## COYOTES LOSE TO WILDCATS 54-26

The Grady Wildcats played spoiler for the Borden County Homecoming with a 54-26 victory. The Wildcats came into the game with only one loss and that was to the district leader. The Coyotes came into the game off of their only district win, but the win was costly for the Coyotes as Jimmy Rios was injured and did not play against Grady. Lance Latimer had also reinjured his ankle and was not able to play after half. Paul Sturdivant and Brian Bond had been sick during the week,

but Paul played on defense.

Short handed, the Coyotes continued to play hard. Both teams provided excitement for the crowd. The Coyotes have shown a lot of character this year in face of all the problems of injuries.

Chris Kilmer was the Coyotes' leading rusher with 95 yards on 8 carries and two touchdowns. He also returned a kickoff 74 yards for another touchdown. Chris had 159 yards on 4 kickoff returns. Patrick Herridge gained 53 yards on 10 carries and scored on a 1 yard run. Lance Latimer rushed for 27 yards on 7 carries before leaving the game with an ankle injury, Cody Stone rushed for 9 yards on 3 carries. Shane Kemper completed 8 out of 20 pass attempts for 46 yards. Cody Cooley caught 4 passes for 14 yards. Chris Kilmer caught 3 passes for 19 yards. Cole Vestal had one reception for 13 yards.

The Coyotes defense was led by Shane Kemper who made 13 assisted and 7 unassisted tackles caused 2 fumbles, and intercepted a pass on our 8 yard line and returned it to the 34. Lance Telchik made 14 assisted and 1 unassisted tackles. Patrick Herridge made 14 tackles and recovered a fumble. Cole Vestal had 11 tackles. Lance Latimer made 10 tackles. Chris



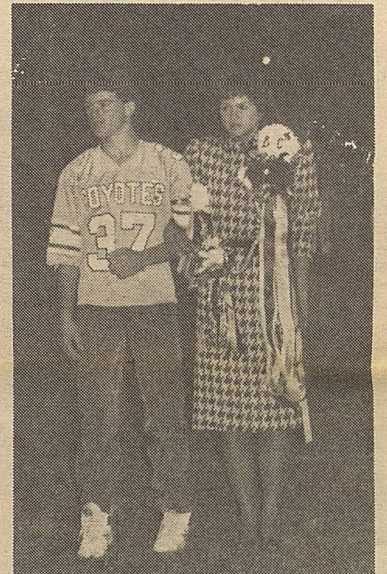

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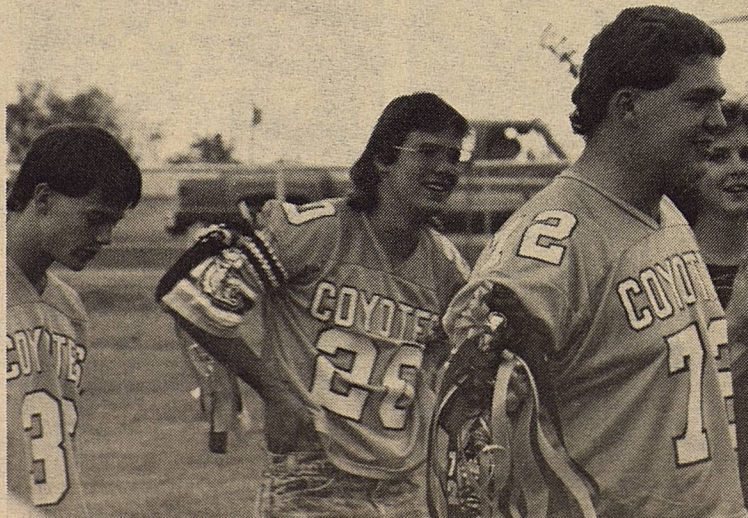

It didn't take long for the Coyotes to establish control of the game as the Coyotes held the Wildcats following the opening kickoff. It only took 1 play for John Paul Harris to run 10 yards for his final touchdown of the year. Ross Hataway completed the play with a 3 yard run for the PAT.

The Wildcats were not able to move the ball on their next possession and were forced to punt. The punt was short and fielded by Brandon Adcock who carried the ball back to the Wildcat's 2 yard line. Just 1 play was needed for another score as Clint Anderson caught a pass from Klint Kemper. Kirk Jones ran for the PAT.

The Coyotes still would not allow the Wildcats to move the ball, and when they tried to punt, Klint Kemper blocked the punt and then ran the ball to the 2 yard line. Brandon Adcock carried the ball into the endzone on the next play. The PAT failed as Kemper's pass to Clay

The Coyotes' offensive starters didn't get to see any more action after the first quarter, but there was still a lot of action. Armando Carrizales ran 58 yards for his touchdown. The PAT failed, and the score was 24-0 at halftime.

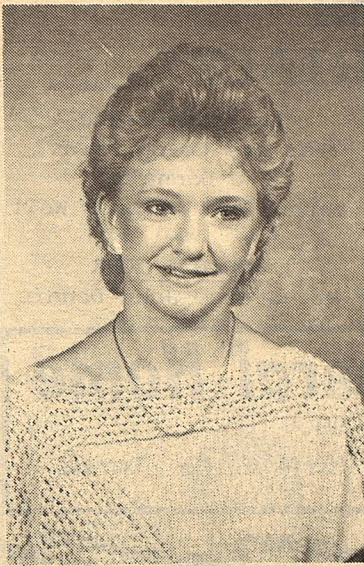
In the third quarter, Brandon Adcock scored on a 60 yard punt return.

Susan came in 3rd. place in the vocal competition with a \$500 performance scholarship.

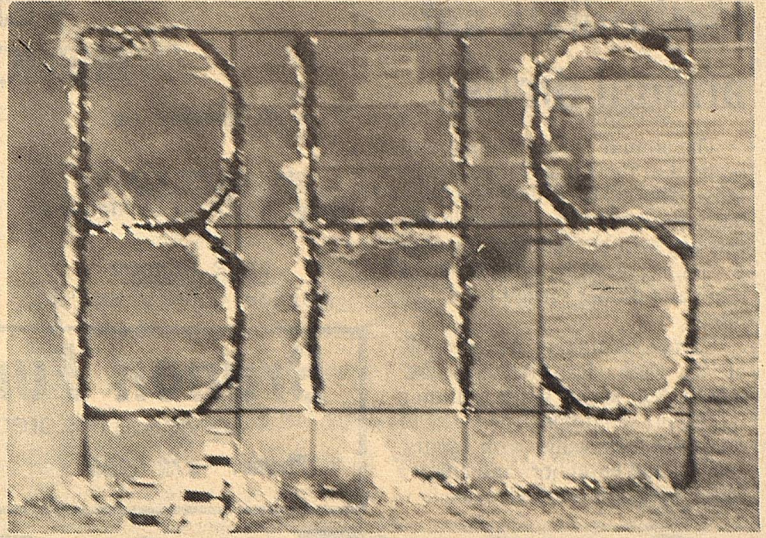
She performed an art song from Van Christy Album titled "O Divine Redeemer."

Are you really serious -- wanting to represent the judicial system in this district and run a strictly juvenile ad against your opponent such as the one run last week?

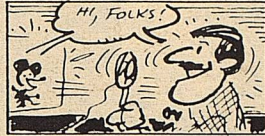

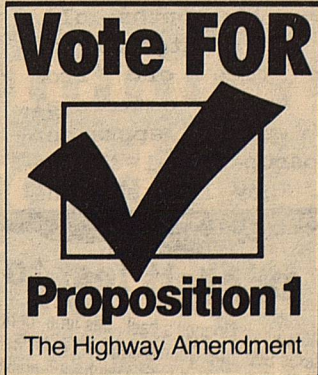

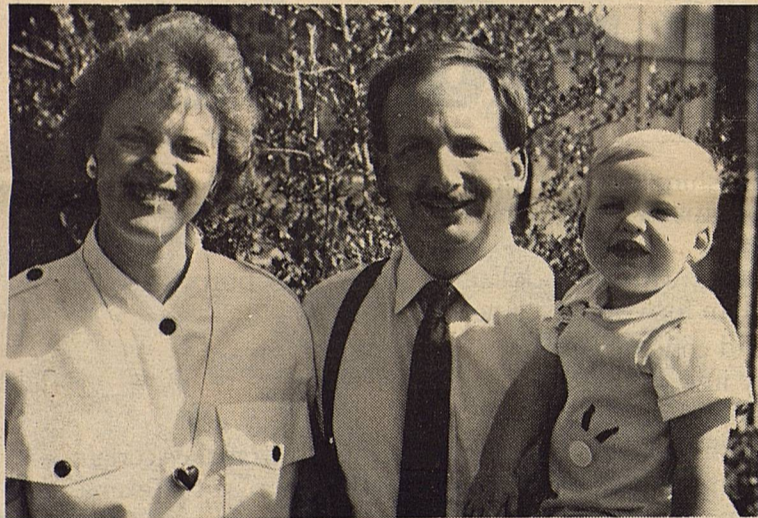

These three pieces of furniture are the only pieces purchased for my office. Every other piece belongs to me including lamps, paintings and a leather couch. I do not know why the District Judge's office had not been furnished like the rest of the courthouse before I was sworn in as judge.

The furniture is of good construction and will serve the county for many many years.

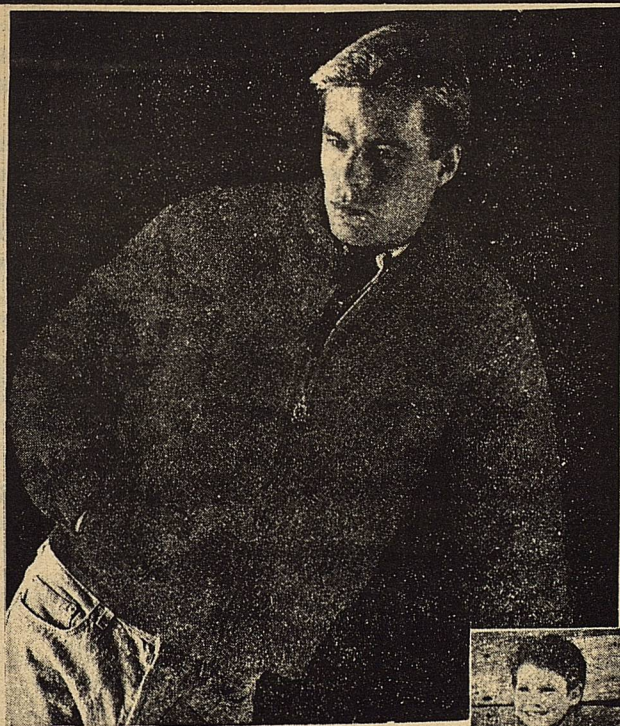

**1988 PERSON DETERMINATIONS**

Effective for the 1989 program year, a "PERSON" is ineligible to receive any payment unless that person is "ACTIVELY ENGAGED" in farming.

A "PERSON" may be many things: an individual, and individual who is a member of a partnership or joint venture, a corporation, a joint stock company, an association, a trust, an estate, or a charitable organization.

To be considered "ACTIVELY ENGAGED" a person must make a significant contribution of land, equipment, or capital, as well as a significant contribution of active personal labor and/or active personal management to the farming operation.

While the general requirements of actively engaged in farming demand inputs of active labor or active management, there are some exceptions. In regards to landowners, an actively engaged determination can be made without a contribution of labor or management to the operation. Another exception is in regards to adult family members being brought into the family operation. An adult family member may significantly contribute labor or management to the operation and be considered a person without contributing land, equipment or capital. This will make it easier for family farming operations to help your adult family members get started in farming than under the prior pay limit provisions.

Before any 1989 program contracts can be approved, including CRP contracts accepted during the last signup period, an actively engaged determination must be made by the ASC County Committee. The

committee must make a person determination within 60 days of the date the producer provides the necessary information and forms. If not satisfied with the determination, you will have the right to appeal to the County and State ASC Committees and Washington, D.C.

More details about the new person determination procedures will be brought out in future news letters.

**1989 WHEAT AND FEED GRAIN PROGRAM**

There will be a 10% required acreage reduction for 1989 crop wheat, grain sorghum, corn, and barley. This means you can plant up to 90% of your base for harvest. Your base may vary some from 1988 as bases will be computed using a 5 year average of 1984 through 1988. ACR will be computed using a factor of .1111 times your planted acreage. 1989 target price for wheat is \$4.10 per bu, sorghum, \$2.06 per bu., corn \$2.84 per bu., barley, \$2.43 per bu., and oats \$1.50 per bu. Loans rates are Wheat - \$2.06, Sorghum - \$1.57, Corn - \$1.65, Barley \$1.34, and Oats - .85 cents. There is a 5% reduction for 1989 oats. There will not be a paid diversion on wheat or feed grains however the 0/92 provisions will be in effect. These cross compliance provisions will not apply to oats for 1989. More details will be announced when available.

**HIGHLY ERODIBLE LAND**

As a reminder, if you are producing agricultural commodities on highly erodible land, you must develop a conservation plan through the Soil Conservation Service Office by January 1, 1990 and have this plan in

operation by January 1, 1995. This means all practices in the plan are applied according to the schedule outlined in the plan and the practices are properly operating and maintained. If you do not have a conservation plan, you need to contact the Scurry County SCS office at 915-573-1268 or a representative from SCS will be in our office on Tuesday.

### Firewood:

### Getting A Cord's Worth

It's that time of year again when ads for firewood begin to appear in the newspapers. People with fireplaces and woodburning stoves begin to notice firewood loads for sale in pick-up trucks alongside the road.

When buying firewood by the pick-up load, consumers really have no way of accurately knowing how much wood they are paying for because truck bed sizes vary from small to large depending on the make of the vehicle. Consumers should also be wary of firewood dealers who offer a quick discount for delivery of unstacked wood. The problem is that when wood isn't stacked, there is no way to measure it accurately.

**There Is a Standard.** Most consumers don't realize that there is a standard measure of firewood called a cord. Knowing the legal dimensions of a cord makes a wise purchase easier to

make. A cord is not a "pick-up full" or a "load" or a "rick." A legal cord is a well-stacked pile of logs that measures four feet high by four feet wide by eight feet long. But no matter how a cord is stacked, it should equal 128 cubic feet.

**Don't Get Burned.** Firewood is usually sold in 16- to 24-inch lengths. If you are buying only a portion of a cord, neatly stack the wood and multiply the height of the stack by its width and length. Divide the result by 128. The final figure tells you how much of a cord you are buying. If, for example, you end up with one-fourth of a cord, multiply the cost of the wood by four. Then you'll know how much you are paying "by the cord."

If you buy a full cord of firewood, here's an easy way to find out if you are getting what you pay for. **Before** you have the wood delivered, measure off a 4x4x8-foot area.) Then, **before you pay for the load**, have the delivery person stack the wood in that area. If you pay for the wood and then stack it yourself, chances are that the delivery truck will be long gone by the time you realize that you may have been shorted on the deal.

The costs for a cord of wood will vary according to what type of tree the wood came from and how well seasoned it is. Green, or unseasoned, wood will be cheaper, but it won't be suitable for burning for another six to 10 months. The best time to purchase unseasoned wood is in late spring and early summer. The demand for wood is

low then and so is the cost. You'll also have plenty of time to let the wood dry out for better burning during the winter.

Oak and mesquite are preferred for firewood because they are slow-burning hardwoods. Softwoods like pine and spruce are less desirable firewood choices—and usually cheaper—because they burn faster.

**A Word of Caution About Red Oak.** The fungus that causes oak wilt can grow on the bark of red oak. Even dead red-oak bark can host this fast-spreading fungus. If you purchase red-oak firewood it is best not to store it for later use, because of the danger that insects might spread the fungus to healthy trees. If you buy firewood of an unknown origin, it is best to burn it all this winter before insect activity picks up.

When stacking firewood, avoid placing it against an outside wall. If firewood is stacked against a wall, the insects and other small animals that may move into the stack for shelter will have an easier time moving inside your house or garage. To prevent this invasion, stack your firewood along a fence or make it a free-standing stack in a corner of the yard.

Dear Schoolteacher:

I am a 43-year-old attorney, a 1963 graduate of Snyder High School, and a 1968 graduate of Baylor University of Law. My wife, Donna, and I have a six-year-old step-daughter, Erin Kirk. My mother is Gaye Nelle (McMillan) Greene; my father, GERALD GREENE, a former Scurry County Tax-Assessor, is deceased. My brother, JOHN A. GREENE, is executive vice-president of West Texas State Bank. I have a brother, GERALD MAC GREENE and a sister, JUDY MOSS, who are both school teachers employed by the Snyder Independent School District. In addition to practicing law, my brothers and I have a stock-farming operation. My family has lived in Scurry County for over three generations.

In order to preface some statements in this letter, I want to quote some of the canons of judicial ethics. Canon 2 of the Code of Judicial Conduct states as follows:

A. A judge should respect and comply with the law and should conduct himself or herself at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary.

B. A judge should not allow family, social, or other relationships to influence his or her judicial conduct or judgment. A judge should not lend the prestige of his or her office to advance the private interest of himself or herself or others; nor should he or she convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to influence him or her.

Canon 3 of the Code of Judicial Conduct states, in part:

(1) A judge should be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it. A judge should be unswayed by partisan interests, public clamor, or fear of criticism.

Canon 7 states:

(3) A candidate shall not make pledges or promises of conduct in office other than the faithful and impartial performance of the duties of the office. Any statement of qualifications, record or performance in office should be such as can withstand the closest scrutiny as to accuracy, candor and fairness.

Recently, my opponent, Republican Judge Dulaney, may have written you a letter which stated, in part: "My opponent has stated repeatedly, publicly and privately, that he does not want the job of District Judge and that he is running only because certain people are financing him."

On Thursday, October 27, 1988, he stated during a radio interview that during the primary he asked me if I intended to run a "clean" campaign and that I walked away and did not answer him. The meeting that he described simply did not occur.

Both of these statements are false. He simply misrepresented the truth to you.

On Monday, February 22, 1988, at a political forum at Western Texas College, I said, "I am not a politician. I am not up here because I want a job or a salary. I am here because I am interested in the welfare of Scurry County." This was reported on the front page of the Snyder Daily News the following day.

I ran for District Judge in 1984 and am presently on the ballot again; does that sound like someone that does not want the position? Further, how would he know what I have said privately to anyone?

In his letter to you, Judge Dulaney stated: "I have reduced the operating

budget of the District Court... " This statement is not supported by the financial records in the Scurry County Auditor's office. Those records reflect that the former Judge, Wayland G. Holt, spent a total of \$168,661.77 over the last four years he was in office; in comparison, Judge Dulaney has spent \$314,302.50, through September 30, 1988, a difference of \$145,640.73! During this same time period, the District Clerk's records show that 241 more cases were filed in Judge Holt's court than in Judge Dulaney's. In fairness, \$40,517.64 of this sum was paid as attorney's fees for the defense of two capital murder cases that were prosecuted, which still left a difference of \$105,123.09 more spent by Judge Dulaney for 241 fewer cases with the last three months of 1988 left to be accounted for!

By innuendo, Judge Dulaney has indicated that I did not pay my \$1,200.00 filing fee. The State Election Laws require that I file a sworn statement of my campaign expenditures and contributions that is on file with the Secretary of State's Office in Austin, Texas. It reflects that I paid my own filing fee and lists each of my contributors. My two largest contributors were both Republicans. One has paid a total of \$1,250.00; the other, a long-time family friend, paid a total \$1,500.00

Each of you may recall that Judge Dulaney disqualified himself in connection with some of the lawsuits regarding the prison that were filed; but, he did not do so until after he conducted an exhaustive hearing in connection with one of them. One of the parties in those suits was Jonisue (Cogdell) Stiff, who Judge Dulaney had previously represented for a number of years in various matters as a private attorney. Perhaps, you should judge as to whether he complied with Canon 3 quoted above.

Concerning the statement about running a "clean" campaign, there is not an appropriate answer except that the meeting did not occur. If he would have made the statement, I would have replied that it would depend upon his wife, Mary.

Some of you may have heard that my opponent had a private investigator conduct an investigation into my background. About August 10, 1988, I received a copy of a private investigator's report addressed to Mary Dulaney addressed to 2515 College Avenue, Snyder, Texas, 79549, the street address of my law office. I initially thought that one of my friends had played a practical joke on me.

After reading the report, it was obvious that it was not. I put the report back into the envelope; and, accompanied by my wife, took it across the street to the courthouse, and handed it to Judge Dulaney, while he was standing in the District Clerk's office. I told him that I had read it; and, at first, I thought it was a practical joke. He took the envelope and went into his office and never commented about it.

The investigator does not work at the business address he listed; and the secretary at the number listed on the report said that he is no longer employed and left no forwarding telephone number.

Prior to October 27, 1988, he did not say one word to me about running a "clean" campaign; however, he and his wife had begun an investigation of me as early as March 29, 1988, at a cost of \$2,449.88, which was not reported in a sworn statement of his campaign expenditures and contributions.

And, he claims that I am conducting a "dirty or mud-slinging" campaign!

Each political advertisement that I have made during this campaign has given you sufficient information to verify it as to accuracy, candor and fairness. I would encourage and welcome each of you to make an independent investigation.

As a candidate, I can assure you that my conduct will comply with the Code of Judicial Conduct. Your vote and support on November 8, 1988, will be appreciated.
