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City counts 90 trees dead from drought as conditions continue

Last week, the city cut down 17 dead trees on Somerville as part of a long-term project to remove drought-stricken, dead trees from its right-of-way and parks. In addition to the trees on Somerville, the City of Pampa counts 72 trees in its parks and one tree downtown as having fallen victim to the drought over the last few years, which Donny Hooper, director of public works for Pampa, said has taken place over an extended period of dry conditions.

"The drought has been devastating to trees and parks, and the need to cut back on watering we do in parks has been another reason they have been affected in so many ways, from grass to trees," said Hooper.

During last year's drought, the city asked Pampans to voluntarily conserve water, as it faced reduced allocations from the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. Last year, the city slashed the amount it waters its parks by 50 percent, switching to watering every day to every other day. The city is continuing to water parks at this level in the name of conservation.

"We didn't feel like we could ask everyone to cut back without doing the same," Hooper said. "We're trying to be conscientious in the amount and way in which we're watering. Unfortunately, we need rainfall to manage trees and get them to grow."

Hooper also reported an influx of dead trees brought to the landfill from private property.

"It's sad," he said. "You've got to start over, and some of these trees have been around a long time."

A Texas Forest Service study from December of last year estimated 100 million to 500 million trees to have died in the state as a result of the drought

during 2011. Dr. Chris Edgar, a forest resource analyst with the Texas Forest Service, said many of the dead trees won't be removed unless they pose a hazard.

"Trees don't necessarily die because of lack of water," said Edgar. "They are weakened and become susceptible to diseases and other things."

In Pampa, the city is cutting down its dead trees in parks or when they violate its right-of-way.

"We're doing everything we can," Hooper said. "We just need some water."

Ticks in force this summer

If you've had a problem keeping ticks off of your animals this summer, you're not alone.

"We've had dogs coming in covered in fleas and ticks," said Faustina Curry of Pampa Animal Welfare Society, an organization that helps out at the local shelter. "The ticks are tremendous this year."

Monty Montgomery of Animal Control said that this year the shelter has had lots of animals coming in with ticks. They treat dogs for the pest when they come into the shelter.

"We've had to put down some dogs because of tick diseases," Curry said. "We try to get them off if at all possible, but it's a battle."

She added that some people are donating their animals to the shelter because they can't get rid of the ticks.

Having a tick-free home, yard and animal is particularly important, because ticks can cause diseases in humans, including tickborne relapsing fever and lyme disease, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Mongomery recommends sprays, over the counter treatments or even an exterminator to get rid of ticks in your yard.

"People need to treat their yard and their animal," he said.

Registration for classes at the college will continue through Aug. 29, when classes begin.



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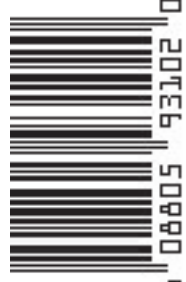
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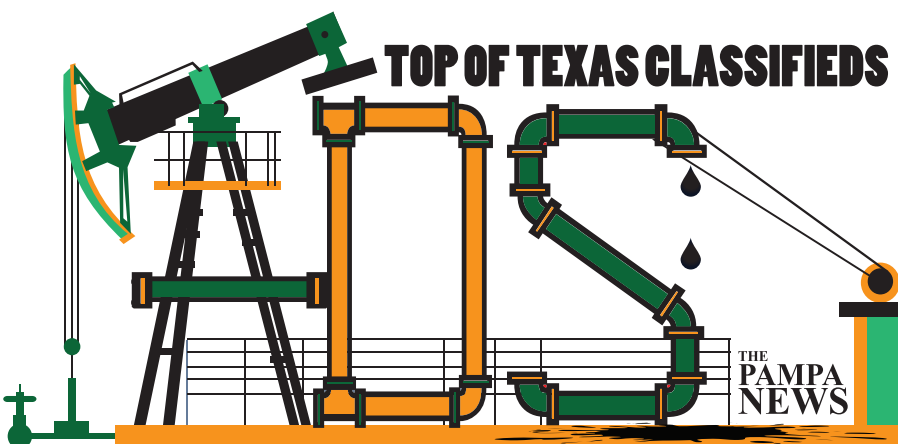

DEAR UNSURE: If your grandfather is in jail, and "the lawyers and everyone else" say he molested you and your sister, then he probably did. The two of you may not have understood what was happening because he led you to believe what he was doing was normal behavior. (This is standard operating procedure for a molester.)

Part of the reason for your sadness may be that your trust was violated. Talking to a therapist is not a pun-

ishment. It's actually a privilege, and I hope that you and your sister will take advantage of it. A therapist can give you more insight than your friends can give you.

Your mom and your aunt have your best interests at heart, so please listen to them. A therapist can help you open up more, and your sadness will dissipate.

DEAR ABBY: I love my wife very much, but over the years we have drifted apart. At one time we considered separating, but we went to a marriage counselor and worked most things out.

My wife is the only woman in the world for me, but my feelings are at the bottom of her priorities. I give her nightly foot massages and tell her how much she means to me. She never returns any pleasures. She has told me that sex is not enjoyable for her and she does it only to please me.

I love her dearly, however the romance is gone. Is it possible to rekindle the long-lost fire? — LONELY, UNIMPORTANT HUSBAND

DEAR LONELY: I hate to appear negative, but the way you have described your marriage, I doubt it. I also have to question why you think a woman who is so withholding is the only woman in the world for you. You have described what she is getting from you, but what are you receiving in return besides passive rejection?

DEAR ABBY: I am torn between two decisions. I am a 40-year-old teacher, but I have always wanted to be in law enforcement. I didn't pursue my dream because my fiancée would not marry me if I went into police work.

Top O' Texas CattleWomen have selected Bill and Edie Breeding and family as their 2012 Ag Family of the Year.

B&C Cattle Company is located in the Texas panhandle in Miami, Eighty miles northeast of Amarillo. Miami is the county seat and the only town in Roberts County. Both Bill and Chad Breeding live in Miami which is the headquarters for B&C Cattle Company.

In 1955, when Bill was a freshman in high school, he purchased two registered Hereford heifers from John B. Talley, a local registered Hereford breeder, with the money he received from selling a 4-H show steer.

These heifers were of Blanchard Return by Anxiety Fourth breeding and are the basis for the cow herd that exists today.

While Bill finished high school, Texas A&M University Veterinary College and the U.S. Army, Earl Breeding, Bill's dad, bred, developed, and maintained the herd with bulls he purchased from Clyde Magee and Jake Hess-Doctor Herefords, both of McLean, Texas.

In 1965 the herd had grown to 30 head of registered Herford cows.

Advance C316 (1963) was the first L1 bull that Breeding and Caldwell used and Les Holden told Bill that 316's gain index of 156 was the highest in

Montana for a Hereford bull. In 1976, Dale Barber of Channing and Bill went to see Jim Fiedler of Stanford, Montana, a long time customer of Les Holden and L1 cattle, and came home with three bulls, an 8-year-old HH Advance 803; a 10 year old WCR L1 Domino 6313 (Clown) and the most famous a 9 year old HH Advance C756 (Hatchet). Hatchet, a tremendously consistent breeding bull, stamped a style and conformation in his offspring that can still be seen in both herds today. Hatchet's best asset was his daughters, maternally sound with a functional correctness, and milking ability – a cut above the best.

In early 1965, while Bill was still in the Army, stationed in the Chicago area, he met Edie McFadden from Harvard, IL and married her in August 1965. They have two children, Chad of Miami, Texas and Christie who now lives in Hereford, Texas. Chad has two children, Austin and Blayke.

Lawyer jailed for embezzlement

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A South Texas lawyer arrested again for drunken driving has been jailed pending trial on charges she embezzled from her grandmother. The San Antonio Express-News reports Michelle Lorenz Valicek faces trial next month on a felony charge of misapplication of fiduciary property. Valicek was indicted in 2009 on charges she spent more than \$500,000 of an inheritance meant for her grandmother, Margaret Lorenz. The 97-year-old woman died last year. Records show Valicek in April 2011 was arrested on a DWI charge. Prosecutors say her blood alcohol level was more than three times the legal limit for driving when she was arrested again last week. Bond was set at \$100,000. A judge Monday revoked bond at the request of prosecutors. A lawyer for Valicek didn't immediately comment Tuesday.

Police fatally shoot gunman

ALVIN (AP) — A Houston-area standoff has ended with police fatally shooting a man suspected of wounding his ex-girlfriend's new boyfriend. Alvin police say the standoff in an apartment complex parking lot ended early Tuesday and the woman wasn't hurt. Her new boyfriend has gunshot wounds not believed to be life-threatening. Names of the three people and the officer who fatally shot the suspect have not been released. The incident began Monday night when the suspect arrived at an apartment, confronted the woman and shot the other man. The gunman forced the woman into a vehicle. Alvin police Chief Mike Merkel says the gunman was shot when he appeared to be preparing to shoot his ex-girlfriend. Merkel says the suspect apparently recently lost his job and was upset about the woman's new relationship.

Texas man gets another life term

CLEBURNE (AP) — A North Texas man already sentenced to life in prison without parole for one killing has received the same penalty for a second slaying. Jose Clemente Ramos Jr. on Aug. 7 pleaded guilty to capital murder in the 2010 slaying of deliveryman Ruben Martinez. The victim was shot outside a Fort Worth convenience store. Ramos on Friday pleaded guilty in Cleburne to capital murder in the robbery and slaying of Nancy Weatherly of Godley. She was attacked in her home during a robbery a few hours after the first killing. Prosecutors say Ramos and Mark Anthony Soliz were friends who went on the crime spree. Soliz earlier this year was convicted and sentenced to death in Weatherly's slaying. Ramos also pleaded guilty to aggravated robbery, burglary and deadly conduct.

Lawmakers hold tobacco hearing

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers will hear testimony on how much revenue the state gets from tobacco-related manufacturers — and whether to make changes to increase it. A 1998 settlement with the nation's leading tobacco companies resulted in billions of dollars for Texas. The state has used some of the money to pay for the Children's Health Insurance Program and various anti-smoking efforts. On Tuesday, the Texas House Ways and Means Committee will hear about tobacco manufacturers that participated in that settlement and about differences with those that didn't. The committee also plans to evaluate whether any changes are needed to increase tobacco-related revenue.

UTEP to conduct shooter exercise

EL PASO (AP) — Police will practice a response to a simulated gunman on campus at the University of Texas at El Paso. UTEP spokeswoman Veronique Masterson said campus and El Paso city police will respond to the call Tuesday morning. She says this is the second time UTEP performs a drill like this. The last time was about three years ago. Masterson says this drill has been planned since last December and is unrelated to the string of shootings in Colorado, Wisconsin and Texas. The exercise happens a day after a gunman killed a police officer, a civilian and himself near the Texas A&M University campus in College Station. Masterson says the exercise is part of a series of routine drills the university does to prepare for emergency situations.

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — A law enforcement veteran of 19 years was making what was supposed to be a routine house call to serve an eviction notice at a property near the Texas A&M University campus. But the recipient opened fire and shots were exchanged, leaving him, the police constable and another man mortally wounded. The spasm of violence Monday left a College Station neighborhood shaken, a tight-knit law enforcement community in mourning and the family of 35-year-old gunman Thomas Alton Caffall distraught. Just after noon, College Station police began fielding frantic 911 calls about gunfire in the neighborhood near the university's football stadium. Responding officers found 41-year-old Brazos County Constable Brian Bachmann shot on the lawn of the house. For nearly 30 minutes police exchanged shots with Caffall as a neighbor, a former Army medic, waited with frustration for the all-clear so he could tend to the injured constable.

Bachmann, a police instructor, one-time Officer of the Year and a married father of two, had been mortally wounded. So was Chris Northcliff, 43, of College Station, who was outside and apparently caught up in the gunfire. Caffall too was shot and later died at a hospital. Police wouldn't speculate on what sparked the shooting and it wasn't immediately clear who shot whom. "We're trying to make some sense of this," College Station Assistant Police Chief Scott McCollum said. A neighbor and former medic, Rigo Cisneros, called 911 when he heard the shooting. In video shot on his cellphone showing police officers running into the house, Cisneros, 40, can be heard asking an officer if an ambulance is coming and if he can meanwhile tend to Bachmann's wounds. The officer tells Cisneros he must wait until the shooting scene is secure. Cisneros told The Bryan-College Station Eagle that by the time he was allowed to approach Bachmann's body, it was too late. "I performed CPR. There were no vital signs on the constable when I got there," he said. "He took one clear gunshot wound to the chest." Cisneros said he also went to Caffall, who was shot several times but still conscious. "I was asking him questions, like if he knew he was allergic to anything," Cisneros said. "He looked up at me and asked me to apologize to the officer that was shot."

Details about Caffall were slow to emerge. Officials at Texas A&M, the 50,000-student school that dominates the city 100 miles northwest of Houston, said he was neither a student nor school employee. Police said he had been renting the home where he was staying. Caffall's sister said Monday night that the family was shocked by the violence. "Our hearts and prayers go out to the families and this is just a senseless tragedy," said Courtney Clark, reached Monday evening at her mother's home in Navasota, about 20 miles to the south. "We are just distraught by the havoc that he has caused." She declined additional comment. Besides the three fatalities, a 55-year-old woman also was wounded and was hospitalized in serious condition. Her name had not been released by Monday evening. Another officer, Justin Oehlke, was treated for a gunshot wound in the calf and was in stable condition, police spokeswoman Rhonda Seaton said. Two other officers — Brad Smith and Phil Dorsett — were treated for "shrapnel injuries" and released, Seaton said. Bachmann was well respected and "very close to everyone in law enforcement," McCollum said. "He was a pillar in this community, and it's sad and tragic that we've lost him today." Bachmann had worked more than 19 years in law enforcement, according to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education. He had been a constable since January 2011. Constables are law enforcement officers similar to sheriff's deputies who are elected to serve in specific county precincts. They primarily serve civil warrants and official paperwork or act as courtroom bailiffs. Officers lined up to

salute Monday afternoon as Bachmann's body was moved from a hospital and placed into a white van for transfer to a funeral home. Texas A&M issued an emergency alert warning students and residents to stay clear of the area although most students weren't on campus because the fall semester doesn't start until later this month. Diana Harbour, 27, whose house is about a block away, said she had just come home for lunch when she and her boyfriend heard five loud popping sounds. "I just thought it was somebody moving wood or stacking something," Harbour said. "Then we heard more sirens and more officers and fire trucks came and they were keeping their distance, kind of slowly moving in. More officers showed up and told us to stay inside. ... The fear didn't hit me until after the fact, especially when I found a bullet hole in front of my house." Texas Gov. Rick Perry, an A&M alumnus, said at an event in Florida that his "prayers are with any of those that have been injured." A&M President R. Bowen Loftin issued a statement calling Monday a "sad day in the Bryan-College Station community."

Man linked to killings caught

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico's navy said Monday that the country's marines captured a drug cartel suspect carrying the ID cards of a newspaper employee who was killed in May along with three photographers. Suspect Juan Carlos Hernandez Pulido is allegedly a local chief of informers for the Jalisco Nueva Generacion drug gang, the navy said. The navy said Hernandez Pulido was detained Friday in the Gulf Coast port city of Veracruz as he handed out packets of drugs to a group of men. The navy said Hernandez Pulido was carrying the ID cards of Irasema Becerra, who had been an administrative worker at a local newspaper and was the girlfriend of one of the dead photographers. Five other journalists have been killed in Veracruz state so far this year. At the time, the May killings had been thought to bear the hallmarks of the hyper-violent Zetas cartel; the victims were slain, dismembered and their bodies stuffed into black plastic bags dumped into a waste canal. However, Hernandez Pulido is allegedly linked to a gang allied with the Sinaloa cartel, which is fighting the Zetas for control of Veracruz and other states.

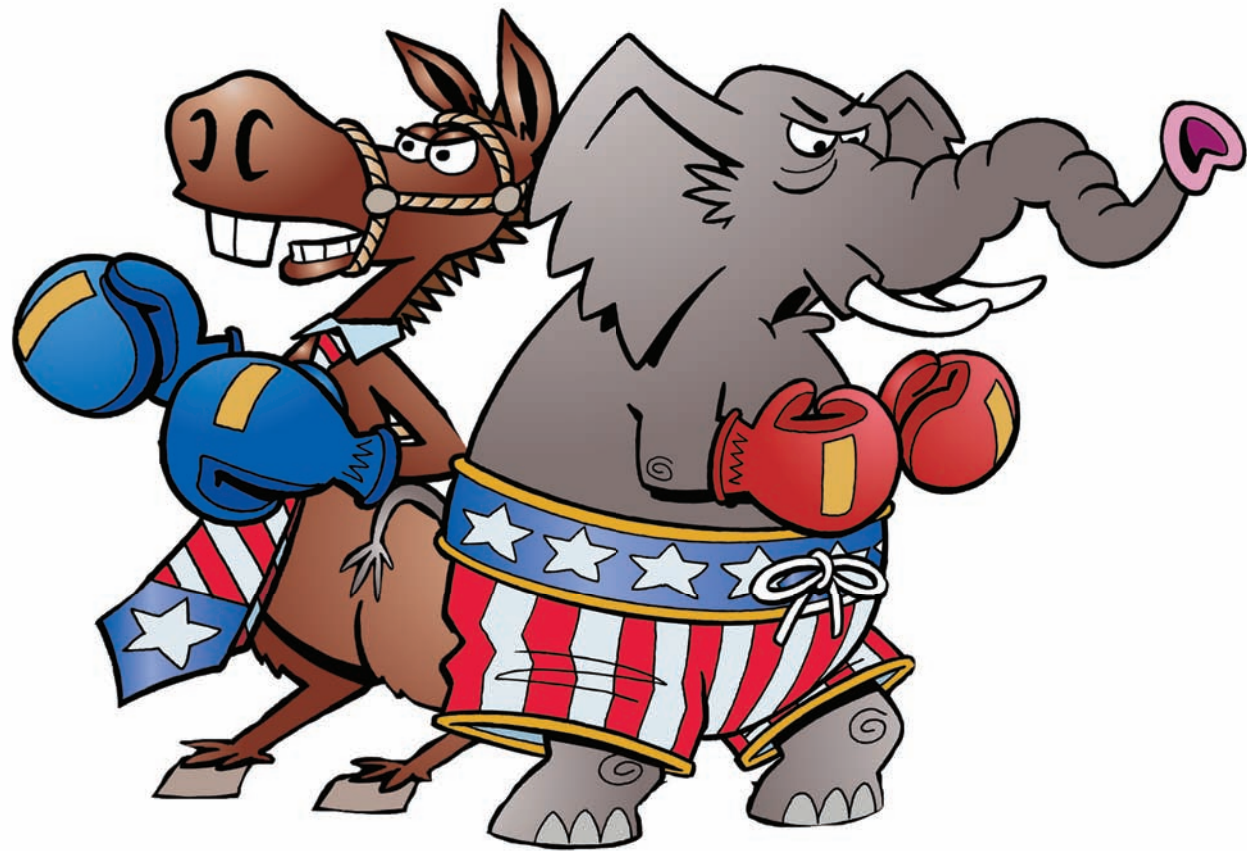

Pat Buchanan: Mitt's 'Damn-the-Torpedoes!' decision

Mitt Romney's decision to select Rep. Paul Ryan as his running mate speaks well of the man who made it. Indeed, it seemed less like the moderate man we have come to know than Adm. David Farragut in Mobile Bay: "Damn the torpedoes! Full speed ahead!"

Facing sinking polls, endless attack ads on his tax returns and Bain Capital record, and venomous lies that he was culpable in the cancer death of the wife of a steelworker seven years after he left Bain, Romney decided to convert this dismal campaign into a stark choice of philosophies and policies. Picking Ryan, Mitt shoved his whole stack of chips into the middle of the table and sent this message to the American people:

"Friends, our country is in trouble. If we do not lift the burden of taxation, regulation and spending that has produced \$5 trillion in new debt in four years, we are going the way of Spain and Greece.

"I have chosen this young leader Paul Ryan to be my partner because he has thought more deeply

and read more closely into the causes and consequences of our fiscal crisis than any other man in Washington.

"Now President Obama says his approach to solving America's fiscal crisis has 'worked.' If you believe that, go ahead and vote for him.

"But Paul Ryan and I believe that 42 straight months of 8 percent unemployment, \$5 trillion in new debt and trillion-dollar deficits starting at us all the way to the horizon is a course to fiscal and financial ruin. He and I do not believe America can survive many more years of what Barack Obama has produced and promises to produce.

"We are offering America a different direction from the radical-liberal path of Obama, Nancy Pelosi and Harry Reid, where the federal government consumes a fourth of the entire economy. We are offering a Romney-Reagan-Ryan conservative road to prosperity.

"I am not going to tell you this will not involve sacrifice. But if you believe this country needs a course correction, then we are asking you to take a chance with change to restore an America where our children can anticipate the better future we all could when we were growing up.

"You know and I know there is something fundamentally wrong with the direction in which we are headed. And the proof lies in the grim statistics that keep coming in month after month after month."

Romney's choice of Ryan makes the election of 2012 not only a report card and referendum on Obama, but a clear choice between philosophies.

Obama believes government is the engine of prosperity. Romney and Ryan believe people, private institutions, entrepreneurs and businesses are the creative and energizing forces in society.

And what a difference four years have made in this president.

In 2008, Obama was the candidate of "hope and change." In 2012, Obama is the candidate of inflexibility and fear.

Look at him, his surrogates and his ads.

Do they not all say to the American people: Be afraid, be terrified of what Romney and that dangerous Ryan would do. Be fearful, for Romney and Ryan will take from you what you have, while we will make sure you keep what you have, and we promise you more. With the selection of Ryan, Mitt Romney has made this election a test of the people themselves. Two-thirds of all Americans, according to polls, believe the country is headed in the wrong direction.

Will they vote for Romney-Ryan to change course, or for Obama to continue on that course because they fear the unknown to the known?

The predictable Democratic response to Ryan's candidacy has begun. They are rummaging through his budget to find proposed cuts and crafting ads to frighten portions of the population about what those terrible

cuts might mean to them.

Will it work? Well, this will be a test of the communications skills of the Romney-Ryan campaign. Can they persuade the people to boot the Obamaites out of the wheelhouse and entrust them with the leadership of the nation?

Second, it will be a test of the people. Can they, will they reject the frightening picture that will be painted of Romney and Ryan's America?

America has faced course corrections before, with 1932 and 1980 coming to mind. In both those elections, the failed leadership was broomed out in a landslide.

Is there any doubt that this administration, too, has fallen short of what it promised? Is there any doubt that it, too, has failed?

But are we the same people those generations were? Or have we become the fearful and risk-averse electorate the consultants and the ad-makers think we are?

We shall see.

Nevertheless, Romney is owed a debt for choosing a man of principles and conservative philosophy as a running mate, thereby giving this country a clear choice as to the future it wants to live in.

However it comes out, this decision was a gutsy call.

Debate joined on Medicare; Romney, Obama go at it

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mitt Romney accused President Barack Obama in person and in TV advertising Tuesday of cutting Medicare “to pay for Obamacare,” launching a strong counterattack to Democratic charges that he and running mate Paul Ryan would radically remake the popular health care program that serves tens of millions of seniors.

The charge drew a blistering response from Obama’s campaign, which labeled the ad dishonest and hypocritical.

Obama “has taken \$716 billion out of the Medicare trust fund. He’s raided that trust fund,” Romney said at a campaign stop in Beallsville, Ohio, as he neared the end of a multi-state bus trip punctuated by his weekend selection of a ticket mate.

“And you know what he did with it? He’s used it to pay for Obamacare, a risky, unproven, federal takeover of health care. And if I’m president of the United States, we’re putting the \$716 billion back,” he said.

Aides said a commercial containing the same allegation would begin airing immediately in several battleground states, although they declined to provide details.

In a campaign without summer doldrums, the rival sets of ticket mates campaigned in a half-dozen of the most hotly contested states, in settings as diverse as a coal mine in Ohio (Romney); a wind farm in Iowa (Obama) and a casino in Nevada (Ryan.)

Vice President Joe Biden stirred controversy in Virginia when he said the Republicans would favor the big banks over the interests of consumers. He said Romney has said he is “going to let the big banks once again write their own rules. Unchain Wall Street.”

“They’re going to put y’all back in chains,” Biden told his audience.

Romney’s campaign reacted strongly to that, saying the comments were “not acceptable in our political discourse and demonstrate yet again that the Obama campaign will say and do anything to win this election.”

But that tempest was modest compared to the building struggle over Medicare.

Romney’s criticism on that subject appeared an attempt to gain some measure of control over an issue likely to play a significant role in the outcome of the election. Florida, Pennsylvania and Iowa are among the top five states in the country in the percentage of people 65 and over, and all three are battleground states.

In a rebuttal issued shortly after the Romney TV ad was released, Obama spokeswoman Lis Smith said the president’s health care law did not “cut a single guaranteed Medicare benefit, and Mitt Romney embraced the very same savings when he promised he’d sign Paul Ryan’s budget. ...The truth is that the Romney-Ryan budget would end Medicare as we know it.”

In the days leading to Ryan’s selection, opinion polls generally showed a close race with Obama holding a modest advantage despite a sluggish economy and unemployment of 8.3 percent. Romney’s pick for a running mate drew enthusiastic support from conservatives pleased that he had tapped a lawmaker known as an intellectual leader of the effort to rein in big government benefit programs and reduce future deficits.

But Democrats, too, said they were happy with the selection. They have quickly set out to draw attention to Ryan’s plans, which contain deep cuts in projected spending in social programs as well as changes to Medicare for future retirees, and to try and saddle Romney with their political ownership.

Polling generally shows that the public places more trust in Democrats’ ability to handle Medicare than they do Republicans, and that people also generally oppose plans to replace the current program with one in which future seniors receive a fixed amount of money from the government to be used to purchase health coverage.

At the same time, polling shows the public strongly believes the financial security of Medicare as well as Social Security must be guaranteed for the long term, and government reports for years have warned of a looming shortfall if something isn’t done to change course.

Ryan and Romney have both cited a desire to right the program’s finances as a motive for their plans.

Moreover, Romney’s attack during the day suggests he hopes to overcome a generic Republican disadvantage on the issue by telling voters that Obama has cut spending for a program that is overwhelmingly popular, and put the money toward one that is controversial.

“So now the money you paid for your guaranteed health care is going for a massive new government program that’s not for you,” says the announcer in the ad, referring to the health care law that Obama signed into law in 2010. “The Romney-Ryan plan protects Medicare benefits

for today’s seniors and strengthens the plan for the next generation,” the ad concludes.

Ryan, interviewed on Fox News Channel, said he and Romney believe Medicare can be a winning issue for Republicans in the fall. “Absolutely, because we’re the ones who are offering a plan to save Medicare, to protect Medicare, to strengthen Medicare,” he said.

Ryan didn’t say so, but the budgets he has written in the House both called for leaving in place the cuts to Medicare that he is now criticizing. Romney has consistently favored restoring the funds, and his running mate said, “I joined the Romney ticket.”

Romney decided to go on the attack on one issue as the president’s re-election campaign sharply criticized him on another.

“Romney’s plans would cut college aid for nearly 10 million students ... and eliminate the tax deduction for college tuition,” says a new television commercial that Obama’s re-election campaign said would run in several battleground states. The commercial cites estimates from the budgets that Ryan has prepared as chairman of the House Budget Committee, and Romney’s own proposals.

Obama and Romney clashed over yet a third issue during the day, laying out different views on energy policy.

The president taunted his challenger for opposing an extension of a tax break for wind production, quoting him as once having said, “You can’t drive a car with a windmill on it. ...”

“I don’t know if he’s actually tried that. I know he’s had other things on his car,” Obama joked, referring to the often-repeated tale of a Romney family road trip with their dog, Seamus, in a carrier strapped to the roof of the car.

Government estimates say that more than 6,000 jobs statewide and 20 percent of Iowa’s electricity needs come from wind power, and the state’s senior GOP leaders all support renewing an extension of a wind tax credit that Romney opposes.

The wind tax provision is one of dozens of credits that would be renewed in legislation making its way to the Senate floor, including several that deal with energy such as of biodiesel, geothermal, biomass and hydropower.

Romney’s campaign did not respond to repeated quests for his position on the other portions of the bill.

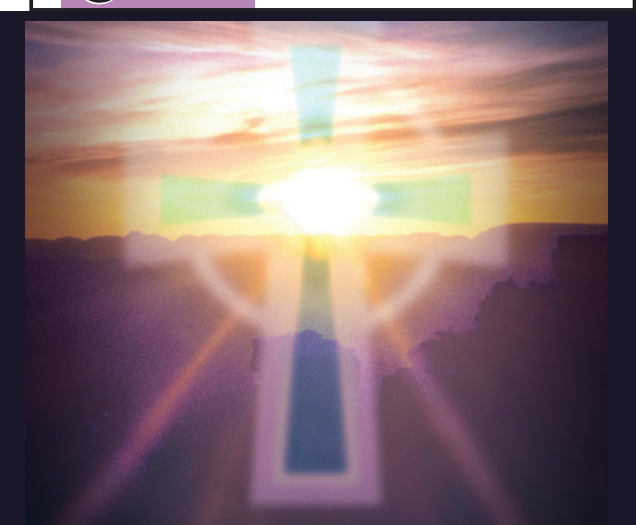

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DHS launches new immigration program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration on Tuesday directed young illegal immigrants to fill out new forms and pay \$465 if they want to apply under a new program that would let them avoid deportation and obtain a U.S. work permit.

The government renewed warnings that the process wouldn't lead to citizenship or give them permission to travel internationally. It will begin accepting immigrants' applications Wednesday.

The paperwork for the program, known as Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, can be downloaded from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services website, said the agency's director, Alejandro Mayorkas. Applicants must pay a \$465 fee and provide proof of identity and eligibility.

Under guidelines that the administration announced Tuesday, the agency said proof of identity and eligibility under the program could include a passport or birth certificate, school transcripts, medical and financial records and military service records. DHS said that in some instances, multiple sworn affidavits, signed by a third party under penalty of perjury, could also be used.

With the start of the program nearing, immigrants have been working on getting their paperwork in order. Tuesday morning, 23-year-old Evelyn Medina, from Tegucigalpa, Honduras, was in line at that country's consulate in Washington about 6:30 a.m. to secure a passport. With her passport in hand, Medina was all smiles as she walked out of the building just before 2 p.m., saying "finally" as she clutched the document.

Medina said she has been in the United States for about 10 years and is currently a student at a Maryland college, hoping to eventually earn a master's degree and become a social worker.

She wasn't alone. Leonardo Irias Navas, head of the consular section at the Embassy of Honduras, said the number of people applying for passports has more than doubled in the last week.

A decision on each application could take several months, and immigrants have been warned not to leave the

country while their application is pending. If they are allowed to stay in the United States and want to travel internationally, they will need to apply for permission to come back into the country, a request that would cost \$360 more.

The administration announced the plan in June to stop deporting many illegal immigrants brought to the U.S. as children. To be eligible, immigrants must prove they arrived in the United States before they turned 16, are 30 or younger, have been living here at least five years, and are in school or graduated or served in the military. They also cannot have been convicted of certain crimes or otherwise pose a safety threat.

Mayorkas said being approved to avoid deportation "does not provide lawful status or a path to citizenship."

The announcement came just months before what is shaping up to be a tight contest for the White House. President Barack Obama has come under fire by Hispanic voters and others who have say he hasn't fulfilled a previous campaign promise to reform the nation's immigration laws. The policy change could stop deportations for more than a million young illegal immigrants who would have qualified for the failed DREAM Act, which Obama has supported in the past.

Critics of the program, including House Judiciary Committee Chairman Lamar Smith, R-Texas, have called the policy backdoor amnesty and say they worry about fraud.

"While potentially millions of illegal immigrants will be permitted to compete with American workers for scarce jobs, there seems to be little if any mechanism in place for vetting fraudulent applications and documentation submitted by illegal immigrants," Smith said Tuesday.

DHS said anyone found to have committed fraud will be referred to federal immigration agents.

The Migration Policy Institute estimated last week that as many as 1.7 million people could be eligible to stay in the U.S. and legally work under the new policy.

DHS officials have repeatedly said the department doesn't have an estimate on how many people may apply.

Furniture featured at American Furniture Mart

Q: Enclosed is a photo of a tall eQ: I have sent a close-up photo of my antique buffet. It is part of a set that includes a dining table and six chairs. Only one of the chairs has arms, all the rest are side chairs. On the back is a paper label with the words "American Furniture Mart — Lake Shore Drive — Vaughn Furniture Indiana." I inherited the set from my grandfather and think it must date back to the 1920s. The finish is the original, but it is not good.

I have considering selling the set, but I would like more information before I decide what to do.

A: You are correct; your set was made around 1920 when Colonial Revival was in vogue. The bulbous legs, applied panels, the use of multiple woods and the veneered top with decorative crest are representative of the Jacobean Colonial Revival. The chair with arms is a host's chair and usually included with dining sets made in the early 1900s. The style is Jacobean Revival, one of the variations of Colonial Revival.

The American Furniture Mart was located on Lake Shore Blvd., Chicago, Ill. It opened in 1926 and was designed to showcase new furniture. The building was 30 stories high, and at the time, it was the largest building in the world. The Midwest housing market was expanding, resulting in a plethora of furniture manufacturers. Homeowners were in a buying mood for both homes and furniture. Chicago was accessible and centrally located for tradeshow and galleries. Over the entrance door of the mart was a carving of a lumberjack, a sawyer and a carpenter all symbolizing the furniture industry. Today the building houses condominiums. Based on the label, your set was made by Vaughn Furniture in Indianapolis and is featured in one of the Mart galleries.

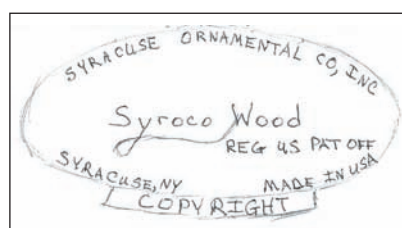
Currently, demand is minimal for Colonial Revival furniture. Based on the poor condition and the need of refinishing, the value for your set would probably be in the low hundreds.

What can you tell me about my set?

A: Syroco wood was made by Syracuse Ornamental Co. Inc. in Syracuse, N.Y. The company was founded around 1908 and closed in 2005. Their decorative pieces were made from molded wood pulp that appeared to actually be carved wood. Your Four Seasons set would probably fetch \$35 to \$55 in an antiques shop.

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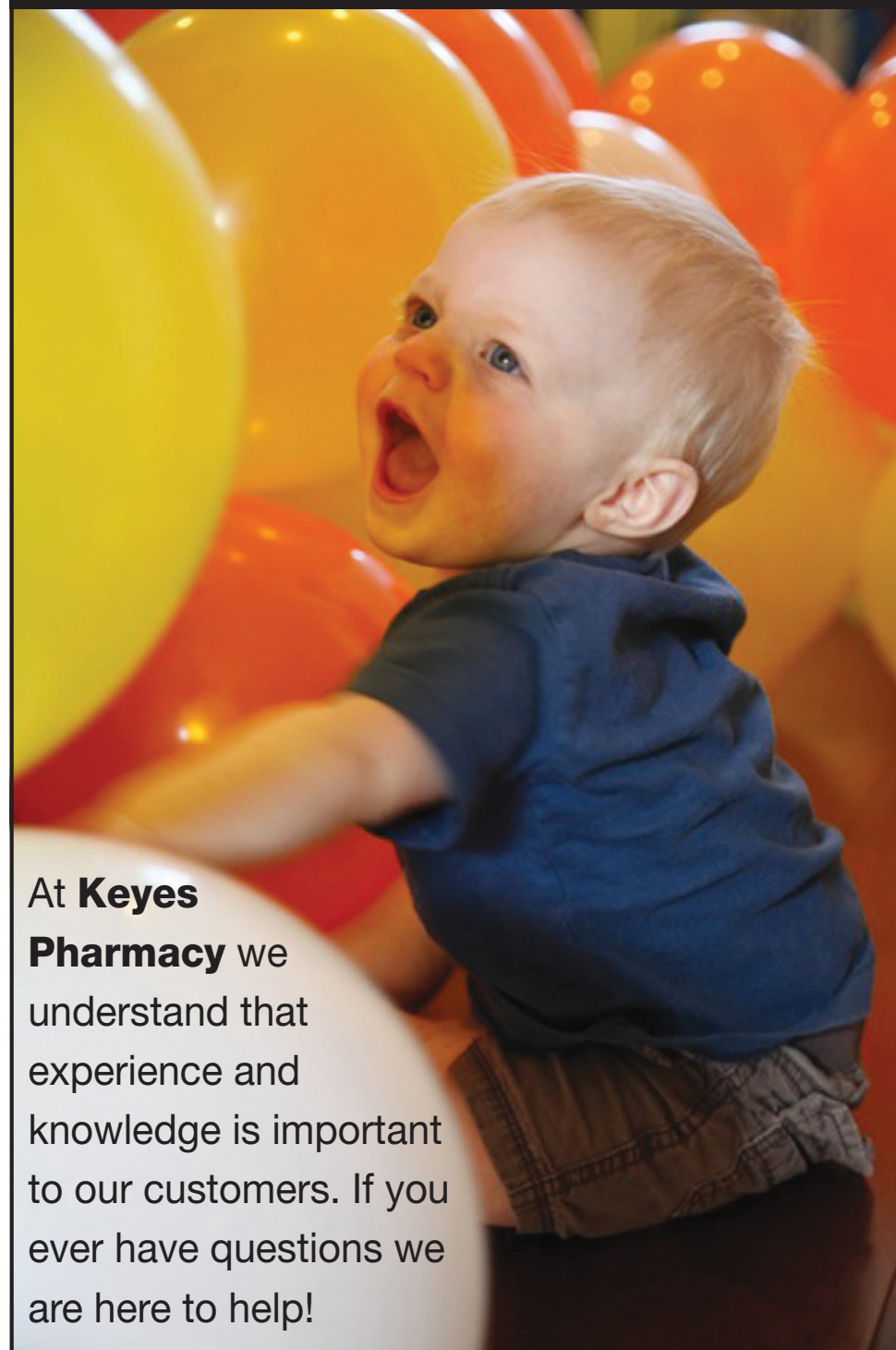


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New geek chic: Mohawks in, pocket protectors out

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Known to the Twitterverse and the president of the United States as “Mohawk Guy” of the Mars mission, Bobak Ferdowsi could be the changing public face of NASA and all of geekdom.

Ferdowsi, whose shaved scalp also features star shapes, is a flight director for the Mars rover Curiosity — a mission that captured the nation’s imagination with its odds-defying, acrobatic landing.

And Mohawk Guy isn’t the only star. There’s also former rock ‘n’ roller Adam Steltzner, sometimes called “Elvis Guy” because of his pompadour and sideburns.

Steltzner directed the daring landing of the rover and appears in a NASA movie trailer describing why the Aug. 5 Mars landing involved “seven minutes of terror.” The movie, posted on YouTube, became a hit.

“You guys are a little cooler than you used to be,” President Barack Obama said in a Monday congratulatory phone call to NASA’s Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Given Ferdowsi’s success, Obama, a “Star Trek” fan, joked about the Mohawk and suggested he might try it: “I think that I’m going to go back to my team and see if it makes sense.”

Mohawk Guy’s Twitter followers have soared to more than 50,000. Over the weekend, he and the 49-year-old Steltzner appeared on NPR’s game show, “Wait, Wait Don’t Tell Me.” He’s been doing Google+ hangouts. And, oh yes, he’s gotten marriage proposals.

Strange hairstyles are a tradition for the 32-year-old Ferdowsi, who once donned a cut that was supposed to resemble a rocket plume — red, orange and gold.

Ferdowsi couldn’t be reached for comment, but he tweeted late Monday: “So incredible to have the POTUS call work today & thank the team! Still can’t believe (at) BarackObama called me mohawk guy!”

Last week, in a Los Angeles Times interview, he acknowledged his haircut might be “a little bit of a shock” to some. He said most people think of the serious, button-downed Apollo 13 NASA.

But he noted that in 1967, engineers at his workplace, Jet Propulsion Lab, or JPL, wore Spock ears for the launch of a Venus-bound spacecraft. In fact, the California operation is more like the Berkeley of NASA.

In the unmanned world of space robotics, engineers are just as detail obsessed as Mission Control in Houston. But JPL doesn’t handle life-and-death astronaut missions, and more risks can be taken. Such as the remarkable landing system of Mars Curiosity that featured a giant parachute, retrorockets and the gentle controlled lowering of the one-ton rover with cables.

It was all run by Steltzner, who twice got F’s in high school math, initially skipped college to play music and enjoys making his own jam.

The JPL missions are run in a creative conclave nestled in the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains east of Los Angeles and managed by the California Institute of Technology for NASA. JPL prides itself on its university-like atmosphere. Some engineers come to work in Hawaiian shirts, shorts and flip-flops. Others sport hippie hairstyles.

“The button-down white shirts and ties were always in Houston; they were not here,” said Gentry Lee, who is chief engineer for planetary flight systems at JPL and is one of Ferdowsi’s bosses.

“The people who have been flying robotic missions have always been about substance and not about appearances,” Lee said. But he said most people who don’t know NASA didn’t know that until now.

“Geeks have hit pop culture,” said Ken Denmead, editor and publisher of geekdad.com. “I think more than any other single event in the last five or 10 years, this (Mars landing) has put a face on science and engineering that really gets future generations excited.”

“People like Bobak and the whole crew on the Curiosity landing just shatter that (pocket protector) mode and that’s wonderful,” Denmead, a San Francisco civil engineer, said in a phone interview.

With hit television shows celebrating geeks, like “The Big Bang Theory,” science-lover Obama in the White House, and especially regular people using more technology in their daily lives, Denmead sees what he calls “normals” becoming more geek-like. And geeks are becoming more social thanks to Twitter and Facebook.

“The communications barriers have come down between the geeks and the normals if you want,” Denmead said. “The differences have faded away.”



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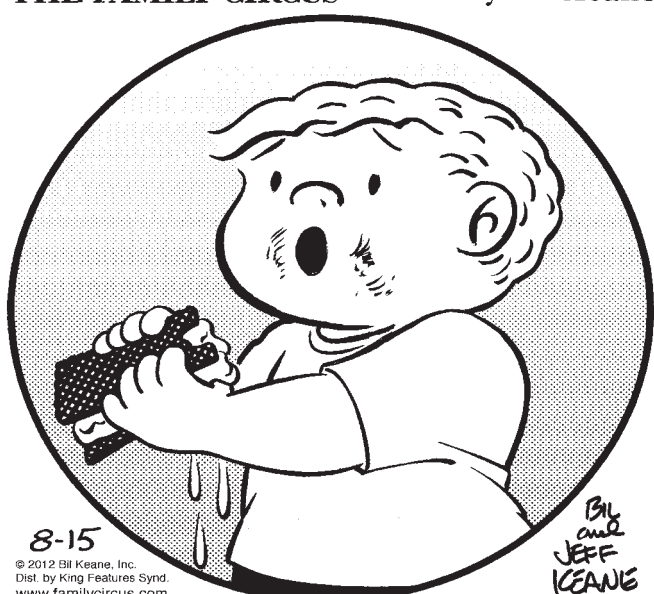

Choosing your relationships

So how familiar do these names sound: On, Assir, Elkanah and Abiasaph? Well, I don't know about you, but until recently I wouldn't have recognized any of the 4 names except Elkanah. And the only Elkanah I knew anything about was Hannah's husband in 1st Samuel. I certainly didn't know anything about these 4 men in Exodus and Numbers and Psalms.

But now that I have spent a little time studying their lives in the Bible and reading some of what has been written about them in Jewish literature, I can honestly say that each of them provides a powerful example for us to follow.

On, Assir, Elkanah and Abiasaph all do have one thing in common – KORAH. On was evidently a close friend of Korah's; while Assir, Elkanah and Abiasaph were sons of Korah.

Now if you know your Bible very well, that name, Korah, will ring a very loud bell and it won't be a very pleasant sound either. Korah is the priest who led a rebellion against his cousins, Moses and Aaron, which really was a rebellion against God. His rebellion was recorded in the first half of Numbers 16 and then he was utterly destroyed by the Lord God in the second half. But enough about Korah.

First, what about On? On was one of the 3 leaders (along with Dathan and Abiram) who listened to Korah's rebellious talk and then foolishly chose to stand by his side when he challenged Moses in Num 16:1-3. Also 250 of the leading Israelite men came with the 4 ring leaders to confront Moses.

Moses immediately realized how serious the situation was in the eyes of the Lord God Jehovah. How do we know this? Because Moses immediately fell to the ground, an act of penitence and prayer. The herd of rebels were then told to return the next morning for God's answer to their challenge.

The end result the next day was that God caused the earth to swallow Korah (and his associates), Dathan (and his entire family) and Abiram (and his entire family) and fire from heaven consumed the 250 leading men.

But where are On and his family in the story? The Bible doesn't actually say; we just know that he wasn't part of the rebellious crowd on that day of annihilation. When the morning sun shown, the ring leaders of the rebellion had lost one of its members.

Some extra-biblical Jewish writings tell us that it was On's wife who stood firmly against her husband's participation in the rebellion. When Korah's messengers were sent the next morning to get On, they found On's wife seated at the door of their tent combing her "uncovered" hair. Since it was considered a serious transgression to

look upon a woman with uncovered hair, the messengers retreated with haste. It was On's wife who saved the family.

On teaches us several lessons. 1- Choose friends very carefully because they can either lead you to destruction or to blessing. 2- Choose your spouse even more carefully because she/he also can either lead you to destruction or to salvation. 3- When given additional time to re-think questionable decisions, always use that extra time to seek God's guidance and to gather counsel from "godly" family members and friends.

Now what about Korah's family? According to some other extra-biblical Jewish writings, Korah's wife encouraged him in his rebellion and therefore died with him in God's judgment. But what about his sons, Assir, Elkanah and Abiasaph?

Num 26:11 says that they did not die in the rebellion. Why? There is only one possible reason why they weren't destroyed along with their father: THEY WERE NOT BY HIS SIDE. They did not support their rebellious father. Notice that in Num 16:27 the children of Dathan and Abiram were by their side; and then they too were destroyed. But nothing is said of Korah's sons being by his side. Why is the record silent? Why does 26:11 make it a point to say that they didn't die? Because they were faithful and stood in opposition to their father.

When it comes down to "truth", BLOOD KIN COUNTS FOR NOTHING! Only a FOOL would permit their earthly kinships to outweigh their relationship with God.

And the best part of the story shows up in some of the Psalms. Thanks to Korah's 3 sons, the descendants of Korah became famous for their faithfulness in the time of David, and are mentioned in Ps 42:1; 44:1; 45:1; 46:1; 47:1; 48:1; 49:1; 84:1; 85:1; 87:1; 88:1.

So what do we learn from Assir, Elkanah and Abiasaph? 1- Real servants of God care more about truth than they care about their earthly family. With them FAMILY DOES NOT COME FIRST; GOD COMES FIRST! 2- Just because a person is raised by a parent with a wicked heart or in a family of wicked hearts DOES NOT MEAN that they have to repeat the pattern of wickedness. Anyone can choose to surrender to God and put Him first in their life and be blessed and rewarded accordingly. 3- God will always reward faithfulness! 4- Our faithfulness can bless our descendants for many generations to come.

And just in case today is the day you want to surrender to Jesus so that He will break your chain of wickedness, here is a simple prayer that will get your life with Jesus started. "Jesus, my life is a mess and has been for some time. I need You to straighten me out, to make me into what You made me to be. So I give up and totally surrender to You; no conditions, no strings. I want You to be my Lord and Master and I want to be Your servant; not just today, but for the rest of my life. Amen."
