three unrelated cases. Three defendants pleaded guilt in separate cases Tuesday in Judge Lee Water's 223rd District Court Tuesday in different


Amy Dawn Strazz, 29, was sentenced to five years in the Texas Department of Corrections' Institutional Division after her probation


concurrently. Fred Henry Pitt, 50, was sentenced to 120 days in jail and ordered to pay \$533 in restitution in connection with a theft.

## UT championship shirts made in heart of Aggieland

HOUSTON (AP) - Deep in the heart of Aggie country, the stuff of Longhorn dreams is kept

a secret.

As the University of Texas prepares to play for the national championship Thursday, thousands of victory T-shirts are being preprinted in one of the last places one would expect: College Station, home of longtime rival Texas A&M University.

"Our printer is up and running," Brian Jewell, vice president of marketing for the nonprofit University (of Texas) Co-op said of a contract with C.C. Creations, near the A&M campus.

By game time, sealed boxes with 5,000 of the shirts are to have been delivered to University in Houston, Austin, Dallas and San

Truckloads more will be standing by, Jewell said.

If the Horns win, the shirts will be prized keepsakes for fans. If they lose, they are to be shredded, gone forever.

"Nobody can see unless we win," Jewell said.

T-shirts are usually the most visible memento of a championship, but would likely be followed by hats and just about anything else used for sports brag-

With a Longhorn victory, co-op stores are to stay open after the game, as are some Academy Sports and Outdoors stores, to draw fans hunting for

shirts. Academy wins either way, as the chain is ready to sell crimson-colored shirts at its Alabama stores, should the



## Texas non-profits awarded \$12.4 mil for emergency food and shelter program

DENTON, TEXAS -The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency today announced that more than \$12.4 millionhas been awarded

to Texas non-profit agencies and others by the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP). Federal funds totaling \$200 million were made available to the EFSP for Fiscal Year 2010 to bring immediate relief to communities to address unemployment, poverty and other needs in light of the economic climate faced by our country.

The EFSP is administered by a National Board of voluntary agencies chaired by FEMA. The National Board qualifies local jurisdictions for annual EFSP awards based on criteria involving current population, unemployment, and poverty levels. Local Boards, convened in the qualifying jurisdictions, decide which nonprofit and government agencies are to receive the awarded funds, and funds are then disbursed directly to the agencies by the National Board.

EFSP funds were first authorized by Congress in 1983 and are appropriated annually under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. With the FY 2010 allocation, more than \$3.6 billion in federal aid will have been disbursed through the EFSP since its incep-

In addition, 8 percent of the year's total EFSP appropriation will be allocated by the National Board to "set-aside committees" at

Aside Committees will make funding determinations to aid the needy in jurisdictions with increased needs or that did not otherwise qualify for assistance.

In each funded jurisdiction, a Local Board advertises the availability of the funds, establishes local priorities, selects local non-profit and government agencies to receive supplemental funding, and monitors program compliance.

Member agencies of the National Board include: American Red Cross; Catholic Charities USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; The Jewish Federations of North America; The Salvation Army; and, United Way Worldwide.

# Paducah HS basketball coach Clarification

Cottle County - An investigation by the Texas Rangers has resulted in the arrest of Paducah High School Basketball Coach Charles Willison, 40 years of age, for Improper Relationship Between Educator and Student a second degree felony punishable by up to 20 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

This was Willison's first year of coaching the boys basketball in Paducah. Willison had previously coached in Krum, TX.

Wilison submitted his resignation to the Paducah Independent School District after the allegations came to light. Willison was arrested on January 5 at his residence in Paducah.

He was arraigned and released on \$20,000 bond. The case will be prosecuted by the 50th Judicial District Attorney David Hajek in Seymour, TX.

## Today in History

Today is Wednesday, Jan. 6, the sixth day of 2010. There are 359 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 6, 1838, Samuel Morse and Alfred Vail gave the first successful public demonstration of their telegraph, in Morristown, N.J.

On this date:

In 1540, England's King Henry VIII married his fourth wife, Anne of Cleves. (The marriage lasted about six months.)

In 1759, George Washington and Martha Dandridge Custis were married in New Kent County, Va.

In 1912, New Mexico became the 47th state. In 1919, the 26th president of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, died in Oyster Bay, N.Y., at age 60.

In 1941, President Franklin Roosevelt, in his State of the Union address, outlined a goal of "Four Freedoms": Freedom of speech and expression; the freedom of people to worship God in their own way; freedom from want; freedom from fear.

In 1942, the Pan American Airways Pacific Clipper New arrived in York more than a month after leaving California and following a westward route.

In 1945, George Herbert Walker Bush married Barbara Pierce in Rye, N.Y.

In 1950, Britain recognized the Communist government of China.

In 1967, U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese troops launched Operation Deckhouse Five, an offensive in the Mekong River delta.

In 1982, truck driver William G. Bonin was convicted in Los Angeles of 10 of the "Freeway Killer" slayings of young men and boys. (Bonin was later convicted of four other killings; he was executed in 1996.)

Ten years ago: In Miami, demonstrators angered by the U.S. government's decision to send Elian Gonzalez back to Cuba skirmished with police. Republican presidential candidates debated in Durham, N.H. with such issues as taxes and gays in the military dominating the discussion.

Five years ago: Attorney General-nominee Alberto Gonzales, under scorching criticism at his confirmation hearing, condemned torture as an interrogation tactic and promised to prosecute abusers of terror suspects. Congress certified President George W. Bush's re-election. Former Ku Klux Klan leader Edgar Ray Killen was arrested 41 years after three civil rights workers were slain in Mississippi. (Killen was later convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 60 years in prison.) Andrea Yates' murder conviction for drowning her children in the bathtub was overturned by a Texas appeals court. (Yates was found not guilty by reason of insanity in a retrial.)

One year ago: Congress opened for business at the dawn of a new Democratic era with vows to fix the crisis-ridden economy; Republicans pledged cooperation in Congress as well as with Presidentelect Barack Obama — to a point. Obama vowed to "bring a long-overdue sense of responsibility and accountability to Washington" and called the need for budget reform "an absolute necessity." Cheryl Holdridge, one of the Mouseketeers on "The Mickey Mouse Club," died in Santa Monica, Calif. at age 64.

It seems that many people today Lare fascinated with success. As a society we crave it, and we worship those who have it. Professional athletes, entertainers, and business people receive adulation and recognition because of the talent and power that is at their disposal.

A successful person is easy to recognize. Successful people drive the finest vehicles, dine at the most exclusive restaurants, have big bank accounts, and pal around with other influential and powerful people. Successful businesses do a booming business. Successful people often own successful businesses.

A dictionary definition of "success" helps us understand why the word is so easy to recognize when it is seen. A dictionary defines success as

•The achievement of something

planned or attempted. •Impressive achievement, especial-

·Something that turns out as planned or intended.

·Somebody who has a record of achievement, especially in gaining wealth, fame, or power.

The state of Texas is determined to recognize and identify successful schools. Quickly, however one can see the paradox that exists with this exercise. No school district in our state can exactly meet the dictionary definition of success.

If the dictionary definition of success is unattainable, then what standard can be used to judge school success? In the book Success Built to Last, the author Jerry Porras asked dozens of successful people how they measured their own success, and the answer they gave provides a good gauge for schools. Successful people defined success as "a life and work that brings personal fulfillment and lasting relationships and makes a difference in the world...".

By using the definition of success ly the attainment of fame, wealth, or provided by Porras in his book, the



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educators of the Pampa ISD are successful. Our staff members dedicate themselves and their lives to providing the students of our schools with information, opportunities, and role models on which they can build meaningful and successful lives.

Successful schools can be identified by the 4Rs - Rigor, Relationships, Relevance, and Results. Using this standard, Pampa's children are being taught by successful educators in successful schools!

## Online tobacco sales need tighter controls

It's time to overhaul outdated laws that allow cigarettes and other tobacco products to be sold online without verifying whether the purchaser is underage. A federal bill with wide bipartisan support called the Prevent All Cigarette Trafficking (PACT) Act will help

Internet and other remote sales of cigarettes and smokeless tobacco are rampant, largely because of the antiquated federal statutes that govern this kind of transaction. Remote tobacco vendors can sell to teenagers (or even younger children) as online ordering and home delivery enable kids of any age to buy the tobacco products they can't get from local retailers.

Convenience stores and other conventional tobacco retailers enforce tight restrictions on sales to minors and ID verification. They do it right, but online retailers face no restrictions. To protect our children from the health risks of tobacco use, we must demand the same restric-, tions placed on brick-and-mortar establishments be followed by online retailers.

Right now, remote tobacco sales are governed by the Jenkins Act, a 60-year old federal law that is ill-equipped to deal with modern online commerce. To bring federal statutes up to date, Congress is considering the PACT

S.1147, the PACT Act, would give federal law enforcement officials the tools and authority they need to regulate remote delivery of tobacco products and close the loophole kids are using to get the cigarettes and smokeless tobacco they can't get in stores. It would subject offenders to felony charges.

The PACT Act would also force remote sellers to comply with the same cigarette and tobacco tax laws that other vendors follow. Because they don't have to comply with the state's cigarette tax laws, the remote tobacco sellers offer discounted prices, making it hard for traditional cigarette vendors in Texas - both mom-andpop convenience stores and big stores alike - to compete. This, in addition to the effects of a recession, can have a negative impact on those businesses and the jobs they provide.

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

The years have passed and I am remarried to a wonderful woman. We are happy together and life is good.



# Harvesters escape Demons for first district win of the season

The Pampa Harvesters boys basketball team overcame first half struggles for their first district win 55-45

over the Dumas Demons

Tuesday in Dumas. Head Coach Dustin Miller said his team was more aggressive on defense in the second half.

"We attacked them instead of them attacking us, which lead us to getting out and getting some transition baskets," Miller said. "Alex (Clendening), Latigo (Collins) and Garrett (Ericson) hit some really big threes in the second half as well."

Shots didn't fall for the Harvesters in the first half. Pampa didn't get a lead in the first half. In the first quarter, Dumas jumped out to an early 12-4 lead. The Harvesters went on a 11-4 run to close out the quarter and only trailed 16-15.

Pampa's shooting woes continued. The Demons outscored the Harvesters 18-10 in the quarter and expanded their lead to 34-25 at halftime. In the third quarter, momentum would swing in favor of the Harvesters. Pampa opened the quarter on a 9-2 run to cut Dumas' lead to 36-34. Both teams exchanged baskets the rest of the quarter as Dumas led 39-37 after

In the final quarter, Pampa was in complete control. Collins hit a three-pointer that gave the Harvesters their first lead of the game at 40-39. Both teams would exchange baskets and Dumas had the lead 45-43, but that's when the Harvesters would seal the game. Collins made another three-pointer to give Pampa a 46-45 lead and started what would be a 12-0 run for the Harvesters.

Clendening and Collins led the team in scoring with 15 points each. Ericson scored 10 points, Ryan Jimenez scored eight, Travis Hagerman scored five, and Reid Miller scored two. Dustin Miller said getting their first district win was big especially since it was on the road.

"(I) Don't care who play and what records are they just aren't easy to get on the road," Miller said. "It was nice to take care of our business."

The Harvesters (9-8, 1-0) play at home 7:30 p.m.

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
