### Tapp, 13, wins state art contest

Who says sibling rivalry isn't productive?  
 After younger sister Camryn, 10, had her artwork chosen to be part of the 2010 Texas Kid's Aviation Art Calendar late last year, 13-year-old Cayley Tapp of Pampa decided that she wanted a little recognition of her own. That motivation propelled Cayley to first place in the statewide competition of the 2010 International Aviation Art Contest, receiving a certificate of recognition at the 28th Annual Texas Aviation conference in Austin last month.

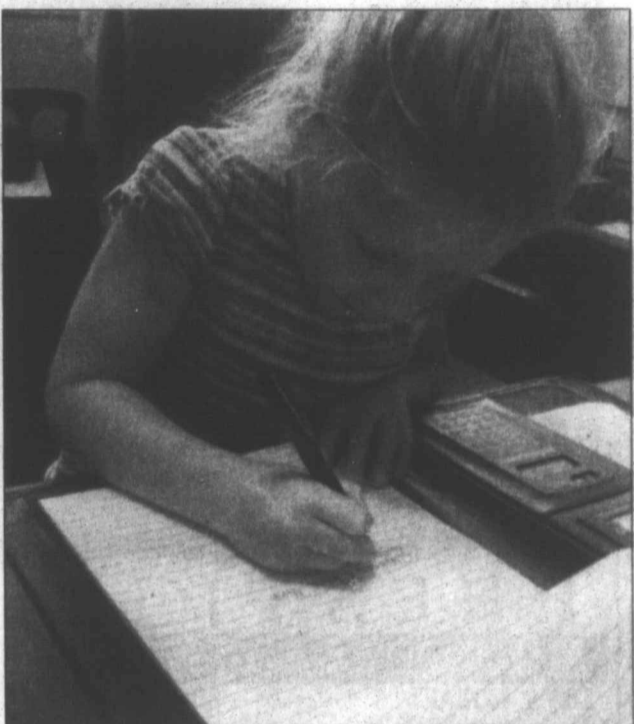
"Honestly, last year, (Camryn) got into the calendar, and that made me want to do something, too," said Cayley with a smile. "I sent in my artwork, but

I didn't think I'd win."  
 Cayley's marker drawing of a space shuttle streaking past an orange sun (to match the contest's theme, "Flying with the Sun") apparently impressed the contest's judges more than Cayley had thought. The piece also advanced to the International Aviation Art Contest's national competition, where it placed third.

Entries were judged from three age groups, separated by age. Cayley competed in the 10- to 13-year-old category. Her work was selected amongst a field of 905 students from 64 schools.

Cayley, who has been home schooled since third grade, said that she is interested in pursuing more artistic opportunities as she continues her education.

"I love art," said Cayley. "I just enjoy

### Miami's Nunn has 'best handwriting in Texas'

A first-grader from Miami Independent School District has been named Texas' best First Grade Handwriter.

Cassidy Nunn, 6, is the daughter of Chris and Cristy Nunn of Miami, and a student in Diana Locke's first grade class.

Cassidy's handwriting sample was picked from among 300,000 entries statewide by Zaner-Bloser, a company that produces Language Arts and Reading materials. The company holds an annual handwriting contest and picks a state finalist from grades 1-8 who have a chance to proceed to the national contest.

"I'm always putting stars or stickers on Cassidy's papers for her handwriting," said Mrs. Locke. "I may have shown her how to do this, but it came from her. She wants her papers to be neat."

Cassidy's mom and dad are teachers at the Pampa Texas' best First Grade Learning Center. They also say the first grader is a good student who deserves credit for the achievement.

"Cassidy is hardworking and she is very determined to do her best," Cristy said.

The little girl who won the statewide contest is very succinct in her explanation.

"I take my time and I want to do it neat," Cassidy said.

Locke said Miami ISD has adopted Zaner-Bloser as its curriculum every year. The school has submitted handwriting samples from students every year for the past five years.

Twenty-three Pampa High School students are closing out their careers on a high note, having attained the rank of Honor Graduate for the Class of 2010.

PISD Superintendent Barry Haenisch and PHS principal Tanya Larkin recently released the list of honorees, which requires inclusion within the top 10th percentile of the graduating class to qualify.

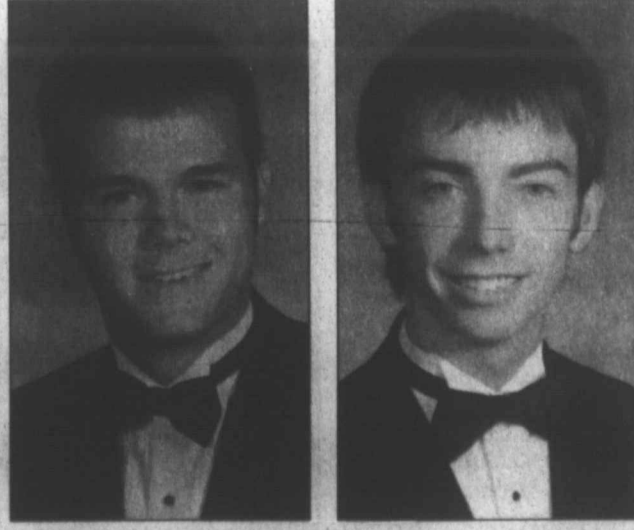
The honor graduates were recognized during last week's Pampa High School

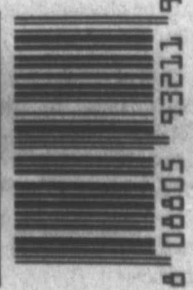

Pampa Meals on Wheels will be hosting their annual "March for Meals in May" fundraiser from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Friday at Recreation Park, giving Gray County residents another chance to come out and enjoy the spring weather.

The March, an annual event for the Meals on Wheels organization, will be \$10 per person. Free t-shirts will be given to the first 100 participants, and free hamburgers, chips, cookies and drinks will be provided to all registered participants. Teams are encouraged to obtain sponsors for their walk, said Pampa Meals on Wheels Director Jeane Autry.

Autry said that, while the national Meals on Wheels organization traditionally holds a March for Meals on Wheels event in March, the Pampa

chapter decided to wait until later in the year to hold their event to take advantage of the improving weather.

"You know how our March weather can be here," joked Autry. "We wanted to give the weather a chance to get a little better so people can enjoy their time outdoors."

It has been a busy few weeks for Pampa Meals on Wheels, with the group holding an Appreciation Luncheon to honor their volunteers late in April at the M.K. Brown Heritage Room. Approximately 120 volunteers and contributors attended the luncheon.

During the luncheon, Pampa MOW President Donna Brauchi reported on the organization's end of 2009 totals — 37,191 meals served — and added that 8,779 meals have been served so far in 2010. Those numbers highlighted the significance of the group's volunteers, as the ongoing Meals on

Wheels effort requires three or four volunteers to assist in the kitchen each day, along with a minimum of 12 volunteers to deliver the meals.

Several volunteers were also recognized for their longtime involvement with the program. Helen and Dick Kastein are Pampa MOW's longest-serving active volunteers, with 32 years of service under their belts. The late Mike Flynt was also remembered for the many years of daily service he devoted to the program.

Four-year-old Zabian Garza was recognized for being the group's youngest volunteer.

## Oil containment box touches ocean floor

**ON THE GULF OF MEXICO (AP)** — A BP-chartered vessel lowered a 100-ton concrete-and-steel vault onto a ruptured well in the Gulf of Mexico on Friday, an important step in a delicate and unprecedented attempt to stop most of the gushing crude fouling the sea.

Underwater robots guided the 40-foot-tall box into place. Now that the contraption is on the seafloor, workers will need at least 12 hours to let it settle and make sure it's stable before the robots can hook up a pipe and hose that will funnel the oil up to a tanker.

"It appears to be going exactly as we hoped," BP

spokesman Bill Salvin told The Associated Press on Friday afternoon, shortly after the four-story device hit the seafloor. "Still lots of challenges ahead, but this is very good progress."

By Sunday, the box the size of a house could be capturing up to 85 percent of the oil. So far about 3 million gallons have leaked in an environmental crisis that has been unfolding since a deepwater drilling platform exploded April 20, sending toxic oil toward a shoreline of marshes, shipping channels, fishing grounds and beaches. Eleven workers were killed in the accident.

# USDA now accepting applications for home repair grants

TEMPLE — Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced today that USDA Rural Development is accepting competitive applications from qualified public agencies and nonprofit organizations for grants to help low and very low income level residents in rural areas repair their homes.

"The costs associated with maintaining a home are a challenge for many rural homeowners and the funding we are announcing today will help low and very low income residents in rural areas maintain and repair their homes," Vilsack said.

"The Obama Administration and USDA are working to ensure that rural homeowners have safe, sanitary, energy-efficient places to live."

Housing Preservation Grants are provided to intermediaries such as town or county governments, public agencies, federally organized Indian tribes and nonprofit or faith-based organizations.

The grants are then distributed to qualified low and very low income homeowners. The grants can be used to weatherize and repair existing structures, install or improve plumbing or provide access to people with disabilities.

To determine if your area is eligible for the Housing Preservation Grant, visit <http://eligibility.sc.egov.usda.gov/eligibility/welcomeAction.do>.

Locally, a recent USDA Rural Development Housing Preservation Grant was awarded to the Rolling Plains Management Corporation of Wichita Falls. A \$200,000 grant was awarded to rehabilitate 94 houses owned and occupied by very-low and low income individuals in Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young counties.

A separate \$25,000 grant is being used to improve the quality of housing and energy conservation for 11 low income Baylor County homeowners by repairing or replacing the roofs on their homes.

USDA Rural Development will accept applications for Housing Preservation Grants until June 28, 2010. All applications must be filed at the USDA Rural Development Texas State Office. To request an application packet, please contact Mr. Leon Carey at 254-742-9772.

USDA Rural Development may award up to \$10.1 million in competitive grants through the Notice of Funds Availability published April 27, 2010. The grants to be awarded are part of the USDA Rural Development annual budget and are not funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

USDA Rural Development's mission is to increase economic opportunity and improve the quality of life for rural residents. Rural Development fosters growth in homeownership, finances business development and supports the creation of critical community and technology infrastructure.

Two talented daughters, evidently, that are constantly pushing each other to new heights, no less.

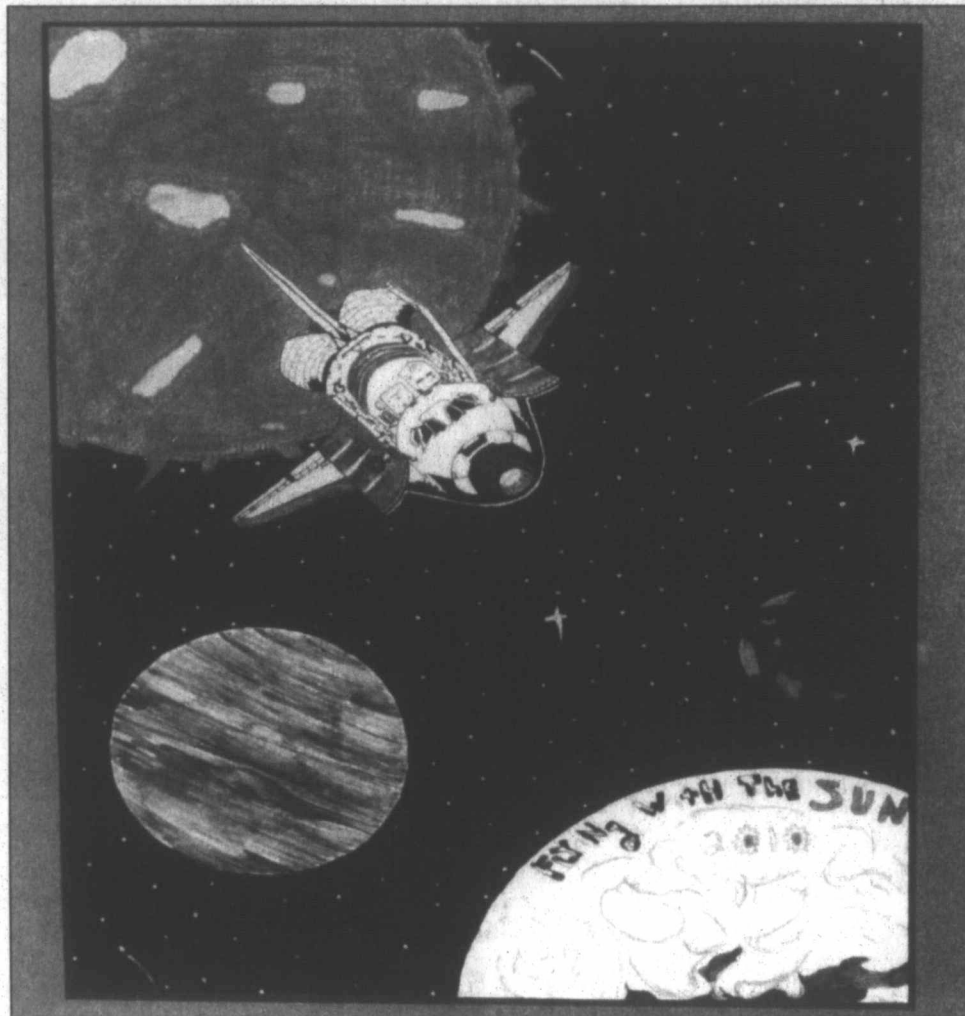

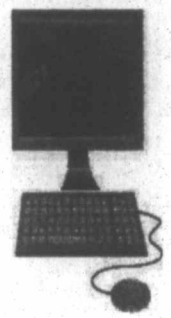

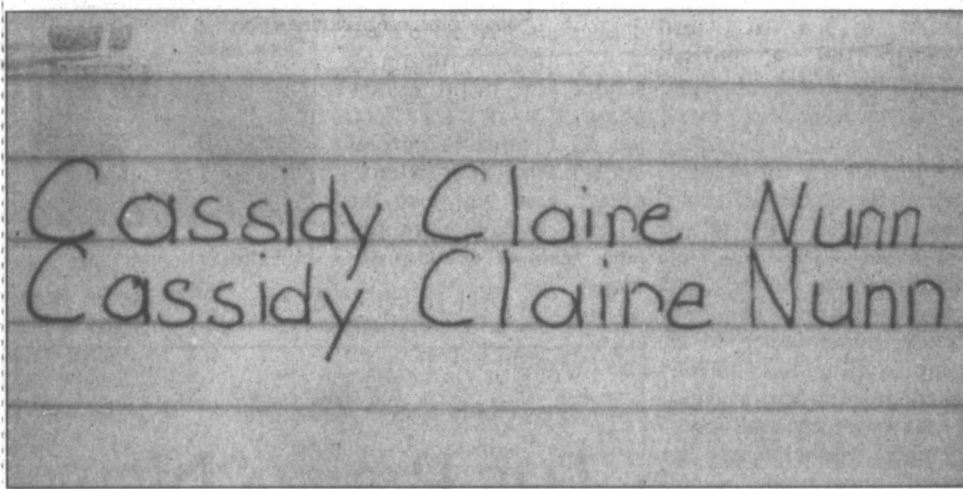
Cayley Tapp's winning entry in the 2010 International Aviation Art Contest depicted a space shuttle flying past a burning sun.

She wants to be a veterinarian when she grows up.



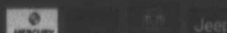

## Today in History

Today is Saturday, May 8, the 128th day of 2010. There are 237 days left in the year.

### Highlights in history on this date:

- 1794 - Antoine Lavoisier, the father of modern chemistry, is executed on the guillotine during France's Reign of Terror.
- 1811 - British under Duke of Wellington defeat French at Fuentes d'Ontro in Portugal.
- 1846 - The first major battle of the Mexican War is fought at Palo Alto, Texas, resulting in victory for U.S. Gen. Zachary Taylor's forces.
- 1886 - The first Coca-Cola, an invention of Dr. John S. Pemberton, is sold at Jacob's Pharmacy in Atlanta, Georgia.
- 1895 - Japan surrenders Liao Tung Peninsula and Port Arthur to China in return for huge indemnity.
- 1897 - Greece asks major powers to intervene in its war with the Turks.
- 1902 - Mount Pelee on the French West Indian island of Martinique erupts, wiping out city of St. Pierre and killing all but two of its 30,000 residents.
- 1916 - Forces from Australia and New Zealand arrive in France during World War I.
- 1921 - Sweden abolishes capital punishment.
- 1945 - German forces surrender to Soviets, who did not recognize the surrender to U.S. Gen. Eisenhower the previous day; World War II ends in Europe.
- 1973 - Militant Native Americans who held the South Dakota hamlet of Wounded Knee for 10 weeks surrender.
- 1975 - After South Vietnam falls to Communists, U.S. President Gerald Ford reassures allies in Asia of American military support for South Korea.
- 1978 - David R. Berkowitz pleads guilty in a Brooklyn courtroom to the "Son of Sam" killings that had terrified New Yorkers.
- 1992 - Some 100,000 Thais defy military orders and march in Bangkok, to protest the government.
- 1995 - Gigantic celebrations mark the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II in Europe.
- 1997 - In defiance of a U.N. imposed flight ban, Libyan leader Col. Moammar Gadhafi flies to meet the president of Niger in Niamey.
- 1998 - The U.N. human rights spokesman in Rwanda is expelled by the government because of his criticism of the justice system. By July, the entire U.N. human rights mission pulls out because of lack of cooperation.
- 1999 - NATO bombs hit the Chinese Embassy in Belgrade by mistake, killing three Chinese reporters. In China, protesters retaliate attacking U.S. missions.
- 2000 - U.S. Navy resumes military training on the Puerto Rican island of Vieques following protests by islanders who say that decades of bombing have harmed their health and the environment.
- 2001 - Japan's Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi, who appointed a record five women to his cabinet, proposes changing the law which prohibits women from ascending to the Chrysanthemum Throne. By legend, the sovereign dates to 660 B.C. and is the world's oldest hereditary monarchy.
- 2003 - The U.S. Senate votes, 96-0, to ratify the expansion of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) to include seven former communist countries in Eastern Europe.
- 2004 - German authorities say they arrested an 18-year-old unidentified student who confessed to creating the "Sasser" worm, which generated computer chaos across the globe as it infected hundreds of thousands of machines.
- 2005 - Survivors, political dignitaries and others gather inside the Mauthausen Nazi concentration camp to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the liberation of what one speaker describes as "hell on earth."
- 2006 - South Africa's former Deputy President Jacob Zuma is acquitted of rape in the country's most politically charged trial since the end of apartheid.
- 2007 - Protestant leader Ian Paisley and Sinn Fein deputy leader Martin McGuinness are elected to the top posts of the new power-sharing government for Northern Ireland.

## Local Community gives \$109,600 in scholarship to this year's seniors

Last Sunday my minister Jeff Taylor used a vivid analogy to illustrate his sermon. He told the story of Calvin Borel, the jockey who rode the winning horse in this year's Kentucky Derby. Calvin has made winning the Derby a habit. In fact, he has won the race three of the last four years.

Calvin was raised in south Louisiana which is known as the home of many top jockeys. It was his older brother Cecil, however, who dreamed of making his mark atop winning thoroughbred horses. A problem maintaining his weight forced Cecil into training horses. With the older brother's help, Calvin found work around the horses Cecil trained. This led to opportunities to ride in races.

Most of the year, Calvin Borel is just an ordinary jockey. He wins occasionally, but more often than not, his horses do not make it to the winner's circle. In the 25 or so years that Calvin has ridden professionally, he has become known for his tireless work ethic, his bubbly personality, and his ability to hug the rail during a race to save ground. When asked recently why his racing strategy so often involves making a move from the rail, Calvin replied, "I was told years ago that the rail was the shortest path to the finish line."

Calvin Borel is becoming known for one other thing. Calvin, an ordinary jockey, is known as being extraordinary in Triple Crown races, and in the process he transforms ordinary horses and trainers into extraordinary horses and individuals!

Last year in the Kentucky Derby, Calvin rode "Mine That Bird." Mine That Bird was a 50 to 1 long shot, but Calvin coaxed that very ordinary thoroughbred to give an extraordinary performance in the 2009 Kentucky Derby and he finished the day as the

Derby champion!

This year, Calvin was the jockey on a horse named "Super Saver." Super Saver is trained by Todd Pletcher. Before this year, Mr. Pletcher had entered 24 horses over the years in the Kentucky Derby. Not one of the 24 horses trained by Todd had ever won the race...but Calvin Borel had never been the jockey on their backs!

With Calvin as his jockey, Super Saver, in a come-from-behind sprint eased to victory at the Kentucky Derby, and Todd Pletcher moved from a "good" horse trainer to an extraordinary one! At the Kentucky Derby, Calvin Borel lifts his performance to the extraordinary level and he lifts everyone associated with him to the same level.

On Wednesday, we celebrated the academic accomplishments of the Pampa High School students at the annual Awards Assembly. Students were recognized for their academic accomplishments. They were honored for their good work and their commitment to excellence. During the ceremony, seniors who were awarded academic scholarships were recognized. Members of the Class of 2010 were awarded over \$109,600 in scholarships from members of this community.

The generosity of the community is offering Pampa High School students an opportunity to achieve great things. Ordinary teenagers from Pampa, Texas, will be able to grow and mature physically and intellectually because of your care, and some of them will one day be ready to accomplish extraordinary things for their country, their community, and their family! WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy got what it needed in April: A burst of hiring that added a net 290,000 jobs, the biggest monthly total in four years. It showed employers are gaining confidence as the recovery takes deeper root.

But people who had given up on finding jobs are gaining confidence, too, and are now looking for work. That's why the unemployment rate rose from 9.7 percent to 9.9 percent and will likely go higher.

Especially encouraging was that the job gains came largely from private employers, the backbone of the economy. They boosted payrolls by a surprisingly strong 231,000, the most since March 2006.

The new jobs, generated by sectors across the economy, are the first sign that the recovery is adding significant numbers of new jobs — even if not enough to absorb the influx of jobseekers.

"Companies feel more comfortable that growth in the economy and in their own sales is here to stay and that they can start preparing for the future and add to their payrolls," said Joel Naroff, president of Naroff Economic Advisors.

The unemployment rate rose as 805,000 people without jobs entered the labor force in April to search for work.

"Individuals are gaining confidence in their ability to find a job and are now throwing their hats into the ring," said John Challenger, CEO of outplacement firm, Challenger, Gray & Christmas.

Kelley Bryan had dropped out of the market last year to attend culinary school after 20 years as a secretary. But she started looking for work again in March.

"I was starting to get to the point where I felt like I needed to get a job," she said. "I was living off unemployment and just feeling guilty."

Not for long. She soon was hired as a restaurant manager in suburban St. Louis. Demand has picked up enough that she's looking

to switch jobs again and is interviewing at hotels. "It's a competitive field, but there are plenty of jobs," she said.

Many economists predict the unemployment rate will rise as people who had given up on finding a job feel better about their prospects. The labor force includes employed people and people actively seeking work — not those who have stopped looking.

The unemployment rate in October hit 10.1 percent, a 26-year high. Some economists now think the rate could go a bit higher and peak at 10.2 percent by June. Still, that's far lower than some forecasts earlier this year of 11 percent. Unemployment hit a post-World War II high of 10.8 percent at the end of 1982 as the country was emerging from a severe recession.

President Barack Obama called April's job growth "very encouraging news" but said much remains to be done to put more Americans to work.

Wall Street appeared to look past the positive U.S. jobs report and instead focused on Europe's spreading debt crisis. Stock prices fluctuated wildly. The Dow Jones industrial average closed down nearly 140 points.

The number of jobs added in April signaled that businesses are more confident, thanks to rising customer demand. Consumers increased spending in March by the largest amount in five months. Factory production grew in April at the fastest pace in nearly six years. Demand grew briskly for a variety of services in that

same month.

Also heartening: Employment in February and March turned out to be stronger than previously thought. Payrolls grew by 230,000 in March, better than the 162,000 first reported. And 39,000 jobs were actually added in February, compared with the previous estimate of a loss of 14,000.

Manufacturers in April added the most jobs since 1998. Construction companies boosted jobs for the second straight month. Retailers, professional and business services, education and health services, leisure and hospitality, and the federal government, which hired 66,000 temporary census workers, all posted job gains.

Jobs were cut in state and local governments, which are suffering through budget crises; transportation and warehousing firms; and information companies, mostly telecommunications firms.

The 290,000 net job gains in April come from a survey of businesses. The government also does a separate survey of households. The household poll found far larger job gains last month: 550,000 more people said they were employed. The household survey is used to calculate the unemployment rate.

Economists are encouraged by the sharp jump in employment in the household survey: It's shown a net 1.6 million jobs created over the past four months. By contrast, the business payroll survey has shown 573,000 jobs added in the same period.

The difference is encour-

aging because the household survey often is the first to detect employment trends in a recovery. Some economists say that's because it can better pick up hiring trends at startup companies. After the 2001 recession, for example, the household survey showed job gains before the payroll survey did.

The household poll is also more inclusive. It covers agricultural workers, the self-employed, domestic employees and people who work in family businesses without pay — none of whom are included in the payroll survey.

There will need to be far more job growth to reduce unemployment.

Friday's report showed that 15.3 million people were out of work in April. And the number of people working part time who would rather have full-time jobs rose by 98,000 to 9.2 million.

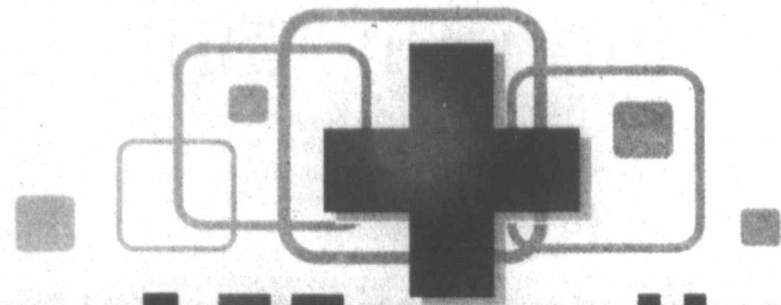

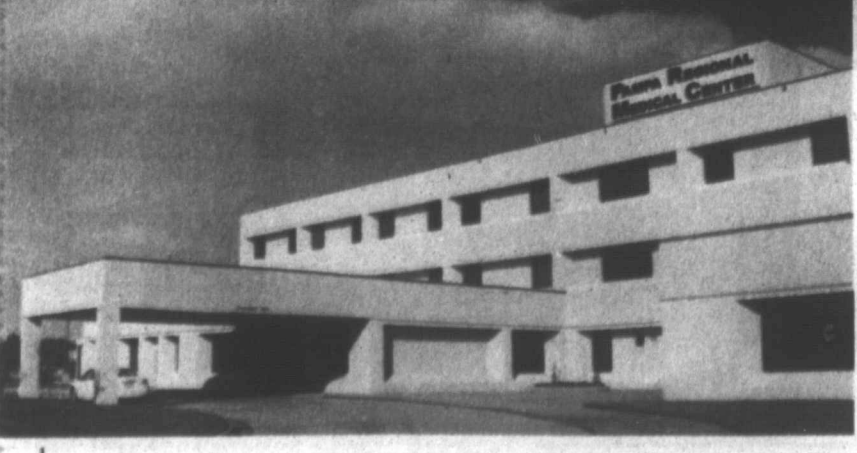
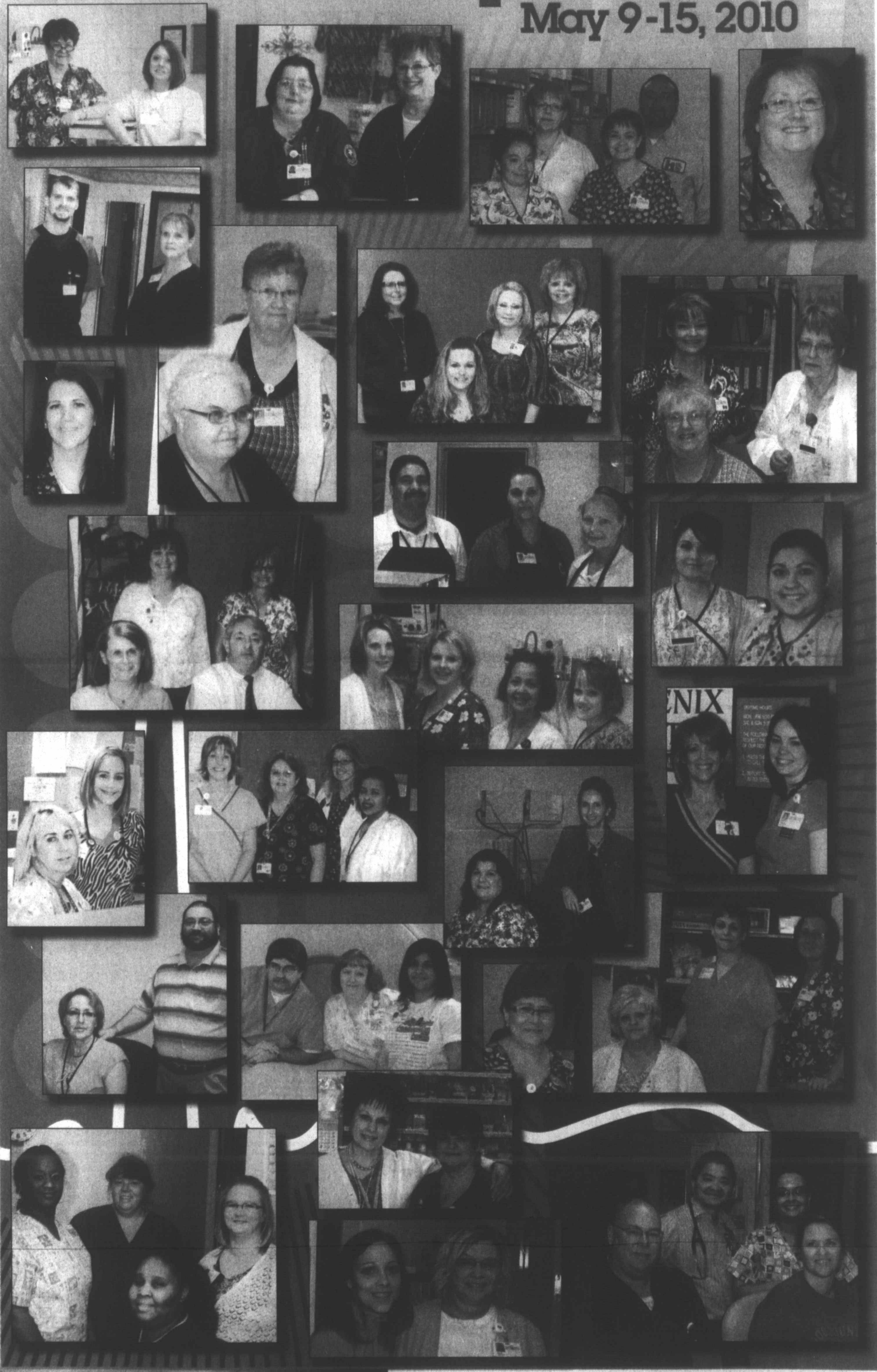

## Teichmann hits milestone, pitches Pampa to victory

ODESSA — Across the street from The Corral where the Pampa Lady Harvesters played the El Paso Parkland Lady Matadors on Friday is Ratliff Stadium, home of the famed "Mojo" rallying cry from "Friday Night Lights" fame.

Well, Carlyn Teichmann threw her 500th strikeout en route to a one-hitter to keep Pampa's own mojo going with a 2-0 victory over the Lady Matadors.

Head coach Bobbi Gill said Teichmann pitched a great game and threw well on the mound.

"I'm extremely proud of the way she competed on the mound," Gill said. "She did what she needed to do to shut them down."

Both pitchers were dominant to start the game. Parkland's Natalie Ortiz only allowed the Lady Harvesters a walk in the first two innings and struck out four. That runner would be stranded at second in the first inning. Teichmann only allowed one hit and a walk in the first two innings and neither baserunner made it past first.

Pampa broke a scoreless tie in the top of the third. Brooklyn Barker led off with a hard hit line drive to the shortstop for a single. Mikaela Flores ran for Barker and advanced to second on a sacrifice bunt. Claire Hopkins grounded out to second but Flores advanced to third with two outs. Ashley Facio drove Flores in with a single to right field. Shelby Watson followed with a single but the inning ended when Samantha Pearson grounded out to the pitcher.

For the rest of the game, Teichmann continued to be dominant. With a strike out in the bottom of the second Pampa's starter retired 16 straight Lady Matadors. El Paso Parkland only had two baserunners in the game.

The Lady Harvesters expanded their

lead in the top of the fifth. Pearson led off with a single in the infield. McKinlee Stokes ran for Pearson and advanced to second on a sacrifice bunt by Bailey Beck. Jordan Mayhew smashed a double to left to score Stokes and expanded Pampa's lead to 2-0.

Mayhew said she just wanted to get on base in her second at bat.

"I knew we had someone there (on base)," Mayhew said. "It felt great to pick her up and get an RBI."

Gill said she was proud of her team for scrapping out a couple of runs.

"This team (El Paso Parkland) was a little better than we anticipated," said Gill. "People that you talked to that played them, the Ortiz girl wasn't throwing at that time. She's a lot better than I gave her credit for. She did a great job today."

Teichmann had her milestone moment in the bottom of the sixth. Facing Juanita Quintana, Teichmann got her to swing at an 0-2 pitch to record the milestone strikeout. Pampa's starter said she didn't realize she did it.

"That's cool and that's really exciting," Teichmann said.

Pampa had the ball thrown back to their dugout to keep for Teichmann. Gill said it's a great accomplishment for her.

"It's huge," Gill said. "Hopefully we get 50 more before we're done."

The Lady Harvesters (24-10-1) play the second game at 10 a.m. Saturday at the Corral. If El Paso Parkland (22-8) wins that game the final game will follow 30 minutes after the second game concludes.

Gill said she feels good about her team's chances with Facio pitching.

"Ashley (Facio) is a different type thrower than Carlyn (Teichmann)," Gill said. "She likes to work the zone a little bit differently. So it will be a different look for them tomorrow and our bats need to come alive and we need to scratch out this one."
