## Report: Capitol gunfire suspect tried reloading

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A man who fired several shots outside the Texas Capitol was trying to reload his weapon when police confronted him and tackled him to the ground, according to court records.

Fausto Cardenas remains in Travis County's jail Friday on a felony charge of deadly conduct. Bond is set at \$250,000.

An arrest affidavit filed Friday describes Thursday's shooting incident on the south steps of the Capitol.

State Trooper Husain Roussel says he spotted Cardenas outside the Capitol after hearing shots ring out. He says he saw Cardenas "reloading a magazine" and noticed a pistol in his waistband and empty shell casings where Cardenas was standing.

State troopers tackled the 24-year-old suspect and arrested him. No one was injured in the shooting, which briefly shut down the Capitol.

## Perry: I'm not for increased Capitol security

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry says he's not for increased security at the Texas Capitol after a shooting incident on its south steps this week.

Perry said Friday that "the last thing I want is the Texas Capitol to turn into DFW airport," referring to security checkpoints that have become familiar features of airport terminals.

Fausto Cardenas remains in Travis County's jail Friday, charged with felony deadly conduct in the Thursday shooting. Witnesses say he fired gun-

shots into the air and was reloading when state troopers tackled him.

Perry said enough people in Texas have concealed handgun licenses to deter violent criminals. In his words, "That keeps us all safer."

His comments came as he accepted the endorsement of the Texas State Rifle Association and the National Rifle Association.

Perry's in a tough fight with U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison for the May 2 Republican nomination for governor.

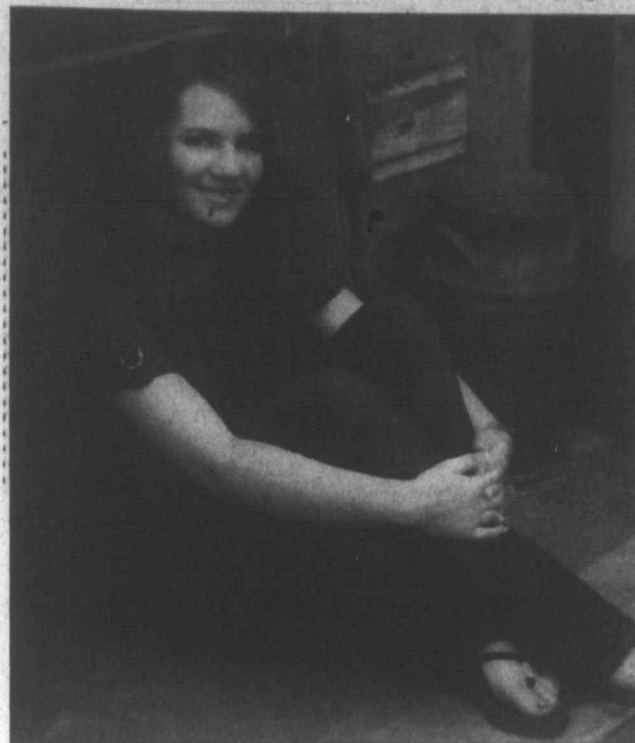

Christa Holt, world traveler

Holt was selected from 500 eligible students meeting the academic requirements. Finalists were chosen from essays they wrote saying why they wanted to participate in the project. This was the third Emerald Eagle Study Abroad Program, which is cooperative effort between the Emerald Eagle Scholars, the University of Texas and the Center for Global Learning and Experience, that covered the full cost of the trip and provides students with three hours of course credit in humanities.

The travelers were tasked with leadership questions, that determined part of their grade, and they were required to bring digital cameras to document their experiences and to learn about ethical cultural storytelling and archiving. Holt said even getting her passport was an experience.

The group left December 27, 2009. Just to arrive in her exotic destination was no small feat. It was a 20-hour, 6,741 mile trip.

and ocean, which was exotic for her, was a wonderful experience.

Next stop— Punta Arenas, Chile. "We were invited to the studio of Paola Vezzani, a renowned Chilean artist, Holt said. "Getting to see her artwork was a great honor, and hearing her views on issues such as global warming was very eye-opening. One of the largest holes in the ozone layer is over Punta Arenas, and so it is a big issue in Chile."

Then it was on to Torres del Paine, Chile and the national park. "In Torres del Paine, we took a 10 1/2 hour hike up a mountain in the Alps to see a lagoon and the Three Peaks, Holt explained. "The scenery was almost as breathtaking as the actual hike."

Stop six on the tour was Tierra del Fuego National Park. "The plant life there was incredible," Holt said. "The guide pointed out several types of edible fungus and even some carnivorous flowers."

Then it was back to Buenos Aires. "One of my favorite parts of Buenos Aires was definitely the markets," Holt said. "Tons of people had set up stands all along the streets, and everything they sold

was handmade. We were amazed to have jewelry made right in front of our eyes!"

Still the Pampa teen said she tired to stick to familiar food, such as burgers and fries, as much as possible, but found some new cuisine along the way. "We had some really good pizza, but the pizza there has no sauce," she explained. "It does have tomatoes on it instead. Once we got a pizza with ham on it. It was literally one big slice of ham underneath the cheese. There was a lot of bread and cheese," she said.

"In Chile, they cook meat in what we thought was dessert— it was good but it had pork in it, that was different."

"The trip was a very good experience," Holt said. "It opens your eyes and opens you up. It helps you look at your own culture differently. "People complain here when people speak Spanish, now I know what it's like not have the language you speak be understood."

Holt will write a series of essays on her experience and the things she learned along the way.

One of her topics, ah said, may be the beaver brought to the area from Canada

The group had a six hour drive to the Dallas airport, followed by a three hour flight to Washington D.C., then an 11-hour plane ride to Buenos Aires, Argentina. Then it was on to Santiago, Chile, their first stop.

Holt said that about 40 percent on Chile's population lives in Santiago. About 50,000 people gathered in the square for the New Year's Eve celebration, including the scholars.

Holt's second stop was During our stay in Ushuaia, Argentina, "We went on a five hour boat tour," Holt said. "We saw a lot of wildlife, including the penguins on Penguin Island, and ended with a bus ride back to Ushuaia."

Her third stop was perhaps her favorite, she said. It was Estancia Harberton, Estancia Fitzroy— An ecotourism ranch. "The ranch was interesting because it was right next to a beach and it was surrounded by mountains," she said. To see activities like sheep shearing, which is familiar, in a setting of mountains

long ago. They were brought in because, some thought they could produce pelts there. But the climate made the fur coarser and not as dense. Left to breed with no natural enemies,

they are destroying forests. "Its a huge problem," Holt said.

Now that she has her passport in hand, Holt hopes to travel to many other countries in the future.

## Americans deliver a message: No more big government

In November 2008, the American people gave President Barack Obama not only the White House but overwhelming majorities in both the House and Senate. Now one year after the President's inauguration, the American people are evaluating the past year and assessing where our nation stands.

On the economic front, our national unemployment rate is currently at 10 percent, and our national debt has surpassed \$12 trillion (with a pending Democratic bill to push that to \$14 trillion). On the domestic front, a partisan health care bill that will raise the cost of health care for the insured while cutting Medicare for our seniors is awaiting final action that the American people are hoping will never come. In our security efforts, the country was spared a terrorist-led disaster when the detonator to an explosive device aboard a Detroit bound flight failed in what will be remembered as a great Christmas miracle.

Last week, the people of Massachusetts cast a "vote heard 'round the world" when they elected Scott Brown, a Republican, to fill the term of the late Senator Ted Kennedy, a seat held by the Democratic Senator for 47 years. Many pundits are interpreting this surprising vote in a Democrat stronghold state as an objection to the many policies proposed and pursued in Washington over the last year. As many have reported, Senator-elect Brown campaigned against the Democratic health care legislation,

and his election will now break the Democrats' filibuster-proof majority in the Senate. He also campaigned against bringing terrorists from Guantanamo Bay to the United States for trial, a position on which a majority of Americans agree.

Over the past year, we have seen unprecedented federal actions, not the least of which has been unrestrained spending and federal encroachment in private markets. In 2009, government spending grew \$705 billion, or 24 percent, in just one year. The Democrats proposed taking over the entire healthcare sector, a full 1/6th of our economy. I believe these actions are contrary to the values a bipartisan majority of Americans support, a point illustrated in the election returns from the State of Massachusetts.

Most American families seek good-faith solutions from elected leaders who work collaboratively in the halls of government to spur economic growth, protect our homeland from threats both domestic and abroad, and provide the opportunity for American innovation and entrepreneurship. But in the face of runaway government spending, crippling debt, detainee transfers to the United States, and a highly partisan health care bill that is being jammed through Congress despite polls showing Americans overwhelmingly oppose it, 2009 represented a low point for bipartisanship.

It may take some time to undo the effects of the past year's unfortunate policies and programs, but with the new year we

have the opportunity to turn around this disturbing direction by returning to our limited government principles and strong commitment to winning the War on Terror. We can start on this path by saying no to government-run health care and no to granting terrorists the same Constitutional rights afforded Americans. Health care reform deserves a fresh start: an honest deal brokered in broad daylight that can garner significant bipartisan support and the blessing of a majority of the American people. We can end the Troubled Asset Relief Program and reduce our public debt by \$319 billion. We can repeal the unused funding from the stimulus bill and pass measures such as lower tax rates that will actually spur economic activity and job creation. We can keep Guantanamo Bay open for the terrorists who threaten our lives and the American way of life. And we can recommit to the American people that we can work together to find solutions to the problems facing our country. Let's hope 2010 will be a year for new beginnings.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 23, 1960, the Swiss-Italian-made bathyscaphe Trieste, owned and operated by the U.S. Navy, carried two men to the deepest known point in the Pacific Ocean, reaching a depth of more than 35,000 feet inside the Challenger Deep in the Mariana Trench.

On this date:

In 1789, Georgetown University was established in present-day Washington, D.C.

In 1845, Congress decided all national elections would be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

In 1849, English-born Elizabeth Blackwell became the first woman in America to receive a Doctor of Medicine degree, from the Medical Institution of Geneva, N.Y.

In 1932, New York Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt announced his candidacy for the Democratic presidential nomination.

In 1943, critic Alexander Woollcott suffered a fatal heart attack during a live broadcast of the CBS radio program "People's Platform."

In 1950, the Israeli Knesset approved a resolution affirming Jerusalem as the capital of Israel.

In 1964, the 24th amendment to the Constitution, eliminating the poll tax in federal elections, was ratified.

In 1968, North Korea seized the Navy intelligence ship USS Pueblo, charging its crew with being on a spying mission. (The crew was released 11 months later.)

In 1973, President Richard M. Nixon announced an accord had been reached to end the Vietnam War.

In 2002, Wall Street Journal reporter Daniel Pearl was abducted in Karachi, Pakistan, by a group demanding the return of prisoners from the Afghan campaign;

he was later slain.

Ten years ago: The dark satire "American Beauty" won the Golden Globe for best film drama, while "The Sopranos" won best television drama. The Tennessee Titans advanced to the Super Bowl by beating the Jacksonville Jaguars 33-14 in the AFC Championship game. The St. Louis Rams defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 11-6 to win the NFC Championship. NFL star Derrick Thomas was injured when the sport utility vehicle he was driving overturned on an icy road in Missouri; Thomas died more than two weeks later. (The crash also claimed the life of Thomas' friend, Michael Tellis.)

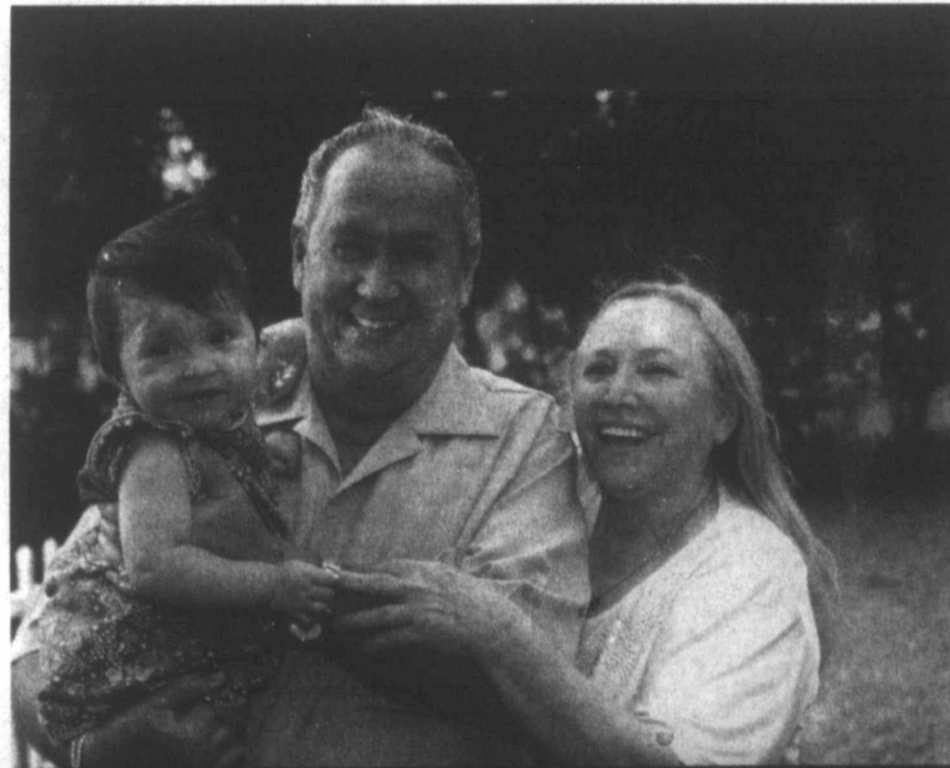

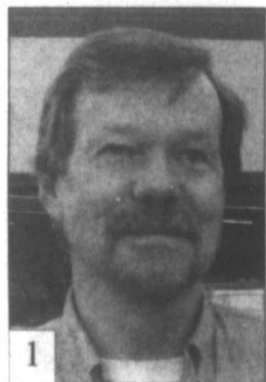

# Gas prices drop for 7 straight days

NEW YORK (AP) — Gasoline prices have declined every day for a week following a similar slide in crude prices this month. But with the national average at nearly \$2.73 a gallon on Friday, pump prices are still more expensive than any day last year. They've ridden a 10-month rally in energy commodities that doubled oil prices to nearly \$80 a barrel by the end of last year. Crude prices have tum-

bled this month, pulling down gas prices with them as weekly government reports showed the country hasn't regained its appetite for petroleum. The economy may be slowly recovering, but Americans aren't burning more fuel than they did last year. The Energy Information Administration said Thursday that the nation's gasoline supply ballooned by 3.9 million barrels last week as demand fell for the fourth straight week.

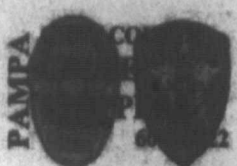
# Soldier from San Marcos killed in Afghanistan

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Army officer from Texas has been killed in a bombing in Afghanistan. The Defense Department on Friday identified the victim as 27-year-old Capt. Paul Pena of San Marcos. DOD says Pena died Tuesday in the Arghandab River Valley of wounds suffered in the bombing. a doggie bag because her cooking is so delicious.



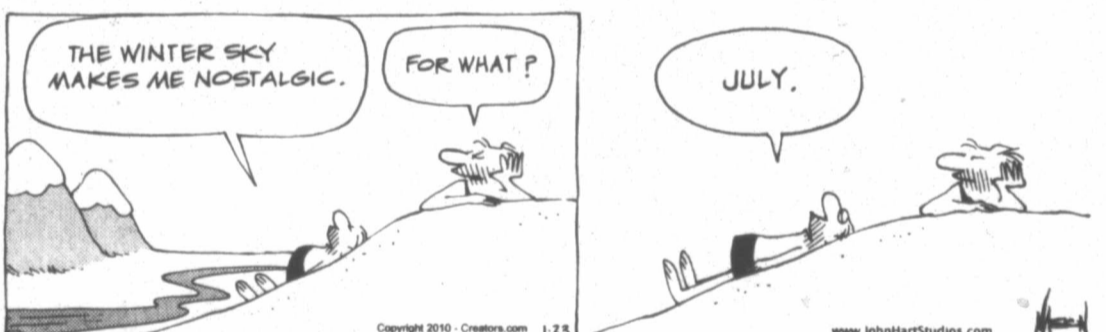

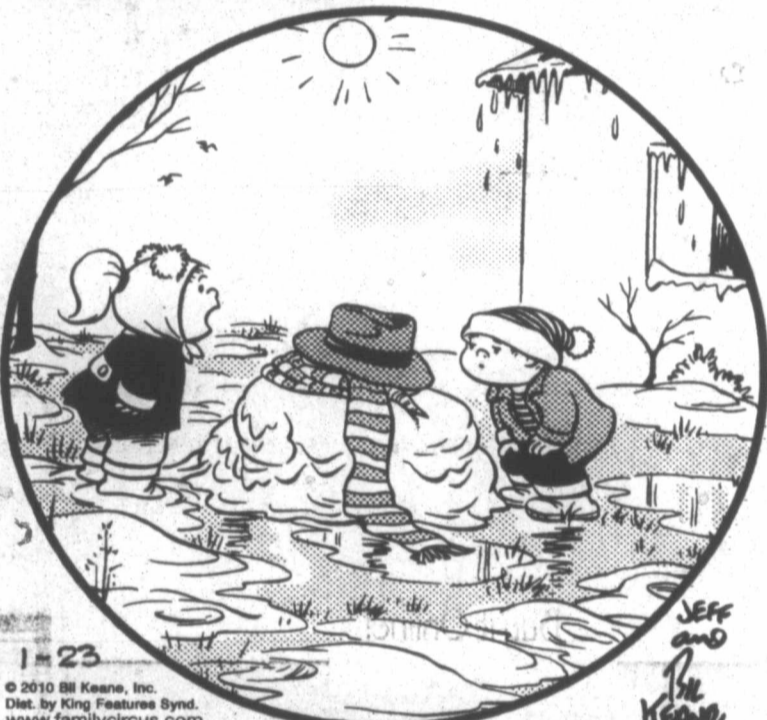

## Second quarter dooms Harvesters against Dons

The Pampa Harvesters allowed an 18-0 run in the second quarter and lost their fifth consecutive game 75-53 to the Palo Duro Dons Friday in Palo Duro.

The win extended Palo Duro's district win streak to 84. Head Coach Dustin Miller said you never want to lose but felt his team accomplished their goals for the game.

"We had goals coming into that game," Miller

said. "I think we are better than we were before tonight.

The Harvesters played tonight without their star senior Alex Clendening who was interviewing for medical school at Baylor. At the start of the game that didn't seem to bother Pampa as they jumped out to a 9-4 lead. Travis Hagerman scored five points and Latigo Collins scored four. But the Dons would score the next six points to take their first lead of the game at 10-9.

The teams exchanged baskets the rest of the quarter and Pampa led 15-14 after the first.

The second quarter started competitive as neither team was able to get a run larger than four. Palo Duro would take control the rest of the second quarter. Leading 24-22, the Dons went on an 18-0 run to hold a commanding 42-22 lead. The Harvesters missed several shots and turned the ball over three times in that span. Palo Duro led 44-25 at halftime. Miller

said his team got tired in the quarter.

"We had some dumb turnovers," Miller said. "But we played pretty even in the second half."

In the third quarter, the Dons (15-5, 6-0) opened with a 6-1 run expanding their advantage to 50-26. The Harvesters wouldn't score more than two consecutive points in the quarter. Palo Duro outscored Pampa 16-7 to be in full control after three quarters with a 60-32 lead.

With the game out of

reach, The Harvesters outscored Palo Duro 21-15 in the fourth quarter. Collins scored 10 of his team leading 18 points in the fourth quarter.

Along with leading the team in scoring Collins led the team in rebounds with six. Hagerman scored 13, had five rebounds and four blocks. Garrett Ericson scored 10 points and had five rebounds.

The junior varsity (5-13, 0-6) lost 60-20. Coach Matt Embry said his team was never in the game.

"We couldn't break their press and they forced a lot of turnovers," Embry said. "We were down 15-4 after one. Down 20 at the half."

The Harvesters (9-13, 1-5) are off Tuesday and host Dumas Friday. Miller said his team feels like they were in every game in the first half of district and will look to correct their mistakes from the first half.

"We just have to play four quarters and not two or three," Miller said.


