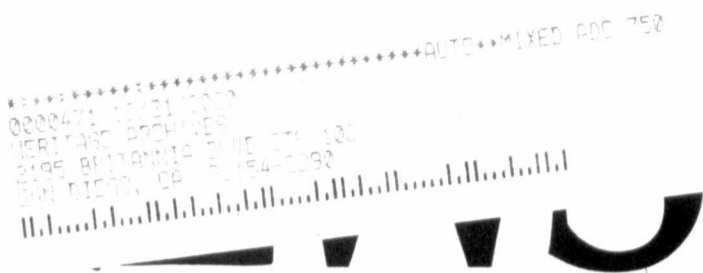

## Prevent shoplifting during the holiday season

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce hosted two seminars on Thursday on how to prevent shoplifting during the holiday season.

The presentations were given by Pampa Police Department Public Information Officer Stormy McCullar.

She also is in charge of the Crime Stoppers program and information regarding sex offenders.

She releases information to the radio, newspaper and Crime Stoppers website. McCullar said that the West Texas Crime Prevention Association is a good program not just for law enforcement, but for businesses as well. The WTCPA meets once every other month.

There were seven topics discussed: How to profile a

shoplifter, the methods and behaviors of shoplifters, theft deterrents, crime prevention through the environment design, crime prevention through customer service and child safety.

Here is a run down of some of the important topics:

- You cannot stereotype shoplifters by age, sex, race, rich, poor, young or old.

- Oversized pants, diaper bags, strollers and hoodie sweaters can be used to steal items.

- Cameras — Use real surveillance cameras and not decoys.

- Use cable and locking devices on expensive or smaller items.

- Crime Prevention through environment design, such as designing store aisles so that cashiers have a clear view down the aisles. For homeowners

an unobstructed front door and/or a security sign.

- Crime Prevention through customer service — The more contact with customers, the less likely they will steal from the business.

McCullar suggests that business operators in different parts of town should get together or at least be familiar with each other so they can notify one another of a suspicious person.

"If you have a heads up your business can watch that person and hopefully prevent a theft," McCullar said. "Don't have the mindset that just because it is a small town bad things won't happen."

When a crime is ongoing McCullar gave these tips:

1. Identify the person with as many details as possible. The more details the better. (Color and type of clothing, tattoos, piercings and birth-

marks.)

2. Call 911 or the police.

3. Get a description of the vehicle if there is one involved. Again, the more details the better. (Make, model, type, license plate number, bumper stickers and dents.)

4. Follow at a safe distance until police arrive. Do not put yourself or others in harms way.

"The quicker you contact the police the better off you will be," McCullar added.

The WTCPA is hosting a program in January for businesses on the topic of an active shooter.

According to a Nov. 18 article in the Middletown Journal in Middletown, Ohio, between 2006 and 2010 more than 3,000 people died due to workplace violence. More than 15,000 people were injured in workplace violence.

## Accident ties up rush hour traffic

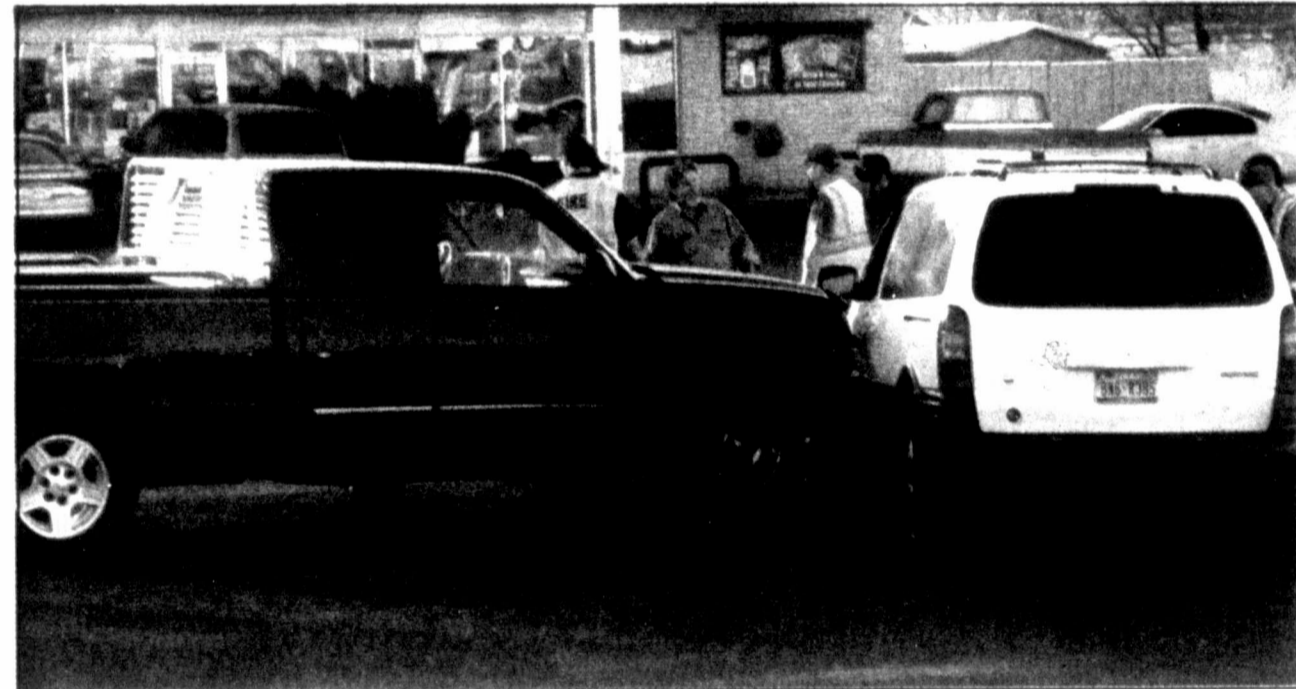

## County makes change to employee health plans

The Gray County Court of Commissioners voted Friday to make a modification to the amount employees must pay for their dependents' health insurance coverage.

The meeting was held at 9 a.m. at the County Courthouse.

Until recently, county employees were paying \$166 per month through payroll deduction to have their children on the plan regardless of how many kids they have.

Beginning with the current pay period, however, employees with one or two children are paying an additional \$34 and employees with three or more employees are paying an additional \$84.

At least one county employee paying the additional \$84 complained that the new employee contribution schedule was unfair.

Commissioners discussed whether it might more fair to deduct \$17 for each child, but ultimately agreed to an employee contribution of \$200 to cover children on the health plans, whether as employee has one child or five.

Judge Richard Peet, who oversees the commission, pointed out the county spends \$9,000 per employee a year for health insurance.

## Pa. chicken rant victims don't show for hearing

POINT MARION, Pa. (AP) — A district judge has dismissed assault and harassment charges against a southwestern Pennsylvania man who allegedly fought with his son and daughter-in-law after he was served chicken that was baked, when he wanted it fried.

The judge dismissed the charges Thursday against 45-year-old George Rhome, of Point Marion, after the alleged victims failed to show up for a preliminary hearing on the charges. The hearing had been rescheduled three times since Rhome was arrested Aug. 27. Court records show he spent four days in jail before posting bail.

The incident occurred in Point Marion, a tiny borough on the West Virginia border, about 50 miles south of Pittsburgh.

A man who answered a phone listed in Rhome's name said it was a wrong number Thursday night. His public defender could not immediately be reached after hours.

## NASA: Closest planet to sun, Mercury, harbors ice

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Just in time for Christmas, scientists have confirmed a vast amount of ice at the north pole — on Mercury, the closest planet to the sun.

The findings are from NASA's Mercury-orbiting probe, Messenger, and the subject of three scientific papers released Thursday by the journal Science.

The frozen water is located in regions of Mercury's north pole that always are in shadows, essentially impact craters. It's believed the south pole harbors ice as well, though there are no hard data to support it. Messenger orbits much closer to the north pole than the south.

"If you add it all up, you have on the order of 100 billion to 1 trillion metric tons of ice," said David Lawrence of the Applied

Physics Laboratory at Johns Hopkins University. "The uncertainty on that number is just how deep it goes."

The ice is thought to be at least 1½ feet deep — and possibly as much as 65 feet deep.

There's enough polar ice at Mercury, in fact, to bury an area the size of Washington, D.C., by two to 2½ miles deep, said Lawrence, the lead author of one of the papers.

"These are very exciting results," he added at a news conference.

For two decades, radar measurements taken from Earth have suggested the presence of ice at Mercury's poles. Now scientists know for sure, thanks to Messenger, the first spacecraft to orbit Mercury.

The water almost certainly came from impact-

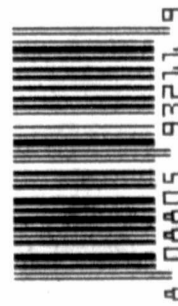

Mackenzie, Carolyn Surratt PhD, clinical psychologist, 1922-2012, died Oct. 4, 2012, in St. Petersburg, Fla. Born Sept. 16, 1922, in Okmulgee, OK, to Steven Surratt and Louise McCarthy, she grew up in Pampa, Texas.

She attended Northwestern University (B.A.), the University of Chicago (M.A.) and the University of Maryland (PhD). She was in practice in Washington, D.C. from 1957-96, she retired in St. Petersburg and was active at Eckerd College.

In 1953, she married Thayer Mills Mackenzie, who preceded her in death on June 24, 2012. ### Derailment in NJ sends tankers into creek

PAULSBORO, N.J. (AP) — A freight train derailed Friday on an old railroad bridge that has had problems before, toppling two tanker cars partially into a creek and causing a leak of hazardous gas that was blamed for sickening dozens of people, authorities said. Members of the National Transportation Safety Board arrived in New Jersey on Friday afternoon to investigate. They will try to determine whether it was a problem with the bridge that caused the derailment or the derailment that is to blame for the partial bridge collapse.

A delicate operation lies ahead, as a huge crane was being brought from New York Harbor to pick up tanker cars precariously dangling from the bridge. The accident happened just after 7 a.m. when a train with two locomotives, 82 freight cars and a caboose made its way from Camden to the industrial town of Paulsboro, just across the Delaware River from Philadelphia International Airport.

Cars went off the rails on a swing-style bridge, owned by Conrail, over Mantua Creek. One tanker containing 25,000 gallons of vinyl chloride was sliced open in the accident and some of the gas spewed into the air,

while the rest turned into a solid and settled into the bottom of the tanker.

People who live nearby said the air was smoky and had a sweet chemical smell for part of the morning.

Breathing the chemical, which is used to make the common plastic PVC, can make people dizzy or sleepy. Breathing very high levels can cause you to pass out, and breathing extremely high levels can cause death. Most of the vinyl chloride is gone from the body a day after being breathed in.

More than 40 people were being treated Underwood-Memorial Hospital, most having complained of breathing problems, said spokeswoman Karen Urbaniak. She said 11 arrived by ambulance and 31 walked in. All those seen by late morning were listed in stable condition.

Residents of Paulsboro, West Deptford and East Greenwich Township were told to remain indoors early Friday before an all-clear was given. One resident walked through town Friday morning wearing a gas mask.

By late morning, state Department of Environmental Protection spokesman Larry Hajna said that sensors were not measuring any amounts of the chemical at the site.

Tom Butts, the director of emergency management for Gloucester County, said it would take at least a day to get the large crane to the site to pick up the damaged cars. The recovery work is expected to take place only during daylight hours and it is not clear how long it will take. The bridge usually supports at least three major trains each day serving refineries and other customers in an industrial area along the Delaware River. It was rebuilt after it buckled in 2009.

State Senate President Stephen Sweeney said he had been told that complaints had been made in recent weeks about noise coming from the bridge and that Conrail was looking into it.

## No estimate on reopening Liberty Island; statue OK

NEW YORK (AP) — The Statue of Liberty survived Superstorm Sandy with every crown spike in place, but its surrounding island was so badly damaged that the National Park Service doesn't know when the beloved tourist attraction will reopen or how much repairs will cost.

A tour of Liberty Island on Friday showed broken railings, torn-up paving stones, damaged equipment and flood-wrecked buildings.

The storm destroyed boilers, sewage pumps and electrical systems, said David Luchsinger, the superintendent of the Statue of Liberty and of the neighboring Ellis Island.

"Our entire infrastructure on both islands, both Liberty Island and Ellis Island, was under water," he said.

Luchsinger estimated that 75 percent of Liberty Island's 12 acres was flooded, with water as high as 8 feet. The water would have been chest-high on the plaza that visitors cross en route from the ferry to the statue itself, he said.

Days after the storm,

there was a controlled detonation of explosives on Ellis Island. Park Service spokesman Mike Litterst said the explosives were stored there to train bomb-sniffing dogs. They were compromised by the storm and had to be destroyed.

The Oct. 29 storm came one day after the Statue of Liberty's 126th birthday and the grand reopening of the crown — though the park was closed at the time in advance of the storm. The crown had been closed for a year for a \$30 million upgrade to the monument's fire alarms, sprinkler systems and exit routes.

The rest of the statue was

open during that year and had 3.7 million visitors last year, making it the 19th most visited national park in the nation.

Historical artifacts on Ellis Island also survived intact, Luchsinger said.

Luchsinger evacuated ahead of the storm and returned Oct. 30, when Liberty Island was covered with mud and debris. Hundreds of National Park Service workers from as far away as California and Alaska have spent the past month cleaning the island and assessing the damage.

Friday's tour showed there is much still to be done.

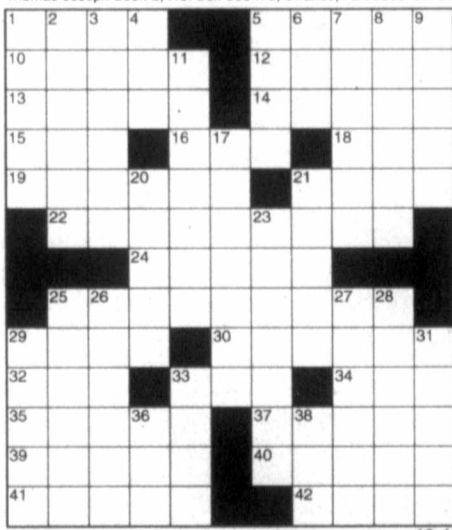

ing comets, or possibly asteroids. Ice is found at the surface, as well as buried beneath a dark material, likely organic.

Messenger was launched in 2004 and went into orbit around the planet 1½ years ago. NASA hopes to continue observations well into next year.

Columbia University's Sean Solomon, principal scientist for Messenger, stressed that no one is suggesting that Mercury might hold evidence of life, given the presence of water. But the latest findings may help explain some of the early chapters of the book of life elsewhere in the solar system, he said.

"Mercury is becoming an object of astrobiological interest, where it wasn't much of one before," Solomon said.

## Fiscal cliff issues

Once again, President Obama dodged the key fiscal-cliff issues at a campaign rally/press conference Wednesday morning. Campaign-style, he argued that the middle-class tax cuts (below \$250,000) must be renewed in order to prevent a \$2,200 average tax hike from hitting middle-class folks. He added that a middle-class tax hike would cost consumers \$200 billion in spending power.

No one wants to raise middle-class taxes. That's not the issue. And even if those numbers are right, they dodge one of the key points in the dialogue between President Obama and House Speaker John Boehner — namely, what to do about top income-tax rates, which include capital gains, dividends and inheritance taxes.

The president once again avoided the term "tax rate" in his latest round of fiscal-cliff comments. He basically said: Let's get this done before Christmas in a fair and balanced way. But what is balance?

Speaker Boehner, in a Republican concession, is willing to cap upper-end deductions, a move that would produce several hundred billion dollars in new revenues while preserving marginal-tax-rate growth incentives, including those for successful small-business owners.

Obama did refer to a Senate Democratic bill that would raise top tax rates while leaving everything else in place. Question is: Is Obama rebuffing the Boehner offer? That's key to a fiscal-cliff deal. Higher tax rates? Or revenue-producing tax-deduction caps?

Another key point: Mr. Obama never mentioned spending cuts. Never. Not once. Yet Boehner has argued that the Republican revenue concession depends on some entitlement cuts as well as other spending reductions that would make up the trillion dollars or so in the across-the-board sequestration plan that appears to have been junked by both parties.

Even The Washington Post is criticizing Obama for failing to deliver a specific plan regarding en-

titlement and non-entitlement spending cuts. And Democratic Sen. Dick Durbin has added that taxing rich people will not overcome the gargantuan entitlement deficit, which some estimate to be \$68 trillion over the decades ahead.

Unfortunately, Durbin doesn't want entitlement changes this year. He wants to put them off until 2013. Why does everybody want to put spending cuts off until next year? It doesn't work. It won't persuade the financial markets or the credit-rating agencies. Small, money-saving entitlement reforms, like cost-of-living adjustments and raising the eligibility age, would be a useful down-payment within this year's fiscal-cliff deficit deal.

And herein resides the GOP leverage, if they choose to use it. Republicans should not sign a tax deal that doesn't have a sizeable spending component. And they should argue that a smaller spending share of gross domestic product is actually a tax cut stimulant for the economy, and that it would give confidence to the business and financial worlds as well as the rating agencies that Washington is on the right track. And the GOP should use this leverage to press on with the idea of capping deductions, rather than raising top rates on successful earners, small businesses and investors.

Now, some people argue that Senate Democrats, and perhaps the president, should just let all the tax cuts expire this year. That, of course, would bring on a recession, or at least an even more anemic economy. Just blame the Republicans, it is said.

But I don't buy this. Because the president does not want a second recession during his watch. Herbert Hoover Obama is not the legacy he's after. And that's why Republicans should hold firm to their principles on spending and tax rates. Then, next year, new efforts for deeper tax and entitlement reforms can proceed in an orderly way.

But no deal will happen until the president unveils his entitlement and spending ideas. It's good that both Obama and Boehner are trying to keep an optimistic tone to this discussion. But so far, the key issues have not been resolved.

## Paint interior walls with old-fashioned glazes

Glazing has been used for centuries, long before wallpaper and flat wall paint were commonplace. It produces a soft texture and depth to the wall that is difficult to duplicate with standard rolled-on paint. It is also much less expensive to apply than high-quality wallpaper.

The process of glazing is to paint the wall one color and then sponge or wipe a coat of tinted translucent glaze over it. Glazing can be purchased in kit form, but it is easy to mix it yourself. The typical mixture is one part paint to two parts glazing liquid. As you get familiar with the technique, you may add some thinner so it flows easier and gives you more working time before it sets up.

Oil-based paint and glazing liquids are the easiest to work with. These materials flow nicely and give you plenty of time to work on the glaze. There are areas of the country where oil-based paints cannot be used for environmental reasons. They give off too much VOCs (volatile organic

chemicals) into the air.

If you live in these environmentally conscious areas, glazing can also be done with latex (water-based) paints. Mix one part of latex paint to two parts latex glazing liquid. A slight bit of water can be added to thin the mixture if needed. To give you more time to work with it and to make it flow better, add some latex glaze extender or paint conditioner. Most paint stores carry these products.

Once you have decided on the type of paint to use, you must select the colors. You can put a lighter colored glaze over a dark wall or visa versa. Putting a dark glaze over a lighter wall often creates more depth and a sense that light is coming through from behind it. Any two colors can be used, but don't use radically different colors. Often selecting different levels of the same paint chip group works well.

First paint the wall with two coats of the base coat color, as you would paint any wall. There are two basic procedures, positive and negative, for applying the glazing after the wall is

Painted. With positive glazing, the glaze is applied and textured in one step. With negative glazing, it is first applied with a brush or roller, and then it is textured with a sponge. Negative glazing is generally easier to control.

Even if you have done this glazing before, practice on pieces of drywall. You are never quite sure how the base coat and glaze colors will look together until they are actually applied and dry. This will also give you some experience to experiment with difference texturing techniques.

Mask off the edge where the walls meet. Start applying the glaze in an upper corner of a wall to form a triangular shape. Work it up to the masking tape at the edge. Using a sponge, texture the glaze diagonally working from the top and then from the bottom to the middle. As with any painting, always keep a wet edge from the previous stroke to blend them together.

## Strategy, timing key to states' pot legalization

SEATTLE (AP) — In the late-1980s heyday of the anti-drug "Just Say No" campaign, a man calling himself "Jerry" appeared on a Seattle talk radio show to criticize U.S. marijuana laws.

An esteemed businessman, he hid his identity because he didn't want to offend customers who — like so many in those days — viewed marijuana as a villain in the ever-raging "war on drugs."

Now, a quarter century later, "Jerry" is one of the main forces behind Washington state's successful initiative to legalize pot for adults over 21. And he no longer fears putting his name to the cause: He's Rick Steves, the travel guru known for his popular guidebooks.

"It's amazing where we've come," says Steves of the legalization measures Washington and Colorado voters approved last month. "It's almost counterculture to oppose us."

A once-unfathomable notion, the lawful possession and private use of pot, becomes an American reality this week when this state's law goes into effect. Thursday is "Legalization Day" here, with a tote-your-own-ounce celebration scheduled beneath Seattle's Space Needle — a nod to the measure allowing adults to possess up to an ounce of pot. Colorado's law is set to

take effect by Jan. 5. How did we get here? From "say no" to "yes" votes in not one but two states?

The answer goes beyond society's evolving views, and growing acceptance, of marijuana as a drug of choice.

In Washington — and, advocates hope, coming soon to a state near you — there was a well-funded and cleverly orchestrated campaign that took advantage of deep-pocketed backers, a tweaked pro-pot message and improbable big-name supporters.

Good timing and a growing national weariness over failed drug laws didn't hurt, either. "Maybe ... the dominoes fell the way they did because they were waiting for somebody to push them in that direction," says Alison Holcomb, the campaign manager for Washington's measure.

Washington and Colorado, both culturally and politically, offered fertile ground for legalization advocates — Washington for its liberal politics, Colorado for its libertarian streak, and both for their Western independence.

Both also have a history with marijuana law reform. More than a decade ago, they were among the first states to approve medical marijuana.

Still, when it came to full legalization, activists hit a wall. Colorado's voters re-

jected a measure to legalize up to an ounce of marijuana in 2006. In Washington, organizers in 2010 couldn't make the ballot with a measure that would have removed criminal penalties for marijuana.

Since the 1970 founding of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws, reform efforts had centered on the unfairness of marijuana laws to the recreational user — hardly a sympathetic character, Holcomb notes.

That began to change as some doctors extolled marijuana's ability to relieve pain, quell nausea and improve the appetites of cancer and AIDS patients. The conversation shifted in the 1990s toward medical marijuana laws. But even in some states with those laws, including Washington, truly sick people continued to be arrested.

Improved data collection that began with the ramping up of the drug war in the 1980s also helped change the debate. Late last decade, with Mexico's crackdown on cartels prompting horrific bloodshed there and headlines here, activists could point to a stunning fact: In 1991, marijuana arrests made up less than one-third of all drug arrests in the U.S. Now, they make up half — about 90 percent for possession of small amounts — yet pot remains easily available.

"What we figured out is that your average person

doesn't necessarily like marijuana, but there's sort of this untapped desire by voters to end the drug war," says Brian Vicente, a Denver lawyer who helped write Colorado's Amendment 64. "If we can focus attention on the fact we can bring in revenue, redirect law enforcement resources and raise awareness instead of focusing on pot, that's a message that works."

With a potentially winning message, the activists needed something else: messengers.

Steves, who lives in the north Seattle suburb of Edmonds, was a natural choice — the "believable, likeable nerd," as he calls himself. Known for his public television and radio shows, as well as his "Europe through the Back Door" guide books, he openly advocated in 2003 for a measure that made marijuana the lowest priority for Seattle police.

He already knew Holcomb, who had been the drug policy director at the American Civil Liberties Union of Washington state. The ACLU chapter recognized that voter education would be crucial to any future reform, especially after polling revealed that many voters didn't even know Washington had a medical marijuana law.

Holcomb helped recruit Steves to star in a 2008 infomercial designed to get

people talking about marijuana law reform. The video was aired on late-night television and at forums held across the state, during which experts

in drug policy answered questions from audiences.

In November 2009, John McKay agreed to appear on one of those panels. McKay was well respected, from a prominent Republican family and had served as the Justice Department's top prosecutor in western Washington — charged

with carrying out U.S. drug laws.

He called for a top-to-bottom review of the nation's drug war and endorsed regulating marijuana like alcohol.

Suddenly, the legalization movement had traction. Over the next year, a voter initiative drive and

legislative efforts gained steam but ultimately failed. California's Proposition 19 legalization measure also won little money and no significant editorial endorsements, in an off-presidential election year with lower youth turnout, Prop 19 received more than 46 percent of the vote.

Holcomb thought: Imagine what Washington could do in a presidential year, with an endorsement from McKay and some money. So, with the backing of the ACLU's state chapter, Holcomb formed New Approach Washington. In June 2011, the group announced Initiative 502, to legalize up

to an ounce of marijuana and to create a system of state-licensed growers, processors and retail stores. It was tailored to gain mainstream support: There would be no home-growing, and there would be a DUI standard designed comparable to the 0.08 limit for blood-alcohol content.

"A good kettle for a couple of hours brings in about \$250, and for the same time period (Tinker and his owners) have been known to bring in \$2,500," he said.

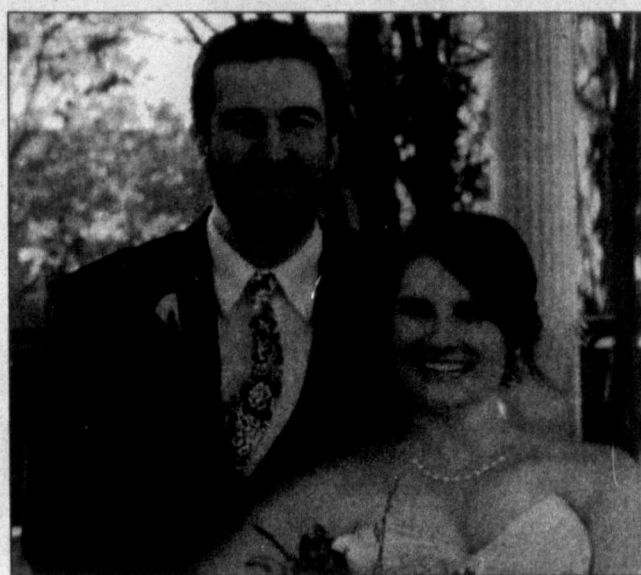
The 13-year-old horse, who's brown, black, grey and white, has been ringing for four seasons.

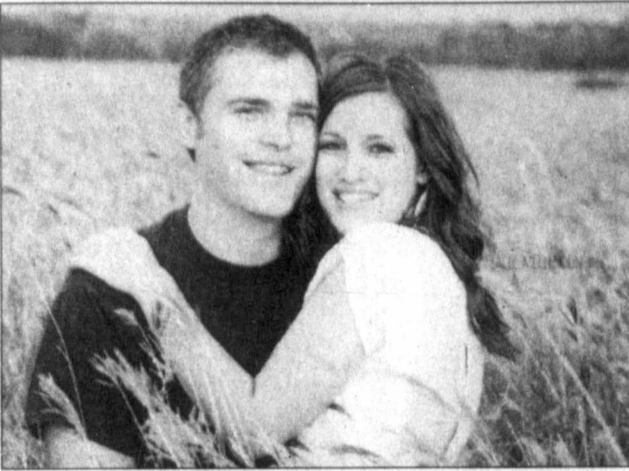

Pampa has its own Roller Derby club called the Route 66 Rolling Reapers that is part of the Women's Flat Track Derby Association (WFTDA). There are now more than 250 leagues in the United States and Canada that are part of the WFTDA. Each year, new leagues are organizing around the world in North and South America as well as Europe and Asia.

The club was started in July by Britt Walters and Alicia Sanchez after Walters' work schedule started preventing her to practice with her roller derby team in Amarillo.

The game of roller derby features two

teams of five skaters that face off on a flat track. Each team consists of a pivot, three blockers and a jammer. The pivot sets the pace and the blockers stay with them, guarding each other in what is called the pack.

The jammers are the scoring skaters and start 20 feet behind the pack. A first whistle blows and the pack begins skating. On the second whistle, the jammers take off and start fighting their way through the pack.

When the first jammer makes it through the pack legally, she is designated the lead jammer. Subsequent to the jammers first lap, they begin to score points as they legally pass players of the opposing team.

A "jam" lasts a maximum of two minutes, but the lead jammer has the right to call off the jam by putting her hands on her waist repeatedly. The rest of the team tries to stop the opposing jammer from passing them and scoring. At the same time, they knock around the opposing team's blockers to help their jammer score. A bout usually consists of two 30-minute periods. At the end of the bout, the team that has accumulated the most points wins.

The season will run from April until October with practices on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and sometimes on Saturdays. Walters and Sanchez feel like the roller derby team can bring a new, fun form of entertainment for everyone in Pampa.

Sanchez said that roller derby lets people let out aggression. "One minute you beat each other up and the next minute you are hugging each other."

"It is not just for women. There are men's teams, men referees and all types of people watching. It is a very family oriented sport," said Walters.

The Rolling Reapers are looking for a place to skate, however, there have been many misconceptions that have prevented them from finding a place. Walters said a lot of people are afraid that if someone gets injured, they will sue the owner of the building. The Rolling Reapers team has skater's insurance for that purpose. Another misconception, Walters said, is that people think the gear and skates will damage the floor, but the skates are designed for indoor use. The Reapers are also looking for more skaters, sponsors and referees.

Due to the fact the Reapers do not have a place to practice they must travel to Borger, Amarillo or practice on vacant parking lots. They also have mainly been practic-

ing the off-skate drills to get comfortable with each other and create a team chemistry so that once they get in the rink they will be mentally prepared.

Walters said roller derby is a good place for people to be who they are. They accept everyone no matter their athletic ability, occupation, looks, age, sex or race. "We don't care who you are or what you do, as long as you come and want to have fun," Walters said. "It redefines you as a person. You can have an alter ego."

Walters said the roller derby group changed her life. "A lot of girls say roller derby saved their lives. You always have someone to call, to talk or to be there for you in a hard time," said Walters.

The roller derby group brings back some of the 1970s and 1980s fashions. Roller derby was a big form of TV entertainment back then.

The Rolling Reapers name came about because years ago, when the Pampa Independent School District was looking for a mascot, it almost took the name Reapers over Harvesters. Walters and Sanchez decided to use the name Reapers in hopes to bring back some of that Pampa history and get more people interested in roller derby.

The Reapers are a nonprofit organization that wants to be a part of the community and be a positive factor on the city. They will do many various charity and volunteer works. On Dec. 15 and 22 they will be ringing Salvation Army bells at the United Supermarket.
