Ex-Penn St. president charged in Sandusky case

 HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — The “conspiracy of silence” that protected Jerry Sandusky extended all the way to the top at Penn State, prosecutors said Thursday as they charged former university President Graham Spanier with hushing up child sexual abuse allegations against the former assistant football coach. Prosecutors also added counts against two of

Spanier’s former underlings, Tim Curley and Gary Schultz, who were already charged with lying to a grand jury. “This was not a mistake by these men. This was not an oversight. It was not misjudgment on their part,” said state Attorney General Linda Kelly. “This was a conspiracy of silence by top officials to actively conceal the truth.” Spanier’s lawyers issued a statement that asserted his innocence and described the new charges as an

attempt by Gov. Tom Corbett to divert attention from the three-year investigation that began under his watch as attorney general. “These charges are the work of a vindictive and politically motivated governor working through an unelected attorney general

whom he appointed to do his bidding,” the four defense lawyers wrote. Corbett spokesman Kevin Harley said the defense statement “sounds like the ranting of a desperate man who just got indicted.” Curley’s lawyer Caroline Roberto said he was inno-

cent of all charges, as he has asserted in the past. She said the new documents were being reviewed and would have a more comprehensive comment later. Schultz also has maintained his innocence; his lawyer did not return a message seeking comment. At a Capitol news conference, Kelly said all three men “knowingly testified falsely and failed to provide important information and evidence.” Spanier was charged

with perjury, obstruction, endangering the welfare of children, failure to properly report suspected abuse and conspiracy. Curley and Schultz face new charges of endangering the welfare of children, obstruction and conspiracy. The charges were filed with a suburban Harrisburg district judge, whose office said Curley and Schultz were expected to be arraigned Friday afternoon and Spanier tentatively scheduled to appear Wednesday.

Construction of new animal shelter to begin

With multiple dogs in some of the cages and cats and kittens in cages stacked along one wall in the office, it’s not hard to see that the city’s animal shelter is overcrowded. “It’s not uncommon to have three or four dogs in the same cage,” said Tracy Scobee, who works at the shelter as a kennel keeper and office worker. Sometimes, Scobee said, they have to use cages meant to quarantine sick animals for animals that aren’t sick because there’s no space. That will all change in about a year

when construction of a new state-of-the-art shelter is complete. The shelter will be located in Hobart Street Park and be visible from the busy roadway. “This will be a beautiful facility,” said Shane Stokes, assistant city manager for Pampa. The present shelter is located a few hundred yards away on the park access road. Right now, workers from Atmos Energy are relocating the gas lines to the building and bids from general contractors will close on Nov. 14, Stokes said. The city is working with GH2 Architecture on the construction,

which is scheduled to begin Dec. 1. The building is expected to cost \$2.9 million, said Faustina Curry, president of the Pampa Animal Welfare Society, or PAWS, a volunteer organization that helps care for the shelter and its animals. Curry said funding for the shelter comes from a bond that was approved by Pampa voters in May. The vote was about 900 to 300 in favor in the shelter, she said. “The city took bond money that was expired and rolled it over (for the shelter),” she said. “With the help from the newspaper and radio

Change to indigent health care plan approved

■ County can request financial info from sponsors of legal aliens

Sponsors of legal aliens living in Gray County will now be requested to disclose their incomes and other financial assets to the county if the alien they are sponsoring applies for indigent health care. The county has a program to provide health care for indigents, including legal aliens who have green cards. However, with a state law that was passed recently, the incomes and assets of the sponsors can be used to determine whether a legal aliens applying for indigent health care can qualify. Adoption of the law in Gray County was unanimously approved by the County Commissioners Court Thursday morning during a special meeting. “If someone’s here legally and they have a green card, we can request information on the sponsor’s income and assets,” said Court Coordinator Sandra Martin, who made a presentation to the commissioners. In Texas, Martin said, indigent health care is either paid for by the counties or through hospital districts. But since Gray County is not in a hospital district, indigent care is paid for through the county tax rolls. She said Gray County has always covered indigent aliens who live

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

Missing Ariz. baby's mom loses bid for freedom

PHOENIX (AP) — An Arizona woman convicted in her young son's disappearance nearly three years ago lost her bid Thursday for release from jail while she awaits sentencing.

The judge who denied Elizabeth Johnson's release request also said the 26-year-old will probably face a prison term on top of the nearly three years she has already spent in jail.

"I could see me giving her consecutive prison terms and giving her more time than she has spent," Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Joseph Kreamer said.

He noted, however, that he hasn't yet heard arguments from Johnson's attorneys on their reasons for seeking a lesser sentence.

Authorities said Johnson told the father of the boy named Gabriel that she killed the boy and dumped him in a trash bin. But authorities said she later recanted and told police she gave the baby to a couple at a San Antonio park.

She never provided the couple's names.

Gabriel would have turned 3 this past April. But authorities don't know if he's still alive, and few clues have emerged.

Kreamer, in rejecting the release request, cited a court rule that says a person can't be released from jail if there's a reasonable probability that he or she would receive a prison sentence.

Johnson was found guilty two weeks ago of custodial interference and conspiracy to commit custodial interference in the December 2009 disappearance of her then-8-month-old son.

The jury failed to reach a verdict on a kidnaping charge — the most serious count against her — and instead convicted her of a lesser count of unlawful imprisonment, meaning a maximum possible prison sentence of 27 years was off the table.

Johnson could now face two to nine years in prison at her Dec. 7 sentencing.

Marc Victor, one of Johnson's attorneys, said he will seek probation and believes the judge won't try to make an example of his client.

Victor said he will note Johnson's lack of prior felony convictions, her youth and other factors in seeking a lesser sentence.

station we were able to get the public to vote for it." Along with the new shelter from the city, Curry said PAWS has been blessed with a grant from the Payne Foundation to help low income families and the shelter pay for medical expenses of pets.

Before the grant, Curry said, if someone brought in a dog with a broken leg or an eye infection they would have to put it down because there was no money to pay for treatment.

"It's been marvelous," Curry said of the grant. The new shelter will have

a saloport to intake pets, pens to hold animals for three days before they can be made available for adoption (six days if they have a rabies tag or microchip) and then regular pens for dogs that are available for adoption.

There also will be an area where people can interact with pets before they decide to adopt them.

Curry said PAWS has about 25 active volunteers, but the group is always looking for more.

"Even if its just spending 15 minutes a day walking with a dog to help it become more social," she said.

here legally, but with the new law sponsors who have adequate financial resources can now be expected to pay the health care costs of the aliens they sponsor.

With the state law there will "now be an opportunity (for the county) to be part of the communication," she said.

The law is retroactive to Sept. 1, when the state's new fiscal budget began.

She told the commission the new law will affect at least one legal alien in the county when the woman reapplies for benefits.

Martin said from Sept. 1, 2011 to Aug. 31 the county spent \$72,000 on indigent health care.

Comparatively, that's not a high figure because so many people in Pampa are working right now, she said.

In past fiscal years, the county has spent twice as much, she said.

Police: Pa. man stops to relieve self, steal meat

JOHNSTOWN, Pa. (AP) — Police say a western Pennsylvania man who stopped to relieve himself outside a packing company decided to steal about \$1,000 worth of meat after his car accidentally backed into the building and broke through a glass door.

At least that's the story that West Hills Regional police say the man is sticking to this time.

Police Sgt. George Musulin tells the Tribune-Democrat of Johnstown that 47-year-old Joseph Winogrodzki gave police several versions of the Oct. 18 incident before he was charged Wednesday.

At first, police say Winogrodzki told them he was driving past the Alex Froehlich Packing Co. when he saw two men break a glass door and throw meat onto the sidewalk.

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Better off 4 years later? A mixed bag of answers

It's a staple of every presidential election, a single question that puts the incumbent's record on trial and asks American voters to be the jurors.

"Are you better off than you were four years ago?" Ronald Reagan asked in 1980 at the end of a televised debate. The answer was his landslide win. Since then, the question has become a cudgel for political challengers, a survey question for pollsters and a barometer for the mood of the country.

Campaign 2012 is no exception. Mitt Romney and his surrogates have stitched the question into a stinging indictment of current White House economic policies, answering with a resounding no. But in an unusual twist, President Barack Obama and the Democrats have asked, too, and responded with an emphatic yes. They pose their own question: Want to go back to 2008-

early 2009, when millions lost their jobs, banks failed and the country teetered on the edge of collapse?

So who's right? It depends. On whom you ask. Where you go. And what yardstick you use to judge.

"It's tough to give a one- or two-word answer," says Mark Hopkins, senior economist at Moody's. "It all depends on what you're looking at. I don't think anyone can really argue seriously that we're not better off than we were four years ago. ... And I would be just as incredulous if anyone tried to argue we're fine or couldn't be doing better."

Both campaigns rely on numbers to woo voters. For Obama, it's employment: In the month when he took office, January 2009, the nation lost 881,000 jobs, according to federal numbers. This September, 114,000 jobs were added — the 31st straight month, Obama points out, of private sector job growth.

For Romney, it's statistics such as the drop in median household income: a 4.8 percent inflation-adjust-

ed decline from June 2009 (the end of the recession) to June 2012, when it was \$50,964, according to a report by Sentier Research.

Hopkins' says his own view is based on the general state of the economy, while the candidates' "better off" question is aimed at voter sentiment. "When a politician asks that," he explains, "they are really hoping to tap into people's gut feelings, not have them do a rational cost-benefit analysis."

So what are those feelings on the eve of the election?

A new Washington Post-ABC News poll reported 22 percent of likely voters say they're better off financially than when Obama became president, a third say they're worse and nearly half report "being in about the same shape."

Those are the broad strokes; it's the singular stories, though, that reveal hope and confidence, frustration and insecurity.

Barack Obama, spin master

The definition of spin is to apply a slant or particular emphasis to information, as to persuade or deceive.

President Barack Obama really has been pounding the pulpit the past few days, with the election right around the corner, with the help of his speechwriters. He sounds a lot like the Rev. Jeremiah Wright.

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Taking the right fork in the road

Americans may be tired of an exhausting national campaign, but let's not forget that the stakes have never been higher. As Yogi Berra said, "When you come to a fork in the road, take it."

If Barack Obama is reelected, he will merely click the repeat button to give us another dose of his first term, sending us down the road to European socialism and dependency on government, and imposing incredible debt on our children and grandchildren. Alabama's Republican Senator Jeff Sessions, who ordered the budget figures to be released, said, "No longer should we measure compassion by how much money the government spends, but by how many people we help to rise out of poverty."

A major reason to take the right fork in the road is the fact that Obama gutted the welfare reform provision to get people out of poverty when he summarily and unlawfully abolished the successful work requirement, which was required by the law passed by the Republican Congress in 1996 and signed by Bill Clinton.

The biggest increase in welfare spending is for food stamps, which are now feeding 46,681,833, including 1,634,000 non-citizens. Sessions says that the Obama administration has allowed this program to increase mightily through misleading promotion and a disregard for self-reliance. Foreign policy is another major reason to

The 1920s (known as the Roaring Twenties) were years of sustained economic prosperity, industrial and technological progress, and cultural dynamism. Obama, on the other hand, is taking us back to the 1930s, the years of the Great Depression, when the progressives started to falsely tell us that government can solve all our economic problems.
