
Local Boys To Report For Workouts Monday

Memphis coaches returned from the Texas Coaches Assn. convention and began planning for the 1971 football season with much enthusiasm this week. With opening date of physical contact workouts only four days away, next Monday, local lads were issued shoes by coaches, Wednesday, and the process of signing up the boys began. Head Coach Clyde McMurray, in an interview Wednesday afternoon, gave a report on coaches school and on the upcoming Cyclone season. He announced staff responsibilities included Coach Joe Bain, defensive secondary, Coach George Berry, varsity line, Coach Phillip Lillard, 8th grade, and Coach Jimmy Pope, 7th grade. "We will have two scrimmage games, one with Stinnett at Stinnett at 8 p. m., Friday, Aug. 27; and one with Quannah here, at 8 p. m., Friday, Sept. 3," Coach McMurray announced. **About Coaches School** "The emphasis at the school was on defense this year, and primarily the collegiate coaches were concerned with pass defense and the play of the defensive line-

backers and secondary personnel," Coach McMurray said. "We went to the North-South All-Star game and saw a practical demonstration of how important this aspect of the game is, as the North, through passing, defeated the South 65-0," he said. The Oklahoma State University staff spoke on defense, as did the U. of Houston defensive coach. Darrell Royal of Texas spoke on the Wishbone-T, while Eddie Robinson of Grambling College covered offense and defense. District 2-A Coaches voted as to how they expected the district teams to finish. These coaches listed Clarendon No. 1, McLean No. 2, Wheeler No. 3, Memphis No. 4, Claude No. 5, and Silverton No. 6. The Top 6 Texas Football magazine selected Memphis as the No. 1 team in the district, while West Texas Football magazine selected Memphis No. 4, as did Dave Campbell's Texas Football magazine. In the interview, Coach McMurray explained some of the reasons for these varied predictions. "Area coaches recognize that Memphis has size, experience and speed, but they also realize that Memphis has a past history of dissension and poor attitude and a lack of application of grass football," Coach McMurray said. **The Prospects** Coach McMurray went on to answer questions about the prospects for the season. Memphis School Board Announces 'Dress' Code, Sets Fee Charges

The board of trustees of the Memphis Independent School District, meeting in regular session Tuesday, revised the "dress" code for Memphis students and handled other items of business. Among the business handled, the board accepted bids from Conoco for gasoline at 18.65 cents per gallon, shared the bread bid between Mead's and Mrs. Baird's Bakeries at equal prices, and awarded Borden's the milk bid. Harvey's Service Center was the high bidder on the 1963 pickup which the school was selling, and the pickup went to Harvey's at \$101. The board approved Fisher-River Insurance Agency as

the policy holder of the transportation insurance. The 1971-72 budget in the amount of \$610,294.00, was approved by the board. The amended budget hearing date was set for Monday, Aug. 30, and the board set the next School Board meeting date for Sept. 13 in the superintendent's office. Mrs. Dwaine Floyd was hired as a girls P. E. teacher's aid to help with instruction and to supervise dressing rooms and to travel with girls teams on trips, high school and junior high. The board also revised the present dress code to read as follows:

"Girls—Scooter skirts and dresses shall be non-distracting; there will be no "hot pants" allowed for grades six through 12."

"Boys—All shirts must have sleeves; hair must not hang below the collar of a shirt with a collar. Hair shall not extend over the ears; boys bangs must be above the eyebrow, and boys sideburns must be above the bottom of the ear lobe. There shall not be mustaches, goatees or full beards. There will be no head bands, combs or ornaments worn in the hair by boys."

The board also set the following charges for cafeteria meals effective this fall. Grades one through three, 45 cents; grades four through eight, 50 cents; grades nine through twelve, 55 cents; and teachers, 60 cents; visitors, one time per week, 75 cents per meal.

Enrollment fees for grades one through five, \$4.00. Grades six through twelve, the enrollment fees will be the same as last year. The board handled other routine monthly business before adjournment.

Turkey School Receives Donation Of \$5,029 Ford Tractor Equipment

Cyclone Band Rehearsals To Start Monday

All members of the Memphis Cyclone Band have been asked by Director Carol Blain to meet at the Band Hall at 9 a. m., Monday, Aug. 16. This will be the first session of pre-school band rehearsals, it was announced.

The 1971 crops prospect for Hall County and surrounding area appears to be highly favorable at this point, as rainfall over the area has varied somewhat in amounts, but all areas have received some moisture. The total amounts of rainfall at different points runs from about one inch to way up to eight and a half inches and possibly even more. Rayford Hutcherson, official weather observer, reports that his gauge in northwest Memphis caught 1.00 inch for the week (not including the early morning shower this morning). Residents in the south part of Memphis who have rain gauges caught a lot more rain than this, primarily due to the nature of the heavy cloud which dropped rain here late Sunday. This cloud, formed far south of Memphis, giving Estelline up to five inches of rain, dumping similar amounts on Newlin and the areas to the west and east of Newlin, and passed to the east of the city. Memphis, itself got one-half inch in the northwest, and up to one inch in the south. This system had clouds within clouds, and it rained for several hours. The largest amount of precipitation reported was 12 miles east of Memphis where one place, equipped with eight-inch gauges, reported the gauges full. Broken terraces, flooded and washed fields attested to the heavy rainfall in this area. Then Monday, these same areas received another one and a half inch of moisture. Actually, rains have occurred throughout the week, in various places. A report from the Plaska area indicated that showers have been spotted, but the entire area has caught from one to two inches of moisture during the past week. Billy Hancock at the Farmers Union Co-Op Gin in Plaska said the area got one-half inch this morning. Lakeview caught up to two inches in several rains. The area between Memphis and Lakeview possibly was the most neglected this week with rains of less than one inch.

Wet In The West Of major concern this summer has been the Brice and Deep Lake areas, possibly the most neglected portions, rainwise, of Hall County. These areas caught from one and a half to two inches of rain this week, and possibly no place in the Texas Panhandle needed the moisture any more. Throughout July and early August, when other portions of the county were receiving good rains, Brice, Lesley and Deep Lake areas just caught showers. All farmers are hoping now for warmer weather, a break from insect damage, and a late freeze. If these occur, Hall County could harvest a bumper cotton crop.

Charles Phillips Is Recovering From Snake Bite

Charles Phillips, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Phillips who was bitten by a rattlesnake Friday afternoon, was much improved Thursday morning, according to information from the family. Randy, his older brother, Charing the cotton on their farm in les and his father were inspecting the cotton on their farm in the Harrell Chapel community about 6:30 Friday afternoon. Charles had walked several rows over in the waist-high cotton from the pickup when the snake bit him on the top part of his right foot. His father had a snake bite kit in the pickup and gave him emergency treatment, and then rushed him to Hall County Hospital. Charles became very ill during the night Friday, and his condition did not improve for about two days. He is still a patient in the hospital.

But Who Bails Out The Family Farmer?

The \$2 billion Government Guarantee Loan Bill, designed mainly to rescue Lockheed, has ramifications that go far beyond the economic stability of one large corporation. Never has an Administration of a Congress been so blatant in its favoritism of big business over the little man. More than 4 million farmers have been forced off their land through no fault of their own, but neither Congress nor the Administration has seen fit to recommend or submit legislation which even approaches the vast Lockheed aid. While a mass migration was taking place from rural urban America, very few government officials bothered to listen to the cries of anguish. But let one giant corporation admit the possibility of failure through mismanagement, and public servants by the score flock to its assistance.

No one interested in the economy of the nation wants to see a corporate giant hit the bullet of bankruptcy. No one is pleased with the prospect of adding thousands of workers and taxpayers to the unemployment rolls. No one cheers at the possibility of other businesses, related to the aerospace industry, facing an uncertain future. But the Corporate Emergency Loan legislation goes so far beyond these considerations that it pits traditional economic logic against itself. Big business has always been the staunchest supporter of the free enterprise system. It has, of course, been more than willing to accept subtle subsidies in the form of tax write-offs. Indeed, the corporate venture into agriculture is ample proof of that acceptance. But the "open competitive marketplace" has been the war cry of corporations with enough power to maintain a privileged position in that marketplace. Now that that position has weakened, at least for one corporation, that war cry—that logic—has reversed itself. Big business now feels that the government should guarantee huge loans which even the banks won't touch with a ten foot pole. Suddenly, there seems to be no inconsistency in the view that if one corporation defaults in its loan, the government should pay it with our tax dollars. Big business and some legislators have not been shy about this switch. They used the Lockheed affair to request a "slush fund" of \$250 million for each corporation that runs into financial trouble.

The family farmer and small businessman was already at a disadvantage in the marketplace. With large corporations insulated against economic failure, the guise of free competition is wiped out entirely. While the little man struggles to survive, corporate decisions can be made in the secure knowledge that mistakes will not be fatal. The government will bail you out if you are big enough and powerful enough. Senator William Proxmire (D-Wis.), who has led the fight against the measure said, "The Lockheed loan guarantee is to bail out one huge corporation that is in trouble for one principal reason—mismanagement. Beyond that, who bails out small business in rural areas when the supporting farmers go bankrupt? The answer again is no one.

The tragic fact is that there may be little substance to the claim that the corporate "slush fund" is needed at all. The Penn Central Railroad went bankrupt, but it did not disappear. It still operates and most of its employees are still working. If the L-1011 Tristar does not get off the ground, other planes will be built by other aircraft companies. They would likely hire any experienced workers who might be laid off from Lockheed. Competing aircraft companies would also require the services of related businesses. The fact that Lockheed may go under does not mean that the nation's economy would go under.


One would think that "What's good for the goose is good for the gander." Suffice it to say that an amendment by Sen. George McGovern (D-S.D.), that would have provided an equal \$2 billion fund for small farmers and small businesses was defeated 75 to 18.

Those who would have the farmer rely strictly on the so-called free, competitive, open marketplace, may wish to re-evaluate their position.

Welfare Breakthrough

The rising cost of welfare has been a major item of concern for the leader of this country and has also been a problem for the average taxpayer who is being called upon to pay more and more for welfare.

New York state has now made a breakthrough in finally clamping down and requiring able bodied men to work if on welfare. It took a long time to enforce this provision of the welfare law even though it has been on the books for 25 years. When the state faced bankruptcy and new tax sources were not forthcoming, New York had to do something about welfare and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller gave the word.

Now, all able bodied welfare recipients have to report in person to pick up their check in New York. When they do this, they are interviewed and placed on a job if there is a job. The state has found a lot of jobs that need doing and that can be done by people on welfare as well as anybody else. They have placed a lot of men in jobs.

But the curious thing about this is that 18 per cent of the welfare recipients have failed to report or their checks since the new policy went into effect. This could mean that people had rather not take a job. It could mean that there are duplications of payment. It should mean that welfare is being channeled back to those who actually need help and are unable to help themselves.

One commissioner of welfare in New York found 50 men on the rolls in his county who were able bodied and who, in his opinion, were able to work. He then

directed them to report at the highway department to work the right-of-way, picking up trash and cutting weeds.

Fifteen of the 50 remain on the rolls because they are ill. But eight promptly asked to be taken off the relief and two moved away. Nine more decided they wouldn't work and were removed from the rolls.

Nine men reported to work. They were paid \$1.85 per hour for the work they did. Two of these men proved to be good workers and were offered permanent jobs, which they accepted. This approach to welfare makes more sense than handing out money to those who demand it as their "right" merely as a citizen of the U. S.

The traditional approach to welfare has been to penalize those who work because the more they earn the less their welfare payment.

Any solution that will reward those who work and earn will be a great improvement. It just may be that New York state has made a landmark breakthrough in the welfare situation.

The Law (Article 6899) VACS) Relating to the Recording and RERECORDING OF Livestock Brands and Marks

(Effective August 20, 1971)
SECTION 1. (a) This Law shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Law takes effect, have his mark and brand for such

stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.
(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and marks in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Law, all records of the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months the records made after this takes effect shall be examined and brands in the county, SECTION 2. All brands registered under this Law shall be registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Law.
