

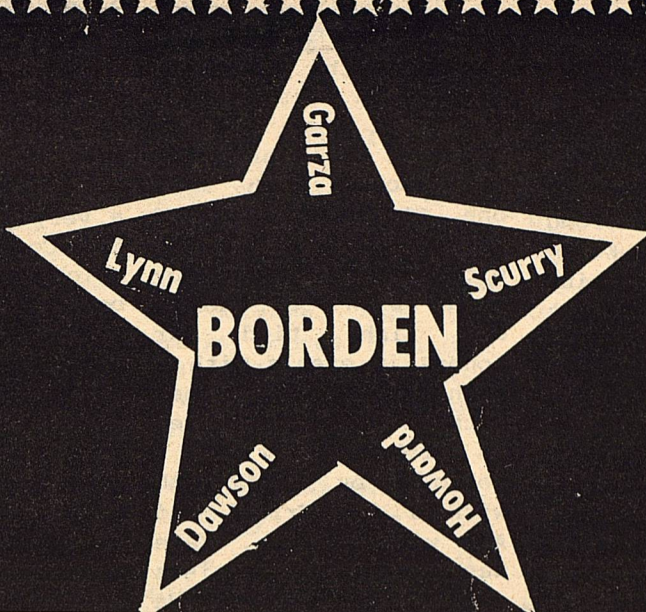

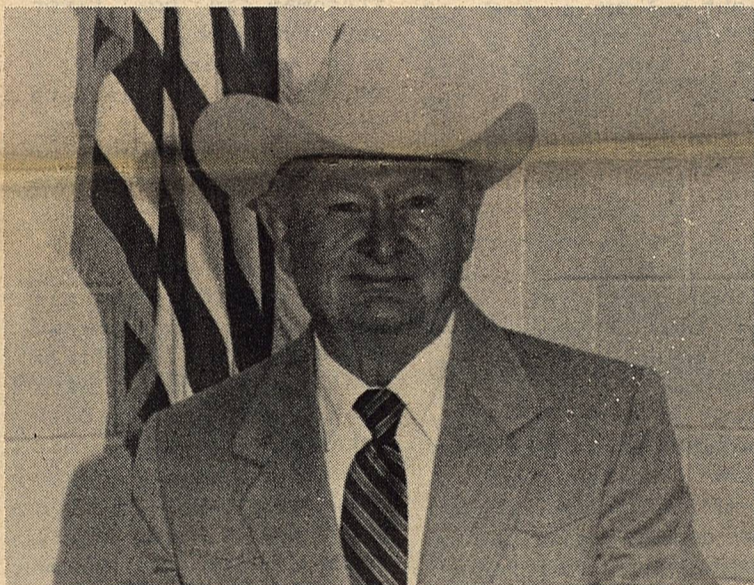

To eligible for the summer internship program, you must be a

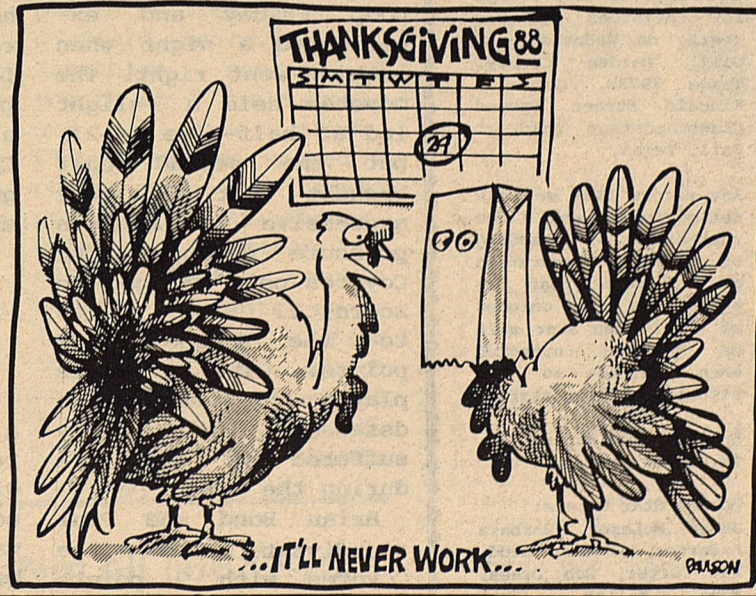

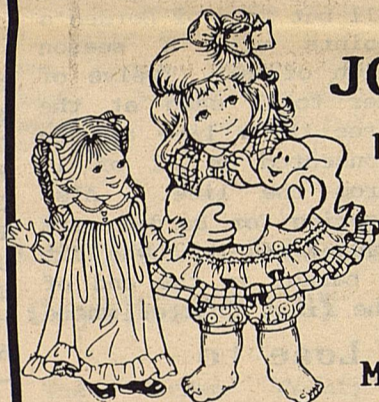

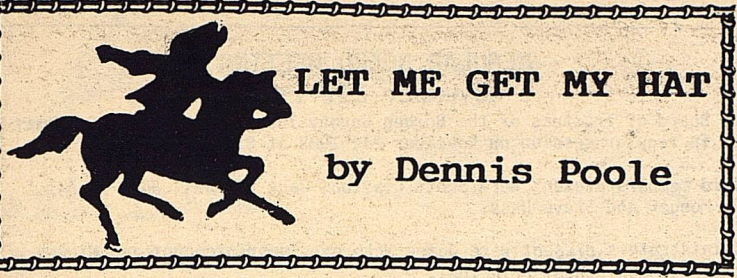

INTERNATIONAL STOCKMEN'S SCHOOL

Feb. 15-18

The 1989 International Stockmen's School in Houston next Feb. 15-18 is aimed at helping stockmen with problems they face in making a profit.

The school, which will be held at the Astro Village Hotel, will feature in-depth concurrent sessions in beef cattle, dairy, horses, range, pasture and wildlife management, futures and options marketing.

The school is designed to address the needs and meet the challenges of those who will make their living in the livestock business in the years ahead. It is a joint effort of the Extension Service, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, and the Agriservices Foundations of Clovis Calif. will

A balance of outstanding livestock producers, consultants and university officials representing numerous states and several countries will be featured.

The beef cattle program will focus on how a cattle producer can balance fertility, growth, milk, muscle and frame in his production environment. Particular emphasis will be on the importance of size in assuring genetic progress.

A special session dealing with improving beef production on marginal lands will be presented in Spanish. The dairy section will explore the best management practices for super herds with cows that produce more than 20,000 pounds of milk annually.

The main focus of the horse program will be on new developments in the horse racing industry. Speakers from several brokerage houses and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange will be on hand for the session on livestock futures and options.

In the session on total ranch management, ranchers will deal with setting goals, evaluating enterprises and understanding overall ranch management principles to help them keep their operations profitable.

Information on registration, including the cost of the overall school as well as the separate sessions, is available from Dr. L.S. Pope, Director, International Stockmen's School, 129 Kleberg Center, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843; telephone 409-845-3808.

HUNTERS URGED TO DONATE VENISON

Texans who harvest more venison during the upcoming deer season than their families can use may want to give the excess to the Salvation Army.

Harvesting deer is an important tool in game management and conservation. Increased doe harvest is needed in some areas of the state to bring deer populations more in line with food supplies.

This venison, if it exceeds the need of the hunter's family, could be donated to the Salvation Army.

Donations of venison can be accepted at 46 Salvation Army Corps Community Centers for use in feeding indigent families and transients across Texas.

These centers will accept deer that are field dressed to fully processed, but the more completely processed carcasses will be most appreciated to reduce operating costs.

Hunters should be sure to follow rules in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Hunting Guide concerning a legible hunter's document, tags or permits when donating a deer carcass.

These guides are available from all hunting licenses dealers. Persons desiring more information about the deer carcass donation program should contact the nearest Salvation Army Corps community Center in Texas.

ASC COMMITTEE ELECTION

County and community ASC committees administer ASCS farm programs at county and community levels. County ASC committees are elected by eligible farmers.

The election of responsible farmers is important to ALL farmers. Farm programs administered by county ASC committees include:

- commodity price support loans and payments;
- establishment of allotments, yields, and marketing quotas;
- grain reserve;
- conservation cost-sharing;
- incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities;
- other farm disaster assistance

In additions, county ASC committees hire County Executive Directors.

Farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, of legal voting age, can vote if they are eligible to take part in any ASCS program. Check with your ASCS office for voting requirements.

The 1988 election will end December 5. Ballots will be mailed at least 10 days before the election and must be returned or postmarked by Dec.5.

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8TH ANNUAL DAWSON COUNTY PECAN SHOW and PECAN FOOD SHOW

Dawson County's 8th Annual Pecan Show and Pecan Food Show will be held December 1 & 2 in the Reddy Room of the TU Electric building at 709 N. 1st in Lamesa. Eddie Brown is the chairman for this year's Pecan Show.

Pecan growers from Dawson County and any adjacent county should save the best nuts from this year's crop for the show. Any grower in the area may enter a sample of 42 nuts from each variety he grows. Growers may enter only one county contest.

Nuts should be selected that are free of insect and disease damage. They should be uniform in size and shell color. Nuts should be cleaned but not altered in shape or color. Any alteration of pecans by marking, filing or excessive polishing will disqualify the entry.

Pecan entries must be from this year's crop and must have been raised in Dawson County or any of the adjacent counties. Competition will be divided into three categories: Inshell variety, Native, and Shelling variety.

Entries in the pecan show should be delivered to the TU Electric Reddy Room on Thursday, December 1, between 11:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. The pecans should be in a paper sack with the name of the grower, the address, telephone number, and the pecan variety, if known. Anyone that does not know the variety of his or her pecans is still urged to enter, since variety can be determined by this year's judge, Earnest Kiker, CEA-AG., from Midland.

The food show is divided into six divisions: appetizers and snacks, breads, pies, cakes, cookies, and candies. Pecans used in the foods can be from a variety of

Other Business

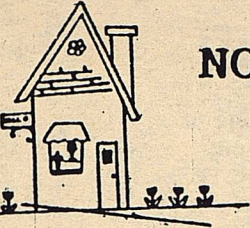

Less Fat In Thanksgiving Turkey

A beautiful golden roasted turkey is the centerpiece for the traditional Thanksgiving dinner. And even if you're counting calories, it's hard to pass up that succulent meat and the gravy that goes with it.

The good news is that turkey itself is low in total fat and in saturated fat, the kind that adds cholesterol to our diets. A 3-ounce serving of roasted dark meat has 175 calories, 7 grams of fat and 2.1 grams of saturated fat.

The light meat contains 150 calories, 3 grams fat and .9 grams saturated fat. So if you're trying to cut calories and saturated fat, eat the white meat.

The most effective means of cutting down excess fat is to remove and discard the turkey skin and any other visible fat.

But what about the gravy? If you plan on

having some, try one or more of these methods for reducing the fat content:

* Using a bulb baster, metal skimmer or long-handled spoon, skim fat from the gravy as it cooks.

* Float a paper towel on top of the gravy to absorb fat.

* Allow time to refrigerate the gravy. Then remove the congealed fat from the top.

* If you use canned stock or broth in the gravy, refrigerate the can. When you open it, the fat will be floating on top so you can skim it off.

Cranberries Are Nutritious

Raw cranberries provide fiber, vitamin C and potassium to the diet. They're low in calories—until you add the sugar for the cranberry sauce!

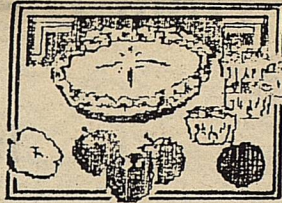

CHEESE BREAD
Roy Clayton

1½ cups milk
1/3 cup sugar
½ cup butter
1 TBSP. salt
2 pkgs. dry yeast
½ cup 105°-115° water
1 well-beaten egg
1½ cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese
1 teas. powdered thyme
½ teas. powdered marjoram
½ cup finely chopped pimento
6 cups sifted all-purpose flour.
Scald milk; add sugar, butter and salt

and cool to about 105°. In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in water for 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in the cooled milk mixture. Add egg, cheese, thyme, majoram and pimento and beat until smooth. Beat in well, 3 cups flour. Add in remaining 3 cups of flour and continue beating and stirring until the dough begins to leave the sides of the bowl. Knead dough about 10 min. Allow to rise once in the bowl and once in the pans, covered, until doubled in bulk. Brush loaves with melted butter. Bake in a preheated 375° oven about 30 min. Makes two 5x9-inch loaves.
For a pleasant variation, use whole wheat flour and 2 TBSP. honey instead of the sugar indicated.

begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1988 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

Changes in the national farm program and this summer's dry weather certainly had an impact on Texas agriculture, and these surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1988.

Information from these confidential surveys conducted by mails, telephone or in person will also help producers make their plans for the coming year.

Sound production and marketing decisions require good, reliable information and some advanced planning, and our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their plans.

The Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum this year because of budget cuts, so please return mailed questionnaires as soon as possible.

Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since one producer represents similar operations of the same type and size. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide.

Results of the surveys will be published in early 1989. Any one wanting a copy of the results can write Information Section, Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, P.O. Box 709, Austin, Texas 78767.

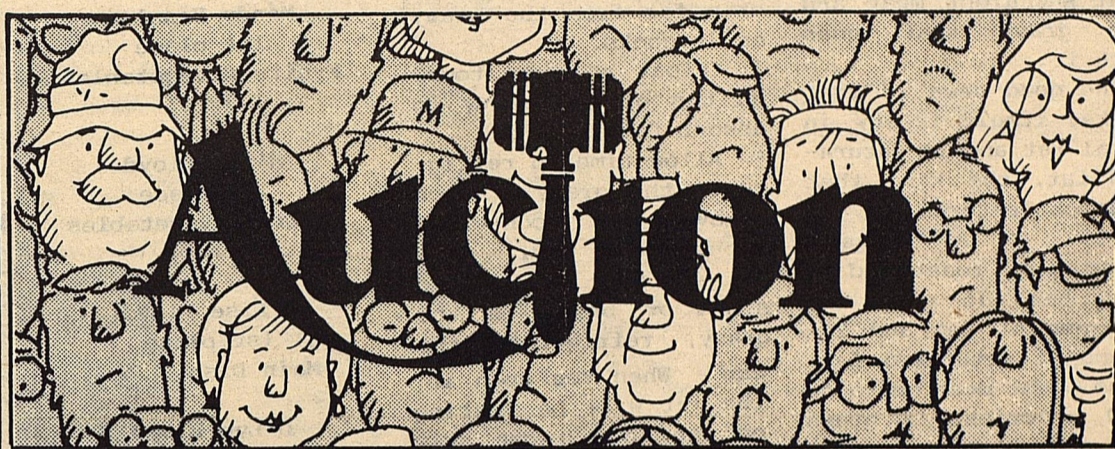
