





Move To Cut Spending is Right

President Eisenhower has done well to order an economy program in spending abroad to guard the United States' gold and dollar resources.

He waited until a late date to act.

And he did not start the retrenchment program in foreign spending at the point where most could be saved-excessive foreign aid.

But so far as the seven-point program he announced Wednesday goes, it will narrow somewhat the gap between what the nation spends overseas and what it earns from foreign

This gap, serious for two years, rose in the July-September quarter to a \$4,300,000,000 rate.

The result has been that foreign claims on our gold supply have risen beyond the danger point. That fact was reflected in the recent flurries in the price of gold.

The time had come when something had to be done. The President has made a start. Whether the program will be sufficient to stop the weakening position of the dollar remains

It is estimated that half the billion-dollar saving will come from slashing Defense Department spending. A big item in this will be the most spectacular move, the reduction of dependents of American personnel abroad by 284,000 persons. Part of the dependents reduction will be civilian rather than military, however.

Buying American instead of foreign goods for economic aid will cut the outgo by \$330,000,000 and another \$170, 000,000 will be saved in cutting back operations of other

It would have been much better if the adminstration had taken these and other steps to reduce the balance of payments a long time ago, before the situation reached the critical stage. It would have been better even if the moves had been made several days ago, before Russia announced the coming creation of the new ruble which the Reds claim will be worth more than the dollar.

What the adminstration should do next is begin reduciawasteful foreign aid. This is the bir hole, not leak, in the balance of payments. And it is to be hoped also that the time will come soon when we can safely bring home some of the armed forces we are maintaining abroad at tremendous cost.

For rich as Uncle Sam is, his purse is not bottomless.


