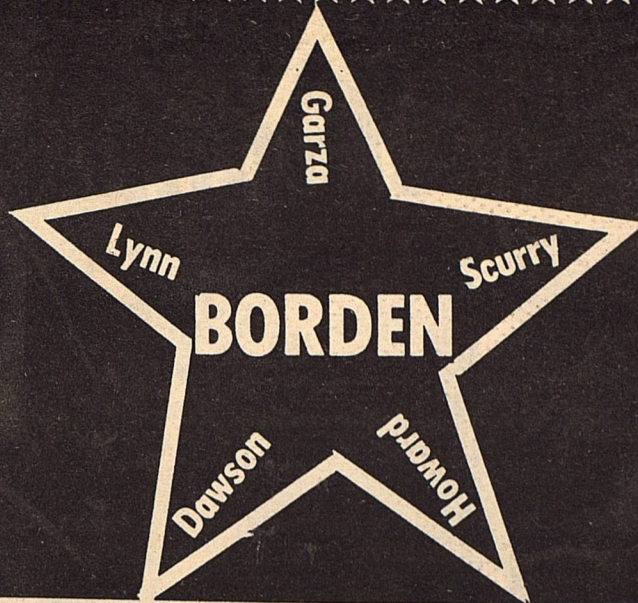

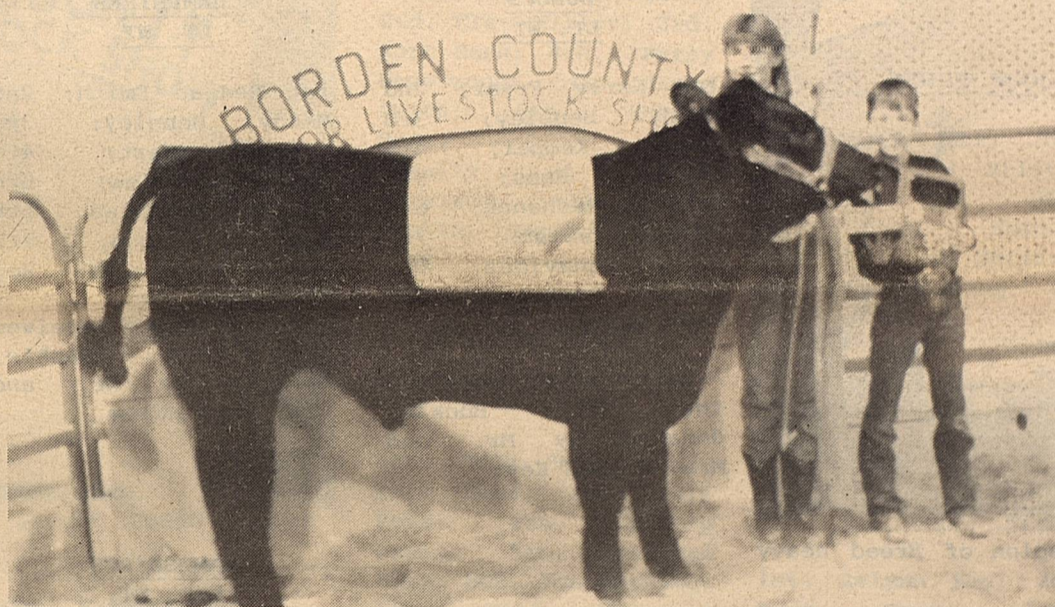

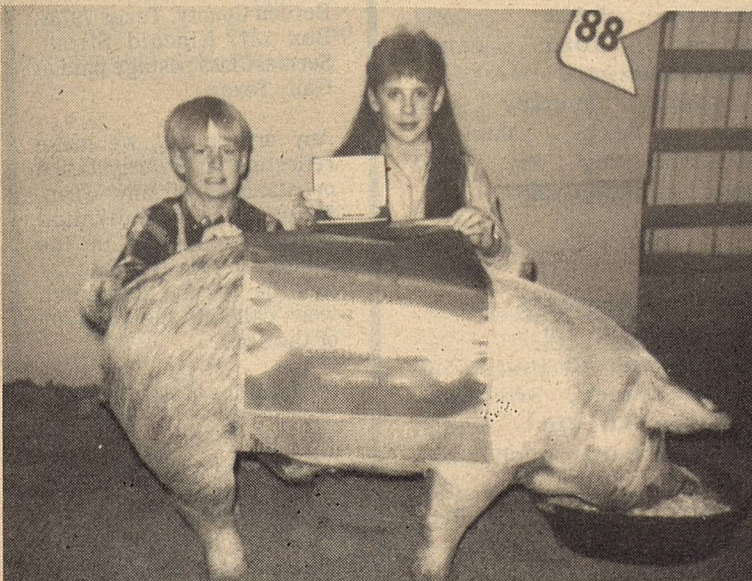
Mr. Tom Gaither from Brownfield, Texas judged the Barrow Show. He complimented the young showmen on their quality of animals and showmanship.

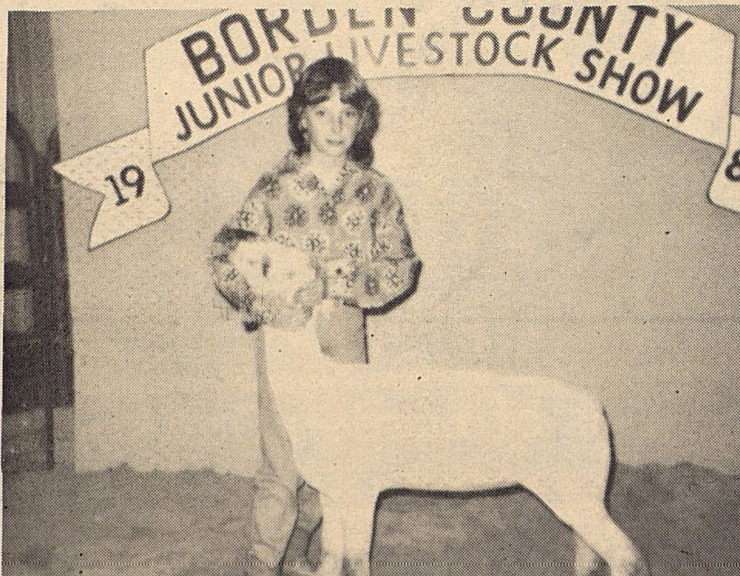

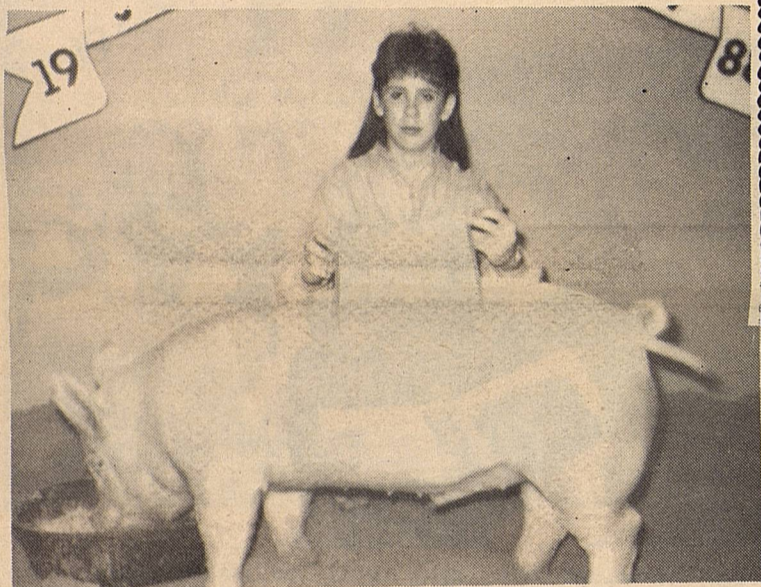

Register to VOTE!

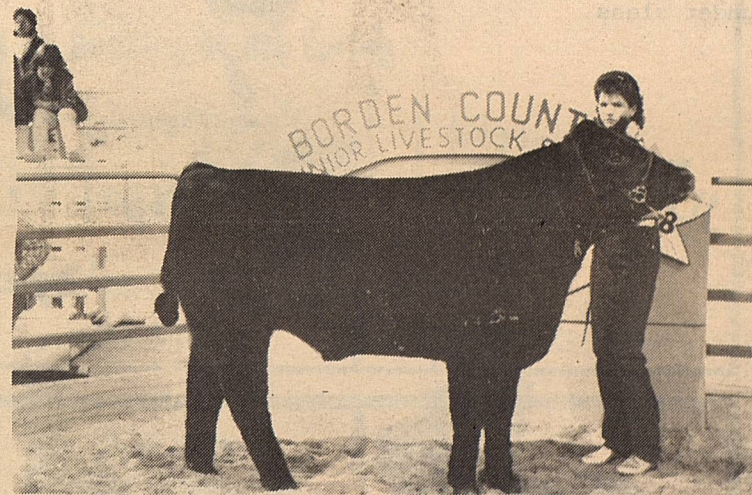
March 8 should be one of the most exciting days in the 1988 elections, with 20 states including Texas holding presidential primaries on that date.

Voters not registered to vote in the big "Super Tuesday" primary election have only until Friday, February 5, to do so.

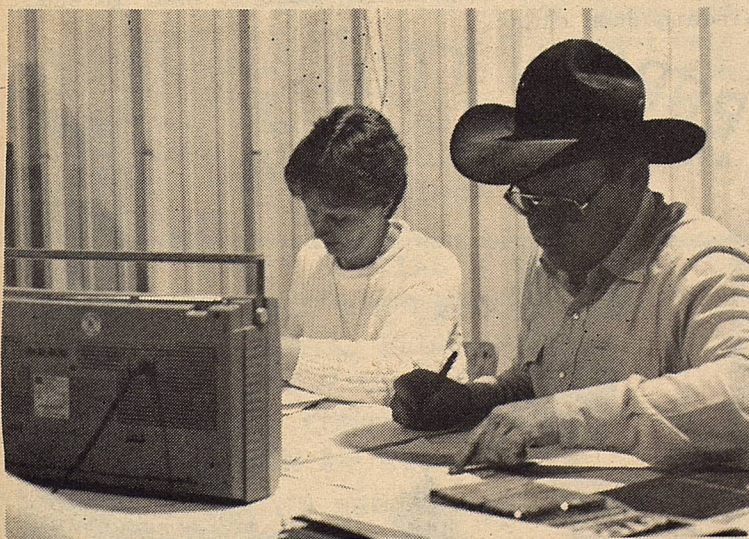
Registered voters should have a white registration card; otherwise they may not be allowed to vote.

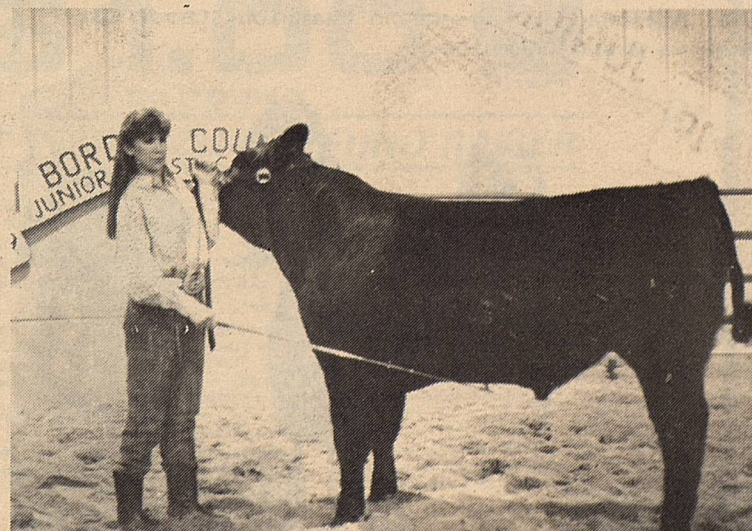

LADY COYOTES EDGE KLONDIKE IN HEARTSTOPPER

Friday night's game with Klondike was all you could hope for, if you are a fan of close basketball games. They just don't get much closer than the 46-43 win Borden captured at Klondike.

Klondike led the contest from the start as they "shot the lights out" the first half. It was midway through the second quarter before Klondike finally missed a shot! The 100% shooting percentage the first quarter gave the Cougars an 11-9 first quarter lead, but had their lead cut to a one, 22-21, at half-time on Elana Himes basket at the buzzer. Klondike increased their lead by the end of the third quarter to three with a 30-27 advantage and increased it to five midway through the fourth quarter. Then the Lady Coyotes made a dramatic comeback and actually held a "safe" lead of 44-37 with just 37 seconds left in the game. The comeback was made possible by seven consecutive baskets without a miss in the final five minutes of the game by Borden. Lisha Sternadel hit four of them, Kate Phinizy made two, and Kristi Adcock added one. But in the final 37 seconds, Borden almost let one get away. A foul resulted in two points at the line for Klondike, to bring the score to within five. Then a turnover ended up as a three point play for the Cougars to come

within 2. A questionable call on the next play awarded the ball again to Klondike and another foul with four seconds remaining put Klondike on the line with a one-and-one and a chance to tie the game up. The first one was made, bring the score to within one, but on the next shot, the ball seemed to sit on the rim before falling off and was rebounded by Shelly Lewis. She was fouled with two seconds remaining and calmly walked to the line sinking both shots for the three point win!

Leading scorer for Borden was Elana Himes with 16 points, despite fouling out. Lisha Sternadel also hit in double figures with 15. Kate Phinizy, who also fouled out, hit 9 points followed by Ralynn Key, Kristi Adcock and Shelly Lewis with 2 each. Elana led in field goal percentage with 53% followed by Kate with 50%. Shelly led in free throw percentage making her only two attempts in the dramatic closing. Kristi and Lisha led in steals with 5 each and Elana led in rebounds with 7 followed by Kate with 6 and Kristi with 5. Lisha led in assists with 9.

This raises the Lady Coyotes records to 17-4 on the season and begins the second half of district play with a 1-0 record. Borden won the first half and Klondike finished second.

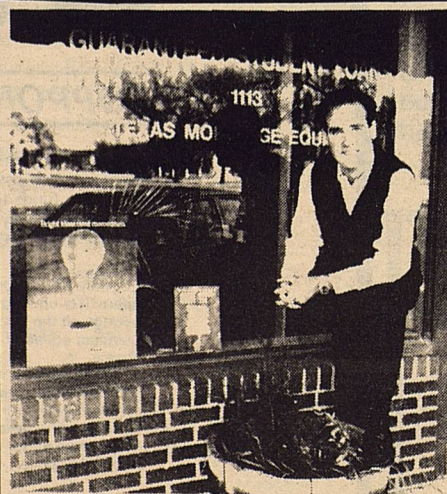

CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

The next CRP signup will be held February 19, 1988. Landlords that bid into the CRP program will need to obtain a written statement from the present tenant, indicating that he or she was not forced off the farm due to the CRP bid. If the tenant did not voluntarily leave the farm, the landlord may not participate in the CRP without a tenant. The landlord can remove one tenant and replace with another tenant if the County Committee determines that the new tenant is being treated fair and equitable.

If you will be bidding part of a field into CRP, then you will be required to furnish the measurements indicating where the posts are located in the field. Posts installed should be the quality that will last for ten years, and will not likely be knocked over. Cross ties or similar posts will probably be suitable to designate the CRP acres during the 10 year period of the contract.

Producers will be able to bid for either a 1988 or 1989 contract

You must have owned the land for three years, in order to be eligible to bid, and the land must have been in a crop at least two years from 1981 through 1985. To also be determined eligible, the land must be classified as highly erodible by SCS.

1988 FARM PROGRAM SIGNUP

The signup period for the 1988 Farm Program is February 16 thru April 15, 1988. the signup period for wheat and feed grain producers to partici-

pate in the 0/92 program is February 16 thru March 11, 1988.

1988 FARM PROGRAM PROVISIONS

Limited cross compliance requirements will be in effect for the 1988 crops of wheat, feed grains, and cotton. To be in compliance with the 1988 Crop Programs, participating producers cannot plant for harvest any acreage of wheat, grain sorghum, corn or cotton that exceeds the crop acreage base of that crop on the farm.

Cotton loans for 1987 are available through May 31, 1988. 1988 crop bases of cotton, wheat, grain, sorghum, and corn will be the five year average of the planted and considered planted of the 1983 thru 1987 crop years.

1988 UPLAND COTTON PROGRAM

Participating producers can plant 87.5% of the 1988 cotton acreage base on the farm. An acreage reduction requirement of 12.5% is in effect. The Reconciliation Act of 1987 lowered the earlier announced target price of 77 cents to 75.9 cents per pound. The national loan rate will still remain at 51.8 cents per pound. There is not a 0/92 program for cotton.

1988 GRAIN SORGHUM PROGRAM

Participating producers can plant 80% of the 1988 grain sorghum base on the farm. An acreage reduction requirement of 20% is in effect. The established target price is \$2.78 per bushel. The national loan rate is \$1.68. An optional paid land diversion will now apply due to the provisions of the Reconciliation Act of 1987. Producers can set aside an additional 10% of the grain sorghum base. The diversion payment rate is \$1.65. The diversion payment will be paid in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16, 1988.

1988 WHEAT PROGRAM

Participating producers can plant 72.5% of the 1988 wheat base on the farm. An acreage reduction requirement of 27.5% is in effect. The established target price is \$4.23 per bushel. The national loan rate is \$2.21 per bushel. There will not be a paid land diversion.

0/92 PROGRAM

Wheat and feed grain producers may elect to participate in an optional 0/92 program. Participating producers would devote all or a portion of the wheat or feed grain permitted acreage to conserving uses and receive deficiency payments on an acreage not to exceed 92 percent of the crop's permitted acreage. The deficiency payment rate on the

conserving use acreage will not be less than the estimated deficiency payment rate. To minimize the adverse economic effects on rural communities, measures will be taken to limit the amount of acreage enrolled in the 0/92 program. Details are limited at this time on the amount of acreage that will be accepted, but the acreages idled under other programs and CRP will be used in considering the economic impact on rural communities.

The signup period for the 0/92 program will start February

16 and end on March 11, 1988.

1988 BASE AND YIELD NOTICES

Base and yield notices are being mailed out and you should be receiving them if you have not already. If the farm has more total bases than cropland, you will be required to adjust your bases back to cropland, before you can sign into the program. The 1988 yields are the same as 1987.

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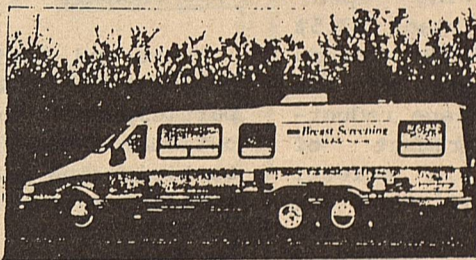
NOTICE TO AT&T CUSTOMERS

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt. Appointments may be made by calling 856-4386.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Gail on Saturday, February 6.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.
