Rickey Grogan said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable obtain credit from private commercial lenders. the interest rate is 4.5. percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Grogan



Chocking and Children

Small children love to put objects into their mouths. But, this can be dangerous because the child could choke on the object. Alan Buster. Methodist educator at Hospital, offers these suggestions for what to do when your child is choking:

CONSCIOUS OLDER CHILD

*If the child can speak and cough, let them continue to do so.

*If the child can't cought, perform the Heimlich Maneuver or abdominal thrust.

-Stand behind the child and wrap your arms around his/her waist.

-Make a fist with one hand and place the thumb side against the child's abdomen in the midline slightly above the navel and well below the breastbone.

-Grasp the fist with the other hand.

-Press into the child's abdomen with quick upward thrusts. Each thrust should be distinct and forceful.

-Repeat thrusts until

either the foreign object is expelled or the person becomes unconscious.

CONSCIOUS INFANT OR SMALL CHILD

Two steps are used to stop an infant or small child from choking. These techniques should be repeated until the object is expelled.

*Back Blows

-Support the head and neck with one hand, straddle the infant over the forearm, face down, with the head lower than the trunk, using your thigh to support your arm.

-Deliver four back blows forcefully between the shoulder blades with the heel of the hand 3 to 5 seconds apart.

*Chest Thursts

-Supporting the head, sandwich the infant between your hands/arms and turn the child on his or her back, head lower than trunk. Deliver four slow thrusts in the midsternal region with index and middle fingers.

"Jack Abernathy,

Texas Wolf Hunter"

sounds almost impossible to imagine that a man would make a of catching wolves with his bare hands, but his is just the skill that Texas cowboy Jack Abernathy developed in the late years of the 19th century.

Abernathy was born in Texas, Bosque County, about 1876, and became a cowhand as a boy. In 1892 at age 16 he was already breaking horses on the JA Ranch in the Texas Panhandle, and it was there that caught his first wolf.

Two of Abernathy's hounds had cornered a big lobo wolf, but it mangled one of the dogs and was successfully attacking the other. With only his hands as weapons, the reckless cowboy jumped from his to rescue hound.

The wolf turned to meet his new adversary, leaping directly for Abernathy's throat. Instinctively he raised his left arm in defense, but by accident he thrust his right hand directly into the open mouth of the wolf. The cowboy the grasped lower jaw of the animal, expecting any moment to his arm chewed, but nothing happened.

Abernathy Amazed. discovered that the wolf could not bite him so long as his hand down in its throat grasped the lower jaw tightly. He held onto the animal until his brother came up to his relief, and the carried the live wolf into camp as a trophy. Jack had caught his first wolf.

As the years passed, Abernathy perfected his wolf catching abilities, often providing the animals to zoos and later to motion picture studios as live specimens.

His fame spreading, was

of a hunt feature organized by West Texas ranchers for President Theodore Roosevelt. Choosing to hunt across the Red River in Oklahoma because the area had less mesquite brush than on the Texas side, the party gathered at Frederick, Okla., April 8, 1905.

For the next several days the Texans and their special guests hunted wolves and in the covotes Red River Valley, Abernathy himself catching 15 wolves or covotes In his book, alive. Outdoor Pastimes of an American Hunter, Roosevelt described one of the captaures.

By heading the wolf in circles, Abernathy slowed the race of his horse and dogs with the animal to allow the president to catch up and observe the proceedings that followed. Roosevelt wrote, "Just as it (the wolf) crossed the creek, the greyhound made a rush, pinned it by the hind leg and threw it." Then, however the wolf bit the dog, which let go and jumped back several feet.

"At the same moment, Abernathy, who ridden his horse right on them as they struggled, leaped off and sprang on top of the wolf." Roosevelt report-

While holding the reins from his horse in one hand, "He . . thrust the other, with a rapidity and precision even greater than the wolf's snap into the wolf's mouth, jamming his hand down crosswise the jaws, between seizing the lower jaw and bending it down so the wolf cound not bite him" Roosevelt noted.

The wolf catcher was a leather wearing glove, the president observed, "but this would have been of no avail whatever had he

not seized the animal just as he did."

The president later related, "I was not 20 yards distant at the time; and as I leaped off the horse he was sitting placidly on the live wolf, his between its jaws."

this By time the president and Abernathy realized that they had noting with which to tie the lobo, but, as Roosevelt wrote, "Abernathy regarded the lack of the straps as nothing more than sligh bother."

Asking one of the other men to hold his horse for a moment, "He threw the wolf across the front of the saddle, still keeping his grip on the jaw, then mounted and rode off with us," related, Roosevelt adding, "The wolf was not tied in anyway. It was · unhurt, and the only hold he had was its lower jaw."

So impressed Abernathy was the president that only 10 months later he appointed him U.S. marshall for the Oklahoma Territory. Abernathy spent the rest of his life in the West, passing away at Long Beach, Calif., 1941, and being buried back in Texas at Wichita Falls.

twenty two years of age.



Most people do not spot or remember a tick bite because the is so small. People are more likely to spot early symptoms of Lyme disease including a flu-like illness and a skin rash. The rash can appear from three days to as long as a month after the bite and often looks like expanding red ring with a clear center.

Early treatment disease with antibiotics can prevent more serious medical problems, said Moulton. If left untreated, Lyme disease can cause problems with the nervous system, heart, and produce a disabling type of arthritis in knees. These t.he

America's 'Other Drug Problem' Overwhelms Thousands

Tens of thousands of older people are living in an "inhuman and needless" stupor induced by misuse or overuse of prescription drugs, medical experts told reporters last month.

The problem of over-medication and mis-medication is so widespread that some people are calling this the nation's other drug problem," said Bryant Welch, executive director of professional practice at the American Psychological Association (APA).

Welch and others spoke at a forum convened by the APA to report new findings on this emerging drug problem affecting older people who live both alone and in nursing homes, and for those who receive adult foster care and home health care.

APA's forum came just weeks after the release of a draft government report stating that mis-medication is a "widespread problem" among America's elderly.

The report, released by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), cited a "series of systematic weaknesses" throughout the drug delivery system. Among them: misdiagnoses by doctors, faulty prescriptions and improper use of drugs by patients.

Speakers at the APA forum said stems in part from nursing home medication practices. Nursing home staffers sometimes use drugs that calm or induce sleep as a "chemical restraint" to keep older patients to keep older patients quiet and manageable.

Some nursing homes administer the wrong kind of drugs. In a study



of one nursing home it was found that only 36 of the 221 residents receiving drugs to treat psychosis actually had a diagnosis of psychosis.

The episode was by no means unique, as a study of residents in 12 Massachusetts nursing homes illustrated. Almost 20 percent of the residents were using two or more mind-affecting medications simultaneously, said Dr. Jerry Gurwitz, of Harvard Medical School's Di-

vision on Aging.

New federal regulations that tighten up on the use of drugs will ease the over-drugging in nursing homes somewhat. But the overdrugging problem is getting worse in situations where an older person lives at home and gets little or no medical supervision. Still other patients go from doctor to doctor demanding medicines they mistakenly think they need.

Experts at the APA forum said that the over-drugging problem doctors don't conspire to drug older people. The problem is lack of knowledge. Many doctors don't realize that as people age they become more sensitive to medicines and are more subject to over-drugging, drug interactions and adverse reactions.

Doctors may also misdiagnose

drug-induced confusion or depression as a symptom of "old age," and prescribe yet another drug to treat a problem caused by drugs, Gurwitz

"While 75 percent of medical schools now have courses in geriatric medicine, less than 10 percent medical students take them, Gurwitz estimated. And less than 2 percent of practicing doctors take education courses in geriatric medicine.

The consequences can be deadly. According to the HHS report, 51 percent of deaths from drug reactions in the U.S. involve people 60 or older, even though they account for only 17 percent of the popula-

To remedy the national crisis of over-drugged elderly, the American Psychological Association recommended:

 Better education of doctors in geriatric medicine and the proper use of drugs for the elderly

• Improved regulation and supervision of drug use in nursing homes;

A change in the Medicare system to reimburse older patients for nondrug psychological treatment such as counseling, thereby encouraging alternatives to drugs;

Strategies to foster better understanding of drugs, health and the elderly among general practi-tioners, since most older patients see doctors in general practicepsychiatrists-for mental health complaints.







Make Tanks and Lakes Safe For Swimmers

With warm weather here, people who have a tank or lake that may be used for creation should be getting it ready for swimmers.

Following simple safety tips and practices can help prevent accidents or even deaths.

More than 450 people Texas drown each year in lakes, rivers, pools and farm tanks. Farm lakes and ;tanks can be especially dangerous because of rocks, stumps and snakes in the water. In addition, too few ponds have rescue equipment--ropes poles or buoys. And times children play in tanks without proper supervision.

Farmers should provide safety equipment and signs near a tanks. Mark

swimming off safe with areas buoyed Accidents can be provented and lives saved by placing signs warning of specific dangers, such deep shallow water. water, sudden drop-off. swimming area and caving banks. Be sure post phone numbers and the location of the nearest phone. Equip tanks for that are used water recreation with rescue equipment such ropes, flotation devices or poles.

In addition, have an adequate first-aid kit available learn to give basic first-aid treatment. especially mouth-tomouth resuscitation and CPR.

Also, discourage swimming in front of steep, sloping banks. If a problem develops,

rescue from such areas is difficult.

If supervising swimmers. these simple rules will help prevent many accidents that in occur farm every year.

-Allow only good swimmers in deep water.

--Do allow someone to swim alone

-Do not let small children swim without adult supervision.

FINAL CERTIFICATION DATE

Monday July 17, 1989 is the final certificadate for ALL tion spring seeded crops, cotton, grain sorghum, ACR, ect. Failure to file by this deadline will result in loss of ALL program benefits.

Remember an accurate certification is MUST as we will be spot checking 15% all farm certifications and if out side of the tolerance of 1.0 acre or 5% of the reported this also cause loss of all program benefits.

Measurement service is available if you are unsure of the planted acreage farm. July vour 1989 also is the deadline for requesting service. If measurement service is requiested you will have 5 days following notice of determined acreage to file your crop certification.

WEED CONTROL ON LAND DESIGNATED AS ACR

If a weed problem has developed ACR designated as under the 1989 program, now is the time to the control actrion to weeds. By using good management now will not have to worry the loss payment later on.

CRP SIGNUP

Please make note as to the ninth signup under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), which will begin July 17, and run through Friday August 4, 1989.
