What's Yellow And Black, And Has 144 Feet?

Summer vacation is just about over and kids accross the state will be returning to school, many of them aboard big yellow and black school buses. One of the most common sights on the state's during the roadways school year, these buses can carry from to 71 83 seated students on any given trip each day, depending on bus style. Texas Safety Association encourages parents to remind their children about school bus safety rules.

Last year in Texas, 1,685 accidents involving school buses were reported that resulted in 1.085 injuries. Although nine fatalities were attributed to these accidents, none were the passengers on 1986, buses. In the 1,696 accidents involving school buses accounted for 1.022 injuries and five deaths.

Since school many bus accident victims are struck by vehicles while waiting for buses, children should be reminded to:

-Line up away from the road and wait for the approaching bus to come to a complete stop before entering the roadway to board.

-Avoid pushing and shoving.

-Use the grab handle when boarding and move

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

directly to a seat.

While the bus is in motion, children should: Avoid horseplay.

-Refrain from shouting or making loud noises that could distract the driver.

-Remain seated for the entire trip, even when the bus is approaching its destination.

Upon arrival at the destination. bus's children should:

-Exit the bus in a quiet and orderly manner.

-Walk about 12 feet front of the to the bus so the driver can see them. and wait driver until the signals them before attempting to Cross the street.

-Remember that although it is against the law for vehicles to pass a school bus that is loading or unloading passengers, some drivers still do. Students should check both ways on any street before crossing.

One of the most offten asked questions regarding school buses is, "When is it legal pass a or safe to stopped school bus when its lights are flasing? According to the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws Uniform Act (6701d, Sec. 104b): "The driver of а vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a

school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlledaccess highway and the school bus is stopped loading in a zone which is part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway."

In other words: When approaching a stopped school bus from the opposite direction on a highway, a driver need not stop if: 1) the school bus is on a frontage road, 2) the opposing lanes are separated by a median strip 10 feet in width (Turn lanes are not considered median strips!), or 3) the opposing lanes are separated by a permannent. barrier. In either case. only vehicles traveling in the same direction as the school bus must stop. Vehicles may pass in the same direction if the bus is in a controlleà loading zone adjacent to the traffic lanes, and where pedestrian crossing is prohibited. But it's still safer to stop.

Parents should other review basic pedestrain safety rules with their children in preparation for their daily trips to and from school.

Bus Routes


The Board heard and approved the bus routes recommended for the 1988-89 school year.







HAYING AND GRAZING ACR

Borden County has been approved for emergency haying and grazing of 1988 ACR and CU for pay. You are permitted bale and graze to these acres, and sell the hay or grazing to anyone for any price. You will have to sign a register and record the intended use. whether it is hay or grazing for yours or someone else's livestock.

Any grazing or baling on ACR acreage must not remove the cover to the extent that the land is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion.

HAYING CRP ACREAGE

Borden County is also approved for emergency haying of CRP acreage. The approval is only until August 31, 1988, and interested participants must request in writing prior to haying this acreage. Grazing or harvesting any seed or grain crop from CRP is prohibited. If CRP land is hayed, next annual vour rental payment will be reduced by 25% times the number of acres hayed. You must leave at least 10% of the cover in each field standing. The hay harvested from your

CRP acreage may be sold to anyone at any price or used to feed your own livestock. Interested producers must also sign a register stating to whom the hay will be sold and that they have received a copy of the conditions for special haying of CRP acres.




NOTES FROM SCS

If your are an agricultural commodity producer then you need a Conservation Plan on your farm and the plan must be active by January 1, 1990.



Experts of chemical Warfare, the Skunks of Texas The back stripes (on

Few residents of are unfamiliar Texas with the pungent odor sometimes noticed wafting on an otherwise pleasant breeze. Upon recognizing the odor, the cry is usually, "Peeee-ooooo, a skunk!" That odor is usually the first indication that one is about to meet the most easily recognized denizen of the wild found in Texas: the skunk. Chances are, it is a member of the most populous subspecies of the skunk species, the Striped Skunk, (Mephitis mephitis.) Mephitis is Latin for "bad odor." Skunks are found throughout the state.

The skunk is the most common member of the Mustelidae family, and is typical in the musculature of this family; small, with long low-slung bodies, short legs, short, rounded ears, and a thick silky fir.

All members of the Mustelidae family are equipped with paired anal glands. These glands in the skunk anal are highly developed for defense and the skunk can spray this powerful secretion as far as fifteen feet. This stench keeps the skunk from being welcome in any manner while within scent To put range. it bluntly, he stinks!

is The male skunk abaout 10% larger than the female, with a length of up to 32 including inches, a 10-12 inch tail. A skunk of 16 pounds was adults but found, usually weigh 10-12 pounds.

The skunk, like most is color mammals, blind, and is usually The base nocturnal. color of the striped skunk is a silky black. It has a small white stripe which begins at the nose and ends at the forehead, and does not join the stripe on the back. The back stripes (one or two,) start as a cap which begins at the ears. The cap is about 2 inches square, then it branches. Each stripe continues back, sometimes ending behind the shoulders, sometimes at the hips, and sometimes extends into the tail.

is The skunk a digging animal, and is equipped with long, strong claws on all feet. The front claws are three-quarters to more than one inch in length, and the back claws are about onehalf long. as Skunks in all areas feed almost exclusively on insects. They will feed on bees from hives, and apparently are not harmed by frequent bee stings. Their favorite insects

grasshoppers, are crickets, gurbs, cutworms, weevils, spiders, millipedes, Their etc. diverse diet also includes fruit, grain, rodents, birds and bird eggs, rats and mice and baby rabbits, and turtle eggs.

Most skunk dens were originally dug by woodchucks, red foxes and badgers. When a skunk digs its own den, it is dug into well drained soil, and many are dug into the sides of hills to promote drainage. The den will be packed with dead grass and leaves for insulation. country, rocky In dens are in some limestone crevices.

The dens are communal property, but most will have only one male. Where more than one male is found, it is usually a juvenile, because adult skunks will not tolerate other males in the same den. There are usually 2 or 3 skunks to a den.

The female skunk has annual estrus cycle of 9-10 days. If not bred during this period, she will not recycle until next year.

The skunk is definitely not monogamous, the male will breed as many females as he can find in estrus.

The gestation period of the skunk is from 61-69 days, with most young being born in late April to mid May.

Before the birth, the female will carry quanities of insulating grasses and leaves into the den. She will not allow a male into this den, and will fight aggressively to keep them out.

The litter consists of 6-8 young, with the young being about 3-4 inches in length, and weighing about one ounce each. They have body hair, but it is short and sparse and the wrinkled skin can easily be seen. They will double their weight in a week, and

The Right To Die Naturally

You and your doctor work together to make important treatment decisions that help preserve your health. One important decision that you may want to discuss now with your doctor and family is the Texas Natural Death Act, says the Texas Medical Association.

The Texas Natural Death Act guarantees the right of individuals and families to direct the withholding and withdrawal of life-sustaining procedures from terminally ill patients.

A terminally ill patient is defined as one who has an incurable illness or injury, which in a physician's medical judgment will result in death despite life-saving procedures. The act does not condone, authorize, or approve mercy killing.

A form called a "directive" is one way

Adult skunks will travel long distances every night, seeking food or a mating partner. During these wanderings, they will frequently stop to dig, then resume wandering. An adult skunk can gallop at 7-8 MPH, but they usually spend their time making trips of only a few feet before stopping to dig grubs

for you to inform your doctor of your wishes not to use artificial methods to extend the natural process of dying. Your doctor will keep it on file if the time for such

a decision ever arises. In addition, terminally ill patients can express their wishes verbally, provided it is observed by two qualified and the witnesses patient's physician. These wishes also must be noted in the patient's medical record.

For persons under age 18, certain persons can carry out the wishes of the patient. These persons include the patient's spouse (if over age 18), the patient's parents, and the patient's legal guardian.
