## **Figure Represents** Approximate Drop Of About \$30,000

The entative 1955 budget for Hall County has been set at \$243,-250, according to County Judge Tracy Davis. This represents a drop of \$30,250 from the current budget of \$273,500. The tax rate is expected to remain at 95 cents on the \$100 valuation, the same as for the past three years. The state tax is 42 cents on the \$100.

Judge Davis said the 1955 budget will be approved at a meeting of the Commissioners' Court, Monday, Sept. 13.

Receipts for 1954 have been estimated at \$211,600. In 1953, actual receipts were \$199,714.54.

The assessed county valuation in 1955 is estimated at 10,700,-000, or approximately \$200,000 below this year. Next year's ad valorem taxes

have been estimated at \$101,650. The 1955 budget may be seen in the office of Mrs. Ruby Collins,



### Conservation Vital To Everyone

Conservation of soil and water is a matter which concerns everyone, not only in agricultural areas such as this, but throughout the entire United States-and for that matter throughout the entire world. Because, even though this has become a highly industrialized nation, our economy still is based on agriculture and is likely to continue to be. If this is true, then our economic life will generally be just as healthy as agriculture. And agriculture will have the opportunity of remaining strong only so long as we follow a program of soil and water conservation designed to save and build the soil and to get the fullest beneifts from all available or potential water

This past spring once again brought home to us who live in this semi-arid region the supreme importance and necessity of maintaining, as far as possible, cover on our precious soil. For a time, it looked like we were in for the kind of duststorms, such as we suffered from 1934 through 1936. But fortunately, rains came in May and June and we were spared a repeat performance of the destructive wind erosion, at least for the time being. However, we should not push our luck too far but should take steps now while we can to prevent a recurrence of the distressing conditions of the mid-30's.




