

## State official: Clinton email practices 'not acceptable'

WASHINGTON (AP) — A high-ranking State Department official said Wednesday it's "not acceptable" for any agency employee to conduct government business on a private email server as former Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton did.

Joyce Barr, the agency's chief freedom of information officer, made the comment under questioning from Republican senators who used a Senate Judiciary hearing on open records laws to attack Clinton over her email practices.

Sen. John Cornyn of Texas said that Clinton's approach amounted to a "premeditated and deliberate" attempt to avoid open records requirements.

Sen. Thom Tillis of North Carolina said that anyone who took such an approach should be fired, and asked Barr whether it would be considered acceptable.

Barr said that she had not

been aware of Clinton's decision to conduct all her State Department email on a private server but that the agency has now made it clear to employees that such an approach would not be acceptable.

"I think that the actions that we've taken in the course of recovering these emails have made it very clear what people's responsibilities are with regard to record-keeping," she said. "We continue to do training, we've sent department notices, telegrams, we've talked to directors and I think the message is loud and clear that that is not acceptable."

Clinton, who is running for president, has defended using a personal email account while serving as secretary of state as a matter of personal convenience. She says she has turned over to the State Department all work-related emails — more than 30,000 of them

— though House Republicans investigating the 2012 attacks on the U.S. mission in Benghazi, Libya, are demanding more. They insist the server itself should be examined by a third party.

A spokesman for Clinton's campaign declined comment. Clinton has agreed to testify on Capitol Hill later this month at the request of the special committee investigating the Benghazi attacks.

Barr acknowledged problems with the State Department's overall performance responding to open records requests, calling an existing backlog of 18,000 requests "unacceptable." But she insisted improvements were being made even as the number of requests keeps growing and the agency is understaffed. Like other government agencies, the State Department is bound by laws including the Freedom of Information Act that generally require them

to maintain records and make them available to the public when asked, with some exceptions.

Karen Kaiser, general counsel at The Associated Press, testified that despite promises of greater transparency by the Obama administration, most agencies are not abiding by their legal obligations under open records laws. "Non-responsiveness is the norm, and the reflex at most agencies is to withhold information, not to release it," she told senators.

Lawmakers are weighing legislation to improve the Freedom of Information Act, but Kaiser said agencies should also be made to comply with the laws already enacted.

"We can have all the wonderful laws on the books and the presumptions of disclosure written in, but if the agencies don't abide by the requirements we're in a bad position," she said.

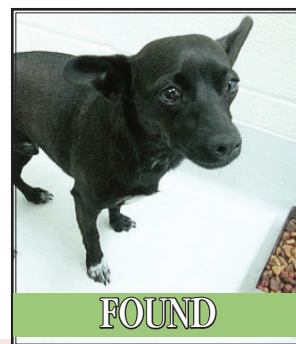

## Tales from the Final Frontier

### ■ Even video game companies need to learn how much is too much.

We've all heard the expression, "too much of a good thing can be a bad thing."

Multiple industries that are featured in my columns need to take that expression to heart. You can have too many movies in a film franchise. I don't think they should have broken up the "Hunger Games: Mockingjay" into two movies. Star Trek could have stopped at "Star Trek: Insurrection" with The Next Generation movie series. Don't get me started on the "Need for Speed" video game series, they haven't

had a good one since "Need for Speed: Most Wanted" came out in October of 2012.

For me, this notion is most true in some of the video games released in recent years.

The one freshest on my mind, as I am still working on it, is "Assassin's Creed: Unity." First off, it wouldn't kill Ubisoft to come out with new installments in the franchise every two years instead of every year. I love the games, but take a break. There are only so many different major time periods you can flashback to.

Secondly, they packed so much into "Unity" that it takes way too long to collect all of the side-quests. Unfortunately, I am not the kind that can just blow through a game's storyline. Nor am I the kind that can grind out on a game for three, four or five hours at time. My attention span in video games is about one to two hours, especially if I am

grinding away at side-quests. It used to be that the Assassin's Creed franchise merely had the main storyline, treasure chests, viewpoints and some other object fitting to the theme of the game like flags or other collectibles. In "Unity," you have all of the former, plus murder mysteries, hidden messages, side missions, building renovations and even safe missions from the buildings you renovate.

It's ridiculous. When I first unlocked the entire map I truly felt overwhelmed by all the side-quests. I used to enjoy doing the side-quests because there is a sense of accomplishment when you look at your progression and there is 100 percent next to each category. But now I am thinking 80 to 90 percent is close enough.

At least the companies are making us get our money's worth, right? Wrong. Now every game, even sports franchises, are coming with downloadable content or DLC.

In "Unity," that DLC comes in the form of being able to get maps that reveal where some of the side-quest collectibles are. Again, it used to be that you

## 'Hate group' blamed for ISIS attack

Liberals claim to be the world's boldest defenders of freedom of expression, which is, of course, nonsense. Here's another canard: Liberals also claim to be the most offended against anyone "blaming the victim."

What liberals possess is an ideological system which identifies favored groups as victims and supports squelching the free speech of anyone challenging them.

One of those favored groups is Muslims. Over the weekend, the American Freedom Defense Initiative held the Muhammad cartoon contest in Dallas, obviously a provocative event. But it wasn't meant to result in two Islamic extremists showing up with assault rifles, later shot to death by police after they opened fire.

Two men identifying as ISIS have now attacked America — in our homeland. So how did the press respond? Liberal journalists deplored AFDI's exercise of free speech and blamed the targeted victims for the attack.

Within hours, ABC described AFDI as "notorious for its anti-Islamic views." The shooters were not "notorious," the shooting targets were. On the Monday evening news, all three "objective" networks were repeating a leftist group's highly emotional "hate group" designation.

"It happened at a Dallas suburb where a group [that has been] labeled an anti-Islamic hate group was holding a Prophet Muhammad cartoon contest," announced NBC anchor Lester Holt.

Washington Post national reporter Lindsey Bever wrote a highly negative article labeling AFDI leader Pamela Geller as an "incendiary organizer" of a Muhammad cartoon contest. The Post, too, went to that same highly emotional leftist source for a smear. Geller was labeled the "anti-Muslim movement's most visible and flamboyant figurehead."

In addition, "She's relentlessly shrill and coarse in her broad-brush denunciations of Islam and makes preposterous claims." On MSNBC, Chris

Matthews blamed AFDI for "causing" or "provoking" the shooting. NBC terrorism analyst Evan Kohlmann even claimed they were not holding a free-speech event: "These people are not standing by that principle; they're standing by the principle of hatred for other people. That's their guiding light. That's what they do. They are intentionally trying to provoke a response from the Muslim community."

This spin is obnoxious and offensive. By this standard, MSNBC spends most of its waking hours operating on the "principle of hatred of other people," people who define themselves as conservatives.

Activists like Geller and her partner Robert Spencer are making a provocative point about how free speech is being uniquely curtailed out of sensitivity to Muslims, who apparently "earn" this sensitivity by being violent or making threats of violence. Liberals and their media outlets have no such sensitivity toward Christians or Jews.

Freedom of speech, not religious sensitivity, was the mantra for the media when the National Endowment for the Arts subsidized the maker of "Piss Christ" in the 1990s, as it was when museums hosted Chris Ofili's dung-spattered "art" work on the Virgin Mary, as it was when the National Portrait Gallery promoted a video of a crucifix with ants crawling over the body of Christ.

But freedom of speech for criticizing Islam? There's apparently no room for that in America. They won't even show the cartoon.

And who was their source, anyway? The Southern Poverty Law Center — yes, that group that has also labeled the Family Research Center a "hate" group for supporting traditional marriage, leading to an assassin using their "hate map" to go to FRC's building and open fire, seriously wounding a security guard, with the intent to kill as many staff as possible, before being subdued.

The leftist media know that. And still use SPLC as their source.

## Killer cops or malicious prosecutor?

Who killed Freddie Gray?

According to Baltimore

prosecutor Marilyn Mosby, Freddie was murdered in a conspiracy of six cops who imprisoned him in a police van and there assaulted and killed him.

The killer was African-American officer Caesar Goodson, driver of the van, who, with a "depraved heart," murdered Freddie.

This is a summation of the charges against six Baltimore cops made Friday by Mosby, as she ranted into the TV cameras:

"To the people of Bal-

timore, and the demonstrators across America: I heard your call for 'No justice, no peace.' ... To the youth of this city: I will seek justice on your behalf. ...

"This is your moment. ... You're at the forefront of this cause and as young people, our time is now."

Mosby has cast herself as the avenging angel of those clamoring for retribution. But unless she has far more evidence than has been revealed, Mosby is talking a stronger hand than her cards are showing on the table.

For consider the captivity of Freddie Gray, step by step.

Making contact with a cop at 8:39 in the morning, Freddie fled, was caught with a knife, and put in a police van that made four stops.

On the first, the cops lifted Freddie off the floor and sat him down. On the second and third, they looked in on him again. On the fourth, they had detoured to pick up another prisoner.

Mosby is charging that not only did the cops willfully ignore Freddie's cries for help, but also the driver deliberately handled the van in so reckless a manner as to inflict a fatal injury, the severing of his spine.

But where is the evidence for any of this?

True, as Freddie had a legal knife, he had committed no crime and should not have been arrested. And the cops should have used the seat belt in the van to buckle in Freddie.

But those are police failings, not police felonies.

And while Freddie should have been taken sooner to a hospital, did the cops know how badly injured he was? How could they have known — if they had done nothing to injure him?

And when and how was Freddie's spinal cord severed?

There appears thus far no evidence that five of the cops did anything to cause this. And no evidence has been brought forward that Goodson tried to injure Freddie by giving him "a rough ride."

The Washington Post reported that the second prisoner said that on the final leg of the trip to the police station, Freddie was thrashing around, possibly injuring himself.

## Do we need a new school?

Just a few years ago, we taxpayers were told Pampa needed a new junior high, a bond issue was put on the ballot for some \$25 million, or there about, and it passed. The new building was built, and we all took on debt for it. After that, this same school board told us we needed a new administration building for the sum of around \$8 million, more debt for each one of us.

spent coins you collected on the game, not real money. The DLC available for purchase also includes a handful or more missions. In the case of "Unity" gamers are able to get it for \$6.99. That's probably because Ubisoft gave away its first DLC missions when the game was released with tons of bugs.

In the case of "Destiny," their expansions are \$19.99 each (there are two of them). That means by the time you "finish" all of the potential storylines, you have spent almost a hundred big ones on the game.

It's frustrating as a gamer to spend more money on a game after you have bought it. Thankfully, most games don't require you to purchase the DLC or extra stuff, but gamers are still missing out.

So what is the lesson we can take away from this column? As long as we are willing to go to the movie every time it comes out, buy the game on its 20th installment or pay the extra buck for the DLC, too much of a good thing will always be a good thing in the entertainment industry.

Consider. In the Rodney King case, where there was film of his extended beating with billy clubs, a Simi Valley jury refused to convict any of the four cops. In Ferguson, Michael Brown sustained half a dozen gunshot wounds. Yet officer Darren Wilson was not indicted.

On Staten Island, 350-pound Eric Garner was seen on film being taken down by five cops in an arrest that led to his death, but none of the cops was indicted.

And there is far less visible evidence of any police crime in the case of Freddie Gray than in any of those three incidents.

The heart of the case against all six is that they denied Freddie the medical treatment needed to save his life. But where is the proof the officers knew how gravely injured he was, that he was in danger of death?

By going on national television and ordering the arrest of the six officers on charges that could mean the rest of their lives in prison, Mosby may have stopped the riots and calmed the crowds in Baltimore.

But she has kicked this can right up the road into 2016.

For what is coming is predictable.

Thus far, Freddie Gray has been portrayed by the media as the victim

of brutal vigilante cops. But, soon, those six officers are going to be seen as flesh-and-blood cops who may have blundered in not seeing the extent of Freddie's injuries, but who are being railroaded by a malicious prosecutor pandering to an angry mob calling for vengeance.

While we have seen film of the arrest of Freddie Gray and his placement in that van, film that is inconclusive, what we are going to hear now is the other side of the story, the cops' side. From now on, they will be the underdogs, and Americans love underdogs.

A nation already riveted by the Freddie Gray episode, already divided, will become more so, as we move toward the indictments, the trials and the verdicts.

In our deepening political divide, the left invokes the narrative that black males are all too often terribly treated by brutal cops, while the right sees tough policing as having cut crime to more tolerable levels and cops as the thin blue line between them and anarchy.

The battle lines have been drawn upon which the "War On Cops" issue will be fought out in 2016.

As Pete Seeger sang, "Which side are you on?"

## Wingstop files for IPO to join slate of chains going public

NEW YORK (AP) — Wingstop filed for an initial public offering worth \$86.3 million Wednesday, joining a growing pack of restaurants that are becoming publicly traded companies.

A changing American palate has boosted traffic at "fast casual" chains. Those chains have sought big and fast cash infusions through IPOs to speed growth.

Shake Shack Inc. raised more than \$100 million in a January IPO. El Pollo Loco Holdings Inc. and sandwich maker Potbelly Corp. went public last year. Those IPOs followed those of Mediterranean-style restaurant chain Zoe's Kitchen Inc., which raised \$87.5 million, and Noodles & Co., which raised \$96.5 million.

Wingstop is seeking to grow fast as well. The Dallas chain opened 100 restaurants last year, bringing its U.S. total to 670. It has 40 more locations in Mexico, Russia, Singapore, Philippines, Indonesia, and the United Arab Emirates.

Almost all of its restaurants, which serve 11 varieties of wings in addition to sides and seasoned fries, are run by franchisees.

The company's annual profit grew to \$9 million from \$7.5 million in 2014 and revenue rose 15 percent to \$67.4 million.

Wingstop Inc. didn't reveal how many shares it plans to sell, but said that some stock will be sold by company shareholders. The company plans to list its shares on the Nasdaq Global Select Market under the ticker symbol "WING."

# Doubts raised about Islamic State's claim in Texas attack

PHOENIX (AP) — The Islamic State group claimed responsibility Tuesday for the assault on a Texas cartoon contest that featured images of the Prophet Muhammad, but counterterrorism experts said IS has a history of asserting involvement in attacks in which it had no operational role. That suggests the two gunmen could have carried out their own lone wolf-style

strike before they were shot and killed at the scene of Sunday's shooting in the Dallas suburb of Garland. Federal officials identified the pair as Elton Simpson and Nadir Soofi, both Americans who lived in Phoenix. Rep. Michael McCaul, chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee, said a Twitter account linked to Simpson included images of Anwar al-Awlaki,

an American-born radical cleric killed in a CIA drone strike in Yemen. Among the hashtags used by the account was "#Texasattack." And one of the final tweets was: "May Allah accept us as mujahideen," or holy warriors. "Was he on the radar? Sure he was," McCaul said from Turkey, where he was leading a congressional delegation. "The FBI has got a pretty good program to monitor public social media." But McCaul said he is not ready to say law enforcement missed any red flags. The evidence does not indicate the attack was directed by the Islamic State group "but rather inspired by them," said McCaul, who was briefed on the investigation by federal law enforcement officials. "This is the textbook case of what we're

most concerned about." A federal law enforcement official told The Associated Press that authorities had an open investigation into Simpson at the time of the shooting. The official, who was not authorized to discuss the ongoing investigation by name and spoke on condition of anonymity, also said investigators will be studying the contacts the men had prior to the shooting, both with associates in the U.S. and abroad, to determine any additional terror-related ties. White House press secretary Josh Earnest said U.S. officials are working to counter terrorist efforts to use social media to radicalize individuals in the United States. IS recently urged those in the United States, Europe and Australia who cannot safely travel to fight in Syria and Iraq to carry out jihad in the countries where they live. An audio statement on the extremist group's Al Bayan radio station called the men "two soldiers of the caliphate."

The shooting appeared to be another example of a "do-it-yourself" jihadist whose plots are often hard for law enforcement and intelligence agencies to stop, said Mitchell Silber, an executive managing director for K2 Intelligence and former director of intelligence analysis for the New York City police department. "It's very tough to detect in advance, which means we are and will continue to be susceptible to lone actors who don't give us much warning to thwart them," he said. The cartoon contest had been expected to draw outrage from the Muslim community. According to mainstream Islamic tradition, any physical depiction of the Prophet Muhammad —

even a respectful one — is considered blasphemous, and drawings similar to those featured at the Texas event have sparked violence around the world. The 31-year-old Simpson and 34-year-old Soofi were wearing body armor, and one of the men shot a security officer in the leg before a single Garland police officer fired on the two gunmen. After his initial shots, nearby SWAT officers also fired, authorities said. The security officer was treated at a hospital and released. Simpson was arrested in 2010 after being the focus of a four-year terror investigation. But despite amassing more than 1,500 hours of recorded conversations, including Simpson's discussions about fighting nonbelievers for Allah and plans to link up with "brothers" in Somalia, the government prosecuted him on only one minor charge — lying to a federal agent. He was sentenced to three years of probation and ordered to pay \$600 in fines and court fees. A University of Utah spokeswoman confirmed Tuesday that Soofi was an undergraduate pre-medicine major enrolled from fall of 1998 to the summer of 2003. Spokeswoman Maria O'Mara said Soofi did not earn a degree. Utah court records show Soofi had several brushes with police during his time in the state. He pleaded guilty to possession of alcohol by a minor, alcohol-related reckless driving and driving on a suspended license in 2001, court records show, and misdemeanor assault the following year. Simpson had worshipped at the Islamic Community Center of Phoenix for about a decade, but he quit showing up over the past two or

three months, the president of the mosque told The Associated Press. The center's president, Usama Shami, said Simpson would play basketball with mosque members and was involved with the community. Soofi owned a nearby pizza business and would stop in to pray occasionally, he said. "They didn't show any signs of radicalization," Shami said. Sharon Soofi, the mother of Soofi, told The Dallas Morning News that her son may have somehow snapped. "The hard thing is to comprehend is why he would do this and leave an 8-year-old son behind," said his mother, who now lives in a small town southwest of Houston. In a statement released late Monday by Phoenix law firm Osborn Maledon, Simpson's family said it is "struggling to understand" what happened. "We are sure many people in this country are curious to know if we had any idea of Elton's plans," the statement said. "To that we say, without question, we did not."

Terrorism expert Ben Venzke, who has been tracking terrorist groups for two decades, said jihadists have shifted their tactics to include not only major targets — like al-Qaida's attack on the World Trade Center — but also small ones that are more easily accessible. In December, for instance, Man Monis, an Iranian-born, self-styled cleric with a long criminal history, took 18 people hostage inside a Sydney cafe, forced them to hold up a flag bearing the Islamic declaration of faith and demanded he be delivered a flag of the Islamic State group. Monis and two hostages were killed.

DEAR INVISIBLE: Frankly, the chances of your grandmother transforming into someone warm and accepting don't look promising because she appears to be a punitive and unhappy person. However, if you feel you might have regrets if you don't try once more to connect with her, then make the effort so that when she dies, you'll know you did everything you could. Don't do it for her; do it for yourself.

DEAR ABBY: Ever since I was young, which was not that long ago, I have known my parents' marriage wasn't a healthy one. But only recently has it begun to affect me emotionally. It isn't that I blame myself, but that I'm afraid of how my own romantic endeavors will fare.

Recently, I was told about my mother's infidelity. I was always curious and suspected that one or both of them had affairs. But now more than before, I worry about finding love. Love is something we all seek, and I believe we all need, but I don't see myself as able to handle that kind of heartbreak.

I understand why Mom did it — that's part of what hurts me. I'm angry that they would masquerade a failure "for me," that failure being their "relationship." I think my anger is valid. My family has screwed me up emotionally and it started long before I knew what was going on. What should I do? — SCREWED UP IN OREGON

DEAR SCREWED UP: When children are raised in a household where the parents' words and actions are different, they cope either by believing only what they are told (even if it contradicts what they see happening) or only what they see. While it can interfere with forming healthy relationships later in life, it's the way they keep themselves sane. You are right to be concerned, and I hope you will discuss this with a licensed counselor or therapist because if you do, you will find it helpful.

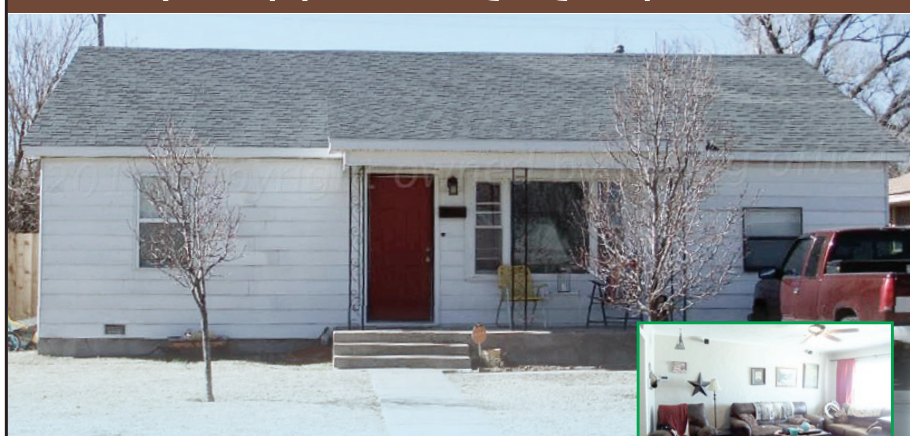

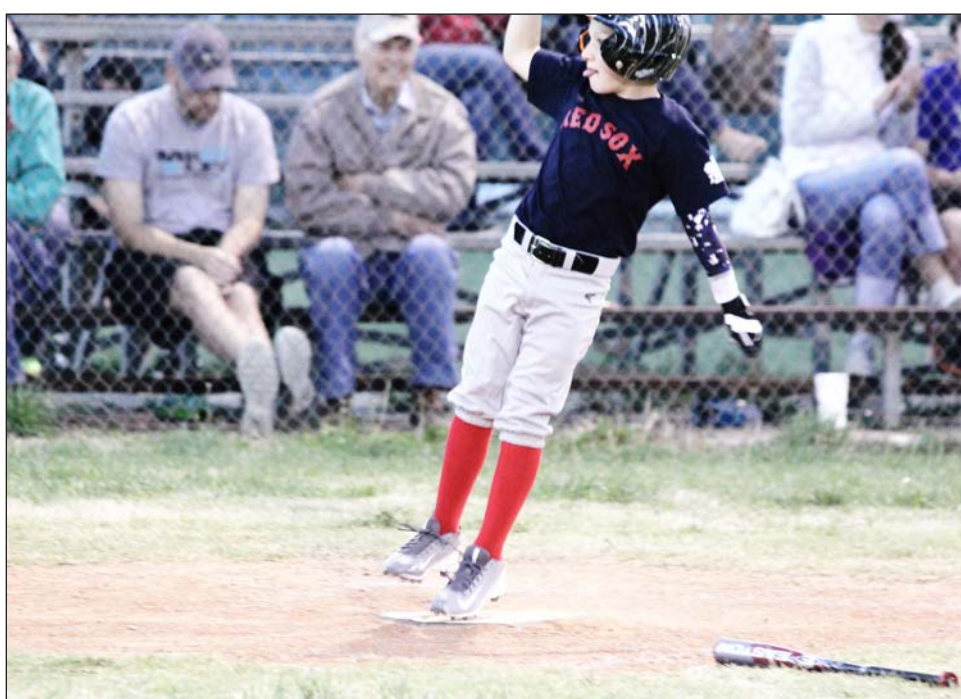
