### Dove Season Opens Next Thursday!

Mourning dove season opens in the North Zone, which includes Hall County, at 12 noon until sunset, Thursday, Sept. 1, it was announced this week by Game Warden Walter Hicks.

The season will run from Sept. 1 until Oct. 30, with hunting beginning at 12 noon and closing at sunset, which is listed in the weather information.

The daily bag limit is 15 birds per day not to exceed 30 in possession after the first day, Hicks said.

Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles of any caliber is prohibited, he added.





# EDITORIAL

# Commissioners Give Farm Program Needs

In all agriculture counties of the state the dominant issue will be the farm program as the citizens make up their minds prior to the November general election. Much will be written and published in the daily press and in nationally-circulated magazines covering many things. The problems of the people who depend upon farm profits will receive scant attention from this media. But the fact remains that the majority of the people - farmers and small-town businessmen alike - will still vote their "pocketbooks." The trends of shifting population, as shown by the recent census report, are causing much concern among leaders.

The deliberations of southern commissioners of agriculture, in their recent convention, has not received the publicity they deserve. They made their wishes known to the political parties and to all members of Congress. Among other items, the commissioners warned against the delegation of too much administrative power in putting any Federal farm program into

It was pointed out that "the experience of the past seven years has clearly demonstrated the danger of allowing too much administrative leeway in farm legislation - in effect, delegating legislative powers to the administrative branch of the government. During this time all of the administrative powers have been used negatively to wreck the farm program.

The commissioners went on to prove their case and set forth their views and charges without mincing words, thus: As a result it has been unnecessarily expensive, with too

little benefit to the farmers, and surpluses have piled up in certain commodities to the point of the ridiculous. This has been by design, not mere bungling, and by making the farm program unpopular with the people has enabled the administration to hack away at farm legislation. This could not have happened if our farm program had been more broadly based in concept and legislative provisions to carry out its intent had the Japanese are making and sellbeen more rigidly drawn.

The time has come when we should seek to avoid more pieced-on, patched-up or piece-meal legislation for agriculture The urgent need now is for a program to meet the total needs of agriculture and give it stability.

The continued steady decline of our farm population may soon reach a danger point. Automation in farming operations and steadily increasing crop and livestock yields will ultimately reach a limit.
