampa Athletic Director Stuart Smith was on record as saying 100 percent of the athletic department was in favor of making the junior high mascot the same as

Perry says he will call special session

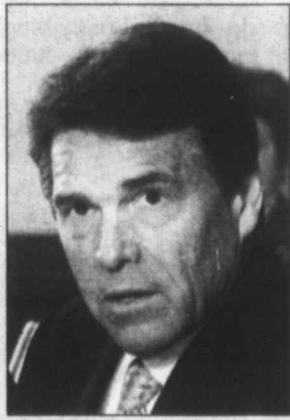
AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry said Tuesday he will call a special legislative session so lawmakers can address unfinished state business, but he wouldn't say when.

"We now are to the point that we can say that there will be a special session. When is still a little bit up in the air," Perry said.

The Legislature adjourned its 140-day regular session June 1 without passing key "sunset" bills that would have kept important state agencies running, including the transportation and insurance departments and the Texas Racing Commission.

Last week, Perry said his staff was studying all

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry broke his collarbone Tuesday night while riding a mountain bike near his home.

Allison Castle, a spokeswoman for the governor, told The Associated Press that Perry had been released from Seton Medical Center where he was treated after breaking his right collarbone. He also had a minor

Open meetings violation suit filed against PISD

Rebecca Terrell and Chandrashekar Thanedar are taking the Pampa Independent School District to court over alleged violations of the Texas Open Meetings Act.

The two claim the school district did not properly post notice of school board meetings this spring and that information they were given by school officials was incorrect.

Rebecca Terrell had taught for the school district, but at the school board's

March 26 meeting, the board voted to terminate her contract. Terrell, a history and geography teacher, questioned why her evaluations by school administrators were lower than evaluations by Region 16 officials.

Requesting that all deliberations in her case be held in public session at the school board meeting, Terrell told the board that Region 16 officials told her she was doing a nice job, but school district administrators gave her unsatisfactory recommendations and then refused to discuss those recommendations with her.

Archeological dig set for June 13-20

Texas public school teachers can earn up to 48 hours of professional development credit when they attend the Texas Archeological Society's field school at the Courson family ranch near Perryton, Tx from June 13-20.

In addition to adult programs, TAS has an excellent youth program, geared for the ages of seven to fourteen, conducted by two professional archaeologists, Dr. Scott Brosowski will be the principal investigator and Danny Witt will serve as the assistant principal investigator. Archeologists, students, teachers, and their families can participate in historic and prehistoric excavations and surveys. No prior experience is necessary.

The TAS campground will be at Wolf Creek Park and Lake Fryer, in Ochiltree county about 15 miles from Perryton. Large elm and cottonwood trees at the campsite promise an enjoyable tenting experience. The Society also provides a kitchen trailer and cooks to prepare breakfast and evening meals for those who want to avoid the hassle of cooking. abrasion to his right elbow.

Castle said Perry was wearing a helmet while riding his bicycle. She had no other details on the accident.

The accident forced the postponement of Perry's planned trips to

Galveston, Corpus Christi and South Padre Island to sign bills passed by the Legislature. Perry planned to sign bills for wind-storm insurance reform and for supplemental funding for the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

options to decide whether a special session was necessary to continue the operation of the agencies. By Tuesday, he said, it was clear that a special session would have to be called.

The Texas governor can call multiple special sessions lasting up to 30 days each. Perry can add any number of items to the agenda of a special session. He wouldn't say whether a contentious GOP-backed voter identification proposal — which would require Texans to show more ID before casting a ballot — would be on the agenda.

"When I decide on the date, I'll let you all know what we're going to discuss, but it's a little bit premature," Perry said.

Fighting between Democrats and Republicans over the voter ID measure bogged down the regular session and, in the Texas House, caused the death of other legislation.

Perry answered reporters' questions as he began a meeting at the Capitol with business leaders about energy. At the start of the meeting, Perry criticized Washington politicians for proposals they are considering that he says would strangle Texas' energy industry.

Perry, whose denunciations of Washington have intensified the past few months, faces a tough Republican primary race for re-election in 2010 against U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. The timing of a special session affects his ability to raise money for that expensive campaign.

He cannot collect campaign cash during a regular or special legislative session. He also must wait to hold fundraisers until after the June 21 conclusion of the veto period for the regular session.

When the Texas Senate adjourned last week without approving legislation to keep the state agencies running, a Republican senator suggested the governor could keep the agencies operating by executive

order.

Perry said that was "blatantly bad information" given to the senators and that research his staff conducted determined it cannot be done.

Perry and other Republican leaders pledged after the legislators' adjournment that insurance regulation, road building and other government functions would continue, despite the lawmakers' inaction.

The agencies in question would be shuttered by Sept. 1, 2010, without the legal authority to continue.

Shortly before adjourning, the Texas House passed a measure to postpone the agency sunset dates, but that legislation did not include \$2 billion in road-building bonds many lawmakers wanted.

Some senators were furious at the situation the House left them with, and the Republican-controlled Senate decided to adjourn without passing the agency operations bill. Republican senators who pushed for the adjournment, over the objections of Democrats, said it would be better to let Perry call lawmakers back into a special session so they could keep the agencies running and pass the road bonds.

After Perry's comments Tuesday, Democratic Sen. Rodney Ellis of Houston issued a letter he wrote to Perry asking that several criminal justice issues be placed on the special session agenda, such as eyewitness identification reform. He said mistaken eyewitness IDs are the leading cause of wrongful convictions.

Ellis also wants the Legislature to try again to pass a measure that could allow the governor to approve posthumous pardons, as in the case of the late Tim Cole, who died in prison while serving time for a rape he didn't commit. Perry said Tuesday that a work slowdown in the Legislature over the voter ID bill led to the death of the posthumous pardon proposal.

the high school.

"There is no dissension there," she told the board. "A wonderful and welcome endorsement only reinforces our argument."

Bailey said she is aware of the debate five years ago when Pampa Middle School was changed back to Pampa Junior High, but she said 73 of the staff members of the junior high school believe that The Reapers is not a fitting or suitable representation for the junior high. She said an overwhelming majority of the staff and students at the junior high school want the name to be The Harvesters, the same as the high school.

School board member David Teichmann said he was in favor of polling the school and students rather than imposing a name on them they might not want.

Teichmann was not on the board at the time the name 'The Reapers' was chosen. The name was chosen in a split decision by

the seven-member school board, but with the new board, the deciding vote may well have changed.

Still, Derrell DeLoach, the school board president, noting that he had backed the idea of using the Harvester name for the new junior high, was hesitant to revisit the decision. DeLoach said he thought the board should be discussing academic issues instead of an emotional issue like mascots.

Board member Lee Porter said to change the name of the junior high mascot to 'The Harvesters' would be to break some 60 years of tradition of having separate identities for the junior high and high school.

In the end, the board tabled the vote concerning the logo on a motion by board member Lance DeFever, who had supported the selection of The Reapers. DeFever said he, too, favored a survey.

months, according to Hooper. Those 49 structures yielded about 3 million pounds of debris.

The city hired a full-time code enforcement officer in 2008 and so far there have been liens placed on nine house. Eighty-nine other properties, most vacant lots are slated to be cleared.

Fire Marshall Michael Ryan has placed liens on 28 other properties.

Hooper said one of the most consistent problem

are the city's alleyways. PEDC board members and city staff are currently hammering out details for a Cash for Trash program exclusively for non-profits.

"They have come forward in the past and offered to help," Hooper said. He explained that the basic proposal has the group picking a day and an area, obtaining a permit from the city and then being paid for the trash they bring in.

School Superintendent Barry Haensch recommended to the board that Terrell's contract be terminated. He said she had unsatisfactory evaluations by administrators.

Terrell and Thanedar claim in their lawsuit that a number of the school board's meetings this year were not properly posted under the Texas Open Meetings Act. The duo, therefore, is asking the court to void any actions taken by the school board

during those meetings, including the March 26 meeting when Terrell's contract was terminated.

In their suit, they say the notice of the school board meetings were taped to the front window of Carver Center, the school administration building rather than posted on a bulletin board as required by state law.

The case is tentatively set to go to Judge Lee Waters' 223rd District Court late this week, Thursday, in the Gray County Courthouse.

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USDA rural development accepting applications for renewable energy systems and energy efficiency

TEMPLE, TEXAS, June 9, 2009- The 2008 Farm Bill authorized the Section 9007 Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) to make loan guarantees and grants to agriculture producers and rural small businesses. Renewable energy systems utilizing wind, solar, renewable biomass, geothermal, ocean, small hydropower or hydrogen sources may be purchased. Energy efficiency improvements may include retrofitting lighting or insulation, irrigation systems, grain dryers, or purchasing or replacing equipment with more efficient units in existing or new replacement facilities. Grants to conduct feasibility studies for renewable energy are also available. Some key provisions of the program are:

- Applicants may qualify for a competitive grant, a guaranteed loan, or a combination of both.
- Grant request must not exceed 25% of the eligible project costs. Renewable energy grants can range from \$2,500 to \$500,000. Energy efficiency grants can range from \$1,500 to \$250,000.
- Loan guarantees can be for up to 75% of total eligible project costs. Maximum guaranteed loans are \$25 million per project.
- Projects can qualify for combined grant and loan guarantee, but the grant portion is still subject to the above limits and combined funding assistance cannot exceed 75% of total eligible project costs.
- Projects under \$200,000 total project costs qualify for a simplified application process.
- No renewable energy system or energy efficiency improvement, or portion thereof, can be used for any

residential purpose. "American agriculture is going through a time of enormous transformation," said Scooter Brockett, Acting State Director, USDA Rural Development. "We need to be bold in recognizing and capitalizing on new opportunities. Energy is unquestionably one of those areas that present tremendous opportunities for economic gains and ultimately an improved quality of life for rural Texans."

This program can assist agriculture producers and small rural businesses develop renewable energy systems and make energy efficiency improvements to reduce energy costs and consumption. Agriculture producers must be directly

engaged in the production of agricultural products and obtain at least 50% of their gross income from their agriculture business.

Complete applications must be received by the Texas USDA Rural Development Office, 101 South Main, Suite 102, Temple, Texas 76501 no later than 4:30 p.m. CST July 31, 2009. Neither complete nor incomplete applications received after this date and time will be considered, regardless of the postmark on the application.
