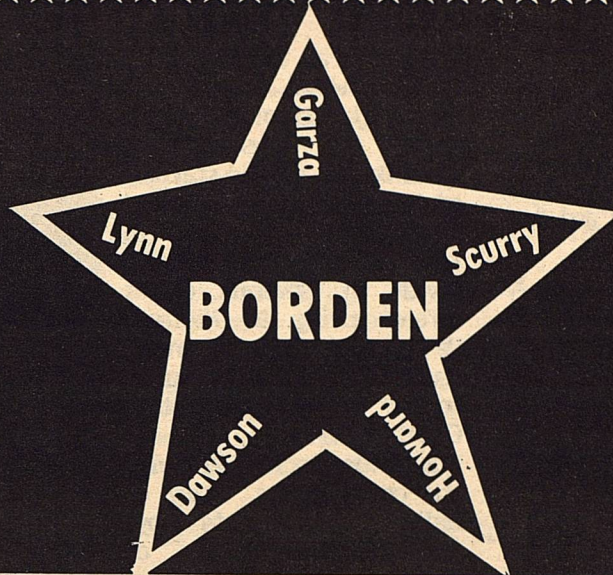

State 4-H Congress To Focus On "Citizenship"

"Citizenship" will be the focal point of the 1986 Texas 4-H Congress.

Some 500 4-H members aged 15 to 19 from across Texas will be attending this year's congress in Austin July 13-15 which will focus on learning about the legislative process and how to become involved in local citizenship activities. Congress headquarters will be the Marriott at the Capital Hotel.

Theme of the 13th annual

congress is "Citizenship - Past, Present, Future."

4-H'ers attending from Borden County include Kristi Stone and Tammy Johnson, both of Gail.

Highlighting this year's congress will be tours of the State Capitol, LBJ Library, actual participation in the Texas Legislature, and special "Public Policy" seminars.

Each congress delegate will actually be sworn in as a state senator of represent-

ative and will take part in developing and passing legislation.

A special Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration the last evening will conclude the congress program.

Texas 4-H Congress is the highlight of the 4-H careers of many older youth. It is held in a different Texas city each year to allow the use of various unique educational aspects.

Individual guest tables were decorated with white table cloths and brass centerpieces.

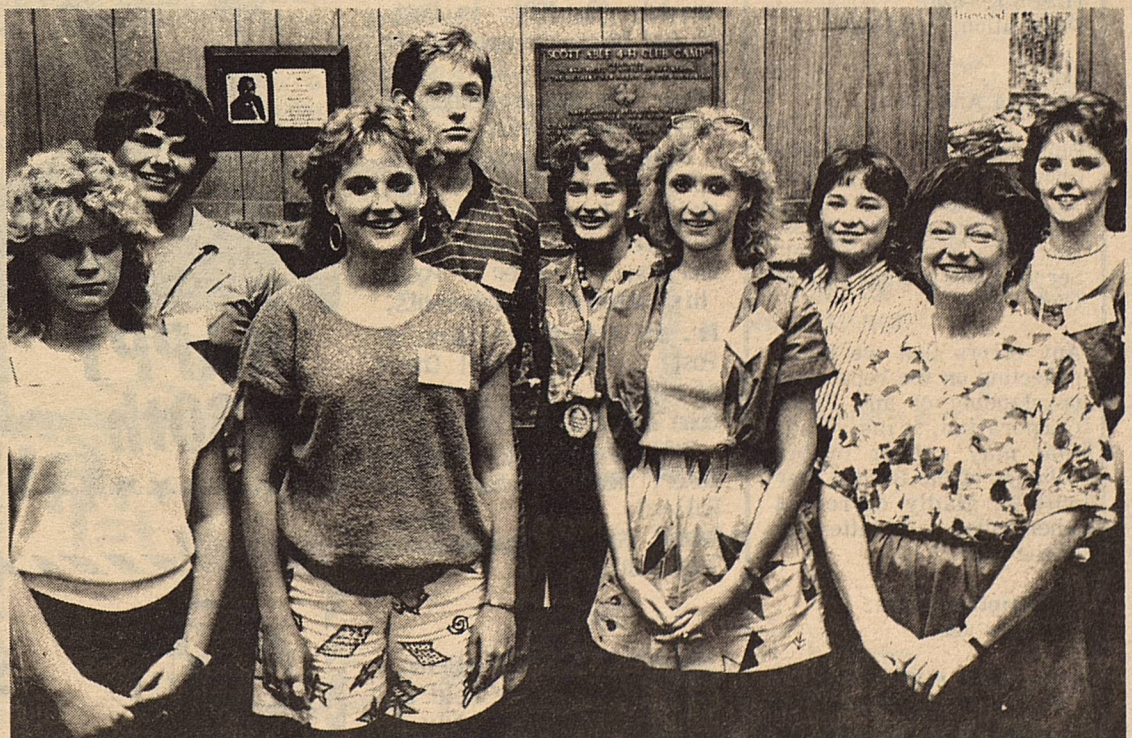
Many friends, neighbors and relatives were on hand to congratulate and celebrate with the couple.

MIDD-SEASON STEPS TO REDUCE BARKY COTTON

Cotton farmers suffer stiff penalties on barky or trashy cotton each year, and certain cultural and management practices during the growing season can reduce these.

Giving close attention to the following tactics can mean money in the bank at harvest-time due to better

prices for higher quality cotton:

—Scout fields regularly to control insects and thus ensure retention of early fruit.

—Protect terminal growth from insect and herbicide damage. Such damage causes lateral branching and high stick content in seed cotton—a situation likely to cause barky cotton.

THE COST OF FOOD AT HOME

How much money do you spend at the supermarket? People often use their supermarket sales receipts to gauge the cost of food, but that is not always a fair measure.

Supermarkets stock thousands of non-food items, including toothpaste, school supplies and cosmetics. But we tend to remember only the total amount we spend at the supermarket, because our primary purpose for going was to buy food.

Actually, the percentage of income we spend for food has fallen over the years. How much an individual or family spends on food depends on family size and composition, income level and what food items are actually purchased. In general, the higher the income, the lower the percentage of total family budget that is spent for food. According to a Food Institute report, the percentage of after-tax

income Americans spent for food at home reached a new low of 10.8% in 1984.

Home economics researchers at the U. S. Department of Agriculture publish periodic figures to help people plan food purchases. The figures show the cost of food at home at four cost levels: the thrifty plan, the low cost plan, the moderate cost plan and the liberal plan.

A childless couple can plan to spend \$40 to \$70 per week. Single people can budget from \$19 to \$30 per week. Families with school-aged children can plan to spend from \$65 to \$115 each week. The figures at the lowest end of the scale will buy just as much nutrition as the figures at the upper end of the scale.

So the next time you go to the supermarket, plan your purchases carefully and sort out the non-food items from the food items before you make judgments about the cost of food for your family.

—Manage nitrogen and irrigation to obtain the right balance between vegetative growth and uniform, productive fruiting.

—Control weeds by spot spraying early to prevent strippers from harvesting weed residue that could end up contaminating fiber.

—Avoid root pruning. Cultivating too deep cuts roots and causes rapid moisture loss which can result in fruit shed and lower yields.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR FLUID LINJECTION WELL PERMIT

Texaco Inc. P. O. Box 1270 Midland, Texas 79701 has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to inject fluid into a formation which is productive of oil or gas.

The applicant proposes to inject fluid into the Dlower Spraberry, Jo Mill Unit, Well Number 2641, 2544, 2542, 2521, 2514, 2424, 2421, 1444, 1442, 1344, 1342. The proposed injection well is located 15 miles SW Gail, Texas in the Jo Mill (Spraberry) Field, in Borden County. Fluid will be injected into strata in the subsurface depth interval from 7064 to 7592 feet.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Chapter 27 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, Title 3 of the Natural Resources Code, as amended, and the Statewide Rules of the Oil and Gas Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Requests for a public hearing from persons who can show they are adversely affected, or requests for further information concerning any aspect of the application should be submitted in writing, within fifteen days of publication, to the Underground Injection Control Section, Oil and Gas Division, Railroad Commission of Texas, Drawer 12967, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711 (Telephone 512-445-1373).

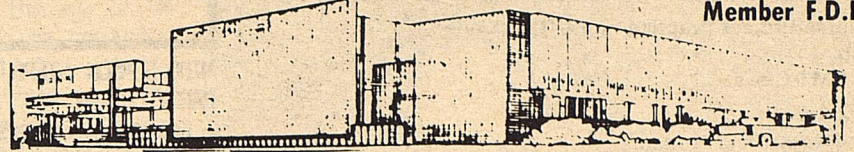
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
