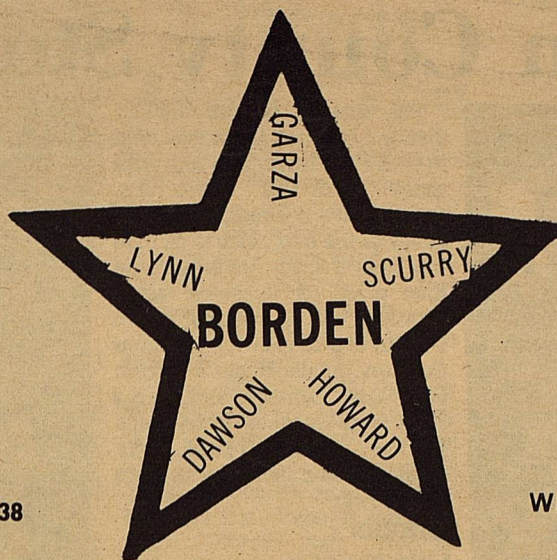

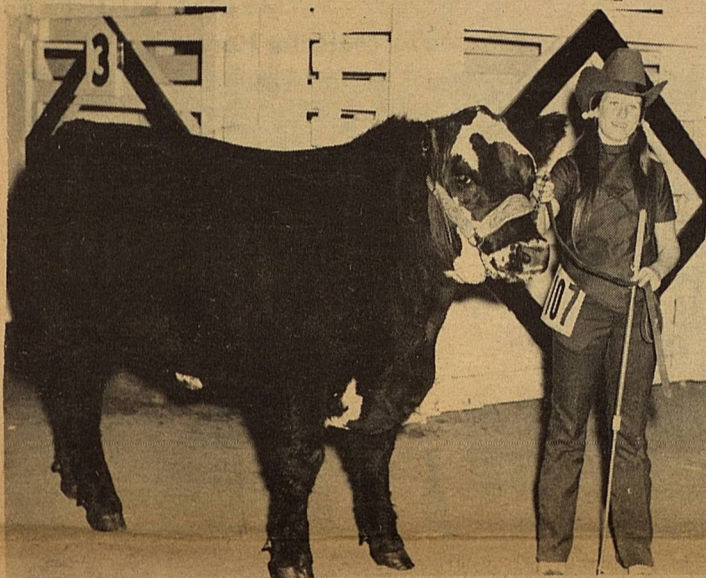

Supt. Preston Harrison said the examination was made Friday. Ballard was scheduled to be returned to Alpine, site of the trial, shortly after the examination.

Sheriff M.A. Standard said Ballard was brought here by a Texas Ranger.

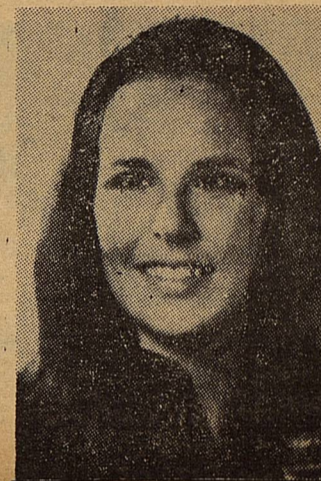
The trial unexpectedly recessed for the weekend

Thursday.

The reason for the recess was not specified at the time. Later, county officials said it was to permit Ballard to be taken to Big Spring "For investigative measures."

The state seeks the death penalty for Ballard, 46, who is accused of killing rancher Stephen Currie, 71, during a robbery attempt.

Currie was killed with a shotgun at his ranch home near Garden City Dec. 2, 1970.

## Honors Received

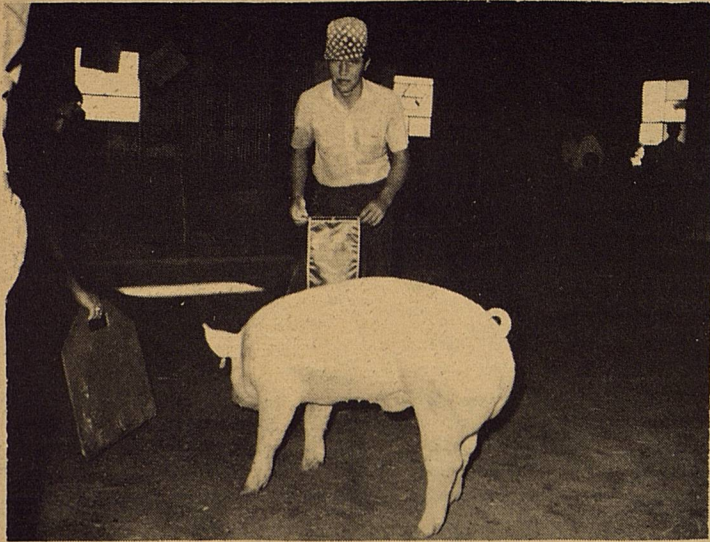

"On the behalf of the faculty in the College of Agriculture, we congratulate you on this most outstanding accomplishment and hope that you will repeat this performance again."



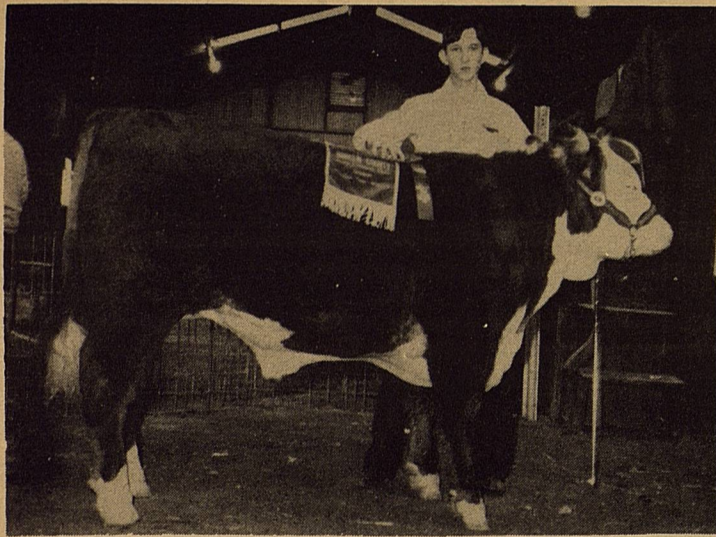

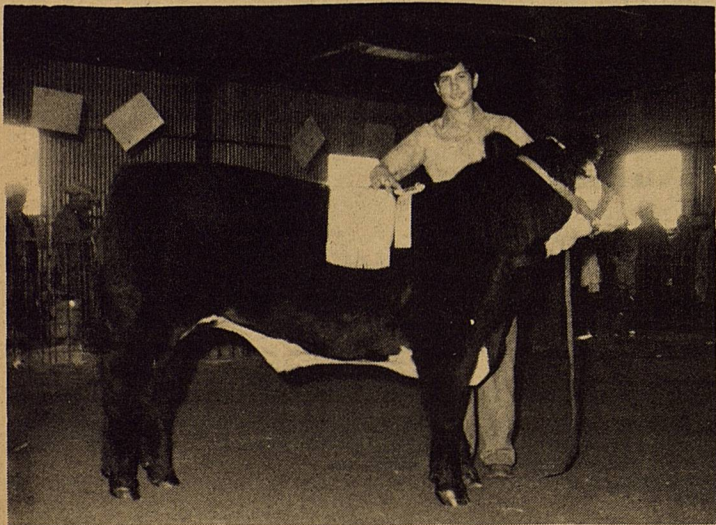

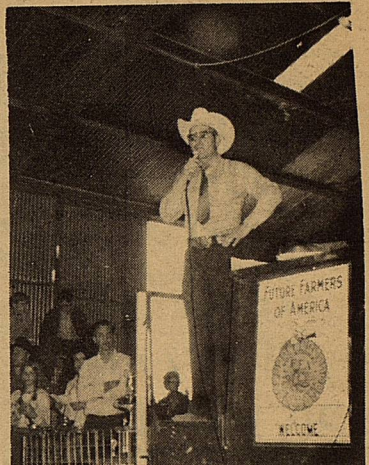
## Bar-B-Que Enjoyed at Stock Show

# Here's Dottings

I KNEW there would come a day when I would have to tell jokes or limericks to fill this space. I've read everything from the Bible to cook books this week for inspiration; and maybe I can forego the jokes for a week at least.

There is a new cook book in my collection titled "The Good Old Days Cookbook". It is nostalgically illustrated with lots of little anecdotes of what it was like in the "olden days" - predepression, that is - not pre 1950. The Now generation refers to the "olden days" as anytime back of 1950- that takes in a lot of pre-scotch tape, kleenex, cakes mix, nylon rope, teflon, wash and wear, detergents, packaged meats, stereo, to name a smattering. But what caught my attention while per- using this book were the price lists of groceries.

In 1910 you could buy a pound of bacon for 12½c a pound of coffee for 15c. Beef sold for 10c a pound and a spring chicken for 7c a pound - a rooster sold for 15c each and butter was 18c per pound. According to U.S. News and World Report of February 28th, you may now buy a pound of bacon in Atlanta for 75c - in New York for \$1.19. Ground beef is selling for 69c a pound in Atlanta and 75c in New York. Porterhouse steak in Atlanta brings \$1.79 a pound but only \$1.75 in New York. A pound of coffee in Midland sells for around 85c eggs for 39c a dozen and chickens for about 40c per pound. You think I am going to join the maddening crowd who are protesting the price of food. Well, I'm not for two reasons. First, my father would disown me, and second, anyone old enough to have purchased a dress pre-depression and one yesterday knows that relatively speaking, your best buy today is groceries.

The typical housewife in the United States is raising old Ned because food prices increased .04 per cent in the past year. Yet that same typical housewife is demanding an air conditioned

super market in which to stroll and shop while choosin'her prepackaged, trimmed meats, cellophane wrapped vegetables, instant frozen broccoli in hollandaise sauce, pressurized whipping cream; she demands at the curb parking, to the tail gate carry out, and even double sacking and stamps. Considering all these conveniences that are taken for granted today, food prices are relatively low.

The distraught housewives cuss the farmer and rancher and the grocer for raking in the loot while they struggle to feed their families—You the readers of the Borden Star are well aware of the cold hard facts that you are not the ones raking it in - nor are the grocers. The price of beef has hovered around the same range of 29c a pound for twenty years; the grocer makes a cent or two per can on his sales year in and year out. But between the producer and the grocer are the inflated salaries of all those persons providing the conveniences the modern woman demands. Transportation costs from the farm to the market; the higher costs of feed that "prime" the animals, the fertilizers that plump the tomatoes, and the higher taxes the grocers and producers all pay- All of these hidden costs add up to the price of bacon in the store.

In the "Good Old Days" you bought a pound of bacon from the one man operated grocery - he cut off a slab slapped it in a pinkish waxed paper and tied it with a string. You bought a stalk of broccoli if it was in season, went home and made your own hollandaise sauce. In these 60 years we have added the person who slices the bacon, the person who wraps the bacon, the person who marks the bacon, the person who pre-cooks the broccoli, the person who stirs the hollandaise, and person who "pouches" the broccoli and sauce, the boys who sacks your groceries. See where the money goes? Maybe this ended up to be a joke after all.

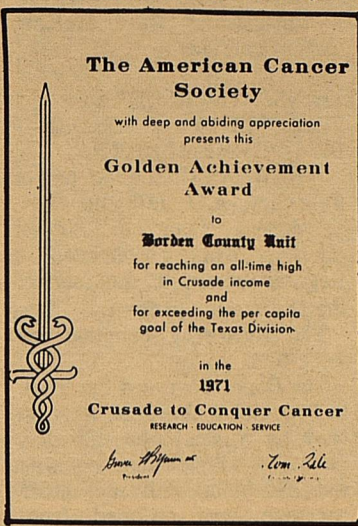
## Cancer Society Meets

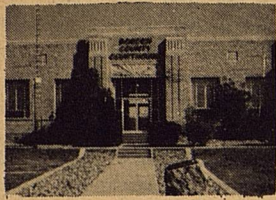

**Ban of Household Garza Stock Show**

**DDT in Texas**

It has been announced that the use of DDT for use in and around the home will not be continued in Texas. This means that use of DDT for households in Texas will not be allowed under the Texas pesticide law.

The decision was based on recommendations of the Pesticide Advisory Committee of Texas. The committee was created by the Texas Legislature to study use of pesticides in Texas and to make recommendations.

It was emphasized that the regulation has no bearing on use of DDT or agriculture and in matters relating to public health. DDT is still a very valuable chemical for agricultural producers and public health officials. But because of the concern of everyone about the quality of our environment, the registration of DDT for household use will not be continued in Texas.

About half of the DDT now in use in Texas is used in and around the home. The use of DDT has declined drastically in the past decade. Nationwide, it has been cut by more than a half. The effective date of this decision is Aug. 31, 1972.

The seventh annual Garza County Junior Livestock Show will be held here March 9-11. Also, Garza County home demonstration clubwomen will hold the annual county fair in connection with the livestock event.

Tommy Young, president of the sponsoring livestock association, said 225 animals are expected, including 130 barrows, 60 lambs, 40 beef calves and 25 horses.

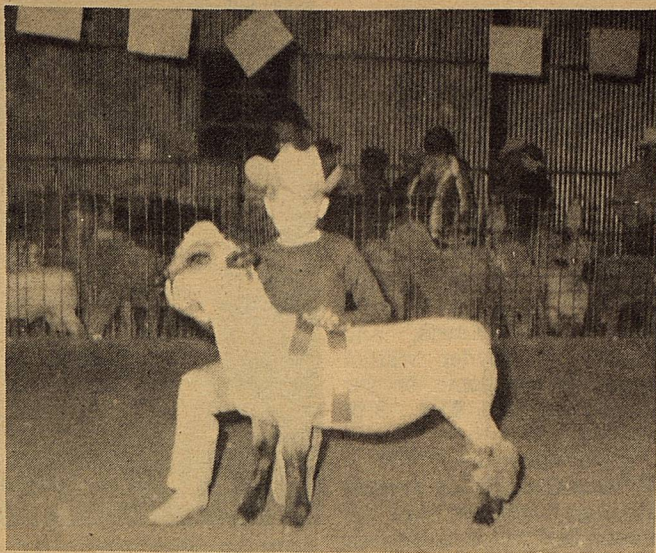

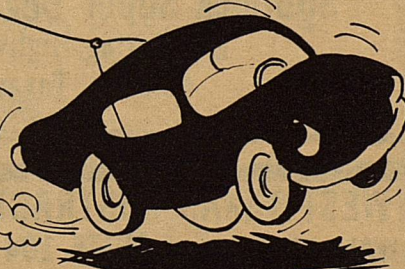
